SCHOOL REPORT.

Your School Committee present the following Report.

We are glad to be able to state, that we believe that the schools that have been taught in the several districts in the town, have been generally satisfactory to those most interested in them.

The Spring Term of the higher department of Centre School, was taught by Miss Sarah Stevens, a lady of excellent qualifications for the occupation of teaching. For a time the school seemed prosperous and the teacher was very popular with the scholars; but for some unaccountable reason the number of scholars decreased toward the end of the term, and though the examination showed exceedingly well, it was a source of regret that so many had left the school.

We attach no blame to the teacher. We think it unjust to a faithful teacher to desert her near the close of the term, unless the reason for so doing is an imperative one.

We might think ourselves fortunate if we could secure and retain in this department, the services of so able a teacher as Miss Stevens.

Winter Term, Albert H. Jewell, teacher. Something more than an experience in, and an aptness for teaching, were regarded necessary in the management of this school.

A little more sternness and perhaps a little more physical strength, than most lady teachers possess, we thought might be employed to advantage, and so we deemed it expedient, all things considered, to procure a man to teach this term.

We hope that the excellent state of discipline that Mr. Jewell leaves this school in, will be maintained in the future.

If credit for good order is in part due the school, we are willing to accord it to the school; but in our opinion a great share of the credit is due the teacher. It did not seem to be the object of the teacher to push his pupils forward in their studies, so much as it was to take each step with thoroughness: and to make them thoroughly acquainted with the ground they were going over.

Could such a teacher be kept in this school, we should hear no complaint about disorder, no committee men would be summoned to quell a rebellion, and our children would be taught lessons of obedience to school discipline, which we think they have been very slow to learn.

South East District Spring Term, Miss Linnie M. Daniels teacher. She had had no experience in teaching, and labored under the disadvantage of having some advanced scholars near her own age, and having been a resident in the district from childhood, and a scholar in the school house where she commenced her work as a teacher.

Notwithstanding all these embarrassing circumstances, she conducted the school to a successful termination, and the examination was creditable to both teacher and scholars.

Fall Term South East School. This school was placed under the care of Miss Mary L. Farley. Miss Farley has the faculty of commanding at once the respect and affection of her scholars. Consequently it seems to be a pleasure to be guided in the ways of learning by her.

We are fortunate to have such a teacher in our schools, and wish that teachers of her ability were more plenty than they are.

When we report that Miss Mary Bryant taught the Spring term in the Southwest district, it is equivalent to reporting that it was well taught.

Her qualifications for her vocation are too well known to need recapitulation.

She has served us as a teacher many times and always most acceptably. As a disciplinarian she can hardly be excelled. We are sorry to lose her as a teacher, and our best wishes go with her.

Fall Term: Miss Jennie A. Pond, teacher. The school was in an excellent state of discipline when Miss Pond took it, and we are glad to say that she kept it nearly up to the same mark.

Miss Pond was rather young for so responsible a place, but we think she possesses those requisites that will make her a good teacher if she chooses to make teaching a business in the future.

Miss Addie Ware taught the Spring Term of the West School quite successfully. The small number of scholars in the school, gave the teacher so much time to each one, that praiseworthy progress was made in the various branches taught; and the scholars deserve commendation for excellent behavior in view of the fact that the teacher was a former schoolmate.

Fall Term. Miss Clara B. Taft, teacher. This was an excellent school. We think that we may say, that in our opinion no school in the town has made in one term as much progress as this one.

We hope that the services of Miss Taft can be procured again.

Miss Emogene Harrington was teacher of the North East School, Spring Term. The school numbered only nine scholars, and the teacher was inexperienced. But the school was quite successful, and much progress was made by the pupils in their studies.

We think if Miss Harrington chooses the vocation of teacher, she will not choose amiss.

Winter Term, Miss Ella Clark teacher. We were pleased to notice all through the term, that the scholars yielded a willing obedience to the wishes of the teacher, and that mutual good will and friendliness pervaded the school.

Good progress was made by all especially some little ones. The term closed with much credit to the teacher and the pupils. We think Miss Clark will prove to be a very successful teacher.

Centre District, Primary Department, Spring Term, Miss Ella Clark teacher. Miss Clark made her first attempts at teaching in this school, and though fears were entertained that the care of the school would be too great a tax upon her, she proved fully equal to it, gained the love and respect of the scholars, and manifested in cases of emergency that decision that is so necessary a qualification in a good teacher.

Miss Mary Sherman taught the Fall Term. It gives us pleasure to quote from the words of a former report. The report for the year ending March 1st, 1873, Miss Sherman having taught both terms of this department that year. That report says: "we cannot use too strong language in regard to the success of this school, and when we say that we are highly gratified we express but half that we feel. We think that the parents of the scholars are under great obligation to the teacher for the service rendered."

The language of this report we cordially endorse as applicable to the teaching of this term of the school.

Centre School, Higher Department, Spring Term. Whole number of scholars, 27. Average attendance, 22. Perfect in attendance, none.

Winter Term. Whole number of scholars 33. Average attendance 30. Perfect in attendance, Ida L. Bartlet, Alfred Snow, and Frank E. Woodward.

Center School, Primary Department, Spring Term. Whole number of Scholars, 36. Average attendance, 31. Perfect in attendance, Carrie E. Dodd, Lottie O. Lyon, Georgia H. Lakin, Julia M. Marsh, Marion E. Stowe, Nellie M. Woodward, Julian M. Eager, Wallace F. Lyon, James Nugent and Henry S. Streeter.
