SIR:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from May 23, 1932, the date of the previous audit, to May 29, 1933, and submit the following report thereon:

The records of the financial transactions of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town, or committing bills for collection, were examined, checked, and verified by a comparison with the reports and the records in the office of the accounting officer.

The accounting officer's ledger was analyzed, the appropriation accounts being checked to the town meeting records of appropriations and transfers voted. After the necessary adjusting entries were made, a baance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town on May 29, 1933, was prepared and is appended to this report.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The cash book was footed and the recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the records of the departments making payments to the treasurer and with the other sources from which money is paid into the treasury. The payments were compared with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The payments of maturing debt and interest were verified by a comparison with the amounts falling due.

The savings bank books representing the investments of the various trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and listed and the income was proved.

The treasurer's cash balance on May 29, 1933, was proved by a reconciliation with statements furnished by the banks and by an actual count of the cash in the office.

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were examined and checked.

The taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination were audited, and all subsequent commitments of taxes and assessments were proved and reconciled with the assessors' warrants. The recorded collections were compared with the payments to the treasurer, as recorded on the treasurer's cash book, the abatements were checked with the assessors' record of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, with the exception of one item which is being investigated, are correct as listed.

No bond for 1933 has been filed by the collector, and therefore no commitments for 1933 taxes have been made.

The records of licenses and permits issued by the selectmen and the town clerk were examined and checked, and the payments to the State, the county, and the town were verified.

The surety bonds for the treasurer, town clerk and manager of the municipal light department were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of the public welfare department were found to be incomplete and did not lend themselves to proper audit. It is recommended that a record be kept of all charges for aid rendered on account of persons having a settlement outside the town, as well as a record of the date and amount of each bill sent out for collection.

In order that the accounting officer's ledger may at all times

reflect the true condition of the several tax levies, it is recommended that the assessors notify the accounting officer promptly of all abatements granted, as required by Section 23-B, Chapter 50, General Laws.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the books and accounts of the sealer of weights and measures and of the library department were examined and checked. It is recommended that money collected by these departments be turned over to the town treasurer at least as often as once a month.

The tax title deeds on hand were listed and the amounts transferred to tax titles were verified.

Appended to this report in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, together with tables showing the trust fund transactions.

For the co-operation extended by the several town officials during the process of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

BOARD OF HEALTH REGULATIONS

FOR CONTROL OF CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

The Board of Health of the Town of Paxton, as authorized by the General Laws, chapter 111, section 31 hereby makes the following regulations for the public health.

The board earnestly requests the co-operation of all citizens of the town in securing a desirable sanitary condition, and wishes to be notified of any existing nuisance, source of filth, or cause of sickness within the town.

DEFINITIONS

Quarantine. The term quarantine as used in these rules shall be understood to mean that persons in the dwelling, tenement, apartment or other quarters under restriction shall not leave said premises, and that no other persons save the physician, nurse, clergyman and authorized health officers shall enter upon such premises except by permission of the board of health.

Isolation.—The term isolation, as used in these rules, shall be understood to mean the restriction of the patient and nurse or other attendants to a certain room or rooms apart from the other members of the household in a manner satisfactory to the board of health.

Householder.—The term householder, as used in these rules, shall be understood as meaning the head of the household, or the one in charge of the household, or the one in charge of a hospital, asylum, prison, jail, school or institution, public or private.

Tenement, Apartment or Dwelling.—The term tenement, apartment or dwelling, as used in these rules, shall be understood to mean the room or rooms or portion of a building used as a residence by a single family or household.

Disinfection.—The term disinfection, applied to premises, as used in these rules, shall be understood to mean the cleansing, renovation and airing of the same, following the presence of cases of communicable diseases, and such additional measures as may be required by the board of health.

ISOLATION OR QUARANTINE

Any person suffering from a disease declared to be dangerous to the public health shall be isolated to the satisfaction of the board of health when in its opinion it shall be necessary.

Isolation or quarantine shall continue until release by the direction of the board of health. The minimum periods of isolation shall be as follows:—

Anterior Poliomyelitis "Infantile Paralysis."-Twenty-eight

days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until acute

symptoms have subsided.

Diphtheria.—Ten days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until two consecutive negative cultures, taken at least twenty-four hours apart, from both nose and throat of the patient, and one negative culture from both nose and throat of all other inmates of the house have been taken.

Scarlet Fever.—Twenty-eight days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until infective discharges have ceased.

Measles.—Ten days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until all symptoms have ceased.

Whooping Cough.—Twenty-eight days from the onset of the disease (catarrhal symptoms).

Mumps.—Seven days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until acute symptoms have subsided.

Chicken Pox.—Fourteen days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until all skin lesions have healed.

Smallpox.—Twenty-eight days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until all skin lesions have healed.

German Measles.—Seven days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until all symptoms have ceased.

Epidemic Cerebrospinal Meningitis.—Fourteen days from the onset of the disease, and thereafter until all acute symptoms have ceased.

CONTACTS

Persons who have been exposed to diseases dangerous to the public health shall be deemed to be in danger of developing such disease unless immunized by a previous attack or by vaccines, or unless free from the symptoms of the disease during the following longest common incubation periods after the last exposure:—Diphtheria: immunization or Chicken pox: twenty-one days.

Scarlet fever: eight days. Smallpox: twenty-one days. Measles: fourteen days.

Mumps: twenty-one days.

Anterior poliomyelitis: four- Whoo teen days.

Whooping cough: fourteen days.

Epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis: ten days.

Septic sore throat: three days.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

No person who has been ill with any of these diseases shall return to school, until the following minimum periods have elapsed after recovery:

Infantile Paralysis	2	weeks
Chicken Pox	7	days
Diphtheria	2	weeks
Cerebrospinal Meningitis	2	weeks
Measles	2	weeks
Mumps	2	weeks
Scarlet Fever	2	weeks
Smallpox	3	weeks
Whooping Cough	2	weeks
German Measles	3	weeks

Any person kept from school on account of contagious disease or exposure to same shall not be readmitted to school, except on certificate from a physician or agent of the Board of Health, and in compliance with the above rules.

Householders are required to report to the Board of Health, any of the above diseases they may know to occur in their families or households.

No person from any dwelling wherein a dangerous disease exists, shall attend any school, church or public gathering of any kind without a permit from the board of health, or as otherwise provided by law.

No person from any dwelling wherein a dangerous disease exists shall take any book or magazine to or from any public library, or any library where books are loaned to the public, without a permit from the board of health.

No person shall remove or permit to be removed from any house, tenement or apartment under quarantine for a disease dangerous to the public health any clothing, books, milk bottles or other property without permission of the board of health.

No child who is known to be affected by active pulmonary tuberculosis or with discharging lesions of tuberculosis shall be allowed to attend any public school without a permit from the board of health.

No person shall engage in the handling of milk or food intended for sale after exposure to or while residing in a household in which there is a case of smallpox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhoid fever, septic sore throat, anterior poliomyelitis or epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis without the permission of the board of health.

No person, except a physician or registered nurse, shall engage in any occupation involving close contact with children after exposure to, or while residing in a household in which there is a case of smallpox, chicken pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, septic sore throat, anterior poliomyelitis, epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis, whooping cough or mumps without permission from the board of health.

No person, except the immediate family and the persons necessarily concerned in the burial, shall enter a house in which there is lying the body of a person who has died of cholera, small-pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, anterior poliomyelitis or epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis.

All premises in which there has been a case of smallpox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, anterior poliomyelitis, epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis or other disease dangerous to the public health shall be disinfected to the satisfaction of the board of health.

Any person may be required to remove from a dwelling in which a dangerous disease exists whenever in the opinion of the board of health the isolation of the patient or the amount of contact is such as to require such action.

WATER COMMISSIONERS

Your Water Commissioners are pleased to submit the following report on activities following the Special Town Meeting at which the Town of Paxton voted to apply for a Government PWA Loan and Grant to construct our Municipal Water Supply System.

This Board secured the approval of the Massachusetts Emergency Finance Board and the Governor, after personal appearance in Boston before the Emergency Finance Board and the executing of formal application.

Following this approval the application was filed in Washington and given a serial number among other PWA projects on the docket.

The Board of Water Commissioners immediately, with the assistance of our Engineers, drew up specifications and called for bids covering the construction of the System, building a pumping station, installing pumps and supplying the cast iron pipe, special fittings, hydrants, valves, etc. These bids were opened publicly in the Town Hall on Monday evening, November 27, 1933.

Tentative contracts pending our finally obtaining the loan and grant as outlined by the vote at our Special Town Meeting, have been awarded covering the material upon which we received bids. We were extremely fortunate in obtaining very low bids on several commodities on which prices have since advanced.

On Friday evening, January 12, 1934, the final loan agreement was entered into with the Government to obtain our funds and have construction begin.

Our application has gone ahead steadily in comparison with the applications of other towns and it is our understanding that Paxton will probably be one of the first to obtain a Government Loan under the Public Works Administration in New England for a Water Supply System.

The Commissioners are indebted to many citizens of Paxton and Worcester for their assistance in pushing our project ahead. The Commissioners, Mr. Erskine, Board of Selectmen, Town Clerk and Mr. Dunbar have worked unceasingly to get this project started at the first possible moment.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Holden Mass., Dec. 31, 1933.

To the School Committee of Paxton:

The following report is the thirty-fourth in the series since the formation of this Union, and the sixteenth by the writer. The usual tables of statistics are appended, showing the changes in teachers, the enrollment and the age and grading chart.

We are glad to report no changes in teachers this fall, and fine loyalty and devotion to their work on the part of everyone. This has been one of the most trying years in education, with many drastic reductions in budgets and school services, but Paxton has maintained and raised standards and kept faith with her children. The School Committee merit the sincere gratitude of all for their careful study of our problems, for improvements in the plant and equipment and closer supervision of the constantly increasing number of pupils in high school. We appreciate the interest taken by the Principal of South High School and the cooperation of the Trade School authorities in the welfare of our pupils. The need of thorough preparation in the elementary school for the work of high school is more apparent when pupils go to the city with its longer school year and more severe competition, than if we had a local high school. To secure this better preparation the Committee has this year had Mr. Cotton devote his time to the eighth The finishing of another room will make it possible to separate grades six and seven and so give more time to the latter We have noted with much satisfaction the quality of work now being done by the majority of our pupils in high school.

To insist on faithful attention to duty for the four years in secondary school is in the interest of the pupil as well as of economy. This year the State allows reimbursement on the basis of a tuition rate of \$110, but Worcester charges \$160.

We have practiced every economy in the operation of the schools, in the interest of the taxpayer, without sacrifice of the welfare of our children. This has been done by standardization of supplies, care in the selection and purchase of equipment, greater care in the use of supplies and books, and in the operation of the school plant. With the coöperation of the Selectmen and through the C. W. A. we have made many needed improvements.

The health program is outlined in the report of the School I should like to see the Audiometer test, a Dental Clinic, and Pre-School Clinic or Summer Round-up, made permanent features of this program. We are grateful to the Parent-Teacher Association for their support of school activities during the year. We thank Miss Daniher for the picture of the Presidents which hangs in the eighth grade room. We thank Mr. and Mrs. Dunbar for sponsoring another Prize Speaking contest. First prizes were awarded to Miriam Sivula and George McGovern. prizes went to Elizabeth Morse and John Wells. Awards from the American Humane Society in the Poster Contest were presented by Mr. Clark at graduation. Byron Oatley and Eugenia Robinson received first prizes of bronze medals. Grace Beyea, John Knipe, Marjorie St. Martin and Alice Wright received second prizes of silver medals. Honorable Mention subscriptions were presented to Marguerite Girouard, Helen Hughes, Elizabeth Morse, Richard Reed and John Wells. A most enjoyable musical entertainment and operetta was presented in the Town Hall by the pupils under the direction of the teachers. The winners in the American Legion Essay Contest were John Lawler and Lilla Crouch. The awards were presented at graduation by Mr. Jesse Mills, the Commander.

The School is your child's larger home. It shares with you as a parent the faith and the hope that the life of your child will be fine and right. Carefully trained teachers know, even as you

know, that the foundations of life are laid in simple, everyday habits. They know that the child who is well and happy, who is punctual and regular, who is helpful to his parents, his associates, and his teachers, and who is eager to learn, is well on his way toward a good life. You as a parent, because of the knowledge of what the school does for your child, will wish to cherish and protect this, your child's larger home. Let us safeguard our children's school.

SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The Audiometer test was given the pupils of the second, third, and fourth grades, and to all other pupils who had entered the Paxton schools since the pupils were tested in 1931. This test is very accurate and detects early loss of hearing which is impossible by a voice test alone. There were three children who showed a loss of hearing who will be examined at the Hard of Hearing clinic by Dr. Goodspeed at the Memorial Hospital in Worcester.

A very successful pre-shool clinic was held in June. The school physician, Dr. Knowlton, examined and vaccinated twelve children. Many parents were present and talked with the doctor regarding their children and the defects found. Some of the defects were corrected before September and others had been improved upon. The Parent-Teacher Association was a most hearty supporter and much credit is due the members for the fine co-operation given.

The dental clinic which was started last year was completed in April. It was a very worth while and needed project. While not every child had dental attention many who needed care badly had the work completed. I hope it will be possible to have another such clinic in the near future to carry on the project which has been started. A clinic was held this fall as usual to determine the children who were three years or more scholastically retarded. The findings are of value in helping the child in school.

I am pleased to report that one child was at the Sterling Health Camp for one month this year. Children who spend a month or more at the health camp benefit in many ways. They not only learn to do things which are going to help improve their health, but good sportsmanship as well.

The usual examinations by Dr. Knowlton have been completed and parents have been sent notices of the defects found. The weighing and measuring in most cases show a steady gain.

The absences from school this year have been mostly because of colds. There were a few cases of skin infections, but when put under proper and immediate care they soon cleared up. The general health of the school children has been good.

TOWN WARRANT

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Worcester, ss:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton:

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town, who are qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs, to meet in ALLEN HALL, on MONDAY, the Fifth day of February, A. D. 1934, at 6:30 o'clock A.M., then and there to act on the following articles, viz.

Article 1. To bring in to the Election Officers their votes for the following town officers to be elected on the official ballot: Moderator, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Treasurer, Auditor, two Constables and Tree Warden, each for the term of one year; one Selectman, one member Board Public Welfare, one Assessor, one member Municipal Light Board, one School Committee, one Cemetery Commissioner, one Water Commissioner, one member Planning Board, two Trustees Richards' Memorial Library, each for the term of three years.

All of the above officers to be voted for upon one ballot.

Also to choose all other necessary town officers.

The polls will be opened at 6:30 o'clock A.M. and may be closed at three o'clock P.M.

The business meeting will begin at ten o'clock A.M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon.

- Article 3. To hear the report of the Finance Committee and vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the various departments and expenses of the town for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to pay the proper charge of a Surety Company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1934, and to issue a note or notes of the town therefor, payable within one year or act in any way thereon.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the selectmen.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town officers, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to employ counsel when deemed necessary, in the performance of their duties or act in any way thereon.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the purpose of constructing a section of permanent road on Reservoir Drive, providing that the State and County each appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for the said purpose or act in any way thereon.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) to be used on Chapter 90 roads providing that the State and County each appropriate twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) for the said purpose or act in any way thereon.

- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to eliminate a curve and steep grade on Marshall Street or act in any way thereon.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Committee to have charge of the observance of Memorial Day or act in any way thereon.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to have charge of the observance of the Fourth of July or act in any way thereon.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to pay the Moderator \$10.00 for services at the Annual Town Meeting and \$5.00 for any special meetings, these sums to be taken from the Contingent Fund or act in any way thereon.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the Highway Equipment Fund to the Highway Equipment Maintenance Fund to be used to furnish supplies and maintain the town's highway equipment or act in any way thereon.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of \$1,000.00 from the Overlay Surplus to the Reserve Fund or act in any way thereon.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to use 60 per cent of the surplus funds in the hands of the Town Treasurer, available July 1, 1934, for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for the current year or act in any way thereon.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to build a fire house, in part through funds made available under the provisions of the Civil Works Administration or otherwise, authorize the taking by eminent domain or purchase of a suitable site for same, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor or act in any way thereon.

- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for fire apparatus or act in any way thereon.
- Article 19. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Building Inspector, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor or act in any way thereon.
- Article 20. To see if town will authorize the Board of Health to appoint someone to collect garbage, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 21. To see if the town will vote to pay the local C. W. A. Administrator \$5.00 per week and the Assistant Disbursing Officer \$3.00 per week since January 1, 1934, during the continuance of the C. W. A. work, same to be charged against the Contingent Fund or act in any way thereon.
- Article 22. To see if the town will vote to allow the cost of all materials and use of trucks necessary on the C. W. A. Projects to be charged against the Reserve Fund or act in any way thereon.
- Article 23. To see if the town will vote to direct the Selectmen or Moderator to appoint a committee of three or more citizens to co-operate with the Mass. Forest and Park Association in the detection and eradication of the Dutch Elm Disease.
- Article 24. To see if the town will vote that the income from sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or municipal power during the current fiscal year be appropriated for the Municipal Light Plant, to be expended by the manager of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for the said fiscal year, as defined in Section 57 of Chapter 164 of the General Laws.
- Article 25. To vote to set the wages of laborers and employes of the town or act in any way thereon.

Article 26. That one person hold but one elective town office or act in any way thereon.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote that the Superintendent or Road Commissioner shall not be allowed to employ or use any of his own personal equipment on work under his supervision. That the work be equalized among those truck owners desiring such work or act in any way thereon.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting two attested copies thereof seven days at least before the time set for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
