The Electric Light Department has added 16 new consumers to the plant in 1927, making a total of 183 consumers on the system.

We also paid one \$500.00 note, with the interest of the Barclay Extension loan of \$112.50, leaving balance of unpaid notes of \$2,500.00.

We have purchased a new switch board for the transformer station as the other one was a great danger to the station, at a cost of \$365.00.

We have installed one additional wire on Pleasant from the city line to Grove Street thereby increasing the capacity of our plant 200% and reducing the load on the other two wires which were overloaded and giving people who desire to install larger power equipment a chance, at a cost of \$446.95 which was taken from the Depreciation Fund.

Report of Board of Public Welfare

DECEMBER 31, 1927

The members of this board were confronted at the beginning of the year with a number of regular and hospital bills which required much time and attention. Each bill was given careful consideration, however, and investigations were made wherever necessary before being passed on for payment.

There are four outstanding bills which should have been paid this past year, but because of lack of funds it is necessary to incorporate them in this year's budget. This will account in a large measure for the unusually large appropriation we are asking for. We were able to get rid of two cases, one of which was taken over by the state. This case cost the town over \$700 last year.

The board has made two official visits to the Charlton Poor Farm; one to attend the regular meeting of the association, and the other to inspect the farm and visit the caretaker. It was also necessary to make one trip to the State House at Boston where Richard K. Conant, commissioner of public welfare, and his associates were consulted about an important case. These trips were made without any expense to the town because the money was needed for use in other places.

Report of the Water Commissioners for the Year 1927

PAXTON, MASSACHUSETTS, DECEMBER 31, 1927

A water system for household uses and fire protection serving at least the central part of the Town is one of the most important needs of Paxton. Such a system would greatly reduce our enormous insurance rates and would stimulate building and growth more than any other one thing, providing we maintain a reasonable tax rate.

Your Board has carefully investigated the problem and has been fortunate, so far, in securing three Engineers' Reports based upon personal examination of the territory without expense to the Town. The principal items considered have been the source of water supply, the pumping equipment, the storage, the distribution and territory served and the financing. The estimates of cost in two of the Engineers' Reports, prepared entirely independent of each other, are slightly under seventy thousand dollars, for a service in Center Village and not extending on the main road beyond Mr. Clapp's. While the borrowing capacity of the Town is sufficiently large to permit the raising of funds to cover this cost, your Board does not see how the revenue can be expected to take care of the required payments on a bond issue at the present time. Your Board is, therefor, unwilling to recommend any immediate steps for installation.

Plans are in process for securing rights to protect for the Town, the source and distributing sites indicated in the Engineers' Reports.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Holden, Mass., Jan. 1, 1928.

To the School Committee of Paxton:

This report is the twenty-eighth in the series since the formation of the present school union, and the tenth by the writer.

The year has been generally satisfactory with real progress made in school work. Perhaps our most serious problem is that of the annual turn-over in the teaching force. Our salaries compare well with those of other towns having a similar valuation per pupil, and yet the salaries of larger places are bound to attract good teachers. year Mr. Dodge resigned to accept a position in Hardwick, Mrs. Gould accepted a position in Worcester and Miss Jessie Maynard resigned to be at home. To fill these vacancies we have elected Mr. Percy G. Porter, a graduate of Farmington Normal School, as Principal and teacher of Grades VII and VIII; Miss Dorothy F. Gibb, a graduate of Lowell Normal School and Boston University, for Grades V and VI; and Miss Ethel G. Swanson, a graduate of Fitchburg Normal School, for Grades I and II. Miss Ruth Maynard returned to teach Grades III and IV. These teachers have taken hold of the work with enthusiasm and have manifested a genuine interest in the progress of our boys and girls. Miss Odessa Long was elected to teach Drawing.

The usual statistics that follow the reports are valuable for purposes of comparison. To show the growth of the schools and indicate probable future needs they should

be compared with corresponding figures of past years. Census in 1918 gave 79 children between the ages of five and fourteen and in 1927 there were 166. The membership then was 60 and now 130. Many more are attending High Schools in other towns and there are more in Trade School. This all means that a great deal more money must be appropriated for schools, to take care of the increase in enrollment as well as to allow for the decrease in the purchasing power of the dollar. Ten years ago we had three teachers and now we have four regular teachers, two special teachers and a school nurse. There were three classrooms then and now four. The Primary room is overcrowded so that it will be necessary very soon to take up the matter of more room. As mentioned in my last report any program for a new building or for an addition, should not fail to include provision for an assembly hall, rooms for manual training and sewing, and more indoor play space.

Interest in Spelling has again been aroused by the contest held in Rutland in May to select the champion speller to represent the district at the Spelling Bee in Worcester conducted by the Telegram-Gazette. Leslie Robinson, Ethel Carlson, Myrtle Smith, and Sigrid Ostergard were chosen to represent Paxton.

In September a Teachers' Institute under the direction of the State Department of Education was held in Barre and our teachers attended. This is the third Institute held for the teachers of this vicinity and we hope to make it a permanent feature of our work.

We are giving more attention each year to the health of the school child and both Dr. Kimberly and Mrs. Cunningham have worked untiringly in the interests of our boys and girls. Careful health records are kept and the growth of the child watched from year to year. We have had during the year a clinic for immunizing against diph-

theria, the clinic conducted by Dr. Chadwick of the State Board in connection with his "Ten Year Program" for the detection of Hilum tuberculosis, and a Dental clinic early in the fall. The reports of School Physician and School Nurse cover this work more in detail.

Along the line of suggestions made last year we have bought a piano and added considerable new supplementary reading material. There will be no special requirements in other text books for this year but we shall need new window shades and some furniture.

During the summer the water supply was thoroughly overhauled and we now have a good flow for the bubbler in the basement. We need to extend the pipe and install bubblers on the first and second floors if there is sufficient pressure. The building was reshingled and painted and is now in very attractive condition. Teachers and pupils should take special interest in keeping the grounds and the interior of the building neat and clean. The janitor has taken pride in his work and everyone should cooperate with him. We need more pictures for the classroom walls, more playground apparatus and more slate blackboard.

It is very gratifying to note the loyal support that the town is giving to the school and to record the devotion of the School Committee to the best interests of our children. The schools belong to the public. They are owned and maintained by the public and in the long run will be about what the public wants them to be. There have been wonderful advances made in the science of teaching and it is important that the taxpayers understand and appreciate the demands made upon the school and the needs of today. We have a splendid corps of teachers and with the backing of the public we look forward to a successful year.

Report of the Supervisor of Music

Holden, Mass., Jan. 1, 1928.

To the Superitnendent of Schools:

I respectfully submit my second report as Supervisor of Music in the town of Paxton.

The plan of work in The Progressive Series which we are using is as follows:

Grade I. Rote songs, to provide musical experience, and to develop the ability to sing.

Grade II. Rote songs continued and the development of rhythm through singing games and motions. Specific work in ear training, application of the Sol-Fa syllables, study of motives and figures, and eye training through presentation of familiar songs on the board in notation.

Graves III and IV. Rote songs, ear training and eye training from the board and book. The recognition of familiar figures in old and new songs. Finding of staff position of the tonic chord from key signature, and the study of comparative note values in the measure forms.

Grade V. The gradual development of the sight reading process. Drills in tone, time and theory.

Grade VI. Two part music. Ability in reading and singing at sight more fully developed.

Grades VII and VIII. Two and three part music. Special drill in the interpretation of mode and sentiment of the songs used.

Christmas Carols and Patriotic songs are taught throughout the grades and the phonograph used for listening lessons in music. Insofar as possible the Revised Lesson Outlines for Music Appreciation are followed, but the time is too limited to accomplish what I would like to do in this field.

The new piano is a valuable asset in upper grade work and is much appreciated by all. I wish to express my appreciation of the fine cooperation of all those who are associated with me in my work.

Beginning with the winter term we plan to teach the children to develop for themselves the language of drawing. The desire to represent objects, animals and people in order to tell a story will furnish the motive for learning to draw them well. Picture-study lessons will be given as an excellent means of correlating art appreciation with other subjects.

The work is progressing well and I very much appreciate the work being done by the teachers and the earnest cooperation of all.

Report of the School Nurse

To the Superintendent of Schools:

This report covers the period from January, 1927, to January, 1928.

MEDICAL INSPECTION—Our yearly medical examination required by law was carried on by Dr. Kimberly in the autumn. Due to his reports sent home the previous year, many defects were found to have been remedied, diseased tonsils and adenoids removed, and many teeth treated.

WEIGHING AND MEASURING—The children were weighed and measured three times this year. A steady gain in weight is a good indication that a child is growing normally, but when he loses or does not gain at all during a six or eight month period, he should be examined to see what is hindering his growth.

CLINICS—In May Dr. Kimberly conducted a clinic for immunizing against that dread disease diphtheria. The treatment was offered for school and pre-school children and thirty-nine were given the three immunizing treatments. We hope to offer the same opportunity in the spring and all parents should then avail themselves of this chance to shield their children against this terrible disease.

A Dental clinic was conducted in October. The School Committee, the Village Improvement Society and other interested citizens contributed most generously in money and service to make this a success. Through the Worcester County Extension Service we secured Dr. E. J. Moulin and a dental equipment.

Report of the School Physician

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit the following report . We were very fortunate early in the season to have the "State Clinic" with us in this district. Over 50% of our children responded to the opportunity of examination by this group. What is this clinic? From the medical standpoint it is a highly specialized diagnostic group organized particularly to discover child tuberculosis at its earliest stage. It also operates to discover outstanding physical defects and offers treatment only to the extent of advice as to nutrition, as to need of removing diseased teeth, tonsils and adenoids and gives general directions as to the care of these early tubercular chest conditions. A detailed summary of the work of this clinic is found under Mrs. Cunningham's report.

Folowing the clinic the usual yearly examination of the remainder of the children was carried out. I thought that this year it might be worth while to review some facts concerning the medical supervision of school children. Each season we find a larger and larger percentage of parents responding to our notices of diseased teeth, tonsils and adenoids. As a result of eradication of these infected tissues we sense our children as being on a little higher plane physically. Intangible conclusions truly but because they are intangible none the less real. One very definite result is the lowered absenteeism among the children, a matter very important indeed in school management. Another result of the health work among the children is the consciousness that improved health conditions in our children can be defi-

nitely sought for and obtained. As time goes on I am convinced our parents are becoming less and less tolerant of repeated infections and more and more insistent on a higher grade of health in their children.

The activities of the various sections of this district in obtaining a dental clinic are heartily commended.

The hygienic conditions of some of our buildings, toilet facilities, etc., are subject to the necessary limitations of rural schools. Entirely satisfactory conditions, however, are obtainable by the use of a scrubbing brush, soap, hot water and chlorate of lime. Unsatisfactory conditions have been reported by Mrs. Cunningham in one or two schools and should be corrected.

With but very few exceptions our children are all vaccinated against smallpox. By the end of the year, every child in the district will have had an opportunity to receive the three innoculations that give permanent immunity to diphtheria. We are in hopes of being able to wipe out the occurrence of diphtheria in school children entirely. Through the descriptive literature sent from school we hope to induce many parents to have their pre-school children immunized by their family physicians against diphtheria.

Milk meeting recognized standards (tuberculin tested always and produced to meet at least "grade A" requirements or pasteurized) should be available in every school room, particularly in the lower grades.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Worcester ss:

To either of the Constables of the town of Paxton, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Paxton, who are qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in "Allen Hall" on MONDAY, the SIXTH day of February A. D. 1928, at 5:45 o'clock A. M., then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To bring in to the Election Officers their ballots for the following town officers to be elected on the official ballot:

Moderator, Town Clerk, three members of the Board of Public Welfare, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables and Tree Warden, each for the term of one year; one Selectman, one Assessor, one member of the School Committee, one member of the Municipal Light Board, one Cemetery Commissioner, one Water Commissioner and one member of the Planning Board, each for the term of three years.

All of the above officers to be voted for upon one ballot.

Also to choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

The business meeting will begin at 10 o'clock A. M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon.

Article 3. To hear the report of the Finance Committee and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the following purposes:

Assessors, Contingent, Elections, Howe Place, Insurance, Legal, Certification of Notes, Printing, Auditor, Selectmen, Tax Collector, Town Hall, Record Building and Town Clock, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Water Supply, Constables, Court Charges, Fire Department, Moth, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Tree Warden, Inspector of Animals, Health Department, Tubercular Hospital, Inspection of Meat and Slaughtering, Bridges, Highways chapter 81, State Road Damages, Street Signs, Snow Removal, Street Lights, Board of Public Welfare, State Aid, Soldiers' Relief, Richards Memorial Library, Trade School, Schools, Care of Common, Agricultural Extension Work, Flagpole, Fourth of July, Memorial Day, Mooreland Cemetery, Interest on Notes, Worcester Fire Department.

Article 4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day and appoint a committee to have charge of the same or act in any way theron.

Article 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of a Surety Company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of

the present municipal year beginning Jan. 1, 1928, and to issue a note or notes of the town therefor payable within one year or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

Article 8. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the town hall and also the care of the town clock for the ensuing year.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to re-appropriate the unexpended balance of the funds appropriated last year for the use of the Water Commissioners for the same purpose for the ensuing year or act in any way thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town officers, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to employ counsel when deemed necessary in the performance of their duties.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to change and amend its by-laws by repealing that certain by-law adopted by the town on the seventh day of February, 1927, by which it was provided that one-half of the registered voters shall constitute a quorum at any town meeting or adjournment thereof, except such parts of meetings as are devoted exclusively to the election of town officers, provided that any meeting may be adjourned to a later date though less than a quorum be present.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to allow the Sons of Paxton Club permission to connect with the water supply that runs to the town hall or act in any way thereon.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to install one street light opposite the drive way of Mr. Estabrook on Davis Road. The cost of operation to be paid by Mr. Esta-

brook at a charge of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per year until the rate changes or act in any way thereon.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to limit the number of permits for stands to be erected on the State Highway within the Paxton boundaries or act in any way thereon.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to construct sidewalks on Rutland Avenue, Pleasant Street or on any other streets and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor or act in any way thereon.

Article 16. To hear and consider the proposals of Ellis G. Richards with reference to the Richards Memorial Library, act in any way thereon, and authorize the preparation, execution and acceptance of any papers necessary in connection therewith.

Article 17. To hear and consider the report by the Planning Board and the Board of Survey as a joint committee of their proposals relative to changing the name of the street leading northerly from the Common to the center of Rutland and now named Rutland Avenue and to act in any way thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of thirteen hundred (\$1300.00) dollars and build a cement block two-car garage, including heating outfit and cement drive to the street gutter, under the Town Hall or act in any way thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money with which to gravel the road from the residence of Joseph A. Barclay to the Spencer line or act in any way thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to build a piece of improved road on the Pudding Corner Road, so called, beginning at the end of the improved road already built and continuing toward the residence of Frank Niemi or act in any way thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to build a cistern at the end of the Common for the purpose of storing water for fire emergency or act in any way thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk, similar to the one around the Library building, on one side of Pleasant Street from the Common to the Shepardson house or beyond or act in any way thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to extend the Electric Light Line to the residences of George Perkins and Joseph Smith, or act in any way thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars with which to buy a Burroughs Adding Machine, or act in any way thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town wil vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty (\$50.00) dollars and authorize the treasurer to send a check for this amount to the Worcester Firemen's Relief Association or act in any way thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to gravel Maple and Oak Avenues in Mooreland Cemetery, or act in any way thereon.

Article 27.—To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) dollars from Mrs. Katie J.

Shover, the income only to be used for the perpetual care of the Albert M. Shover burial lot in Mooreland Cemetery.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) dollars from the estate of the late Edgar J. Matthews, the income only to be used for the perpetual care of the Edgar J. Matthews burial lot in Paxton Cemetery.
