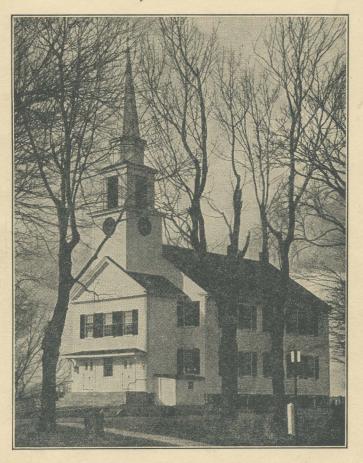

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from April 11, 1943 to April 26, 1944, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

SIR:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from April 11, 1943, the date of the previous audit, to April 26, 1944, and report thereon as follows:

The records of the financial transactions of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town, or committing bills for collection, were examined, checked and verified by comparison with the reports and the records in the town accountant's office.

The accountant's ledger was analyzed, the appropriation accounts being checked to the town meeting records of appropriations and transfers voted. A balance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town on April 26, 1944, was prepared and is appended to this report.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the accountant's ledger and with the records of the departments making payments to the treasurer, while the payments by the treasurer were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were verified by comparison with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the various trust and investment funds in the custody of the treasurer were examined and listed, and the income was proved.

The cash book additions were verified, and the treasurer's cash balance on April 26, 1944, was proved by reconciliation of bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The tax title deeds on hand were listed and the amounts transferred to the tax title account were verified.

The surety bonds of the officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were examined and checked. The commitments of taxes were examined and verified by comparison with the assessors' warrants. The recorded collections were checked to the commitment books, the payments to the treasurer were verified by comparison with the treasurer's books, the abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved with the accountant's ledger.

The outstanding accounts were verified by sending notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of the selectmen and town clerks as to licenses and permits granted were checked and the payments to the town and to the State were verified.

The attention of the town clerk is called to the provisions of law requiring monthly payments to the treasurer and to the Division of Fisheries and Game of receipts from dog and sporting licenses issued.

The recorded receipts for the rental of municipal buildings were checked and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

The books and accounts of the municipal light and water departments were examined and checked. The commitments were proved, the collections were compared with the payments to the treasurer, and the outstanding accounts were listed and compared with the accountant's ledger.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the books and accounts of the sealer of weights and measures and of the public welfare and cemetery departments were examined and checked, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the transactions and condition of the trust and investment funds.

While engaged in making the audit, cooperation was received from all town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

Illig property: painted storm windows, installed new

Howe Farm: Shingled entire roof, added pipe line for additional water supply. Many more repairs are necessary, and should be made immediately on this property.

Through joint negotiations with Chester M. Rossier, proprietor of the general store and Post Office, we were able to eliminate a wet and muddy condition by resurfacing between the highway and store.

We have plans with the assistance of the State to re-sod the bank on the west side of the Common, also re-seed the Common, and we would like to ask the cooperation of the young people of the Town to help us to keep the Common attractive by not using it as a playground.

We wish to extend to the State Police of the Holden Barracks our thanks and appreciation of their help and assistance in the past year.

Any comments or suggestions from the citizens of the Town at any time are most welcome.

We are listing below the common diseases declared by the State Department of Public Health as dangerous to the public health, and urge parents to cooperate by promptly reporting them to the Board of Health as required by law.

Chicken Pox Mumps
Dog Bite (rabid dog) Scarlet Fever
Diphtheria Tuberculosis in all forms
German Measles Typhoid Fever
Measles Whooping Cough

We wish to thank all those who cooperated with the Board of Health in the removal of the domestic sewage which drained into the surface water drains, as this surface water drain was not designed as a sanitary sewer, and should not be used for that purpose.

We are sorry this work has not been fully completed, but hope to finish the work in the early Spring.

At this time we wish to bring to your attention that the

Board of Health feels that the Town dump in the center of the Town, and in the rear of the school house, should be abolished. We realize that another site must be obtained before the present dump can be closed; therefore, if someone knows where a site for a public dump can be acquired the Board would greatly appreciate the information.

In closing this report, we wish to bring to your attention the rubbish that is disposed of along our highways is what makes our roads unsightly. We would appreciate anyone reporting license numbers to us of any cars you may see whose occupants may be committing such a nuisance. We will do our part to stop this practice.

It is the feeling of the Board that the Illig property might serve as a beginning to a permanent memorial.

The original grant and probable disposal of the Howe property was discussed without any action taken.

It is requested that the citizens of the town make full use of this Board by submitting proposals and recommendations for the good of the town. The Board to study and report to the town.

Holden, Mass., Dec. 31, 1944

To the School Committee of Paxton:

This report is the twenty-seventh by the writer, and the forty-fifth in the series since the formation of the present Union.

This has been a year of normal progress in school work in spite of the many distracting influences resulting from war. There is a small decrease in enrollment over last year, but an increase of nine since school opened in the Fall.

New text-books in several subjects have been introduced, and additional reference books, maps and other equipment added. It has been difficult to obtain some basal texts and workbooks because of paper shortage, but orders have been placed for this material, and for more Stillfilm for use in the projector.

Miss Hagar resigned her position as Supervisor of Music in June, having been elected at Exeter, N. H. We all miss her, but feel we were fortunate in securing Miss Winona A. Weed of Enosburg Falls, Vt., to carry on this work. Both Mrs. Deignan and Miss Weeks also left in June to accept positions in Worcester. Miss Ruth Moss was chosen for Grades V and VI, and Mrs. Jenny C. Hodgdon for Grades III and IV. Mrs. Butler has been on leave of absence, and Mrs. Esther Gonyer has been acting as School Nurse. We have not yet been able to get anyone to serve as School Physician.

The American Legion awards were made to Owen Rogers and Beverly Maccabee. Animal Poster awards went to Barbara Dixon, Beverly Maccabee, first prizes; George Beley,

Charles Sjoberg and Anna VanWyck, second prizes; Marion Brandt, Robert Langevin, Frances Rogers, Owen Rogers, and Louise Wentworth, honorable mention.

The school building has been opened for the use of various community organizations and groups during the year. From January through November pupils and teachers purchased \$1700 worth of Defense Stamps and Bonds.

To keep pace with the rapidly changing point of view of the function and nature of education in this changing world we need to re-think our whole program, and no school system however small should evade the responsibility facing it. The war is bringing about a new "world-mindedness" and with the schools lies much of the task of building the new world in which "all nations are working together intelligently and harmoniously toward higher physical, intellectual and moral standards, with equal opportunity for all." Specifically for us it means training for a better citizenship, for self-discipline, respect for authority and the rights of others.

For your loyal support and for the fine cooperation of parents and teachers I am grateful.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following report covers the school health program

from January through June.

Nine children were transferred from the Well Child Clinic. This service has prepared the child for entrance to school, free from defects.

All children entering school were properly vaccinated, as required by Mass. State laws.

Two children attended the annual tonsil clinic held in June at the Holden District Hospital.

Three had visual defects corrected.

All children were weighed in January and again in June. Only one per cent failed to make normal gains.

Forty-eight home calls and conferences were made.

The dental clinic is still in operation, the results are incomplete.

With the suspension of annual physical examinations, it is the duty of all to be watchful for minor defects so that they may be corrected before major problems result.

Now more than ever the home and school must cooperate to prepare the child physically and emotionally to meet the responsibilities of the post-war world.

Monthly sanitary inspections show the interest the janitor maintains in the school building.

To you, the teachers and all others who have assisted me, I wish to extend my sincere appreciation.

TOWN WARRANT

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

WORCESTER SS:

To the Town Clerk of the Town of Paxton,

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, who are qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs, to meet in "Allen Hall" on Monday, the 5th day of February, 1945, at 12 o'clock, noon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

ARTICLE 1. To bring in to the election officers their votes for Town Officers to be voted for on the official ballot, as follows:

Moderator, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Treasurer, two Constables, and Tree Warden each for the term of one year; one member of the Board of Selectmen for three years, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, for three years, one member of the Board of Assessors for three years, one member of the School Committee for three years, one member of the Municipal Light Board for three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of three years, one Water Commissioner for three years, two Trustees of the Richards Memorial Library for the term of three years and one member of the Planning Board for five years.

All of the above officers to be voted for upon one ballot. Also to choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

The Polls will be open from Noon until eight o'clock P.M. Business meeting to begin at 7:30 o'clock P.M.

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon and to act upon any recommendations contained in said reports and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required in accordance with said reports or otherwise, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (see budget) with which to pay the proper charges of a Surety Company for acting as surety on bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectment to approve the same.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1945, and to issue a note or notes of the Town therefor payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, of the General Laws

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to use \$600.00 from the revenue of the Howe property to be used for repairs and maintenance of said property.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to use \$300.00 from the revenue of the Illig Property, to be used for repairs and maintenance of said property.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to cooperate 2 with the State to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 81 Highways, or take any action in relation thereto

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to cooperate with the State and County to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a

sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55.00 for a Well Child Health Conference for Pre-School children and follow-up work connected therewith or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to give the Fire Department members compensation for their services or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the money received from the Dog Fund to the Richards Memorial Library or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new Grader, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of \$285.40 from Highway Equipment Fund to the Highway Equipment Maintenance Fund to be used to furnish supplies and maintain the town's highway equipment or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to have charge of the Fourth of July celebration, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to appoint the American Legion as a committee to have charge of the observance of Memorial Day or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will consider that the Illig property be proposed as a War Memorial or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to pay the moderator \$10.00 for his services at the Annual Town Meeting and \$5.00 for any special meetings, charging the same to Contingent or act in any way thereon.









ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to use up to 60% of the surplus funds in the hands of the Town Treasurer, available when the tax rate is ready to be set, as recommended by the Tax Commissioner for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for the current year or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the service of a Custodian to the Town Dump.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to sell a parcel of land to Sons of Paxton Club, in rear of the present club house, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 21. To see that there be included in the tax levy for electricity used for street lights the sum of \$500 and that this sum and the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or for municipal power, and from sales of appliances and jobbing during the current fiscal year, be appropriated for Municipal Light Plant, the whole to be expended by the manager of the Municipal Light Plant under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for the current fiscal year, as defined in Section 57, Chapter 164, of the General Laws and Chapter 235 of the Acts of 1937 and that if this sum and this income shall exceed the expense for said fiscal year, such excess shall be transferred to the construction fund of said plant and appropriated and used for such additions thereto as may thereafter be authorized by the Municipal Light Board.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of war bonds or other bonds that are legal investments for savings banks, in order to establish a post-war rehabilitation fund, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Acts of 1943, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the town will vote to request the Honor Roll Committee to place the names of men serving with the Merchant Marine on the Honor Roll under a heading (U. S. Maritime Service) or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the town will vote to transfer from surplus to the Richards Memorial Library Trust Funds, the amount of \$100.61, to replace the loss because of the bank closure, to bring the principal of the Bigelow Trust Funds to \$22,372.08 to conform with the record of the State, or act in any way thereon.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting two attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office and one at the Town Hall, seven days at least before the day set for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
