The year just closed has been a severe one for the financial interests of the town. More than a thousand dollars of debt is shown to have accumulated during the year, most of which is due to two causes, namely, that of the heavy snow bills and worse road bills. We had thought our burthens heretofore large in the matter of breaking out roads, but last year they were almost unprecedented, and before the town had finished paying bills for that department, there came on the 19th of August last what is known as the "great washout." The fall of rain was such that within about three hours and a half the empty brooks and small water courses were swollen to great streams, and the highways of the town which in the morning were in excellent condition and repair were so badly torn up that it was several weeks before their restoration to public travel was accomplished and their safety assured. In several instances the culverts across the main roads were found so totally inadequate to such emergencies that small plank bridges were substituted. This added somewhat to the cost of repairs, and then the deficiency in the Poor Department adds to the debt.

But no human foresight could avert those calamities—of snow and water fall—the past year, and while regretting them, we may hope that Providence will in the future deal with us as a people more benignly.

It is the custom to place in the town warrant such special articles as any reputable citizen may request, and several such have been inserted. That relating to a new Town Hall, which would involve some cost, we could not advise entering upon at this time in view of our present indebtedness; however, your attention is called to the condition of the "Allen Fund" as shown in the report of the Treasurer. The fund was turned over by the late trustee by advice of counsel to the Treasurer.

Finally, we beg to state that the guide boards are all in good condition at the present time, with one exception, and are located as follows: One near the Old Hotel, one near the house of C. F. Flint, one near the house of N. T. Frink, one near the house of T. Wendell, one near southwest school house, one near the house of F. T. Merriam, one on the N. E. school house, one near barn of Peter Daw, one on barn of T. S. Penniman, and one at the junction of the Leicester and Worcester highways.

It will be seen by the financial statement already submitted that although the net expenses of the farm are about the same as last year, the Overseers have been obliged to considerably overrun the appropriation for the support of the poor, owing mainly to the unusual expense for the support of poor out of the Almshouse, and some necessary and long delayed repairs upon the buildings, especially upon the stables, which had become unfit for the purpose for which they were intended, as well as unsafe, and we decided to put in new ones which will well add their cost to the value of the place, as well as to the convenience and satisfaction of those having charge of the farm, also the expense of the Butler boy at the Reform School; these and the expense of the settlement of the well known Hastings case of long standing, all of which were not contemplated at the time of making the appropriation for the support of the poor, and will more than account for the difference between the liabilities and resources. In relation to the Hastings case, about four years ago the City of Cambridge commenced an action against this town to recover the expense of supporting one Barney Hastings and family, claiming a military settlement in Town, the case was put into the hands of Messrs. Bacon & Hopkins, as counsel for the Town, who for one reason and another, failed to make much headway with the case until last year, when they were directed by the Overseers of the Poor to bring the case to a settlement as soon as possible. The case was brought to a trial before the Superior Court of Cambridge early this year, and decided in favor of the Town. The City of Cambridge then carried it up to the Supreme Court, where it was again and finally decided in favor of this Town, and we feel that the Town may well congratulate itself upon the favorable settlement of this case, and in our opinion the bill of Messrs. Hopkins and Bacon is moderate in consideration of the able services rendered. The Overseers have thought best in view of all the circumstances to make a change in the warden at the almshouse and have engaged Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bugbee of Spencer to take charge of the Town farm and almshouse for the coming year at a salary of \$250.00.

Report of the Free Public Library.

To the Inhabitants of Paxton.

In conformity with the established rules of this institution, it becomes our duty at this season of the year to submit to the citizens of the town a brief report of the condition of your Free Public Library.

The library was opened to the public June 9th, 1877, and the ten and one half years of its existence have been ample time to test its utility as a public educator.

From the time it was first opened till the present it has been constantly patronized by those who have sought instruction or amusement, and we believe their desires have been abundantly satisfied; not only they outh in the school room, but all ages may find in the library something to give them a greater diversity of knowledge upon a given subject, and we believe that a fair share of the intelligence and enlightenment of our people is due the library.

Each year a few new books have been added, which have been selected with care, that they possess individual merit, and be of an instructive character, that they may leave a healthful impression on the minds of those who read them.

During the past year 42 new volumes have been purchased, and these yearly additions to the library, if selected with care, constantly enhance its value.

For the year ending Feb. 11, 1888, 1320 books have been issued to 122 persons, which fact is sufficient evidence that this institution is appreciated by the town's people.

Of this sum \$6.25 was due the librarian Jan. 1, but owing to her absence from town it has not yet been paid, so in reality there is but \$2.36 in hand of the Treasurer.

We regret to lose the services of the librarian, Miss Rowell, who has filled the position so faithfully and efficiently for several years, and it is our earnest desire that she may speedily recover from her illness and come back to continue the service which we have so highly prized in the past.

Owing to the financial condition of the town, the renewal of the insurance on the library has been paid from the library funds.

At the annual inspection Feb. 11, all but nine books were in their places, seven of these are accounted for and two are missing, Nos. 184 and 1158.

No donations have come to our notice except several published documents from the Secretary of the Commonwealth.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

OF THE

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

To the Citizens and School Board of Paxton:

In accordance with the requirements of the State law, I submit the following, as the report of the Superintendent of your schools, for the year just closed.

While there has been no astonishing progress made in any of them during this time, yet we believe there has been good work done, and in some cases especially, a decided advance has been made in learning how to study and how to think.

The object of the school is not simply to teach facts and principles, which may be done in such a manner, that the pupil can recite them in a parrot-like way, with little or no thought of the meaning his words convey. Learning facts in this way is of very little use, for they are soon forgotten, but the pupil should be taught to think for himself, to master difficulties as they occur, and thus cultivate mental self-reliance, without which, he will be perforce, an unimportant member of society.

The discipline maintained has been, we believe, above the average, in the common country schools. In some cases it may have seemed rather strict, but parents sometimes find difficulty in governing a family of four or five members, and a teacher's position is more difficult, owing to the greater number of individuals to be governed and the greater variety of dispositions to be dealt with. As a rule the pupils have been remarkably well disposed, and we enter no complaint against them.

The subject of regular and punctual attendance has been often commented upon, but a repetition of the subject seems important and even necessary; while attendance every day, the health permitting, is very essential, it is equally important that the pupil be on time, and that he does not adopt the idea that if he is only there sometime during the session it is of no consequence, if he is five or ten minutes late. The habit of punctuality is one of the good lessons to be learned in attendance upon school.

The parent as well as the child has a duty in this respect. Irregular attendance is a serious hindrance in more ways than one. If a child is kept out of school one or two days in a week, he finds it hard and well-nigh impossible to keep up with his class-mates, misses the lesson and the teaching which accompanied it, gets discouraged, unless in exceptional cases, and finally loses much of his interest, at the same time he is a weight for his class to carry.

It is a fine thing for a child to determine he will secure an education, whatever obstacle may interpose, still such cases are sufficiently rare to be noticeable. The average pupil needs encouragement and some of the difficulties removed from his path; his school-days are likely to be short enough at best, and hence the greater need that there be as little interruption as possible.

The written examinations in the Grammar School have been continued during the year, and we think the benefit derived from them has not been slight.

The very act of writing answers to the questions, makes the subject come out sharply before the mind, and if a mistake is made, it is not likely the same one will occur again. It also shows the pupil where his knowledge of a subject is deficient and where he needs to give additional study. These examinations have not been insisted upon in the other schools, for a number of reasons. One new study has been introduced into the Grammar school this winter, viz: Book-keeping, which has been quite a popular study, and one which must be of great practical use to every member of the class. It would be an excellent thing if the winter term of this school could be twelve weeks long instead of ten, but if the town feels that it is not best to go to the additional expense, it might be well to shorten the term in the autumn, two weeks and add them to the winter term, thus securing two weeks more to the older pupils who have but one term during the year, in which to attend school.

The Warren's Common School geographies, which have been in use throughout the town for a long series of years, have been exchanged for a recently revised edition of the same work, and we feel the exchange has been advantageous. The grammar in use was replaced by Patterson's, and it has given satisfaction to teachers and pupils alike.

Appended to this report is a table giving a variety of statistics in regard to the school, also items of expenses occurred in connection with them.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Paxton qualified to vote in Elections and Town Affairs, to meet in the Town Hall in said Paxton, on Monday the fifth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following Articles, namely:—

Art. 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2d. To choose a Town Clerk for the eusuing year.

Art. 3d. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Art. 4th. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 5th. To see what sums of money the Town will grant for the support of the Public Schools, and transportation of Scholars; for the support of the Town's Poor; for the repairs of the Highways and Bridges and for the Contingent Fund the ensuing year and act in any way thereon.

Art. 6th. To see what disposition the Town will make of its "Dog Fund."

Art. 7. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money to liquidate the whole or any part of its indebtedness.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money for the relief of Indigent and Disabled Soldiers, as provided in chapter 30 of the Public Statutes.

Art. 9. To see what action the Town will take in the matter of the suit against the town brought by George C. LeMonier for the recovery of the Tax assessed against him in 1886.

Art. 10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will order the appointment of a Superintendent of the Public Schools, the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money to Henry D. Rice of Rutland, Mass., either as compensation or reimbursement for monies paid by or contracted to be paid by him on account of the last illness, and funeral expenses of his mother, the late Emily R. Allen, widow of Simon Allen, or on account of grave-stones erected by said Rice over the grave of the said Widow Allen.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will authorize the sale of any or all of its Real Estate, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will take any action with regard to a new Town Hall to be erected out of the proceeds of the "Allen Fund," or securing a location for the same or act any way thereon.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money for care of and lighting the lamps around or near the Common.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will grant or refuse to grant any licenses for the sale of Intoxicating Liquors the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote a discount on the Taxes the ensuing year, and fix a time when they shall be paid or act in any way thereon.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will fix the amount of conpensation for labor on the Highways the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will authorize its Treasurer to borrow money, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to meet current expenses or other liabilities, in anticipation of the Taxes.

Art. 20th. To see if the Town will accept the List of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will authorize the bell to be rung the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office, one at the Hotel, and one at the Meeting-house in said Town, ten days at least, before the time and place for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting as aforesaid.
