I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from April 27, 1944, to March 5, 1945, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

SIR:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from April 27, 1944, the date of the previous audit, to March 5, 1945, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as shown on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked with the available records of the town accountant and with the records of the town treasurer.

The books and accounts in the town accountant's office were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were compared with the treasurer's books and with the records in the several departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection. The recorded payments were checked with the treasury warrants and with the disbursements as shown by the treasurer's books. The appropriations and transfers were checked with the town clerk's records of financial votes passed by town meetings.

The necessary ledger adjustments resulting from the audit were made, a trial balance, proving the accounts to be in balance, was taken off, and a balance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town on March 5, 1945, was prepared and is appended to this report.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The cash book additions were verified. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the available records in the several departments in which money was collected for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and with the accountant's books.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the trust funds in the custody of the treasurer were examined and listed, the income being proved and the disbursements verified.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and checked, the amounts transferred from the tax levies to the tax title account being verified.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examine and checked in detail. The tax accounts outstanding at

the date of the previous audit and all subsequent commitments were audited and compared with the assessors' warrants for their collection. The recorded collections were checked with the payments to the treasurer as shown by the treasurer's and the accountant's books. The recorded abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved with the town accountant's ledger accounts as adjusted.

The financial records of the town clerk were examined and checked. The collections on account of dog and sporting licenses were verified and checked with the payments to the town and State and the cash balance on March 5, 1945, was verified.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the books and accounts of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined. The recorded collections were checked with the payments to the treasurer, and the cash on hand was verified.

The surety bonds of the officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the balance sheet referred to, there are appended to this report tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, tax title, departmental and water accounts, as well as tables showing the condition and transactions of the trust funds.

For the cooperation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, an behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

To the Voters of the Town of Paxton:

Your Finance Committee has made a comparative survey of the department expenditures for 1945, and requested department budgets for the year 1946. We note that over-drafts of \$4,834.34 exist for the year 1945.

This amount must be raised at the annual Town Meeting and must be included in the tax levy for the year 1946. We also note that many department requests show an increase over that of last year.

These increases will also affect your tax rate for the year 1946. The amount as stated above is exclusive of the amounts requested in the different articles in the Town warrant.

We feel that it is the duty of every taxpayer in this Town to take time enough to go over the budget and while doing so, please keep in mind that every one thousand dollar appropriation voted for in favor will increase your taxes approximately one dollar per one thousand dollar assessed valuation of your property.

The committee feels that the 1946 tax rate is beginning to climb to a height that might become a little uncomfortable, with a possible raise in taxes to the amount of nine dollars per thousand. This possible increase is based on the amounts in the budget and does not include the articles calling for special appropriations in the warrant.

ZONING AND BUILDING BY-LAWS

This board since the town meeting of February 1945 has devoted the major part of its time formulating a new set of "Zoning By-laws," to replace the "Temporary Zoning By-laws" accepted at the Special Town Meeting of June 5, 1923.

Considerable care and many consultations with the State Planning Board were held to ascertain that the subject matter was in compliance with the "General Laws."

Also we are submitting a set of "Building By-laws" which we believe will take care of our needs in Paxton for the coming year. The members of the Board hope that the townspeople will keep an open mind in regards to these Zoning and Building By-laws.

To be of service to the community the by-laws should be continually revised and studied to keep up with changing conditions.

HOWE FARM

We are submitting an article for the sale of this property, after obtaining legal advice and a report of court procedure. The law cites that a person cannot tie up property so that it never can be sold.

This farm, if sold to a private person will become a valuable piece of taxable property, and we believe further town ownership will incur maintenance costs that will exceed its revenue.

We propose that the money from the sale of this property be applied to the start of a "War Memorial Park."

ILLIG FARM OR PROPERTY

This year we again propose that the Illig Farm property be developed as a "War Memorial Park" with the provision that if at some future date the town wishes to build a Municipal Building on this property it would be permissible.

Miss Herlihey, chairman of the State Planning Board, came to Paxton on December 8th and addressed the townspeople on Zoning and Building by-laws. We wish to thank her for the special trip, also to Miss Herlihy and Mr. Davis for their co-operation in helping us set up these new By-laws in correct form, that we might submit them at this town meeting.

We wish to remind the townspeople that any matter of town affairs may be referred to the Planning Board for study to be reported on to the voters at the next town meeting.

REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Holden, Mass., Dec. 31, 1945

To the School Committee of Paxton:

This report presented for your consideration is the fortysixth in the series since the formation of the present School Union, and the twenty-eighth by the writer.

No one can realize better than a School Committee the problems that face us in maintaining the standards of a good school system in the face of teacher shortage and scarcity of supplies and equipment. Since the last report we have had a complete turn-over in the teaching staff, even with general salary increases. We have not yet been able to find a Drawing Supervisor, but I hope in the near future to be able to fill that position, and as soon as possible we should have a definite program in manual training and practical arts for both boys and girls. As supplies and equipment become available we shall need to expand the physical education program to meet our needs.

There is an increase in our registration of children between the ages of 5 and 16, from 102 to 116. The fall term enrollment shows an increase of 86 to 94, and the per cent of attendance is very good.

The building has been open again this year for the use of various community organizations and groups. The pupils purchased \$1,301.35 in Defense Stamps and Bonds. At the graduation exercises in June the American Legion awards were presented to Donald Flint and Anna VanWyck. First prizes for Posters, presented by the American Humane Education Society, were awarded to Frances Rogers and Marion

Brandt. Second prizes to Robert Langevin and Rachel Pierce, and honorable mention to Jean Perkins and Louise Wentworth. There were also awards made to Leonard Harrington and Gerald Fontaine for their service as Safety Patrol leaders.

In this period of reconversion from an "all out war effort" to peacetime conditions, the schools come in for their share of close scrutiny and reorganization. Having seen the power of education as demonstrated by the Axis nations, we realize more than ever the need for a high standard of universal education. We need greater vision, strong leadership and the support of all parents and citizens. Our School Committee is typical of over 100,000 similar boards of education, working continually for better opportunities for our boys and girls. The experience of each member is most valuable, and with the loyal support of the citizens our schools will be able to meet the needs of our youth as they enter upon this new age in our history.

OF THE

MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In response to your request, I am hereby submitting my annual report as Supervisor of Music.

The regular program has been carried on during the year. It includes singing, listening, reading, part singing, theory, and general information about the music sung, the composers, nationality and general characteristics. These phases are carefully graded and carried on during the eight grade levels. The children in the first grade enter in the fall with a 20% group able to sing "in tune". By the end of the first year the per cent is raised to 80. During the second year the percentage is raised to 95, and third year we strive for 100%. The existing third grade has about 90% of its members who are able to sing in tune and by the end of the year will probably be able to claim a 98% average. This phase of the music work is one of the most important covered through the whole eight years. On it depends the success of the higher levels of music education.

With the help of the Principal the seventh and eighth grades worked out a musical program based on the song and graduation theme, "The House I Live In".

New books were introduced into the first grade and proved very successful and popular with the children. It is hoped that the next book of the same series for Grade II will be introduced this year.

REPORT

OF THE

SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

This report covers the period September to December, and includes the following activities:

- 1. Weekly sanitation inspection of the building.
- 2. Weekly inspection of each child.
- 3. Weighing and measuring of all children.
- 4. First Aid.
- 5. Visual and auditory testing.
- 6. Assisting Dr. Kimberly with health examinations.
- 7. Consultations with parents and teachers.
- 8. Eight field visits.

We are fortunate to have the health program begin with a physical examination of each child by Dr. Arthur M. Kimberly. Details noted by him were checked, and a record of any defects sent to the parents. Poor posture is a common condition that will need careful attention at home as well as in school. Good posture proceeds with normal development. Those in greatest need posturally can be improved by physical exercises. Only three children had teeth in poor condition. This reflects the good work being done by Dr. Bessie Scott who conducted the Dental Clinic in November.

May I thank the teachers for their kind cooperation, and Mr. Maccabee for screening off an office for Dr. Kimberly's work.

The following By-Laws are recommendations of the Planning Board to the town, to be acted upon at the Town Meeting on February 4th.

Paxton, Mass., December 19, 1945

SECTION I

In order to promote the health, safety, convenience, morals or welfare of the inhabitants of the Town of Paxton under the authority of the provisions of Chapter 40 of the General Laws, and with a view to encouraging the most appropriate use of land; the alteration, repair, height, area, location and use of buildings and the use of land is hereby regulated.

This By-Law repeals and replaces the temporary Zoning By-Law adopted by the Special Town Meeting of June 5, 1923 and subsequent Amendents made thereto.

SECTION II

- 1. For the purposes of this By-Law, the Town of Paxton is hereby divided into the following zones:
 - 1. Residence
 - 2. Business
- 2. Zoning Map. These zones are shown on a map on file in the office of the Town Clerk and entitled, "Zoning Map of Paxton, Massachusetts, 1946". This Zoning Map is hereby declared a part of this By-Law.

SECTION III

ADMINISTRATION

1. Enforcement. This By-Law shall be enforced by the Inspector of Buildings. The Selectmen shall issue no permit

for the erection or alteration of any building, or part thereof, plans and specifications and intended use of which are not in all respects in conformity with the provisions of this By-Law. With each application for a permit to build there shall be filed a plan showing the lot and the location of the building thereon.

- 2. Certification of Occupancy. No premises or building or part thereof hereafter erected or altered, wholly or partly, in use or structure, or the open spaces pertaining to which are in any way reduced, shall be used until the Inspector of Buildings shall have certified on the building permit, or, in case no permit is issued, shall have issued a certificate of occupancy, specifying the use to which the premises, or the building upon being sufficiently completed to comply with the provisions and regulations relating thereto, may be put.
- 3. *Board of Appeals. Within 30 days after the adopton of this By-Law, the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Appeals of five members for terms of such length and so arranged that the term of one appontee will expire each year, and two associate members appointed in like manner, which shall act on all matters within its judisdiction under this By-Law in the manner prescribed in Section 30 of Chapter 40 of the General Laws, as amended, and subject always to the rule that it shall give due consideration to promoting the public health, safety, convenience and welfare, encouraging the most appropriate use of land, and conserving property value, that it shall permit no building or use injurious, noxious, offensive, or detrimental to a neighborhood, and that it shall prescribe appropriate conditions and safeguards in each case.
- 5. Validity. The invalidity of any section or provision of this By-Law shall not invalidate any other section or provision hereof.

SECTION IV

REGULATIONS

1. General Conditions. Any building, use of building or use of land not herein expressly permitted for the zone

in which the building or land is located is hereby forbidden, except a building, use of building, or use of land legally existing at the time of the adoption of this By-Law, unless permission is obtained from the Board of Appeals as provided in Section III of this By-Law.

- 2. In the Residence Zone no building shall be erected or altered and no building or premises shall be used for any purpose except:
 - 1. Detached one family dwelling.
 - 2. Private club not conducted for profit.
 - 3. Church and/or parish house and/or parish school.
 - 4. Farming (Agricultural), nursery, garden or greenhouse, selling primarily products or plants raised or produced on the premises and excluding any use injurious, noxious or offensive to the neighborhood.
 - 5. Building or premises for municipal use.
 - 6. Telephone Exchange
 - 7. Commercial Poultry farms, provided that the buildings housing the poultry be located not less than 200 feet from any street or way and not less than 100 feet from any adjoining property line.
 - 8. Accessory use on the same lot with and customarily incident to any of the above permitted uses and not detrimental to a residential neighborhood. Any of the following uses shall be considered "accessory use":
 - 1. The use of a room or rooms in a dwelling as an office or studio by a physician, dentist, lawyer, music teacher or similar professional person resident in the dwelling.
 - 2. The renting of rooms to not more than 5 persons.

- 3. Furnishing table board to not more than 5 persons.
- 4. Garage for not more than 3 automobiles.
- 5. Storage of 1 commercial vehicle (except farm vehicles.)
- Any of the following uses, provided the use is not injurious, noxious or offensive to the neighborhood and only if authorized by the Board of Appeals.

Aviation Field. Fur Farm.

Riding Stable. Stone Quarry.

Cemetery. Golf Club.

Soil, loam, sod, sand or gravel removal.

Hospital, Convalescent Home or Sanitarium.

Educational or Philanthropic Institution.

Ice Harvest and/or Ice Storage.

10. Signs.

- 1. Real estate sign advertising rental, lease or sale of the premises and not exceeding 12 sq. ft. in area.
- Sign or bulletin board incidental to a permitted use and not exceeding 12 sq. ft.
 in area unless authorized by the Board of Appeals, and in no case to exceed 16 sq. ft.
 in area.
- 3. Sign advertising authorized accessory use and not exceeding 1 sq. ft.

11. Exception.

The Board of Appeals may authorize the conversion of a single family dwelling, in existence at the time of the adoption of this By-Law, to accommodate two families.

SECTION V

BUSINESS ZONES USES

In a Business Zone no building shall be erected or altered and no building or premises shall be used for any purpose injurious, noxious, or offensive to a neighborhood by reason of the emission of odor, fumes, dust, smoke, vibration, or noise or other cause, nor for any purpose except

- 1. Any use permitted in Residence Zones.
- 2. Hotel or lodging house.
- 3. Filling station, garage, or storage of automobiles, if authorized by the Board of Appeals.
- 4. Municipal use.
- 5. Newspaper or job printing.
- 6. Office or bank.
- 7. Trailer and/or Overnight Camps if authorized by the Board of Health and Board of Appeals.
- 8. Place of amusement or assembly.
- 9. Restaurant.
- 10. Retail business, service or public utility, not involving manufacture on the premises except of products the major portion of which is to be sold on the premises to the consumer and further provided that not more than four operatives shall be employed in such manufacture.
- 11. Signs advertising goods or services offered by an occupant of the premises for sale, for hire, or use.

SECTION VI

NON-CONFORMING USES

1. Continuation of Non-conforming Uses. Any lawful building or use of a building or premises or part thereof existing at the time this By-Law or any amendment thereto is adopted may be continued although such building or use does not conform to the provisions thereof and such building or

use may on the approval of the Board of Appeals be extended throughout such premises, provided such use has not been discontinued for a period of one year.

- 2. Change of Non-conforming Uses. The Board of Appeals may permit any non-conforming use to be changed to any specified use not more detrimental or objectionable to a neighborhood.
- 3. Limitation on Restoration. No non-conforming building which has been damaged by fire or other causes to the extent of more than 80% of its assessed value shall be repaired or rebuilt except in conformity with this By-Law unless the Board of Appeals so authorizes.

SECTION VII

AREA REGULATIONS

1. Lot Size and Frontage. In residence zones no building except a one-story building of accessory use shall be erected upon a lot having less than the following area and frontage:

Residence Zone Frontage Area 100' 10,000 Sq. Ft.

provided that one building and its accessory buildings may be erected on any lot which, at the time this By-Law is adopted, cannot be made to conform to the above requirements.

- 2. Front Yards. In a residence zone no building or roadside stand shall be erected or placed within twenty feet of a street line. In a business zone no building shall be erected within ten feet of a street line. In any zone there shall be in front of every dwelling on a lot not abutting on a street, a yard not less than thirty feet deep.
- 3. Side and Rear Yards. In a Residence Zone, no building except one-story buildings of accessory use shall be built within 15 ft. of a side lot line, or within 30 feet of a rear lot line or within 20 feet of another building, and no one-story building of accessory use shall be built with-

in 10 feet of a lot line, or within 20 feet of another building unless there is a firewall facing the lot line or other building, in which case the building may not be less than 10 feet to the nearest building.

In a Business Zone no building shall be built within 10 feet of a lot line or within 20 feet of another building unless there is a firewall facing the lot line or other building, in which case the building may not be less than 5 feet from the lot line or less than 10 feet from the nearest building.

- 4. Corner Clearance. Within the area formed by the lines of intersecting streets and a line joining points on such lines fifteen feet distant from their point of intersection, or in the case of a rounded corner the point of intersection of their tangents, no structure other than a building and no shrubbery or foliage shall be maintained between a height of three and one-half feet and a height of eight feet above the plane through their curb grades.
- 5. Appurtenant Open Space. No yard, lot area, or other open space required for a building by this By-Law, shall during the existence of such building be occupied by or counted as open space for another building.
- 6. *Projections*. Nothing herein shall prevent the projection of steps, eaves, cornices, window sills, or belt courses into any required yard.

SECTION VIII

HEIGHT REGULATIONS

- 1. Residence District Heights. In a residence zone no building shall be erected or altered to exceed two stories in height unless it sets back from each street and lot line ten feet in addition to the requirements of Section VII. No building shall exceed two and one-half stories in height.
- 2. Business Zone Heights. In a business zone no building shall be erected or altered to exceed two stories in height, and no dwelling shall be erected or altered to exceed two stories in height.

- 3. Measurement of Height. A habitable basement having half or more of its height above ground, or an attic shall be counted as a story, provided that a story in a sloping roof, the areas of which story at a height four feet above the floor does not exceed two-thirds the floor area of the story immediately below it, shall be counted as a half story.
- 4. Height Exceptions. Chimneys, elevators, poles, spires, tanks, and other projections not used for human occupancy may extend above the height limits herein fixed.

BUILDING BY-LAWS

TO BE VOTED ON AT THE TOWN MEETING FEBRUARY 4, 1946

By-Laws regulating the erection, alteration, and repair of buildings and the inspection of same in the Town of Paxton.

ARTICLE I

General Provisions

Section 1.—Except as hereinafter provided, no building, dwelling house or other structure shall be erected, altered or repaired except in conformity with the provisions of these By-Laws.

ARTICLE II

Exemptions and Definitions

Section 1.—The provisions of this By-Law shall not apply to:

- a. Buildings or structures owned or occupied by the United States or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
- b. Bridges, quays, wharfs.
- c. Ordinary repairs as defined in Article 3.

ARTICLE III

Repairs

Section 1.—Ordinary repairs to buildings may be made, provided such repairs do not include the cutting away of any wall, in whole or in part, the removal of which would tend to weaken the structure.

ARTICLE IV

Preliminary Requirements and Permits

Section 1.—No person shall construct, alter or substantially repair any building or structure without having first obtained a permit for the same from the Selectmen.

Section 2.—For the construction, alteration or repair of any building, plans and specifications shall be submitted to the Selectmen with a duplicate copy for the Building Inspector together with such structural detail or information on location as the Selectmen may require before issuance of a permit for the same.

ARTICLE V

General Requirements

Section 1.—Foundations.—All buildings hereafter erected shall be set on solid foundation walls erected and constructed so as to be resistant to frost heaving and of sufficient dimension to carry the intended load.

Section 2. Dwelling-House Dimensions.—All one and two story dwelling-houses shall have a foundation enclosed area of not less than 720 square feet.

Section 3. Chimneys.—All masonry chimneys shall be lined throughout with flue lining the entire length and shall be topped at least two (2) feet above the ridge. No smoke-pipe, so-called, shall project through any external wall, window, or roof.

Section 4. Roofs.—All roofs on buildings in Residence or Business District shall be covered with tile, asbestos shingles, asphalt, or other fire-resisting material and any old roof to be repaired to one-quarter of the area shall be of fire-resisting material with the exception that the Board of Appeals may allow wood shingles.

Section 5. Sills.—All house sills shall be of lumber of dimension of not less than 4x6 inches; joists 2x6 inches up to ten-foot span, then 2x8 inches or more, or material of equal strength.

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Section 6. Floors.—All house ground floors shall be double boarded, and have fire-stops.

Section 7. Uprights.—All uprights shall be of lumber of a dimension of at least 2x4 inches to be placed not more than 16 inches on center, or on inside partition 2x3 inches not more than 16 inches on center, doubled at window or door openings.

Section 8. Rafters.—All house rafters shall be of lumber of a dimension of not less than 2x5 inches placed no more than 16 inches on center.

Section 9. Plumbing.—All structures occupied as dwellings must have plumbing installation suitable to meet the requirements of the usual number of persons occupying said premises. Every fixture shall have a trap and be properly vented.

Section 10.—Every frame building shall have the sills, posts girts and plates framed and braced in a manner satisfactory to the Building Inspector.

ARTICLE VI

Inspector of Buildings

Section 1.—The Board of Selectmen annually in February and subsequent to the Annual Town Meeting shall appoint an Inspector of Buildings to hold office for the term of one year from the first of March following and until his successor is appointed and qualified.

Section 2.—He shall make inspection of all building operations within this Town, and shall report to the Board of Selectmen all violations of this ordinance.

ARTICLE VII

Board of Appeals

Section 1.—The Board of Appeals established under the zoning by-laws shall be the Board of Appeals for the Building By-Laws. No member of the Board of Appeals shall act

in any case in which he is financially or otherwise interested. Every decision of the Board of Appeals shall be in writing and shall require the assent of at least three members.

Any applicant for a permit whose application has been refused by the Selectmen or any person dissatisfied with the decision of the Selectmen on any matter left by this by-law to their approval or discretion may appeal therefrom to the Board of Appeals within ten (10) days from the date of said refusal or decision. If the refusal or decision of the Selectmen is affirmed, the ruling shall be final. If the action of the Selectmen is modified or annulled, the Selectmen shall issue a permit or decision in accordance with the decision of the Board of Appeals.

The Board of Appeals shall grant a hearing on each appeal of which all persons interested shall have notice.

ARTICLE VIII

Variances

Section 1.—Upon petition filed by any person the Board of Appeals may by unanimous decision suspend or vary the application of provisions of these by-laws in specific cases which appear to them not to have been contemplated by the by-laws, or in cases where manifest injustice is done provided the decision shall not conflict with the spirit of the by-laws.

The decision shall specify the variations allowed and the reason therefor.

The Board of Appeals shall grant a hearing on every application for variance or suspension of which all persons interested shall have notice.

ARTICLE IX

Penalty

Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to court procedure and costs thereof.

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, who are qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in "Allen Hall" on Monday, the 4th day of February, 1946, at 12 o'clock noon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

ARTICLE 1. To bring in to the election officers their votes for Town Officers to be voted for on the official ballot, as follows:

Moderator, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Treasurer, two Constables, and Tree Warden, each for the term of one year; one member of the Board of Selectmen for three years, one member of the Board of Public Welfare for three years, one member of the Board of Assessors for three years, one member of the School Committee for three years, one member of the Municipal Light Board for three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for three years and one Cemetery Commissioner for one year, one Water Commissioner for three years, two Trustees of the Richards Memorial Library for three years and one Trustee of the Richards Memorial Library for one year, and one member of the Planning Board for five years.

All of the above officers to be voted for upon one ballot. Also to choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

The Polls will be open from Noon until eight o'clock P.M. Business meeting to begin at 7:30 o'clock P.M.

- ARTICLE 2. To choose a moderator to preside over the above mentioned business meeting.
- ARTICLE 3. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon and to act upon any recommendations contained in said reports and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required in accordance with said reports or otherwise, or act in any way thereon.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (see budget) with which to pay the proper charges of a Surety Company for acting as surety on bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1946, and to issue a note or notes of the Town therefor payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,661.64 to cover an overdraft on tractor equipment, or act in any way thereon.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,241.74 to cover an overdraft on snow removal, or act in any way thereon.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of \$505.00 from Highway Equipment Fund to the Highway Equipment Maintenance Fund to be used to furnish supplies and maintain the town's highway equipment or act in any way thereon.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$930.96 to cover an overdraft in the

1945 accounts of the School Department, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to purchase and alterate the garage now owned by Bertrand F. Smith, Pleasant St., or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the money received from the Dog Fund to the Richards Memorial Library or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to give the Fire Department members compensation for their services or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,950.00 to purchase a new fire truck, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with the State to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 81 Highways, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to cooperate with the State and County to raise and appropriate, or transfer from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90, Highway Maintenance, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to extend the water main, approximately 500 ft. along Highland St. or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to pay the Moderator \$10.00 for his services at the Annual Town Meeting and \$5.00 for any special meetings, charging the same to Contingent or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to use up to 60% of the surplus funds in the hands of the Town Treasurer available when the tax rate is ready to be set, as recommended by the Tax Commissioner for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for the current year or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will vote to increase the salary of the Collector of Taxes from \$400.00 to \$600.00 or act in any way thereon.

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ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will adopt the following by-law in substitution for the existing by-law establishing a quorum for town meetings.

Seventy-five registered voters shall constitute a quorum at any Annual Town Meeting or adjournment thereof, except such parts of meetings as shall be devoted exclusively to the election of town officers, provided that any meeting may be adjourned to a later date though less than a quorum be present, and that no meeting for the transaction of town business shall be called earlier than 7 o'clock P.M.

Fifty registered voters shall constitute a quorum at any special town meeting or adjournment thereof.

ARTICLE 21. To see that there be included in the tax levy for electricity used for street lights the sum of \$500.00 and that this sum and the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or for municipal power, and from sales of appliances and jobbing during the current fiscal year be appropriated for Municipal Light Plant, the whole to be expended by the manager of the Municipal Light Plant under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for the current fiscal year, as defined in Section 57, Chapter 164, of the General Laws and Chapter 235 of the Acts of 1937 and that if this sum and this income shall exceed the expense for said fiscal year such excess shall be transferred to the construction fund of said

plant and appropriated and used for such additions thereto as may be thereafter authorized by the Municipal Light Board.

ARTICLE 22. To see what action the town will take on the recommendations of the Planning Board relative to amending the existing Temporary Zoning By-laws of take action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to have charge of the Fourth of July celebration, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the town will vote to appoint the American Legion as a committee to have charge of the observance of Memorial Day or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to use \$1,000.00 from the revenue of the Illig property for repairs and water, or to act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the town will vote to sell the Howe Farm Property and so authorize the Board of Selectmen with the Town Treasurer to give good and sufficient deeds therefor or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the town will vote to accept Chapter 124 for the purpose of creating a stabilization fund.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the town will vote to accept Chapter 723 which relates to the establishing of a Department of Veterans Service.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the town will vote to extend two Street Lights on the following streets: West St., Grove St., Richards Ave., and Barre Rd., or to act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the town will vote to extend the town water for domestic use and fire protection on Pleasant St. to the residence of Anton Urbanovitch, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the town will vote that the Collector of Taxes be elected for a three year term.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the town will vote to raise the salary of the Town Clerk from \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) to \$150.00 (one hundred fifty dollars) or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the town will authorize the members of the School Committee to appoint any one of their board to another position, the salary fixed by yote of the town, or take any action thereon.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the town will authorize the Water Department to appoint any one of their board to another position, the salary fixed by vote of the town, or take any action thereon.

ARTICLE 35. To see what action the town will take regarding the fire inspector retaining the established fee of .50 for oil burner and oil storage inspections in accordance with Chapter 148 Section 10-A of the General Laws. (Ter. Ed.) (as amended to 1945 Inc.) or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors, as prepared by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to use \$500.00 from the revenue of the Howe property to be used for repairs and maintenance of said property, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the town will adopt as a By-law, as provided in Chapter 166 Sec. 32 of the General Laws of Mass., or act in any way thereon on the following.

INSPECTOR OF WIRES

Section 1. The Selectmen shall annually, and whenever the office is vacant for any reason, appoint a licensed electrician as Inspector of Wires, who shall hold office until his successor is appointed and qualified.

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Section 2. The Inspector of Wires shall exercise all power and duties conferred upon him by the General Laws and the By-laws of the town relating to electric wires, conducts and apparatus.

Section 3. Every Corporation or person proposing to place or attach wires designed to carry a current of electricity for lighting, heating or power in, or attached to a building, pole, or structure, shall give written notice thereof to the Inspector of Wires before commencing work, and shall not energize such wires until written permission to do so has been given by said Inspector of Wires.

Section 4. Whenever, in the opinion of the Inspector of Wires and electrical conductors or apparatus used for the distribution or application of an electrical current in, on, or attached to a building, pole, or structure, are in an unsafe or dangerous condition he is hereby authorized to cause the electricity to be shut off if the existing defects are not remedied within a reasonable period of time as determined by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 39. To see what action the town will take on the recommendations of the Planning Board for a set of Building By-laws or action relative thereto:

ARTICLE 40. To see if the town will vote to create a Park out of the Illig Property so called, to be known as the "War Memorial Park" with the understanding that if the town at some future time wishes to erect a Municipal Building thereon it should be allowed to do so, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the town will vote that any monies received from the sale of the Howe Farm property be set aside as a "Special Fund" for the development of the Illig property so called, owned by the town. Said sum to be used under the direction of the Park Commissioners after such improvements have been recommended and voted upon at the

Annual Town Meeting or any adjournment thereof, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to act as Park Commissioners and be vested with all the power and duties as such in accordance with the General Laws.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for construction on Rockland Street under Chapter 90, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County or both, for this purpose, or act in any way thereon.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting two attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office and one at the Town Hall, seven days at least before the day set for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
