TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

WARRANT AND PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MONDAY, MARCH 1, 1909.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

WORCESTER, SS.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton, in the County of Worcester,

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Paxton, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall in said Paxton, on Monday, the first day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. Chose Henry H. Pike, moderator.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Voted that the reports of the Town Officers be read by their titles.

- Voted to accept the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Overseers of the Poor, Trustees of the Public Library, Trustee of the C. D. Boynton Fund, Cemetery Committee, Assessors of Taxes.
 - Voted that the reports of the Superintendent of Streets and of the Road Committee be laid upon the table.

Article 3. To bring in and deposit their ballots for a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Auditor, two Constables, three members of the Board of Health, and a Superintendent of Streets, each for the term of one year; one Assessor for three years, one member of the School Committee for three years, and two Trustees of the Public Library for the term of three years.

All the above to be voted for on one ballot.

Also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question, "Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?"

Also to choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M., and closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

The Town Officers elected will be found on pages 3, 4, and 5 of this book.

The result of the vote on the license question was as follows: "Yes," twenty (20); "No," forty-two (42); Blanks, four (4).

Article 4. To appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the support of the town's poor; repairs of highways and bridges; support of the public schools and transportation of scholars; breaking roads; and for contingent expenses.

- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400, together with the income of the D. R. Boynton Fund for the support of the poor.
- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the repairs of highways and bridges.
- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200 for the support of the public schools and transportation of scholars.
- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for breaking roads.

Voted to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money which together with the income of the C. D. Boynton Fund will make a total of \$1000 for contingent expenses. Voted that the sum of \$42.72 be raised and appropriated, which, together with the balance in favor of the town of \$499.28, making a total of \$540, be used by the Town Treasurer to pay the schoolhouse debt.

Article 5. To see what disposition the town will make of its Dog Fund.

Voted that the Dog Fund be used for the support of Public Library.

Article 6. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial day; and for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers as provided by law.

- Voted to grant and appropriate the sum of \$10 for Memorial day.
- Voted to grant and appropriate the sum of \$50 for State aid. Voted to grant and appropriate the sum of \$96 for soldiers' relief.
- Article 7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and lighting of street lamps, or act in any way thereon.
 - Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for street lighting.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote a discount on taxes paid before a given date and fix a time when interest shall be charged and taxes made payable; and likewise to fix the compensation to be paid the Collector for the ensuing year, or take any action relative thereto.

Voted that no discount be granted.

- Voted that all taxes be made payable October 1, 1909, and that interest at the rate of 6% per annum shall be charged on all unpaid taxes after that date.
- Voted that the compensation of the Collector be the same as last year, which was $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ on all taxes collected.

Article 9. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of an Insurance Company for acting as surety on Official Bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same, or act in any way thereon.

Voted to appropriate the same amount as last year, which was \$15, and that the Selectmen be authorized to approve the same.

Article 10. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer to borrow money under the direction and by the approval of the Selectmen, in anticipation of taxes assessed in 1909.

Voted that the Treasurer be so authorized.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Voted to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by Selectmen.

Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to employ counsel to defend suits that may exist or be brought against the town; and to furnish advice and counsel to all town officers, when deemed necessary by the Selectmen.

Voted that the Selectmen be so authorized.

Article 13. To see if the town will fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Voted that labor on the highway for the ensuing year be 17 cents per hour for men and $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents per hour for a horse.

Article 14. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the Town Hall and also of the town clock the ensuing year.

Voted to leave the matter with the Selectmen.

Article 15. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended by the Tree Warden; also for the improvement and care of the Common and sidewalks, or act in any way thereon. Voted to grant the sum of \$25 for the use of the Tree Warden. Voted to grant the sum of \$20 for Common and sidewalks.

Article 16. To see if the town will accept the provisions of Chapter 209, Acts of 1908, entitled an act to provide for the protection of forest or sprout lands from fire. The vote shall be • taken by separate ballot and shall be "Yes" or "No" in answer to the following question printed upon the ballot. "Shall an Act be passed by the General Court in the year nineteen hundred and eight, entitled, 'An Act to provide for the protection of forest or sprout lands from fire' be accepted by this town?" A majority vote shall be required for the acceptance of this Act.

Voted to accept the provisions of Chap. 209 of the Acts of 1908, "Yes," 38; "No," 2.

Voted to take up article 25.

Article 25. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money to be used in exterminating the gypsy and brown-tail moths in this town, or act in any way thereon.

Voted to grant and appropriate the sum of \$50 to be used in exterminating the gypsy and brown-tail moths.

Article 17. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will grant for the use of the firemen for fire purposes, or act in any way thereon.

Voted to appropriate the sum of \$50 for the use of the firemen for fire purposes.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to suppress the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors. To be spent under the direction of the Selectmen or other authorized agents, or act in any way thereon.

Voted to appropriate the sum of \$100 for the suppression of the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors in this town to be spent under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$10 and appropriate so much of it as may be deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of Chap. 502, Acts of 1906, relative to the appointment of a school physician, or act in any way thereon.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10 for said purpose.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to repair and paint the liberty pole, or act in any way thereon.

Voted to leave the matter in the hands of the Selectmen.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate money to repair the furnace, or to install a new heating plant at the Town Hall building, or act in any way thereon.

Voted to appropriate the sum of \$50 for repairs on the furnace in the Town Hall building and that the matter of repairs be left with the Selectmen.

Article 22. To see if the town will authorize the setting of bounds at the "Howe Place," grant a sum of money for the same, or act in any way thereon.

Voted that the matter be left in the hands of the Selectmen.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions as made in the will of Clarissa H. Parker, whereby she directs that the sum of \$100 be given to the town of Paxton, the income only to be used on the care of her lot in the cemetery.

Voted to accept.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions made in the will of the late Delia M. Estabrook, whereby she directs that the sum of \$100 be given to the town of Paxton, in trust, the income only to be expended to keep the burial lot of Daniel Franklin Estabrook in good condition perpetually, also the lot of Phineas M. Howe in good condition perpetually.

Voted to pass over the article.

ACTION TAKEN AT SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, NOVEMBER 2, 1909.

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. Chose Charles F. Flint, moderator. Article 2. To see if the town will vote to accept of Mrs. Elizabeth Goddard the sum of \$100, the income to be used for the care of the Goddard lot in cemetery.

Voted to accept.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from Charles A. Bemis. The income to be used for the care of the burial lot of Tyler Bemis.

Voted to accept.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

HOLDEN, MASS., Jan. 29, 1910.

To the Honorable School Board of the Town of Paxton:

At present there are sixty-six pupils in your school building. It seems to me that the town of Paxton can reasonably expect as good schools as can be found in any country town in the State.

Assuming that parents and tax-payers in general have this high ideal, I will say at once that to accomplish this is my sole aim, namely to help make the schools of this town as good as can be found under similar circumstances.

In order to secure the best and desired results, our teachers must be both good teachers and good disciplinarians; both qualities are of vital importance. It is as necessary that the child be taught, from his first term to the end of his course, strict and cheerful obedience, self-control, and respect for authority, as it is for him to be taught his daily tasks. The problems of your school demand a strong teacher in control of the building; such an one I believe you have; strong in methods of teaching the three upper grades, and tactful and wise in discipline. The efforts of this principal must be supplemented by the efficient, loyal coöperation of the other teachers.

The strength of a school always lies in the teacher; a successful teacher must be retained. If it becomes necessary to raise the salary of an effective teacher in order to retain her, it should be done without hesitation; a dollar per week, say, is not of great consideration compared with the welfare of Paxton children.

It is in continuance of this thought of doing as well as possible for the child that I mention the teaching of music in the public schools.

The old-time singing school is a thing of the past. It often accomplished its mission well; but, though some may wish it back, it has gone forever. If our children do not learn the elements of music in the public schools, where will they learn them?

Our schools must educate not for school, but for life.

What can we give the ordinary boy or girl, that will add more to his enjoyment in later life than the knowledge of music and the power to participate in it?

In what way can we obtain a more immediate and satisfactory return for a small investment than to have in a year's time, perhaps, a large number of children and young people able to help materially in the songs of church and social gatherings?

You hear the question, "Can all children be taught to sing?" No, all children cannot be developed into "singers," but all may be taught the principles upon which music is founded; while at least nine out of every ten may be helped to sing as naturally, and relatively as well, as they now read. The belief that much may be accomplished without the aid of the expert is a fallacy.

I have had an opportunity to study this question of music in the public schools for the past decade, and I am thoroughly convinced that "worth-while" results can be obtained only by the trained specialist.

Precedent should have some weight, and it is a fact that there are but very few small and poor towns in the State which do not employ a teacher of music, not as an adornment, but as a necessity.

I urge you not as an enthusiast in music, but as one who constantly feels his loss of early training in it, give the boys and girls of Paxton a chance.

Now the cost of a supervisor of music for this town would probably be \$2.00 per week, with an additional expenditure of \$20.00 the first year for books and music supplies, and an annual expenditure of not more than \$5.00 after the first year.

I am in favor of maintaining a strong corps of teachers, introducing music, and of keeping a good equipment in text-books, maps, etc., even if it becomes necessary to shorten the length of the school year to thirty-six weeks. Certainly the present appropriation for schools should be maintained, and if it could be increased by \$100 or \$200 we could show the people within a year that a good investment had been made. It may not be out of place here to speak of the interest of the state in our schools, and the elastic method of apportioning the state school fund, a method which is designed, as I have heard the state authorities say within a year, to reward the small town which deals liberally with its schools; Paxton receives about onehalf the money which it uses in its schools from the state. This distribution depends upon, firstly, the valuation of the town; secondly, the amount of its school appropriation in proportion to the total appropriation, as you will readily see by the following quotation from Section 1 of Chapter 456 of the Acts of 1903.

"Every town whose school tax is not less than one-third of its whole tax shall receive a proportion of said remainder" (income of school fund) "expressed by one-third; every town whose school tax is not less than one-fourth of its whole tax shall receive a proportion expressed by one-fourth; every town whose school tax is not less than one-fifth its whole tax shall receive a proportion expressed by one-fifth; and every town whose school tax is not less than one-sixth of its whole tax shall receive a proportion expressed by one-fifth; and every town whose school tax is not less than one-sixth of its whole tax shall receive a proportion expressed by one-sixth."

Thus you see that the town which decreases its school appropriation may drop from one class into a lower one, making in the town of Holden recently a difference of about \$200; while the town which increases its school appropriation (in comparison with its total tax) may change into a higher class, thereby gaining an increased share of the state fund.

The state authorities consider this matter of the distribution of the school fund, and of a town striving to secure a generous amount of it, most important.

The question of vaccination has recently occurred. Of course the law in this case is very plain, "A child who has not been vaccinated shall not be admitted to a public school except upon presentation of a certificate granted for cause stated therein, signed by a regular practising physician that he is not a fit subject for vaccination."

We are obliged to enforce the law, but not violently. Unless threatened by contagion, I recommend that, during the warmer weather of the spring and summer, the parents attend to the vaccination of the children so that at the beginning of the fall term the law relative to this matter may be complied with.

Last winter Miss Burnham conducted a very successful prizespeaking contest among the pupils of her school. I approve of this as I think that the influence of the "contest" improved the pupils' work in reading. I would like to have the prize-speaking contest of the grammar school an annual occurrence.

At the date of this writing the teachers, under the direction of the superintendent, are fitting up the basement with swings and other appliances of a playroom. I wish to see a reasonable amount of this same kind of care-taking done out-of-doors as well as in. A great step in discipline is made when the teacher can tell the children "do" instead of "don't."

The earnest coöperation of the parents is sought. The education of the child rests in the home as well as in the school; parent and teacher should confer together and should work in harmony for the interests of the child.

The parent can and should do much to improve the school attendance.

I would like to see such an attitude on the part of parents and pupils that the child would look forward, not to reaching the age of fourteen, but to completing the course of the ninth grade of the schools of his town.

Only last night Mr. Fish, principal of Worcester's new "Trade School," said to me, "I try to impress on the boys who apply for admission the importance of completing the work of the grades, in fact I don't want them till they have finished the common schools." Paxton boys are interested in this "Trade School" and the words of its principal should have effect.

I want to see more than seventeen pupils in the grammar school and more than three in the ninth grade.

Mr. Fish further said, "All I want is to do what is best for the boys."

With the same thought I will close; "All I want is to do what is best for the child." Respectfully submitted,

TOWN WARRANT.

FOR ANNUAL MEETING, MONDAY, MARCH 7TH, 1910.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

WORCESTER SS.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton in the County of Worcester,

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Paxton, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall in said Paxton, on Monday, the 7th day of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1---To choose a moderator, by ballot, to preside at said meeting.

Article 2---To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Article 3—To bring in and deposit their ballots for Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables, three members of the Board of Health, and Superintendent of Streets, each for a term of one year; one Assessor for three years, one member of the School Committee for three years, and two Library Trustees for a-term of three years. All the above to be voted for on one ballot; also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question:—"Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M. and closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

Article 4—To appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the support of the Town's Poor, repairs of Highways and Bridges, support of Public Schools and transportation of scholars, breaking Roads, and for Contingent Expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 5—To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for the Board of Health, to pay such bills as legally come under their charge, or take any action relative thereto.

- Article 6--To see what disposition the town will make of its Dog Fund.

Article 7—To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day, and for the relief of indigent and disabled Soldiers as provided by law.

Article 8—To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and maintenance of street lights, or act in any way thereon.

Article 9—To see if the town will vote a discount on taxes paid before a given date and fix a time when interest shall be charged and taxes made payable and likewise fix the compensation to be paid the Collector for the ensuing year, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of an Insurance Company for acting as surety on Official Bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same, or act in any way thereon.

Article 11--To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer to borrow money under the direction and by the approval of Selectmen in anticipation of the taxes assessed in 1910.

Article 12-To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Article 13—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to employ counsel to defend suits that may exist or be brought against the town and to furnish advice and counsel to Tax Collectors or any Town Officers, when deemed necessary by the Selectmen. Article 14-To see if the town will fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Article 15—To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the Town Hall and also of the Town Clock the ensuing year.

Article 16—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair and put in proper condition, the public Hay Scales, or act in any way thereon.

Article 17—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to suppress the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors, to be spent under the direction of the Selectmen, or other authorized agents, or act in any way thereon.

Article 18--To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended by the Tree Warden; also for the care and improvement of the Common, and sidewalks, or act in any way thereon.

Article 19—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten dollars (\$10), and appropriate so much of it as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of Chapter 502, Acts of 1906, relating to the appointment of school physicians, or act or do anything relative thereto.

Article 20—To see if the town will authorize the Overseers of the Poor, or any other committee, to contract with the Charlton Poor Farm Association for a term of one or more years from the 1st day of April, 1910, for the support of the town's poor when, in their opinion, it would be for the interest of the town to do so.

Article 21—To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money to be used to suppress the Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths in this town, or act in any way thereon.

Article 22—To see if the town will vote to accept, in trust, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) the income to be used in the care of the burial lot of Nathaniel Clark.

Article 23--To see if the town will vote to accept, in trust, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100), the income to be expended to keep the burial lot of Ralph Earle in good condition perpetually.

Article 24--To see if the town will appoint a committee to confer with the officials of the Worcester Consolidated Street Railway Co. relative to extending its road from Tatnuck to Paxton Center, or take any action in relation thereto.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office and one at the Blacksmith Shop, in said Town of Paxton, ten days, at least, before the time set for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
