In the foregoing statement of the expenses for the year just closed, we trust that on careful examination it will be found reasonably satisfactory to all concerned.

It will be observed that we are again enabled to show a large financial balance in favor of the Town in this report—a thing we had scarcely dared hope for in view of the rather large liabilities incurred in some branches of Town expenditures.

Our report gives a balance of nearly five hundred dollars over and above all outstanding notes and other indebtedness of the town. This is not only better than last year by about a hundred dollars, but is a better exhibit than has been made for quite a number of years, we believe, and still we have had to encounter rather large snow bills for the past two years—more than the average—yet not as high as happens occasionally, of course.

In view of the accumulating revenues in the treasury, we ordered the Town's note for three hundred dollars (300,00) to be paid, which was done on Feb. 14. Thus we have unloaded a public burthen and while it was not large, perhaps, yet it has been large enough to avoid getting paid for very many years.

By reference to the items under the head of "Resources" of the town, and also as shown by the Collector's report, it will be seen that there is the sum of \$884 91 of uncollected taxes. A sum doubly adequate to meet the last outstanding town note. We are in hopes there will soon be in the treasury a sufficient sum with which to meet this. We have indeed already requested its payment on the first opportunity.

By reducing the expenses of the town to the lowest reasonable point consistent with judicious and proper management we are able to lighten the burthens on our tax paying citizens. This good result has already been achieved as may be seen by reference to your Assessors' reports for the past year or two, showing the rates of taxation to be on a descending scale and there is no reason why the coming year will not see a still lower rate and yet maintain all of our affairs in good condition.

The total amount paid out on account of State Aid this year was \$294.00 (last year it was \$348.) The State pays back \$205 25, leaving the direct cost to the town the past year, only \$89 25.

In conclusion, we would call attention to the condition of the Guide Boards as we are required by law to do. There have been no additions or changes in the several Guide Boards the past year. They are all in good condition, and are located as follows: One at or near the house of Michael Nugent, one near the house of Mrs. Ainsworth, one near the house of Charles S. Flint, one near the house of Daniel L. Ware, one near the house of T. Wendell, one near the house of F. T. Merriam, one near the South-west School-house, one on the North-east School-house, one near the barn of Peter Daw, one near the house of H. L. Fiske, one on the barn of Tyler

Penniman, and one at the junction of the Leicester and Worcester roads.

There was also a break in the Center Primary; the teacher was taken sick the eighth week of term; a substitute was provided who was inexperienced in teaching. Her success was as good as the average of beginners.

We are satisfied that a majority of our schools have been satisfactory, and that they all will compare favorably with our schools in the past.

We should like to say a word to teachers who mean to make a business of teaching. Prepare yourselves for your work by graduating from some State Normal School, and you will enjoy teaching more and have better success. If any teachers are having success without such preparation, no doubt they would stand very near the head with.

Our teachers are dropping off one after another, and we shall want others to take their places. Who will come?

Public Library.

To the Inhabitant of Paxton:

This report closes the sixth year of the existence of the Library, and the Trustees feel confident that the value of the Library has in no wise diminished during the year.

It is evident that the people of the town fully apprectate the great advantages of such an institution, and would not willingly see its value and usefulness impaired.

One of the teachers of the public schools during the past year, has made excellent use of the Library by making lists of books relating to studies pursued in school, especially history and natural sciences, and directing her scholars to draw, and read these books, to supplement the knowledge derived from the regular school text books.

The Library contains many useful works of this character. and we believe that the scholars in all our schools migh the greatly benefited if they were generally encouraged to read them.

The number of books added to the Library the past year, by purchase and exchange, is twenty-five, and by donation including books of reference, sixty-six, making the total number catalogued to date, thirteen hundred and ninety-five.

It will be seen that the amount received from the Dog Fund the past year was much less than during any previous year of the Library's existence, and in the coming year a still further decrease is expected, so that after paying the Librarian's salary and other necessary expenses, there will be but very little left for the purchase of books.

In addition to the ordinary expenses for the coming year, there should be a new catalogue issued to supercede the original one, and several supplements, after a revision of the Library and a considerable culling of books which are of little value and but little read, especially a large number of Public Documents, which have accumulated on the shelves from year to year, and of which probably not half a dozen are opened during a year.

We therefore ask for an appropriation the coming year, of at least twenty-five dollars (\$25) in addition to the Dog Fund, as it will be hardly possible to make any additions or improvements to the Library without it. If even more than this sum were granted it could be advantageously used.

The Librarian, Miss Ella M. Rowell, has given unqualified satisfaction, and we hope to secure her services for another year.

At the annual inspection of books, Feb. 10th, all the books were accounted for.

The number of books issued during the year, is two thousand three hundred and three. Number of persons taking books, one hundred and forty-five.

IN THE NAME OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS, you are directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Paxton qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Paxton, on Monday the fifth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following Articles, namely:—

ARTICLE 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICE 2nd. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3rd. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees, and act thereon.

ARTICLE 4th. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5th. To see what sums of money the town will grant for the support of the Public Schools, for the support of the Poor, for the repairs of Highways, Townways and Bridges; for the Contingent Charges, and paying of Debts, the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 6th. To see what disposition the town will make of their "Dog Fund."

ARTICLE 7th. To see what action the town will take in regard to the observance of "Memorial Day."

ARTICLE 8th. To see if the town will authorize their Treasurer to borrow money to pay necessary expenses, under the direction of the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 9th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers, as provided in chapter 252 and 301 of the Acts of the General Court of Massachusetts of the year 1879, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 10th. To see if the town will vote a discount on the Taxes for the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 11th. To see if the town will fix the amount of compensation for labor on the Highways the ensuing year, or act thereon.

ARTICLE 12th. To see what compensation the town will allow its Firemen the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 13th. To see if the town will accept the List of Jurors as prepared by the Seclectmen.

ARTICLE 14th. To see what action the town will take with reference providing a suitable place to house the Fire Company's apparatus, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 15th. To see what action the town will take on the question submitted by the Acts of the General Court, chapter 54 of the year 1881, namely:—"Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" The form of the ballot shall be "Yes" or "No."
