## ***Report of Town Clerk***

Action taken at Special Town Meeting, January 13, 1922

Article 1. Chose Rev. Edw. L. Chute moderator.

Article 2. Voted to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) from Mrs. Caroline E. P. Slade, Manchester, N. H., to be held in trust, the income only to be used for the perpetual care of the Moses Parkhurst burial lot in the old Cemetery.

Article 3. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand one hundred seventy-five dollars (\$2,175) for high school tuition for the year 1921, said sum to be taken from the tax levy of 1922.

Article 4. Voted that there be appropriated the sum of seventeen hundred dollars (\$1,700) to repair the Electric Light Plant, trim the shade trees and to clear up the debris occasioned by the recent storm and to do any work involving the safety of people or their property; fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) of said sum to be used to repair the light plant and two hundred dollars (\$200) to cover the amount that has already been expended for clearing up the debris and to take care of the trees on the Common; the shade trees on the highways to be taken care of by the abutters under the direction of the Tree Warden; and to meet said appropriation that the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow said sum in accordance with item 15 of Section 7 of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, and to issue bonds or notes of the town therefor to be payable in accordance with Section 19 of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, so that the whole loan shall be paid in not more than five years from the date of issue of the first bond or note, or at such earlier dates as the treasurer and selectmen may determine.

Article 5. Voted to rescind the vote taken at a special town meeting held September 28, 1918, establishing a Board of Highway Commissioners.

Article 6. Voted to appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for snow bills, said sum to be taken from tax levy of 1922.

Voted that the price for labor on highway be left until the annual town meeting.

Article 7. Voted that the Chairman and Clerk appoint a Finance Committee of five members.

Messrs. George H. Johnson, Henry H. Pike, Frank Griffin, Samuel L. Clapp and Roy P. Marble were appointed.

Voted to dissolve the meeting.

## REPORT OF TOWN CLERK

Action taken at the Annual Town Meeting,  
March 6, 1922

Article 1. Chose Rev. Edward L. Chute, moderator.

Article 2. The result of the balloting was as follows, whole number of ballots cast one hundred twenty-three (123), the officers elected will be found on the first pages of this report.

Article 4. The report of the Finance Committee was read and the following appropriations were made for the year ensuing:

Article 5. Voted to appropriate for Memorial Day \$50 00

Voted chairman appoint a committee of three to have charge of the observance of Memorial Day. Geo. H. Whitney, Harry C. Catherwood and Mary E. Pike were appointed.

Article 6. Voted to appropriate the sum of \$25 for surety on official bonds of town officers and that the Selectmen approve the same.

Article 7. Voted to appropriate the sum of \$1400 dollars for highways under Section 26, Chapter 81, General Laws of 1921.

Article 8. Voted that the Treasurer be and hereby is authorized, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1922, and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year, and any debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of the said municipal year

Article 9. Voted to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

Article 10. Voted that the compensation on the highways for the ensuing year be thirty five-cents (35c.) per hour per man and fifty cents per hour (50c.) per pair of horses.,

Article 11. Voted that the care and rental of the Town Hall and the care of the town clock be left with the Selectmen.

Voted that at every public dance held in the Town Hall a constable be present and that he be paid by party hiring hall and that the compensation of officer be regulated by the Selectmen.

Article 12. Voted to appropriate the sum of three hundred sixteen dollars (\$316) together with the depreciation fund for the extension of the electric light line on the Barre road, and that the Treasurer be and hereby is authorized, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow any or all of said sum and to issue notes of the town therefor, the first to become due and payable within one year from the date thereof and one note to become due and payable each year thereafter until all shall have been paid; and that the Assessors provide in their annual tax levy for the payment of one of the notes and the interest on all outstanding notes each year.

Article 13. Voted to leave the matter of Hosmer's right of way with the Selectmen.

Article 14. Voted to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) from the estate of the late William Warren, the income only to be used for the care of lot in Cemetery.

Article 15. Voted to pass over the article relative to extension of North Spencer road.

Article 16. Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to carry out the provisions of the article regarding use of certain Trust Funds for Cemetery work.

Article 17. Voted to appropriate the sum of three hundred and twenty dollars (\$320) for Trade School transportation.

Article 18. Voted that a committee of five voters, other than the Selectmen, be appointed by the Chairman to carry out the provisions of the article regarding names for the several roads and to ascertain what action should be taken in regard to discontinuing certain roads.

The following committee was appointed: Messrs A. W. Dwyer, C. G. Cheney, D. R. Woodbury, Miss E. B. Catherwood and Mrs. Anna D. Johnson.

Article 19. Voted to appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) for the extension work of the Worcester County Farm Bureau.

Article 20. Voted that town officials, by and with approval of the Selectmen, may employ counsel when it is deemed expedient to do so.

Article 21. Voted that the present Finance Committee, with the addition of the Clerk of the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer, be the Finance Committee for the ensuing year.

Article 22. Voted to accept that portion of Chapter 41, of the General Laws of 1921, which provides for the election of the Board of Selectmen for a term of three years, electing one for one year, one for two years and one for three years, and each year thereafter electing one for three years.

Article 23. Voted to leave the matter of keeping the Worcester road open for automobiles during the winter with the Selectmen, same as last year.

Article 24. Voted to change the date of holding the Annual Town Meeting from the first Monday in March to the first Monday in February.

Voted to dissolve the meeting.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING AND ELECTION,  
APRIL 3, 1922

Article 1. Chose Rev. Edward L. Chute moderator.

Article 2. The result of the election of one member of the Municipal Light Board for three years was as follows:

Polls were opened at twelve o'clock noon, and were closed at eight o'clock P. M.; the whole number of ballots cast were seventy-seven. Robert S. Smith, having received the largest number of votes, was declared elected.

Article 3. Voted to appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) in addition to the sum of fourteen hundred dollars (\$1,400) appropriated at the last annual town meeting for highways.

Article 4. Voted that a moderator be elected at each annual meeting for the term of one year, and that the names of candidates for the office be placed upon the official ballot.

Voted to dissolve the meeting.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING, APRIL 28, 1922

Article 1. Chose Roy P. Marble moderator.

Article 2. Voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the further construction of the West road from Flint's Corner (so called) to the North Spencer line; providing the County and State each contribute the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for said purpose, and that suitable agreements, acceptable to the Selectmen, be filed by certain citizens, in regard to contributions of money and material; also further voted to instruct the Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow the said sum of money and to issue four notes of the town therefor, of five hundred dollars (\$500) each, the first to become due and payable in one year from the date thereof, and one to become due and payable each year thereafter until all shall have been paid. And that the Assessors provide in their tax levy each year for the payment of one of the notes and the interest on all outstanding notes.

Voted to dissolve the meeting.



# ACTION TAKEN AT SPECIAL TOWN MEETING JUNE 1, 1922

Article 1. Chose Rev. Edw. L. Chute moderator.

Article 2. Voted that the matter of improvements at the school house be left with the Finance Committee, and that they report at the next annual town meeting.

Article 3. Voted to pass over the article relative to price of labor on highway.

Article 4. Voted that the town run the wire from the residence of J. W. Bishop, Jr., to the residence of Elis Bergstedt, if after careful consideration the Municipal Light Board deem it to be a good proposition, providing that Mr. Bergstedt will furnish and set the poles.

Article 5. Voted to pass over the article relative to authorizing the Municipal Light Board to purchase a wood lot.

Article 6. Voted to give the people at "Camp Pike" the same opportunity to have electric lights as was given Mr. Bergstedt.  
Voted to dissolve the meeting.

## ***Report of Work Done on the Paxton Roads During the Year 1922***

Work commenced March 4, 1922.

West Rutland Road—Scraped. A section of stone fill, 488 feet long, 15 feet wide, and 12 inches deep was laid, and covered with 4-inch gravel. One 12-inch pipe culvert, 20 feet long, was laid, and brush cut.

Eames Pond Road—Scraped, and 150 feet of ledge covered with the best available material.

North Spencer Road—Brush cut and burned.

North Spencer Road, Improved Work—Under Chapter 90, Acts 1921, Sec. 34, the town raised the sum of \$2,000 to put with an equal amount raised by both the State and County for the purpose of extending the improved work on the North Spencer Road. This work was started on September 22, and 2,000 feet of stone fill, 15 feet wide and 10 inches deep, was laid and covered with gravel. The work, owing to the lateness of the season, was suspended for the season on December 8, and will be continued in the spring as soon as possible, and extended as far as the balance of the money will allow.

Nanigan Road—Scraped, washout filled. 580 feet of stone fill, 15 feet wide and 12 inches deep, was built and covered with 3 inches of gravel. 500 feet of brush cut.

Brigham Hill Road—Scraped.

Davis Hill Road—Scraped. Brush cut.

Spencer Road—Scraped. Dragged road twice from State Road to junction with the North Spencer Road. A portion of the road 1,000 feet in length was resurfaced with the best available material, 12 feet wide and 10 inches deep, and 300 feet of brush was cut.

Rutland Road—Scraped, patched with gravel, washout filled. One 12-inch pipe culvert, 20 feet long, was laid. Catch-basins cleaned and one stone culvert extended 15 feet.

Barre Road—Patched with K. P. and 3,000 gallons of 45% oil applied the entire length. Shoulders scraped and patched with gravel, and the brush cut.

Pudding Corner Road—Scraped and widened. 35 cubic yards of boulders were removed. The following amounts of gravel were carted on in a couple of bad places: One 350 feet long, 15 feet wide, and 8 inches deep; the other 100 feet long, 12 feet wide, and 4 inches deep.

Ojanne Lane—Scraped.

Ojanne Road—Scraped.

Ben Barclay Road—Scraped, and one 12-inch culvert, 20 feet long, laid.

Johnson's Lane—Scraped.

New Braintree Road—Scraped. Two culverts laid; one 18-inch pipe, 22 feet long, and one 12-inch pipe, 26 feet long.

Henry's Lane—Scraped.

Leicester Road—Scraped. One 24-inch pipe culvert, 26 feet long, was laid.

Crystal Spring Road—Scraped, and brush cut.

Old County Road—Scraped up to O'Connor's house.

Silver Spring Road—Scraped.

Nystrom Road—Scraped.

Grove Street—Scraped, dragged three times. One 12-inch pipe culvert, 20 feet long, was laid.

Haggett Road—Scraped.

Hillside Road—Scraped.

Streeter Road—Scraped, brush cut. One 18-inch pipe culvert, 20 feet long, was laid.

Maple Street—Scraped, dragged two times; catch-basins cleaned.

Holden Road—Scraped; one culvert relaid and brush cut.

Remarks—Mr. Rossier was appointed superintendent at the beginning of the season, but resigned in August, and Mr. J. F. Trum was appointed to complete the year. Mr. Trum, having had more experience in road work, has given a great deal of satisfaction in the method of handling and the quantity of work done. Accurate account of all labor and material bought under

his management has been kept, and his accounts promptly rendered to this office.

This department considers him a very desirable man for this position.

Owing to the tremendous amount of rainfall during the summer it made it almost impossible to keep the roads smooth and free from ruts. Washouts occurred quite often, and in several places the cost was considerable to repair.

The donation of money by Messrs. Barclay and Nannigan for permanent improvement of the roads going by their places, in addition to the free use of Mr. Nannigan's tractor, enabled us to do considerable work upon these roads, and thanks should be extended to these men for valued assistance.

# **Warrant**

## COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Worcester ss:

To either of the Constables of the town of Paxton,

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall, on Monday, the fifth day of February, A. D. 1923, at nine o'clock A. M., then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon.

Article 3. To bring in and deposit their ballots for a moderator for one year, Town Clerk for one year, one Selectman for one year, one Selectman for two years, and one Selectman for three years, three Overseers of the Poor for one year, Treasurer for one year, Collector of Taxes for one year, two Constables for one year, Auditor for one year, three members of Board of Health for one year, one Assessor for three years, one member of the School Committee for one year to fill vacancy, and one member of School Committee for three years, one member of Municipal Light Board for one year, to fill vacancy, and one member of Municipal Light Board for three years, two Library Trustees for three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for three years, one Water Commissioner for three years.

All the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

Also on the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the following questions, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this town?"

"Shall the town petition for the installation of an accounting system by the Commonwealth?" (This question is submitted under the provisions of Chapter 516, Acts of 1922.)

Also to choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M. and may be closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Finance Committee and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the following purposes; support of the town's poor, repair of highways and bridges, support of public schools and transportation of pupils, opening snow roads, fire purposes, state aid, soldiers' relief, compensation of town officers, support of public library, school physician, Trade School tuition, Trade School transportation, suppression of gypsy and brown tail moths, care of Common, inspection of meat and slaughtering, High School transportation, street lighting, improvement of Mooreland Cemetery, tree warden, depreciation fund for electric light plant, and for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day and appoint a committee for same.

Article 6. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of a surety company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended under the provisions of Section 26 of Chapter 81 of the General Laws of 1921.

Article 8. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time, in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1923, and to issue a note or notes of the town therefor, payable within one year, or act in any way thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation for labor on the highways for the ensuing year.

Article 11. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the Town Hall and also the care of the town clock for the ensuing year.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town officers, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to employ counsel when deemed necessary in the performance of their duties.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to bond the meter reader of the Electric Light Department or act in any way thereon.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of grading the play ground adjacent to the school grounds or act in any way thereon.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the further extension of the West Road, via Nanigan's Road (so called) to the Spencer line, providing the County and State will each appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the same purpose; and authorize the Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow any or all of said sum of money and issue a note or notes of the town therefor, the first to become due and payable within one year from the date thereof, and one to become due and payable each year thereafter until all shall have been paid. The Assessors to make provisions in their tax levy for the payment of one of the notes and the interest on all outstanding notes each year.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to accept, under certain conditions, a tract or parcel of land, known as the "Cook" land, from Nanigan Brothers, or act in any way thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Sections 7 and 8 of Chapter 136 of the General Laws

of 1921, relative to the sale of ice cream, confectionery, soda water and fruit on the Lord's Day, or pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a survey along the lines of the several roads of the town and the preparation of a plan or plans of the town for use by the Assessors, or act in any way thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to extend the electric light line from the present terminal on the Barre road, near the residence of J. W. Bishop, Jr., to the residence of William Mac-cabee, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or act in any way thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to install street lights on the Worcester road, from the Worcester-Paxton line to the present terminal near the corner of Grove Street, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor or act in any way thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) for the observance of July Fourth or act in any way thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will provide for the appointment of a special committee, and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the necessary technical assistance and advice, to investigate ways and means of providing a supply of water suitable for household use and fire protection, sources of supply, extent to which service might be practicable, expenses of installation and maintenance, and experiences of other towns, and to file a written report, with the Selectmen, of their doings, findings and recommendations within six months, to be presented at the next succeeding town meeting.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Sections 21 to 33 inclusive of Chapter 40 of the General Laws of 1921, relating to Ordinances, By-Laws and Regulations, and appoint a special committee to formulate a code of by-laws to be presented at a special town meeting to be held not later than June 5, 1923, or act in any way thereon.



Article 24. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to be paid to the Trustees for county aid to agriculture in accordance with the provisions of and for the purposes of Chapter 128, General Laws, or for the support of demonstration work under the direction of the agent or instructors of the Trustees, on land owned by the town or any resident thereof, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to choose a director in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 128, General Laws, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to create a committee to continue the duties of the committee appointed at the last annual town meeting, for naming all public streets in the town and preparing and setting suitable sign posts at the principal points of intersection; to direct the committee in its activities and methods; to determine the effect of the decisions of the committee; and to raise and appropriate a sum of money to carry out the provisions of this article.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to give the "Sons of Paxton" the use of the Town Hall for basket ball once or twice a week. Rules governing the same to be made by the Selectmen, or act in any way thereon.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting two attested copies thereof, seven days at least, before the time set for holding said meeting, as directed by vote of the town.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
