## TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

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PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 7,  
1910.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

WORCESTER, SS.

*To either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton, in the County  
of Worcester,*

### GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Paxton, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall in said Paxton, on Monday, the 7th day of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting. Chose Frank H. Robinson moderator.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Voted to have the reports read by their titles. Voted to accept the reports of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Streets, Library Trustees, and Trustee of the C. D. Boynton Fund.

Article 3. To bring in and deposit their ballots for Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables, three members of the Board of Health, and Superintendent of

Streets, each for the term of one year; one Assessor for three years, one member of the School Committee for three years, and two members of the Library Trustees for a term of three years. All the above to be voted for on one ballot.

Also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question:—"Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquor in this town?" Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

The list of officials chosen will be found in the front of this book.

Article 4. To appropriate such sums as may be deemed necessary for the support of the Town's Poor; repairs of Highways and Bridges; support of the Public Schools and transportation of scholars; breaking roads; and for contingent charges.

Voted to appropriate the sum of Four hundred (\$400) dollars in addition to the income from the C. D. Boynton fund for the support of Poor.

Voted to appropriate the sum of Seven hundred (\$700) dollars for repairs of highways and bridges.

Voted to appropriate the sum of Twelve hundred (\$1200) dollars for the support of the public schools and transportation of scholars.

Voted not to appropriate any money for breaking roads.

Voted to appropriate a sum of money, which added to the income of the C. D. Boynton fund, will make a total of Twelve hundred (\$1200) dollars for contingent expenses.

Article 5. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for the Board of Health, to pay such bills as legally come under their charge, or take any action relative thereto.

Voted to grant the sum of One hundred (\$100) dollars for the use of the Board of Health to pay bills due the City of Worcester for Isolation Hospital case.

Article 6. To see what disposition the town will make of its dog fund.

Voted that the Dog Fund be used for the support of the Public Library.

Article 7. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial day, and for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers.

Voted to grant the sum of Ten (\$10) dollars for Memorial day.

Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to draw the sum of One hundred and fifty (\$150) dollars from the town treasury for the support of indigent and disabled soldiers.

Article 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and maintenance of the street lights or act in any way thereon.

Voted to raise the sum of One hundred and fifty (\$150) dollars for care of street lights.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote a discount on taxes paid before a given date; and fix the time when interest shall be charged and taxes be made payable; and likewise fix the compensation to be paid the Collector for the ensuing year, or take any action in relation thereto.

Voted not to grant a discount on taxes, and that all taxes shall be due October 1, 1910, and that interest be charged after that date.

Voted that the compensation of the Collector be the same as last year.

Article 10. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of an Insurance Company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.

Voted to grant the sum of Fifteen (\$15) dollars for said purpose.

Article 11. To see if the town will authorize the town treasurer to borrow money under the direction and by the approval of the Selectmen in anticipation of the taxes assessed in 1910.

Voted that the treasurer be so authorized.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Voted to accept list of Jurors.

Article 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to employ counsel to defend suits that may exist or be brought against the town and to furnish advice and counsel to the Tax Collector or any town officers, when deemed necessary by the Selectmen.

Voted that the Selectmen be so authorized.

Article 14. To see if the town will fix the compensation for labor on the highway the ensuing year.

Voted that the compensation for labor on the highway the ensuing year be 20 cents per hour for men and 25 cents per hour for pair of horses.

Article 15. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the town hall and also of the town clock the ensuing year.

Voted to leave the matter in the hands of the Selectmen.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair and put in proper condition the public hay scales or act in any way thereon.

Voted to pass over the article.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to suppress the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors, to be spent under the direction of the Selectmen or other authorized agents or act in any way thereon.



Voted to raise the sum of One hundred (\$100) dollars for the suppression of the illegal sale of liquor, to be used under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 18. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended by the Tree Warden; also for the care and improvement of the common and sidewalks or act in any way thereon.

Voted to grant the sum of Ten (\$10) dollars for use of Tree Warden.

Voted to grant the sum of Twenty (\$20) dollars for care of the common.

Voted not to grant any money to be expended on the sidewalks.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Ten (\$10) dollars, and appropriate so much of it as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of Chapter 502, Acts of 1906, relating to the appointment of school physician, or act or do anything relative thereto.

Voted to grant the sum of Ten (\$10) dollars.

Article 20. To see if the town will authorize the Overseers of the Poor or any other committee, to contract with the Charlton Poor Farm Association for a term of one or more years from the First day of April, 1910, for the support of the town's poor, when in their opinion it would be for the interest of the town to do so.

Voted that the Overseers of the Poor be instructed to contract with the Charlton Poor Farm Association for the care of the town's poor for such time as they deem necessary.

Article 21. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money to be used to suppress the Gypsy and Brown Tail moths in this town or act in any way thereon.

Voted to grant the sum of Fifty (\$50) dollars for said purpose.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to accept in trust the sum of One hundred (\$100) dollars, the income to be used in the care of the burial lot of Nathaniel Clark.

Voted that the fund be accepted, the income only, to be used.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to accept in trust the sum of One hundred (\$100) dollars, the income to be expended to keep the burial lot of Ralph Earle in good condition perpetually.

Voted to accept the fund, the income only, to be used.

Article 24. To see if the town will appoint a committee to confer with the officials of the Worcester Consolidated Street Railway Company relative to extending its road from Tatnuck to Paxton Center, or take any action in relation thereto.

Voted that a committee of three, who shall be authorized to choose two others to act with them, be chosen by acclamation. Said committee to report at a later meeting.

Fred L. Durgin, Charles H. Derby, and Daniel N. Wentworth were chosen.

ACTION TAKEN AT A SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, HELD  
MARCH 26, 1910.

Article 1. To choose a moderator by ballot to preside at said meeting.

Chose Charles F. Flint moderator.

Article 2. To bring in and deposit their ballots for one Assessor for one year to fill vacancy.

The polls will be opened at 12 o'clock M. and may close at 4 o'clock P. M.

Chose Frank A. Pierce as Assessor for one year.

Article 3. To see if the town will authorize the removal of the town hay scales to a new location, grant and appro-

priate a sum of money for that purpose, or take any action whatever regarding the repair and maintenance of said scales.

Voted that the Selectmen be a committee to investigate the matter and report later, and that they be authorized to make any temporary repairs.

ACTION TAKEN AT A SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, HELD  
APRIL 30, 1910.

Article 1. To choose a moderator by ballot to preside at said meeting.

Chose Frank H. Robinson moderator.

Article 2. To hear and act upon the reports of any committees heretofore appointed by the town.

The report of the Selectmen as a committee on hay scales was heard and accepted.

The report of the committee chosen at the last Annual Town meeting to confer with the officials of the Worcester Consolidated Street Railway Co. relative to extending their trolley line to Paxton, was given by Mr. C. H. Derby and was accepted. The committee was given further time.

Article 3. To see if the town vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the repair of the town hay scales in their present location, or authorize their removal, or take any action whatever regarding the repair and maintenance of said scales.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-five (\$75) dollars to repair the hay scales in their present location. The work to be done under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of One hundred (\$100) dollars, the income only, to be used in the perpetual care of the Abbott lot in cemetery, it being the burial place of Simon C. and Elizabeth Abbott.

Voted to accept.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

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HOLDEN, MASS., Feb. 1, 1911.

*To the Honorable School Board of the Town of Paxton:*

Since September 1, 1910, there have been enrolled in your three schools eighty-one pupils. At present date there are sixty-seven, distributed as follows: Primary twenty-one, Intermediate twenty-eight, and Grammar eighteen.

The amount raised by local tax alone for support of schools would thus give, approximately, \$17 per child.

I notice that the last report of the State Board, that of 1908-9 gives Paxton \$15.19 per child, and ranks it as number 310 among the towns of the State in this respect.

The per cent. of attendance in Paxton is low. I presume it is, to a great extent, unavoidable when so many children are carried in school teams. I know that the teachers are trying to look closely after unexcused absences. Everything possible should be done by parents, teachers, and school officials to have the child in school all the time when his health will permit.

The transportation question is an important one, and, as the child is for many hours per year wholly under the control of the driver of the team, the selection of the driver of the school team is of importance almost equal to that of the selection of the teacher.

I have inspected your teams frequently during the past year, and have found them in most instances well equipped to carry the children comfortably.

During the present school year ill health has taken from

us an efficient teacher who has served Paxton faithfully for many years. I esteem her highly as a teacher.

The three teachers who are now with us are doing creditable work, and the schools are in satisfactory condition.

A change should be made soon in geographies, as the old text-books are in poor condition. The spellers also are not doing the work for which they were designed; they are poor "tools" in the hands of the workmen.

With these two exceptions your text-books and supplies are kept up in good condition.

I would like to refer to a paragraph in my report of last year concerning the value of music in the schools, and again I recommend its adoption in Paxton, even if it becomes necessary to make the length of the school year not to exceed thirty-six weeks.

I recently heard a gentleman say, "Young people will sing something, anyway; whether they sing ribald songs of the street or those that are wholesome will depend on what they learn in school."

I wish to call attention to the vaccination law which must be enforced. Parents who have children approaching the school age should see that those children are vaccinated before sending them to school.

I would like to refer you to page 51 of my report of last year in regard to the distribution of the Massachusetts school fund. I furthermore quote from the last report of the State Board page 222 on this important subject.

"On Jan. 25, 1909, the income of the State school fund, amounting to \$229,439.73, was divided among 219 towns. The smallest sum given to any one town \$75, and the largest \$1,458.41. The method of the distribution of the income of the State school fund is meant to encourage the towns to appropriate money liberally for the support of their schools. The more a town does for its schools the greater its share of the school fund. The following table illustrates the extent to which the expenditures of local appropriations affects the town's share of the income of the school fund:—"

Amount received Jan. 25, 1909, by towns whose school tax was one sixth, one fifth, one fourth, and one third of the whole amount raised by taxation.

You will see from this table that in the \$500,000 valuation there is about \$200 difference between the third and fourth class, or between the fourth and fifth class.

I believe that the school appropriation should be left until the last appropriation at the annual town meeting, and that a short computation should be made after all other appropriations are made, in order that the town may be placed in as low a "class" as possible, thereby getting as large a sum as possible of the State money. This financial question is well worth mastering.

In closing I wish to ask the hearty, friendly, co-operation of home and school. I wish that parents would often consult with teachers, in times of harmony as well as in times of trouble, concerning the welfare of the child.

Besides this, care and foresight of the home may do much to make the daily work of the schoolroom effective.

# TOWN WARRANT.

FOR ANNUAL MEETING, MONDAY, MARCH 6TH, 1911.

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## COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

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WORCESTER, SS.

*To either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton in the County  
of Worcester,*

**GREETING:**

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Paxton, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall in said Paxton, on Monday, the 6th day of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1—To choose a moderator, by ballot, to preside at said meeting.

Article 2—To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Article 3—To bring in and deposit their ballots for Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables, three members of the Board of Health, and Superintendent of Streets, each for a term of one year; two Assessors, one for a term of three years, and one for two years; one member of the School Committee for three years; and two Library Trustees, for a term of three years. All the above to be voted for on one ballot; also upon the same ballot to vote

“Yes ” or “No” on the question:—“Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?”

Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M. and closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

Article 4—To appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the support of the Town's Poor, repairs of Highways and Bridges, support of Public Schools and transportation of scholars, breaking roads, and for Contingent Expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 5—To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day, and for the relief of indigent and disabled Soldiers.

Article 6.—To see what disposition the town will make of its Dog Fund.

Article 7—To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and maintenance of street lights, or act in any way thereon.

Article 8—To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of an Insurance Company for acting as surety on Official Bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same, or act in any way thereon.

Article 9—To see if the town will vote a discount on taxes paid before a given date and fix a time when interest shall be charged and taxes made payable, and likewise fix the compensation to be paid the Collector for the ensuing year, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 10—To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of taxes of the present municipal year to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500) and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year.

Article 11—To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Article 12—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to employ counsel to defend suits that may exist or be brought against the town and to furnish advice and counsel to any Town Officers, when deemed necessary by the Selectmen.

Article 13—To see if the town will fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Article 14—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten dollars (\$10), and appropriate so much of it as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of Chapter 502, Acts of 1906, relating to the appointment of School Physicians.

Article 15—To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the Town Hall, and also the care of the Town Clock the ensuing year.

Article 16—To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money, as much of it as is necessary to be used to suppress the Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths in this town.

Article 17—To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended in the care and improvement of the Common, or act in any way thereon.

Article 18—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to be used in any way towards furnishing better fire proof protection for the records of its Town Officers, or act in any way thereon.

Article 19—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to set bounds at the angles and corners of the "Howe Place."

Article 20—To see if the town will vote to choose a liquor officer or agent to enforce the liquor laws, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor or take any action whatever toward the enforcement of the liquor laws.

Article 21—To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a new a road scraper, repair the old one, or take any action whatever relative thereto.

Article 22—To see if the town will grant to E. P. Hosmer a right of way to cross land belonging to the town.

Article 23—To see if the town will choose a committee to confer with the officials of the Worcester Consolidated Street Railway Co. relative to extending its road from Tatnuck to Paxton Center, or take any action whatever, in relation to an electric railway.

Article 24—To see if the town will vote under the provisions of Chapter 422 of the Acts of 1908 not to receive the series of Public Documents.

Article 25—To see what sum of money the town will grant for the use of the firemen for fire purposes, the ensuing year.

Article 26—To see what action, if any, the town will take toward furnishing a proper place for a public dump.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office, and one at the Blacksmith Shop in said Town of Paxton, ten days, at least, before the time set for holding said meeting. Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
