Report of Board of Public Welfare

DECEMBER 31, 1928

Members on this board have been presented many new and unusual problems this year, but in each case careful consideration has been given, and the interest of the town, as well as the parties concerned has been safeguarded. The work of the board is becoming more important each year, and considerable time and service is required to solve the numerous problems in a satisfactory manner.

Expenses will increase proportionately with the increase in population, and they are likely to be greater in the years to come than they have been in the past. This is due principally to the trend of the times, and to the increasing recognition of state and town of their responsibility to the poor. The laws of the Commonwealth are very stringent and many bills have to be paid which we as a township sometimes think are unjust.

The parties aided in case No. 64, of the year 1927, have paid back to the town the sum of \$27, which was the amount of aid given. This is commendable and shows a fine community spirit.

The laws governing welfare work are complicated and exacting, and require much study and attention, and because of this fact the present board recommends a change in the term of office from one to three years. One new member to be elected each year for a term of three years.

This board is ready and willing at all times to explain

its action or expenditures, to any taxpayer who may be interested enough to ask for an appointment.

REPORT OF AN AUDIT
OF THE ACCOUNTS OF THE
TOWN OF PAXTON

FOR THE PERIOD FROM JANUARY 1, 1927
TO JUNE 26, 1928



Made in Accordance with the Provisions of
Chapter 44, General Laws

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from January 1, 1927 to June 26, 1928, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions of the town, as recorded on the books of the several departments, were examined and checked for the period of the audit and compared with the records on the treasurer's books.

The surety bonds furnished by the officials for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The treasurer's ledger was examined and checked in detail. The reported receipts were compared with the records in the several departments collecting money for the town and with the treasurer's cash book, and the expenditures were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing payments and with the approved bills and payrolls on file. The appropriation accounts were examined and checked with the town clerk's record of appropriations voted by the town.

In order to obtain the correct balances of the ledger accounts, it was necessary to check the ledger entries from January 1, 1925 to the date of the audit. After the necessary adjustments and the closing entries were made for the

several years, a trial balance was taken off, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of June 26, 1928.

It is recommended that, when work for which a special appropriation has been made is not completed at the end of the fiscal year, the balance in the appropriation be carried forward until the work is complete, rather than to close out the unexpended balance at the end of the year and to make a new appropriation the following year.

The books and accounts of the treasurer were examined and checked, the recorded receipts being compared with the record of departmental payments to the treasurer and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, and the payments being checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The cash book was footed and the cash balance was verified by an actual count of cash and a reconciliation of the bank accounts with the bank statements and savings bank books.

The debt and interest payments were checked with the amounts falling due, and the outstanding debt accounts were listed and verified.

The savings bank books representing the investments of the several trust funds in the custody of the treasurer were examined, and the income and withdrawals were verified, being found to be as recorded on the treasurer's books.

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were checked. The commitments were examined and verified, and the receipts were checked with the commitment books and with the payments to the treasurer. The abatements were compared with the assessors' record of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved. A

further verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The books and accounts of the municipal light department were examined and checked. The ledger accounts kept by the department were analyzed, the record of charges for light and power were totaled, and the payments to the treasurer were checked to the treasurer's books. The uncollected accounts were listed and reconciled, and the cash on hand was verified.

The town clerk's records of dog and of fishing and hunting licenses issued were examined, and the payments to the county and the State, respectively, were proved, the cash on hand being verified.

The records of receipts from licenses issued by the selectmen, from rent of the town hall, and from the sealer of weights and measures were examined, and the reported payments to the treasurer were checked with the treasurer's books.

Attention is called to the fact that a number of accounts have been overdrawn each year, it being the practice to carry these accounts forward to the next year, thereby reducing the appropriations of the following year by the amount of the overdrafts.

The value of a carefully prepared budget is destroyed if liabilities in excess of appropriations in a given year are taken care of by the revenue of the following year.

Department officials should not incur liabilities in excess of the appropriations made for their departments. Even

though their appropriations may be insufficient to permit the performance of work, which, in their judgment, should be done, they are, nevertheless, bound by the amounts appropriated and should, unless given additional appropriations, curtail the work so as to bring the costs within the sums available.

The statutes covering this subject are contained in Section 31, Chapter 44, General Laws, and in Chapter 248, Acts of 1926, which read as follows:

No department of any city or town, except Boston, shall incur liability in excess of the appropriation made for the use of such department, except in cases of extreme emergency involving the health or safety of persons or property, and then only by a vote in a city of two thirds of the members of the city council, and in a town by a vote of two thirds of the selectmen.

Any city, town or district officer who knowingly violates, or authorizes or directs any official or employee to violate, any provision of this chapter, or any other provision of general law relating to the incurring of liability or expenditure of public funds on account of any city, town or district, or any provision of special law relating to the incurring of liability or expenditure of public funds as aforesaid, shall, except as otherwise provided, be punished by a fine of not more than one thousand dollars or by imprisonment for not more than one year, or both; and the mayor, selectmen, prudential committee, or commissioners, shall, and five taxpayers may, report such violation to the district attorney who shall investigate and prosecute the same.

Appended to this report are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, and electric light accounts, together with tables showing the transactions of the trust funds.

While engaged in making the audit, I received co-operation from the several town officials, and on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Holden, Mass., Jan. 1, 1929.

To the School Committee of Paxton:

I have the honor of presenting for your consideration my eleventh report, the twenty-ninth in the series since the formation of the present union.

We have had the average number of changes in teachers but we have been fortunate in our appointments and the work of the schools has been carried forward with understanding and devotion to the real interests and needs of our boys and girls. Miss Gibb resigned in June to accept a position in Norwood and Miss Flora Donald of Milton and a graduate of Lowell Normal was chosen for Grades V and VI. Miss Ruth Maynard resigned after two years of successful teaching in Grades III and IV and Mrs. Mildred Porter was elected as her successor. Mrs. Porter is a graduate of Farmington Normal School and has had several years of teaching experience. Miss Stevenson and Miss Long resigned their positions as Supervisors of Music and Drawing respectively, and Miss Mary R. Spofford of Haverhill was appointed to carry on the work in Music and Miss Doris L. Potter the Drawing. Under their direction these subjects have been taught most acceptably and excellent progress is being made.

The following table showing the enrollment for the fall term gives us an idea of the steady growth of the school. The situation that we have been expecting developed early in the term and it was necessary to separate Grades III and IV and equip another room. After conference with the Se-

lectmen it was decided to use the dining room at the Town Hall and Miss Helen Wheeler of Worcester Normal School was chosen to teach Grade IV.

We have divided the second grade so that there are now 35 in the primary room and 33 in the second primary. There are now 20 in Grade IV using the Town Hall. There are 30 in each of the other two rooms. The need for more school room is apparent and the Committee has given careful study to the problem. Whether the Town decides to build a new and separate building or put an addition on the present, the plans should provide for two class rooms, an assembly hall that may later be used for two more class rooms, and space for manual training classes and domestic science.

A larger number of our boys and girls are attending high school each year and it is important that we give them the best possible preparation for their advanced study. Then too we should provide as practical training as other modern schools offer, for those who are not able to go to school beyond the elementary grades. I would like to see the seventh and eighth grades separated and a beginning made in teaching practical arts and vocational civics.

This chart shows that we had at the time it was prepared, 14 pupils or about 11% over-age, and 10 pupils or about 8% under-age or advanced somewhat ahead of the normal age group.

There are 25 pupils attending high schools in other places and 8 who have entered Trade School. The tuition for high school pupils in Worcester is \$160 a year and \$175 at Trade School. It is surely the responsibility of parents to see that these privileges are not abused. Certainly regular attendance should be insisted upon and the marks in Effort and Conduct should be high, to justify continued membership. It is better for our boys and girls to be at work in some gainful occupation than to be in school if they do not make the most of their opportunities.

It is with regret that we received the resignation of Mrs. Naomi Cunningham who has served as School Nurse for two years. Miss Mildred Givan of West Somerville, a registered nurse with special training for school work at Hyannis Normal School, was appointed to carry on the health program and her first report deserves our careful consideration. The observance of a day in the spring known as Child Health Day was followed this year and a very interesting program was arranged by the schools and presented on the athletic field.

Paxton was represented at the District Spelling Bee in Rutland by Ralph Carlson, Leslie Robinson, Sidney Thompson and Barbara Bemis.

In the state-wide Poster Contest conducted by the Mass. S. P. C. A. Leslie Robinson won a medal and Edward Trum and Austin Whitney were given Honorable Mention and a subscription to the magazine published by the Society. The report of the Drawing Supervisor indicates what is being done along this line.

New text books in English for the upper grades will be needed this year. I hope to reorganize the course in Geography so as to emphasize its relation to history, to stress the regional treatment and problem method, probably with the single cycle method of presentation. We shall need some new music books, and in this connection I want to commend the work Miss Spofford is doing in music. There is much interest shown in this subject and in the work of the orchestra.

The water system was further extended this last summer and we now have bubblers on the first and second floors. This installation is a great convenience and a real time saver. A few more well selected pictures, playground apparatus and slate blackboard are needed.

Someone has said "education is of little value if it does not produce character." The gaining of facts is of questionable value unless we learn how to evaluate them, to apply them in right living and the practice of good citizenship. I believe that we are training our boys and girls to realize this. Character is the one important thing. Our teachers are constantly striving to impress this thought and to present opportunities for right choices and right decisions. As Mr. Wright of The Pathfinders organization has said, "we are convinced that it is not only better, but far cheaper to 'Prepare and Prevent' than to 'Repair and Repent'."

For the loyal cooperation and service of our teachers, the backing of the parents and the splendid support of the School Committee I am deeply grateful.

Report of the School Nurse

To the Superintendent of Schools:

This report covers the period from September 1928 to January 1929.

MEDICAL INSPECTION—Our annual medical inspection required by law was carried on during the fall, by our able school physician, Dr. Kimberly. Many defects had been corrected among the children, due to notices previously sent to parents and guardians.

WEIGHING AND MEASURING—The children were weighed and measured once during the fall. Children should gain a few ounces each month, the number varying according to age and sex. If the gain is not made, the parent or guardian is consulted and advised.

CLINICS—In September the "Ten Year Program" was again conducted by the State Department of Public Health. This is follow-up work done by the State to further observe those cases that were detected the previous year as being contact or suspicious cases or those having Hilum Tuberculosis. Number of children examined 1.

Dr. Kimberly again conducted an immunizing program against diphtheria. Fifty were given the Schick test, thereby determining whether or not their systems were immune to the disease. Three were given Toxin-antitoxin which consists of three immunizing treatments. Dr. Kimberly is very proud of the splendid cooperation shown regarding these treatments to prevent diphtheria. This has made us a record town in the worthy endeavor to fight this fearful disease. Four vaccinations were also given.

HEALTH TALKS have been given from time to time and the eager way in which health projects have been carried out is most gratifying.

I wish to thank the parents, the teachers and the children for their splendid cooperation, which has made my work a pleasure among them.

Report of the School Physician

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Medical work is a good deal like the management of a progressive business. Each year sees improvement or expansion in some department. Each year as we go through the physical examination of the children we find a considerable group of defects that have been corrected. It may be tonsils that have required notices for the past three or four years that have at last been removed, or it may be dental work that has been given attention. There has been a noticeable improvement in posture among the school children, doubtless due to the instruction and training they have received.

The response to Toxin-antitoxin in Paxton was poor. In several sections no interest was evidenced in the treatment even though it has been responded to well in other years. To our knowledge there has not been a serious reaction to this treatment. This year in the whole union there were 149 children to whom Toxin-antitoxin inoculations were given.

We regretted Mrs. Cunningham's inability to return. Miss Givan has proven herself more than an excellent aid in the health work. She has been a real General in planning and executing original health work programs.

Report of the Music Supervisor

To the Superintendent of Schools

School music in Paxton is good. The children love to sing and they sing well.

But there is one phase of music which has been utterly neglected and that is the instrumental music. Once, a school orchestra was an unheard of thing, but now it is considered an important part of school life. Every school should have its orchestra and especially when there is but one school in town. With the number of children that there are in Paxton, we should have a good orchestra. As it is, we have only three violins and piano but that is a good beginning.

I do not know how many children are studying the piano but, to my knowledge, there is only one child taking regular violin lessons and no other instrument is being studied. It is my sincere hope that the parents will cooperate with the school so that by June we may have more in our Paxton school orchestra.

A percussion ensemble or toy band has been formed in Grade three by Mrs. Porter who is also directing the orchestra. This gives the children experience in ensemble playing so that when they are older they will be well prepared for the orchestra. We are planning to have a percussion ensemble in the first grade also.

I wish to thank the teachers for their kind cooperation.

Report of the Drawing Supervisor

To the Superintendent of Schools:

All children love to make pictures of things with which they are familiar. Therefore, we began our fall work with a study of the fall flowers, grasses, fruits and vegetables, using a variety of mediums, pencil crayons, water color and ink, according to the experience and development of the class with which we are working.

Lettering alphabets have been studied to be kept and used as a basis for all projects requiring lettering throughout the year.

Holiday projects have been worked out at appropriate times. Posters cut and drawn freehand have been made involving proportion, spacing and composition. Subjects for posters have been taken from reading history, and, hygiene.

We have been giving extra training and work to those who show special interest and ability through our black-board decorative work. The results of this work have been especially interesting and we feel that progress made in this manner will be most beneficial.

The work for the next terms will include color study, design, perspective, proportion, object drawing, and illustrative drawing, to be developed by cutting and crayoning of mass in lower grades, pencil crayon and water color in upper grades. Picture Study and recognition of well known masterpieces will be given.

Occasional memory tests of objects studied will be given, and near the end of the year a review of the principles taught and projects developing originality.

It is hoped to have an exhibition of typical work done in the schools sometime during the year.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Worcester ss;

To either of the Constables of the town of Paxton,
Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town, who are qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall, on Monday, the Fourth day of February A. D. 1929, at 5.45 o'clock A. M. then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To bring in to the Election Officers their votes, for the following town officers to be elected on the official ballots:

Moderator, Town Clerk, Three Members Board of Public Welfare, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, Two Sonstables and Tree Warden, each for the term of one year; One Selectman, One Assessor, and One Member of School Committee for the term of three years; One member Municipal Light Board for three years and One Member for one year to fill vacancy; One Water Commissioner, One Cemetery Commissioner and One Member of Planning Board each for the term of three years.

All the above officers to be voted for upon one ballot.

Also to choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

The polls will be opened at 5.45 o'clock A. M. and may be closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

The business meeting will begin at 10 o'clock A. M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon.

Article 3. To hear the report of the Finance Committee and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the various departments and expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day and appoint a committee to have charge of the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of a Surety Company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the treasurer, by and with the approval of the selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1929, and to issue a note or notes of the town therefor payable within one year or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the selectmen.

Article 8. To see what action the town will take regarding the town officers, by and with the approval of the selectmen, to employ counsel when deemed necessary in the performance of their duties.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town officers, by and with the approval of the selectmen, to

employ counsel when deemed necessary in the performance of their duties.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Boards that have during the year 1928 appointed one of their members to another town office or position to continue this practice to May 1, 1929, as authorized by Chapter 371 of the Acts of 1928.

Article 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for extension of the Street Lights from their present terminus opposite Grove Street to the Worcester City Line or act in any way thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to elect the Board of Public Welfare, one for one year, one for two years and one for three years and each year thereafter to elect one for three years or act in any way thereon.

Article 13. To hear the report of the School Committee appointed by the town in 1926 as a special committee to investigate the need of a new school building.

Article 14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of constructing and originally equipping and furnishing a school building, said building to be located on grounds adjacent to the present school building; appoint the School Committee to carry out the recommendations of the town; or take any action relative thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from any available funds the sum of \$1120.71 to cover unpaid bills of the School Department for 1928 or act or do anything relative thereto.

Article 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1000|00) dollars with which to build a section of improved road on Maple Street, beginning at the end of the present stone road and extending in an easterly direction or act in any way thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to put a fire escape on the school building and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or act in any way thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a tractor, to be used as power for the town scraper and snow plow, or act in any way thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred (\$200.00) dollars to be added to the funds already in the hands of the town treasurer, for the purpose of erecting a Memorial to the World War Soldiers and choose a committee with full power to purchase and erect said memorial or act in any way thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money toward the purchase of a Fire Siren or act in any way thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate from any available funds the sum of \$79.87 to cover bills and overdrafts of 1928 as follows: Assessors \$28.00; Moth \$1.95; State Aid \$24.00; Highways (1927 balance) \$14.47; Flag Pole \$6.20; Memorial Day \$5.25; or act in any way thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to rescind the action taken at the annual town meeting, February 7, 1927, whereby it was voted that no further extension of the electric light plant be made unless a suitable guarantee of an adequate return for a reasonable period of years and after hearing before and a written report by the Municipal Light Board, and to vote to leave the matter of making short extensions in the hands of the Municipal Light Board, or act in any way thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to extend the Electric Light Line to the residence of George Perkins and also to the residence of Joseph W. Smith and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the said purpose or act in any way thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars with which to reimburse Joseph A. Barclay for funds advanced to extend the Electric Light Line from the residence of J. Ralph Barclay to the Paxton-Spencer town line or act in any way thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to choose a director in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 128, General Laws, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 26. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to install an electrically lighted signal over the intersection of West and Pleasant Streets, Paxton Center, or act in any way thereon.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$4100 from the estate of Charles H. Osland in trust, the same to be invested and the income thereof to be expended for the perpetual care of the Osland family lot in the Paxton Center Cemetery.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from Mrs. Mary E. Dwyer in trust, the same to be invested and the income only thereof to be used for the perpetual care of the Dwyer family lot in the Paxton Cemetery.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and their successors in said office to accept, in the name and behalf of the Town, gifts of money in trust

to be invested by the Town and the income thereof to be used for the care and upkeep of cemeteries or burial lots in cemeteries located in the town.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting two attested copies thereof, seven days at least before the time set for holding said meeting, as directed by vote of the town.
