TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

WARRANT AND ACTION THEREON AT ANNUAL MEETING, MARCH 3rd, 1913.

Article 1. To choose a moderator by ballot to preside at said. meeting.

Chose Henry H. Pike.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon.

Voted to accept the reports of the Selectmen, Trustee of C. D. Boynton Fund, Collector of Taxes, Treasurer, Overseers of the Poor, Trustees of the Public Library, and the Assessors.

Voted to accept the report of the Selectmen, as the committee on the repairs of the Barre road and extend to them a vote of thanks for their services.

Article 3. To bring in and deposit their ballots for Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables, and Superintendent of Streets, each for the term of one year. Two Assessors, one for one year and one for a term of three years, one member of the School Committee, two Library Trustees for a term of three years.

All the above to be voted for on one ballot; also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question:—"Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?"

Also to choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M. and closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

The Moderator declared the polls open at eleven o'clock A. M. The whole number of ballots cast, sixty-seven (67).

The vote on the License Question was as follows:

Yes	thirty-nine	(39)
No	twenty-seven	(27)
Blanks	one	(1)

The officers elected will be found on the first two pages of this report.

Article 4. To appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the support of the town's poor; repairs of highways and bridges; support of public schools and transportation of pupils, breaking roads and for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) and to also add the income of the D. R. Boynton Fund for the support of the town's poor.
- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) for repairs on highways and bridges, and that two-thirds of said sum shall be expended before July 1, 1913.
- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1400) for the support of the public schools and the transportation of pupils.
- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for breaking roads.
- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for contingent expenses.
- Article 5. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day; and for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers.

- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-two dollars (\$22) for Memorial Day and that a speaker be procured for that occasion.
- Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and sixteen dollars (\$216) for Indigent Soldiers.

Article 6. To see what disposition the town will make of its Dog Fund.

Voted to give the Dog Fund to the Public Library.

Article 7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and maintainence of street lights or act in any way thereon.

Voted to lay the matter of street lighting on the table until two o'clock.

At the appointed hour the matter was again taken up and a committee of three was chosen to investigate the matter of electric lights for street lighting and to report four weeks from today at 7.30 P. M. Chose Edward E. Eames, Charles H. Derby and Henry H. Pike.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150 for the present lights during the investigation.

Article 8. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay the proper charge of an Insurance Company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers, and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15) for officers bonds.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote a discount on taxes paid before a given date, and fix a time when interest shall be charged and taxes made payable; and likewise fix the compensation to be paid the Collector for the ensuing year or take any action in relation thereto. Voted that there be no discount on taxes.

Voted that taxes be made payable and interest charged same as last year; and that the compensation paid the Collector be the same as last year.

Article 10. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the taxes of the present municipal year beginning Feb. 1, 1913, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate, two thousand dollars (\$2,000) and to issue a note or notes therefor payable in one year.

Voted that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the taxes of the municipal year beginning Feb. 1, 1913, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate two thousand dollars, (\$2000), and to issue a note or notes therefor payable in one year, any debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the taxes of said municipal year.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Voted to accept the list of Jurors.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten dollars (\$10) and appropriate as much of it as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of Chapter 502, Acts of 1906, relating to the appointment of a school physician.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of ten dollars (10) - for purpose of School Physician.

Article 13. To see if the town will fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Voted that the compensation for labor on the highways be 20 cents per hour for men and 30 cents for horses from April 1 to July 1, 1913.

Article 14. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the town hall, and also the care of the town clock the ensuing year.

Voted to leave the care and rental of the town hall and care of town clock with the selectmen.

Article 15. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be used to suppress the gypsy and brown tailed moths in this town.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty dollars (\$30) for moth suppression.

Article 16. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended in the care and improvement of the Common or act in any way thereon.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of ten dollars (\$10) for care of Common.

Article 17. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended by the Tree Warden, also for the use of the Firemen for fire purposes the ensuing year.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) to be expended by the Tree Warden.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15) for the firemen for fire purposes.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate an additional sum of money to that granted in 1912 to be expended between the terminus of the State Road and the Rutland line on the Barre road, or take any action in regard to repairing the Barre road.

Voted to appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to be taken from the surplus in the town treasury to be added to the appropriation made in 1912 for repairs on the Barre road, provided the State will appropriate the sum of \$1,000 and the County the sum of \$500.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the painting of the exterior of the Town Hall building, grant and appropriate money or take any action relating to the same.

Voted to authorize the Selectmen to paint the exterior of the town hall building and further voted to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) for said purpose.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to accept of William E. Keep of Hartford, Conn., the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100), the income to be used for the perpetual care of the Josiah O. Keep lot in Paxton Cemetery.

Voted to accept.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) as left the town in trust by will of Mrs. Mariah L. Smith, late of Paxton, the income to be expended in the perpetual care of her lot in Paxton Cemetery.

Voted to accept.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to abate any portion of the taxes assessed by the Assessors of 1912 against James E. Henry and Son.

Voted to abate the personal property tax of 1912.

Article 23. To see if the town will authorize the buying or taking of suitable land for cemetery purposes or act in any way thereon.

Voted to appoint a committee of three to investigate the matter and report at a later meeting. Chose Arthur W. Dwyer, George H. Johnson, and Henry H. Pike.

Article 24. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay proper charges that may necessarily come before a Board of Health.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) for said purpose.

Voted to adjourn the meeting for four weeks at 7.30 o'clock P. M.

ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Henry H. Pike. Edward E. Eames and Chas. H. Derby of the Committee to investigate the matter of electric lights made their report.

Mr. W. D. Thompson, an electrical engineer, told of the necessary cost of constructing and maintaining a municipal lighting plant. Remarks were also made by H. W. Estabrook and others.

Voted to dissolve the meeting.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING HELD APRIL 11, 1913.

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. Chose Henry H. Pike, Moderator.

Article 2. To see whether the voters of the Town of Paxton will authorize the Town of Paxton to acquire a plant for the manufacture and distribution of electricity as provided in Section 1 of Chapter 34 of the Revised Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and Acts in amendment thereof.

Voted not to authorize the town to acquire a plant for the manufacture and distribution of electricity.

Voted to dissolve the meeting.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING HELD ON MAY 3RD, 1913.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting. Chose F. L. Durgin, Moderator.

Article 2. To see if the Town of Paxton will construct and maintain within its limits a plant for the distribution of electricity, for furnishing light for municipal use, or light, heat or power, except for the operation of electric cars, for the use of its inhabitants.

Voted to proceed to ballot using check list.

Whole number of ballots cast, fifty-two (52).

Yes forty-four (44) No eight (8)

Voted to choose a committee consisting of the Board of Selectmen, and two additional members who shall be chosen by ballot.

Chose Edward E. Eames and Arthur W. Dwyer.

Article 3. To authorize the selectmen to make a contract with the Worcester Electric Light Company, or any other company, to furnish electric lights and power to the town, and the inhabitants thereof, for a period of ten years, and to grant all franchises incident thereto or act in any way thereon.

Voted to pass over the article.

Article 4. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of lighting the streets of the town and town hall by electricity or act in any way thereon.

Voted to pass over the article.

Voted to adjourn without date.

· Special Town Meeting Held August 2nd, 1913.

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. Chose Fred L. Durgin, Moderator.

Article 2. To see if the town of Paxton will vote to construct and maintain within its limits a plant for the distribution of electricity for furnishing light for municipal use and light, heat and power, except for the operation of electric cars, for the use of its inhabitants.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to borrow a sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to pay for the building and equipment of a plant for the distribution of electricity, and issue therefor a series of notes, signed by its treasurer and countersigned and approved by a majority of Selectmen in the presence of the Town Clerk, with interest payable semi-annually; the first of said series of notes to become due and payable on the first day of January, 1915, and one to become due and payable on the first day of January of each year thereafter until all shall have been paid; that the town appropriate the money thus borrowed for the purpose indicated, and that the Assessors provide in their annual tax levy for the payment of one of the notes and interest on all outstanding notes each year.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

HOLDEN, MASSACHUSETTS February 10, 1914.

To the School Committee of the Town of Paxton:

I take pleasure in submitting to you my first annual report as superintendent of your schools. In this report I shall be forced to confine my attention largely to the conditions as I have found them since September.

TEACHERS.

Paxton has been fortunate in having so few changes in its teaching force this year. One of the greatest economic wastes of our rural schools is due to the constant change in the teaching force. In November Miss Burr resigned to accept a position in her home town. Her position has been filled by Miss Edith L. Burdett, a graduate of the Fitchburg Normal School, who has taught in Colerain, Mass., and Plastow, N. H.

In a recent bulletin of the State Board of Education the following excellent principles of procedure are given:

"1. Any teacher in accepting an appointment, unless other terms are agreed upon, shall do so with the understanding that no effort is to be made without the prior consent of the superintendent of schools, to secure another position before the close of one full school year.

"2. Release from a position shall not be asked during the months of June and September by any teacher, unless for reasons satisfactory to the superintendent of schools.

"3. Any resignation, for other reasons than to accept another position teaching, shall take effect only at the beginning of a vacation period, unless such resignation is for causes not within the control of the teacher. "4. Any teacher, having served in a position a year or longer, who desires to resign, shall give notice of such intention at least a month, or a longer period if the rules and regulations of the school committee so provide, in advance of the time the resignation is to take effect."

I believe such a set of rules is just to both the teacher and the school, and I hope that our teachers for next year will be engaged on some such understanding.

INDUSTRIAL WORK.

The industrial work which was started last year has been continued along similar lines. Mr. Blackmer has had charge of the boys in manual training. They have scraped and refinished the desks in the grammar room, and are now learning to cane chairs. A little later it is planned to have them paint the blackboards and make several necessary repairs about the building.

Miss Woodman has had charge of the girls in sewing. The girls are divided into two divisions. Those in the first division have had lessons in plain sewing and hemming. They have made holders, pincushions, sewing bags, and aprons.

The girls in the second division have had lessons in patching and in several of the different stitches. They have made sleeve protectors, cooking caps, travelling cases, aprons, and jabots. Part of their work was exhibited at the Grange Fair in the fall.

Miss Burr and Miss Burdett have been teaching the girls cooking. Part of the time is taken for discussion and reading, and part for practice in cooking. The girls have been taught how to cook and serve several kinds of soup, peach short-cake, banana salad, cake, macaroni and cheese, eggs, cheese crackers, toast, and gruel. Last June they served a dinner to which Mr. Julius E. Warren, of the State Board of Education, the School Committee, and the mothers of the girls were invited. I have been told that it was a very successful dinner.

I hope to have a large number enter the various agricultural and household arts contests this spring. The Massachusetts Agricultural College is ready to co-operate with us in this work. They will furnish seed and primers of instruction for contests in raising sweet corn, flint corn, potatoes, beans, and tomatoes. They are also offering prizes for the best work with vegetable and flower gardens, cooking, sewing, and handwork. Large numbers of children are entering these contests all over the State, and every child in Paxton ought to be engaged on some project this summer. The success of the exhibition of vegetables, sewing, and handwork last fall should encourage those who did not try last year to make a special effort this year. I want to thank the Grange for their splendid co-operation last year. I hope we may have their help and support again this year.

COMPULSORY ATTENDANCE.

During the past year several laws have been enacted which affect our school life in Paxton. Under the new law relative to the employment of minors, all children under 16 must attend day school regularly unless they hold employment certificates and work six hours per day regularly, or have the written permission of the superintendent of schools to engage in profitable employment at home.

HIGH SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION.

Another law requires towns of less than 500 families which do not support a high school to furnish transportation for children attending high schools in other towns and to pay for such transportation a sum not exceeding \$1.50 per week of actual attendance.

Paxton has spent for this purpose \$307.50 this year. In case we spend over \$5.00 per thousand of valuation for the support of our schools, the State will reimburse us in full for this amount. In case we spend over \$4.00 but less than \$5.00 per thousand of valuation, the State will reimburse us for one half of the amount expended. If Paxton is not reimbursed in full for this, it will be necessary later to make a special appropriation for this purpose.

TEACHERS' RETIREMENT ASSOCIATION.

Another law, which goesin to effect next July, provides for the establishment of a State teachers' retirement association. Teachers already in service on June 30, 1914 may, choose whether they will enter the association, but all beginning service after that date must become members. The annual assessment will be five per cent of the annual salary, with \$35 as the minimum, and \$100 as the maximum assessment. The assessments will be deducted from the monthly salary by the school committee and forwarded to the secretary of the retirement board by the town treasurer.

As a result of this law it will probably be necessary to increase our minimum salary from \$10 to \$11. No teacher, earning but \$360 per year, and spending one half of this for board during thirty-six weeks, can afford to pay \$35 for insurance.

MUSIC.

Owing to the condition of our finances this year it has been necessary for the regular teachers to take charge of the music. I hope it will be possible to have a supervisor of music again this spring.

ATTENDANCE.

I wish to call your attention to the data relative to school attendance and to the roll of honor. I wish that every school could have as good a record with regard to tardiness as Miss Woodman's room, where there has been but one case of tardiness in a year and a half.

The average attendance for last year for all the pupils was about ninety per cent. As it costs the town about the same whether all are present or not, this means that about one-tenth of our funds were wasted through absences. Sickness and stormy weather often make it impossible for children to attend school, but I do not believe there is any legitimate excuse for one child to be absent 87 days out of 175 days. Irregular attendance seriously interferes with the work of the entire class as well as with that of the individual. Parents cannot expect their children to be regularly promoted if their children are irregular in their attendance.

VISITORS.

I have been pleased to find parents visiting the schools on sev-

eral occasions. I know of no better way to secure a sympathetic co-operation between the home and school. I hope every parent will consider it a duty as well as a pleasure to visit the schools frequently. Teachers need the help and suggestions of the parents, and parents ought to know from their own observation what their children are doing in the schools.

I wish to thank the teachers for their hearty co-operation with me in all matters, and the school committee for their confidence, help, and advice.

Report of School Physician

HOLDEN, MASS., Feb. 9, 1914.

Mr. ROBERT I. BRAMHALL,

Superintendent of Schools, Holden.

My Dear Sir:-

In the performance of my duties as School Physician of Paxton I visited the schools of that town April 23, September 15, and also again in December, 1913. The report of one of the inspections follows:

The inspection in December seemed advisable by reason of the appearance of a case of diphtheria in the town. At that visit the throats of all the pupils in school that day were examined, but no symptoms of the disease were found.

I would suggest briefly: Individual pencils,—and as far as possible, books, for the pupils. Somewhere, during this year, a teacher, in my presence, distributed to her pupils pencils which probably had been used before, and within a minute three or four children had their pencils in the mouth, one was poking a pencil in his nose, while others were using them for scratching the head or face. No comment is necessary. Also wash basins, with individual towels and soap. This is done in some schools with good results,—it can be done in all. Dirty hands and faces would then be inexcusable.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Paxton, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall in said Paxton on Monday, the 2nd day of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To choose a moderator, by ballot, to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Article 3. To bring in and deposit their ballots for Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables, three members of the Board of Health, and Superintendent of Streets, each for a term of one year; one Assessor for three years, and three Library Trustees, two for a term of three years and one for a term of two years to fill vacancy; also one member of the School Committee, for three years. All the above to be voted for on one ballot; also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question:—"Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" Also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question, "Shall chapter 807 of the acts of nineteen hundred and thirteen, being an act to provide for compensating laborers, workmen and mechanics for injuries sustained in public employment, and to exempt from legal liability counties and municipal corporations which pay such compensation, be accepted by the inhabitants of this town?

Also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" upon the question, "Shall this town accept the provisions of section fortytwo of chapter five hundred and fourteen of the acts of the year nineteen hundred and nine, as affected by chapter four hundred and ninety-four of the acts of the year nineteen hundred and eleven, which provides that eight hours shall constitute a day's work for city or town employees?"

Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M. and closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

Article 4. To appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the support of the Town's Poor, repair of Highways and Bridges, support of Public Schools, and transportation of scholars, breaking out roads, and for Fire Purpose and for Contingent Expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day, and for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers.

Article 6. To see what disposition the town will make of its Dog Fund.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the balance due on the Electric Light Plant and for the care and maintenance of the same.

Article 8. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of an Insurance Company for acting as surety on Official Bonds required by Town Officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon Article 9. To see if the town will vote a discount on taxes paid before a given date and fix a time when interest shall be charged and taxes made payable, and likewise fix the compensation to be paid the Collector for the ensuing year or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenue of the present municipal year beginning Feb. 1st, 1914, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate, three thousand dollars (\$3,000) and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of ten dollars (\$10) and appropriate as much of it as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of Chapter 502, Acts of 1906, relating to the appointment of School Physicians.

Article 13. To see if the town will fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Article 14. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the town hall, and also the care of the town clock the ensuing year.

Article 15. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be used to suppress the gypsy and brown tail moths in this town.

Article 16. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended in the care and improvement of the Common or act in any way thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended by the Tree Warden, the ensuing year.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the balance due on repairs on Barre Road from terminus of State Road to Rutland line.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote authorizing the painting of the exterior of the School House, grant and appropriate money or take any action relating to the same.

Article 20. To see if the town will petition the Director of the Bureau of Statistics for an audit of its accounts in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 598, Acts of 1910, and amendments thereof.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as left by will of George W. Cowden, and also fifty dollars (\$50) provided by the Streeter Heirs, the income to be used for the care of the Stephen Streeter lot in the Paxton Cemetery.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to develop a portion of the new cemetery, appropriate a sum of money for that purpose and appoint a committee to expend the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will accept the provisions of Chapter 361 of the Acts and Resolves of 1912, entitled "An act to authorize the Town of Paxton to supply itself with water" or act in any way thereon.

Article 24: To see if the town will grant a sum of money for a new watering trough near the "Streeter Place" so-called.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to pay the balance due the Road Commissioner or act in any way theron.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Barre road near the residence of Frank A. Pierce, over "Christian Hill," so-called, to the Barre road opposite the road leading to the "Howe Place."

Article 27. To see what action the town will take in regard to payment of outstanding demand notes as provided under Section 1, Chapter 634, Acts of 1913.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for the transportation of High School pupils.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for insurance against damage of any kind in connection with the Electric Light Plant. Article 30. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee of make arrangements for the celebration of the 150th anniversary to the incorporation of the town in 1915.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to raise the pay of the Town Treasurer or act in any way thereon.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) for the wiring of the town hall as authorized at special town meeting.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office, and one at the blacksmith shop in said town of Paxton, ten days, at least, before the time set for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
