The year just closed has been an exceptional one in the matter of the severity of its storms. The fall of snow has seldom been equalled, and the marvellous dexterity displayed by the winds in getting the most of it into the highways was

certainly a most impleasant and costly feature of the whole In one locality and in the very center of the road a drift of nearly fifty rods in length and of an average of about seven feet in depth had to be cut through, also, in nearly all portions of the town except on the main road, travel was somewhat blocked for several days, and yet every exertion was made that was possible to make under like circumstances. It was simply a great and sudden snow blockade, and cost the town the round sum of five hundred dollars (nearly half of which is already paid,) to remove it. But for this unusual and unavoidable demand on the town, we should have been able to report ourselves clear of debt once more, but as it is. there is a balance against the town of about three hundred and fifty dollars—one hundred and thirty of which was inherited from last year, and that mainly by reason of no provision being made for the discount on the taxes of that year. We would recommend that the town provide for the discharge of this indebtedness.

Early in the season of last year, there was a break in the bridge at the foot of "Arnold Hill" on the main road. It proved to be quite serious inasmuch as some fifteen feet of earth had to be removed before the difficulty could be reached or repaired. The space in which men could work was so confined that it required several days before travel was resumed. This extra labor consumed nearly fifty dollars of the sum granted the surveyor in that district. Again, the railing put up by the County Commissioners on the causeway beyond the town farm had so far rotted and broken away as to be quite worthless. New railing was ordered to replace the old, and the surveyor has put up a substantial line of rail for forty rods as a guard to the east side of the road in that locality. Of course this added considerably to the amount this surveyor had to spend in his district, but it was money well laid out and in the interests of economy. Indeed, nearly all of the main

road has had extra work in the way of repairs to culverts, bridges, and railing, and yet all was done inside of the grant for roads, with fifty dollars remaining unused of said grant.

Perhaps we should not add more, except to briefly refer to the claim for damages made against the town by one James Ahern. He gave notice in last of January of having been hurt in the highway by a falling limb. We found him in bed unable to get up as he stated. It was decided wise to have a medical examination, and physicians were called who were unable to detect anything serious, and left orders for him to get up and eat his dinner. We apprehend no further complaints at the present time.

Finally, we have to report that the guide boards are all in good condition at the present time, with a single exception, and are located as follows: One near the Old Hotel which needs a new post, one near the house of C. F. Flint, one near the house of N. T. Frink, one near the house of T. Wendell, one near the house of F. T. Merriam, one near the S. W. School-house, one on the N. E. School-house, one near barn of Peter Daw, one near the house of H. L. Fiske, Jr., one on barn of T. S. Penniman, and one at the junction of the Leicester and Worcester highways.

The Trustees of the Public Library, during the past year, as before, have endeavored to steadily increase its usefulness by the frequent addition of valuable books. The book purchasing committee have used much care in selecting, aiming to secure books of a useful and instructive character, having a decidedly moral tone, rather than the lighter works of fiction, which although they may be popular, are of doubtful value.
