We wish to call the attention of the citizens that of the \$1,216.43 cash on hand, as shown, \$270.40 was received for one-half interest on the poles on the Barre Road and \$325.38 was received for one-half interest on poles in various parts of the town that had never been bought by the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, but which they were already using.

The above amount received from the Telephone Company we intend to use for installing lightning arresters.

We have added 9,712 feet of Commercial and Line and 1,200 feet of Street Line during the year.

We have replaced one old street fixture with a new one and have in stock two more to replace other old fixtures.

Report of Board of Health

The board was organized February 12 with Dr. Wm. L. Shipman, chairman, and Dr. Errold V. Mills appointed agent February 26.

Two dogs were ordered killed by Board of Health and Boston authorities pronounced both cases of Rabies. One of the dogs owned by Niemiela had bitten or scratched Mrs. John W. Bishop and Mr. Niemiela's boy. The Pasteur treatment was successfully given the latter by Dr. E. N. Mills.

The board adopted the State Standard Regulations for Boards of Health to control contagious diseases, copies of which will be given every family in town. We need your help to guard the health of Paxton school children.

January 1, 1926.

Board of Selectmen, Paxton, Mass.

Gentlemen:

Work began February 16, 1925.

1. West Rutland Road:

Scraped, dragged and cut brush. Gravelled 100 feet long, 12 feet wide, 5 inches deep. 8 yards of gravel used for patching.

A washout was filled with 5 yards of stone and 8 yards of gravel.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Holden, Mass., Jan. 1, 1926.

To the School Committee of Paxton:

This report of the work of the schools is the twentysixth since the formation of the present union, and the eighth by the present superintendent. Comparison of the following table with that of last year shows an increase of about ten per cent in our membership, most encouraging improvement in attendance, and but one change in the list of teachers.

The figures in black type represent those children who are in the grades where we normally expect to find children of the ages indicated. The figures at the left of those in black type are considered a little ahead of grade or accelerated. It is apparent that those who are 11 and 12 years old and in grade I are considerably behind grade or retarded.

The action of the Joint Committee in deciding to employ teachers of Music and Drawing and a School Nurse for the four towns of the Union, has made it possible for us to secure this service at much less expense than if we were to employ such teachers and health officers independently. We have secured Miss Helen E. Mills of the Massachusetts Normal Art School for Drawing, Mrs. Frances B. Settle of the American Institute of Normal Methods for Music and Mrs. Naomi A. Cunningham, a Registered Nurse, for the health work. This is in my judgment, the most important step that has been taken, and gives our boys and girls the same advantages and opportunities that we have in so many other school systems. I ask your special attention to their reports.

Some standardized tests have been given during the year. They are of value in checking up our work and comparing it with that done in other schools. I appreciate the care and attention that our teachers have given to correcting these tests.

I am glad to call attention to the Honor Roll, a great improvement over the record of last year, and one of which we are proud. Our average of 94% is the best we have had for several years and reflects credit on parents and teachers as well as on the pupils. Let us try for a better record next year. We all appreciate very much the time and study given to school needs by the Committee, and I want to express my thanks to them and to the teachers for their interest and loyal support.

To hear the report of the Finance Committee and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the following purposes: Assessors, Contingent expenses, Elections, Howe Place, Fire and Liability Insurance, Legal, Certification of Notes, Printing, Auditor, Selectmen, Tax Collector, Town Hall, Record Building, Town Clock, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Water Supply, Constables, Court Charges, Fire Department, Fire House, Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Tree Warden, Inspector of Animals, Inspection of Meat Bridges, Highways, Chapter 90, Highways, Chapter 81, Drainage, Snow Removal, Street Lights, Support of Poor, State Aid, Soldiers' Relief, Public Library, Trade School, Public and High Schools, Surety on Bonds, Purchasing Additional Land for School Lot, Care of Common, Agricultural Extension Work, Repairing Flag Pole, Playground, Fourth of July, Memorial Day, Mooreland Cemetery and Interest on Notes.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day and appoint a committee to have charge of same.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge

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of a Surety Company for acting as surety on officials' bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1926, and to issue a note or notes of the town therefor payable within one year or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

Article 8. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the Town Hall and also the care of the Town Clock for the ensuing year.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars for the purposes of graveling and oiling the West Road, provided the State and County will each appropriate a like amount for the same purpose or act in any way thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars to be expended on the Rutland Road near Mooreland Cemetery or act in any way thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to finish grading the Playground and provide for the expense of the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to rescind the action taken at the annual town meeting, 1922, whereby the town accepted that portion of Chapter 41 of the General

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Laws, relative to electing the Selectmen for a term of three years each and vote to elect the Selectmen for a term of one year each.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to accept the plan submitted by the Charlton Association for the care of the town's poor, which is, That the Town of Paxton associate itself with the other towns now constituting the Association in the purchase of the Charlton property and to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred sixty-eight (\$168.00) dollars to carry out the foregoing provisions.

Article 14. To see if the town will take any action relative to celebrating July 4th, 1926, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor and appoint a committee to have charge of the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of taking care of the water from Maple and School Streets or act in any way thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to extend the electric light line on the Barre Road to the residence of Fred Niemela and provide for the expense of the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee whose duty it shall be to select a name for each of the various streets and roads in the town and erect suitable markers and guide boards and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the expense of the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town officers by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to employ counsel when deemed necessary in the performance of their duties. Article 19. To see if the town will vote to buy an adding machine for the use of the town officers and to provide for the expense of the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to rescind the action taken at a special town meeting, March 21st, relative to erecting a building in which to house the fire truck and vote to keep the fire truck in the basement of the Town Hall or pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to reappropriate the sums of money appropriated at a special town meeting, March 21, 1925, for the maintenance of the Richard's Memorial Library and also for the sidewalk on the Maple and School Streets sides of the building.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the unexpended balance of 1925 for the use of the Water Commissioners or act in any way thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be paid to the Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, in accordance with the provisions of, and for the purposes of Chapter 128, General Laws, or for the support of demonstration work in Agriculture, Home Economics, or Boys' and Girls' Club Work, under the direction of the agent or instructors, or the Trustees, cooperating with local town director, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to choose a director in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 128, General Laws, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended under Section 26, Chapter 81, of the General Laws or act in any way thereon.
