We have not gone into a detailed account of the expenses and income of the Union Poor Farm accounts, as it seems unnecessary, inasmuch as these will be published in full in the annual report of the Association, April 1. Briefly, the net expenses of the Poor Farm Association for ten months, ending February 1, 1892, were, including rent and interest, \$1110,56.

Total number of weeks' board, 486, namely: Hubbardston, 267 6-7; Holden, 112 6-7; Paxton, 60 4-7; Princeton, 44 5-7 weeks, at a net cost of \$2.28 per week, against \$2.89 per week last year for the same period of time. We have increased the number and value of the stock on the farm and the general valuation has been maintained.

The town of Westminster has been admitted into the Association, to take effect April 1, and one or two other towns are considering the matter, and on the whole the experience of the past year confirms the wisdom of this method of caring for the poor.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

### To the Citizens of Paxton:

Our association with the schools has been hardly long enough to more than give an idea of their present conditions, we having served only part of a year to fill vacancies. We have been placed somewhat under a disadvantage, being obliged to carry on work commenced by others and being left without any of the original members chosen at the last annual town meeting. We have also been tempted to resign our positions, but having somewhat of a determined spirit, disliked very much to give up a thing once commenced, until finished. Yet we feel that we have been successful in hiring earnest teachers with good methods, teachers that are well fitted and capable of teaching good schools.

Quite a number of the parents of children attending the Primary School asked us if we would not open that school for a winter term. We were strongly inclined to do so, but felt that if we did we would probably overdraw your appropriation. We are well satisfied, however, that great advantage might be derived and much progress made by the pupils attending this branch of our school, if it could be opened for a longer period of time.

The schools of a town will be such as the public demand. If public sentiment calls for economy by depriving its pupils of a term, or a few weeks of schooling, which would be to their great advantage, or by hiring teachers for a small sum, while others with greater ability and knowledge might be hired for a little larger compensation, our school system will not advance much. On the other hand if the public will demand the best the town can afford, appropriate as large a sum of money as it possibly can, and rest satisfied with nothing but the best, good schools will be the result.

We believe the best results can be obtained by accepting the provisions of Chapter 431 of the Acts of 1888, enabling several towns to form a union and elect a Superintendent. In this way our schools can be under the instruction of a person who has made a special study of the work. The State makes a special appropriation of a thousand dollars for such unions.

We have had only one application for the payment of tuition, under the law found in Chapter 263 of the Acts of 1891. We quote the law below, thinking it an excellent thing for the promotion of education in small towns that support no high school, and thinking it may also be useful to some of the citizens who may wish their children to attend a high school.

Chapter 263.

SECTION 1. Any town not required by law to maintain a high school shall pay for the tuition of any child who, with the parent or guardian resides in said town, and who attends the high school of another town or city, provided the parent or guardian of such child before such attendance obtains the approval of the school committee of the town in which the child and parent or guardian reside.

SECTION 2. If any town not required by law to maintain a high school neglects or refuses to pay for tuition as provided in the preceding section, such town shall be liable therefor to the parent or guardian of the child furnished with such tuition, if the parent or guardian has paid the same, or to the town or city furnishing the same, in action of contract.

#### WARRANT.

#### Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

WORCESTER, SS.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton, in the County of Worcester: GREETING:

IN THE NAME OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Paxton qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall, in said Paxton, on Monday, the 7th day of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following Articles. The polls shall be open from 11 o'clock A. M. to 3 o'clock P. M.

ART. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To hear the reports of Town Officers and Committees, and act thereon.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will accept of Sections 74, 75, 76 and 77 of Chapter 27 of the Public Statutes, relating to the election of Road Commissioners, one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, or act in any way thereon.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will accept of Sections 64, 65, 66, 67 and 68 of Chapter 27 of the Public Statutes, relating to the election of Selectmen and Assessors, one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years. Also to see if the Town will accept of the provisions of Sections 69, 70, 71, 72, and 73 of Chapter 27 of the Public Statutes, relating to the election of Overseers of the Poor, one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, or act in any way thereon. ART. 5. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 6. To see what sums of money the Town will grant for the support of the Public Schools, and for the transportation of scholars; for the support of the Town's Poor; for the repairs of the Highways and Bridges; and for Contingent Charges of the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

ART. 7. To see what disposition the Town will make of the Dog Fund.

ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to have a winter term of the Primary School.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will provide additional fireproof protection for the Town Records, and grant a sum of money for the same, or act in any way thereon.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will authorize any of its officers to contract for the public use of the Telephone, and grant a sum of money for the same, or act in any way thereon.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will grant or refuse to grant licenses for the sale of Intoxicating Liquors in this Town, the ensuing year; the vote shall be "Yes or No."

ART. 12. To see if the Town will authorize the lighting of the lamps around or near the Common, or act in any way thereon.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money for Memorial Day.

ART. 14. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money for the relief of Indigent and Disabled Soldiers, as provided by the Public Statutes.

ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote a discount on Taxes paid before a given date, and fix a time when they shall be paid; likewise to see what compensation the Town will vote the Collector of Taxes the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon. ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Town Clock and grant a sum of money for the same, or act in any way thereon.

ART. 17. To see what compensation the Town will allow for Labor on the Highway the ensuing year.

ART. 18 To see if the Town will authorize their Treasurer to borrow money by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to meet current expenses or other liabilities in anticipation of the Taxes.

ART. 19. To see if the Town will accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

ART. 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Bell to be rung, and see what action the Town will take in regard to the care and renting the Town Hall the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

ART. 21. To see if the Town will unite with any other Town or Towns in the employment of a Superintendent of Schools, as provided in Chapter 44 of the Public Statutes, and any amendments or additions thereto, or act in any way thereon.

And you are hereby directed to serve this warrant by posting attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office and one at the Blacksmith's shop, in said Paxton, ten days at least before the time set for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of meeting as aforesaid.
