Town Clerk's Report

Action taken on warrant at the Annual Town Meeting, March 7, 1921

Article 1. To choose a moderator by ballot to preside at said meeting.

Chose Rev. Edward L. Chute.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon.

Voted to accept the reports of the Selectmen, Collector of Taxes, Municipal Light Board, Treasurer, Overseers of Poor, Cemetery Commissioners, Trustees of the Public Library and the report of the Assessors as it appears on the register.

Article 3. To bring in and deposit their ballots for a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables and three members of the Board of Health, each for the term of one year; one Road Commissioner for three years, one Assessor for three years, two members of the School Committee, one for three years and one for two years, to fill vacancy; three Trustees of the Public Library, two for three years and one for one year, to fill vacancy; three members of the Municipal Light Board, one for three years, one for two years, to fill vacancy, and one for one year, to fill vacancy; one Cemetery Commissioner for three years, and one member of the Board of Water Commissioners for three years.

All of the above to be voted for on one ballot. Also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this town?"

Also to choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M., and may be closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

Total number of ballots cast, one hundred and thirty (130). The names of the officers elected will be found on the first three pages of this report.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the support of the town's poor; for repairs of highways and bridges; for the support of the public schools and transportation of pupils; for breaking out roads; for fire purposes and for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

Voted:

Support of poor, \$100.

Together with the unexended balance of 1920 and the interest on the D. R. Boynton Poor Fund.

Highways and bridges (passed over)

Public schools and transportation of pupils, \$5,005.88.

Together with the unexpended balance of 1920.

Article 5. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day, and for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers and soldiers' relief, and choose a committee for Memorial Day.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Public Library or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to grant a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of a surety company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same, or act in any way thereon.

Voted:

Surety on bonds and that the Selectmen approve the

same \$25 00

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation to be paid the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year or take any action in relation thereto.

Voted: That the compensation of the Collector of Taxes be 2 per cent of all taxes collected.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be expended under the provisions of Chapter 155, Acts of 1918.

Voted:

To appropriate under the above chapter

\$1,320 00

Article 10. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for a suitable water supply for the town hall.

Voted: To install an electric pump in the town hall and to appropriate the sum of \$200 for said purpose.

Article 11. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time, in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year, beginning January 1, 1921, and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: That the treasurer be and hereby is authorized, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from

time to time in anticipation of revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1921, and to issue a note therefor payable within one year, and any debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said municipal year.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

Voted: To accept the list of Jurors.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to carry out the provisions of Chapter 503, Acts of 1906 relative to appointment of school physician.

Voted:

School physician, \$10.

And the unexpended balance from last year.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Voted: That the compensation to be paid for labor on the highways be 50 cents per hour for a man and 60 cents per hour for a pair of horses.

Article 15. To see if the town will put the expense of street lighting into the tax levy and use the profits of the house lighting to extend the lighting service or reduce the cost of house lighting.

Voted: To pass over the article.

Article 16. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the town hall and also the care of the town clock the ensuing year.

Voted: That the matter be left with the Selectmen.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be expended in the care and improvement of the Common or act in any way thereon.

Voted:

For the care and improvement of the Common

Article 18. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the depreciation fund of the electric light plant.

Voted:

For depreciation fund, electric light plant

\$225 00

Article 19. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended by the Tree Warden the ensuing year.

· Voted:

To grant the Tree Warden

\$25 00

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the inspection of meat and slaughtering, or act in any way thereon.

Voted:

To grant for inspection of meat and slaughtering

\$125 00

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the transportation of high school pupils or act in any way thereon.

Voted:

To grant for high school transportation

\$650 00

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to keep the road leading from Paxton to Worcester open for automobiles during the winter or act in any way thereon.

Voted: To leave the matter with the Selectmen and that the road be cleared after any ordinary storm.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of Mooreland Cemetery or act in any way thereon.

Voted:

To grant for Mooreland Cemetery

\$100 00

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Collector of Taxes to employ counsel when in his judgment it is necessary in the collection of taxes.

Voted: That the Collector of Taxes be so authorized.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to petition the Massachusetts Highway Commission to resurface the state road from the town hall to the Paxton-Worcester line or act in any way thereon.

Voted: That the Selectmen be instructed to petition the Massachusetts Highway Commission to resurface said road.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to purchase a road drag or act in any way thereon.

Voted: To pass over the article.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to construct a cobble gutter from Ladd's Corner to the Post Office and on Maple Street as far as the macadam road extends.

Voted: To pass over the article.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to purchase a truck for fire purposes or act in any way thereon.

Voted:

To appropriate for fire truck

\$3,000 00

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to extend the electric light line from the home of Frank Niemi to the home of William J. Koski; also from Flint's Corner (so-called) to the home of Joseph A. Barclay; also from the home of Henry C. Eames to the home of J. W. Bishop, Jr.; and raise and appropriate a sum of money for each proposed extension and to authorize the Town Treasurer to borrow said sums of money and to issue serial notes therefor.

Voted: To appropriate five hundred dollars (\$500) and the unexpended balance from last year, to extend the electric light line from the home of Frank Niemi to the home of William J. Koski.

Voted: To pass over second clause of article.

Voted: To appropriate eleven hundred dollars (\$1,100) to-

gether with the rebate received from the Telephone Company to extend the electric light line on the Barre road.

Voted: That the Treasurer be and hereby is authorized to borrow said sums of money and to issue serial notes therefor.

This vote was unanimous.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to accept of R. H. Stearns, of Holden, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) the income only to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lot of Henry C. Bliss.

Voted: To accept the said sum as stipulated in the article.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to give the firemen the free use of the town hall for dances and entertainments or act in any way thereon.

Voted: That the firemen be given the free use of the town hall for dances and entertainments.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in addition to an amount appropriated by the State and County for the improvement of the North Spencer road from Flint's Corner (so-called) to the Paxton-Spencer town line.

Voted: To appropriate the sum of \$1,500, provided that the State and County appropriate a sum in addition. If no appropriation is made by the State and County then this sum shall not be appropriated by the town. Voted further that the work be done by town labor under the direction of the Selectmen and road commissioners.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to purchase a plot of land, adjacent to or near the school grounds, to be used as a playground, and appropriate a sum of money for same or act in any way thereon.

Voted: To purchase a plot of land near the school house for a playground and that there be appropriated for said purpose the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, APRIL 29, 1921

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. Chose Roy P. Marble, moderator.

Article 2. To bring in and deposit their votes for one member of the Overseers of the Poor and for a Tax Collector, to fill the existing vacancies.

The polls will be opened at 12 o'clock, noon, and will be closed at 8 o'clock P. M.

The result of the balloting was as follows, whole number of ballots cast:

George H. Johnson, receiving the largest number of votes for Overseer of the Poor, was declared elected.

George H. Whitney, receiving the largest number of votes for Collector of Taxes, was declared elected.

Also at 8 o'clock P. M., to act on the following articles:

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, in addition to the amount raised and appropriated at the last annual town meeting, with which to purchase a truck for fire purposes.

Voted:

To appropriate for fire truck

\$2,700 00

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to rescind the action taken on article 28 of the warrant for the last annual town meeting, whereby it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 with which to purchase a truck for fire purposes.

Report of an Audit of the Accounts of the Town of Paxton

Made in accordance with the provisions of Section 40, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Mr. Theodore N. Waddell,
Director of Accounts,
Department of Corporations and Taxation,
State House, Boston.

Sir:-

As directed by you I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions of the town as recorded on the books of the several departments were examined and checked for the period from January 1 to December 21, 1920, and the recorded payments to the treasurer were verified by a comparison with the treasurer's books.

The books and accounts of the treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The cash book was footed, the recorded receipts were checked and verified by a comparison with the records in the departments collecting money for the town, and the records of disbursements were checked with the selectmen's orders authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and with the amounts falling due on account of debt and interest and the State and County taxes.

The treasurer's accounts were subsequently checked to December 20, 1921, and the cash balance as called for by the cash book was verified by a reconciliation with the bank statement as of that date.

The following is a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash:

The accounts of the selectmen were examined and checked. The records of orders drawn for the payment of town funds were checked and charges against the several appropriations compared with the amounts appropriated by the town as shown on the town clerk's records; and several accounts were found to be overdrawn. Attention is called in this connection to Section 31 of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, which provides as follows:

No department of any city or town, except Boston, shall incur liability in excess of the appropriation made for the use of such department, except in cases of extreme emergency involving the health or safety of persons or property, and then only by a vote in a city of two-thirds of the members of the city council, and in a town by a vote of two-thirds of the selectmen.

Apparently the reason for the overdrafts is the lack of a proper accounting system whereby the several departmental officials responsible for the expenditures of money may know at any time the amount of funds available for their use.

The Board of Selectmen in a town is, in reality, the Director of the Municipal Corporation, and should have at its service books and records which will furnish complete information as to the finances of the town, in order that as much time as possible may be given to selecting the work most essential to be done with the means at hand.

Attention is also called to Section 53 of said Chapter 44 of the General Laws, which provides that:

All moneys received by any town officer or department, except as otherwise provided by special acts and except fees provided for by statute, shall be paid by such officer or department upon their receipt into the town treasury. Any sums so paid into the town treasury shall not later be used by such officer or department without a specific appropriation thereof.

I would therefore recommend that, in future, all appropriations be made for the full amount to be expended by each department, and that the receipts be estimated by the assessors in fixing the tax rate. This method, while a change from the past, will not cause any increase in the amount to be raised by taxation, and will enable the department officials to plan their work better, as they will know early in the year the amount they will have at their disposal.

I would also call attention to Section 108 of Chapter 41 of the General Laws, which is, in part, as follows:

The salary and compensation of all elected officers of a town shall be fixed by vote of the town. All boards or heads of departments of a town shall fix the salary or compensation of all officers or employees appointed or employed by them, subject to the provisions of Section 31 of Chapter 44.

The accounts of the tax collector for the years 1919 and 1920 were examined and checked in detail. The commitments were footed and reconciled with the assessor's warrants, the recorded payments to the treasurer were verified by a comparison with the treasurer's cash book, the abatements were checked with the records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled.

The outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing about fifty notices to persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received I am satisfied that the accounts were correct.

I would recommend that, in future, the collector, in making payments to the treasurer, show separately the amounts received from taxes and interest, and that the treasurer show these items separately on his cash book.

The receipts and expenditures of the electric light department were checked and the cash balance was verified by a reconciliation with the bank statement.

The savings bank books representing the investments of the

trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and found to be as recorded.

While engaged in making the audit, I received the co-operation of the department officials, and on behalf of my assistant and for myself I wish to express my appreciation for the assistance rendered and the courtesies extended.

To the Board of Selectmen of Paxton, Mass.,

Gentlemen :-

The Board of Health of the Town of Paxton herewith present the following report:

During the year there has been little interruption to the general health of the town.

In the early fall an infection of Chicken Pox spread among the children, but with no serious results. At the present time the public school teachers, under directions from the Board of Health, are watching all cases of aggravated "colds" or any indications of influenza in order that these may be discovered and properly dealt with.

The Board desires to state emphatically that it is the duty of all parents, and of every family, to take precautions against contracting diseases of every kind, and also to guard all persons who may have contracted them from contact with others, that the health and welfare of the community may be safe guarded. All that relates to protection from disease, as cleanliness, sanitation in all public and waste places, oversight of water supply, as well as proper food and nourishment should be the object of continual and faithful care. The Board of Health will co-operate with any and all agencies to this end.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Worcester ss.

To either of the Constables of the town of Paxton, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Paxton, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall on Monday, the sixth day of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. Article 2. To bring in and deposit their ballots for Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Auditor, Collector of Taxes, two Constables, and three members of the Board of Health, each for the term of one year; one Assessor for three years, one member of the School Committee for three years, two Library Trustees for three years, and one Library Trustee for one year to fill vacancy, one member of the Municipal Light Board for three years, and one member of the Municipal Light Board for two years to fill vacancy, one Cemetery Commissioner for three years, and one Water Commissioner for three years.

All of the above to be voted for on one ballot. Also on the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question, "Shall licenses for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages be granted in this town?"

Also, to choose all other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock and may be closed at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Finance Committee and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the following purposes:

Support of the town's poor, repairs of highways and bridges, support of public schools and transportation of pupils, opening snow roads, fire purposes, State aid, soldiers' relief, compensation of town officers, support of public library, school physician, Trade School tuition, suppression of gypsy and brown tail moths, care and improvement of the common, inspection of meat and slaughtering, High School transportation, street lighting, improvement of Mooreland Cemetery, tree warden, depreciation fund for electric light plant, and for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day and choose a committee for Memorial Day.

Article 6. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of a surety company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended under the provisions of Section 26 of Chapter 81 of the General Laws of 1921.

Article 8. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time, in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1922, and to issue a note or notes of the town therefor, payable within one year, or act in any way thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Article 11. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the town hall and also the care of the town clock for the ensuing year.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to complete the Barre road extension of the electric light plant and authorize the treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow any or all of said sum

and to issue bonds or notes of the town therefor, the first note to become due and payable within one year from the date thereof and one note to become due and payable each year thereafter
until all shall have been paid, and that the Assessors provide in
their annual tax levy for the payment of one of the notes and
interest on all outstanding notes each year.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to grant a right of way to Charles E. Hosmer, through land owned by the town, from the highway known as Davis Hill road to said Hosmer's house on the shore of Eames' Pond (so-called).

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) from the estate of the late William M. Warren, the income only, to be used for the perpetual care of the William M. Warren burial lot.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of the road from Flint's Corner (so-called) to the Spencer line, provided the County and State will each make an appropriation for the same purpose, or act in any way thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen jointly with the Cemetery Commissioners to petition the Honorable, the Probate Court, to grant the right to use the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) of the accrued dividends of the trust funds in the hands of the Town Treasurer, to be used for improving Mooreland Cemetery about the gate and fence or act in any way thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for the transportation of pupils attending the Trade School or act in any way thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to provide an appropriate and permanent name for each of the various roads in town, and also to take such action as may be necessary in regard to discontinued and so-called abandoned roads, so that any liability therefrom shall not devolve upon the town, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to grant a sum of money to aid the extension work of the Worcester County Farm Bureau or act in any way thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town officers, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to emplay counsel when deemed necessary in the performance of their duties.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting two attested copies thereof, seven days, at least, before the time set for holding said meeting, as directed by vote of the town.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Holden, Mass., Jan. 1, 1922.

To the School Committee of Paxton:

My fourth report, the twenty-second in the series, is herewith presented for your consideration. As members of the School Committee you are familiar with what is here recorded, but it is my hope that every citizen of Paxton will give careful thought and study to this statement of the condition of our schools. The usual statistics that I have prepared are chiefly for matter of record, but if compared with similar data of former years they will furnish to those interested a summary of school progress and an idea of the necessity for united support of this most important institution of our civic life and prosperity.

At a time when it has been a serious problem to find or keep adequately trained teachers, Paxton responded in the right way by increasing salaries, and is to be congratulated on having retained good teachers. Changes have been few when compared with those in other towns of our group. Miss Hickey left in June to teach in Worcester and Miss Anne C. Merriman of Northfield took her place. Miss Merriman has taken a real interest in the children and in the life of the community. In the Intermediate room, Miss Sarah McNeice was appointed to succeed Miss Campbell, who designed in April.

The attendance in the Primary room increased from 43 in June to 51 in September. It seemed wise to rearrange the grades in each room so that now there are two only in that room and three in the Intermediate and Grammar. We have been very fortunate in keeping Miss Barclay, but she now has three grades instead of two. The high standard our graduates have maintained in high school has been due in part to the fact that with but two grades in the Grammar room, Miss Barclay could devote more time to the eighth grade.

So much has been said about poor attendance 1 dislike to mention it again. In 1914 the superintendent wrote as follows: "It costs the town about the same whether all are present or not. An average of 90 per cent means that about one-tenth of our funds are wasted through absences." The average for the last two years was 83 per cent, but I am glad to say that this year it has improved and we have an average of 89.3 per cent. We are making a special effort this fall to better this, and for September it was 97 per cent, a new high record. Let us all try to keep this up for the entire year. A special Certificate is to be granted in June to those who have been neither absent nor tardy for the year.

Townspeople should be acquainted with certain recent legislation as it affects the schools.

- 1. Children between seven and fourteen years of age MUST ATTEND SCHOOL ALL THE TIME THE SCHOOLS ARE IN SESSION. A child may not leave school at fourteen unless he has completed the work of the SIXTH grade.
- 2. Towns may not be required to pay transportation for pupils unless they live more than two miles from the school they are entitled to attend.
- 3. A recent law requires the teaching in all Elementary and High Schools of courses in American History and Civics, with special emphasis on training for citizenship.
- 4. Special classes must be formed for children who are determined as three years or more mentally retarded if ten or more are found in a given town.

- 5. A new minimum salary has been fixed for teachers in Massachusetts.
- 6. Children between fourteen and sixteen employed in private domestic service or on farms shall be required to secure a special certificate issued by the superintendent.
- 7. "Indoor and outdoor games and athletic exercises" must be included in the list of subjects required by law to be taught in the public schools.
- 8. Section 53 of Chapter 71 of the General Laws provides that the School Committee shall appoint a school nurse as well as a school physician. Two or more towns may employ a nurse jointly, or a town may employ a part-time nurse.

Much is being said and written about the improvement of teachers in service. I am glad to note the evident desire of our teachers to keep in touch with the best thought and the best practice in their profession. Excellent opportunities are now offered to anyone for self-improvement, through professional reading courses, correspondence courses, summer schools and the like. Valuable courses are offered by the Division of University Extension, especially for teachers in service, and a plan is being worked out for evaluating such work in terms of school or college credit. Many towns are offering an increase in salary or bonus to teachers who avail themselves of these opportunities.

Various needed repairs have been made during the past year. There is one matter which should have special attention this year, and I urge that an appropriation be made for the purchase of new blackboards. For several years we have tried to improve them by re-slating or painting, but this is really money thrown away, for they are as bad as ever in a few days. We also need, as soon as we can afford it, chemical toilets, placed in the basement, instead of the present arrangement. It is practically impossible to keep the present conveniences in good conditions during the winter, and it is unsanitary and unwhole-some, at best, to use them.

We appreciate highly the acquisition of additional land for a playground and we are very much indebted to Mr. Chute for the time he has given and for his interest in the welfare of our boys and girls.

The cost of books and supplies is decreasing and we need to replace worn-out materials at once. Geographies and histories are not only well worn, but out of date. We need books that have been prepared since the war.

I am very glad to note that we are having more visits from parents and friends. We need your support and value your interest and lovalty.
