REPORT OF VOTING AT THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### MARCH 5, 1956

Article 1. Election of Officers. (172 ballots cast)

Article 2. Acceptance of reports of Town Officers and acceptance of the the budget as presented by the Finance Committee with changes as made from the flo<sup>o</sup>r.

The following action was taken under the Article.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,900.00 as Town's share of cost of Chapter 81 Highway Mantainence and to transfer the sum of \$7,975.00 from available funds. Article 13.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 to Town's share of cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintainence and to transfer \$3,200.00 from available funds. Article 14.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 as Town's share of the cost of construction on West St. and to transfer \$12,000.00 from available funds. Article 16.

Voted to change the amount recommended for Street Lights to \$1,664.81.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to raise the salary of the Veteran's Agent to \$100.00 per year.

Voted \$25,003.60 for the Regional High School to clarify an error in the budget as printed.

Voted the sum of \$9,710.00 to be transferred from available funds to the Water Department expense account.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to paint the standpipe.

Voted to transfer the sum of \$2,500.00 from available funds to repair the base of the standpipe and to make repairs at the pump station.

Vote to accept the budget as amended.

Article 3. Voted under Article 2.

Article 4. Voted to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

Article 5. Voted to appoint the American Legion as a committee in charge of Memorial Day.

Article 6. Voted to give the members of the Fire Department compensation for their services.

Article 7. Voted to appropriate the money received from the Dog Fund to the Richards Memorial Library.

Article 8. Voted to transfer \$300.00 from the "Illig Fund" to the "Illig Property Maintainence Fund".

Article 9. Voted to accept the list of Jurors as presented by the Selectmen.

Article 10. Voted to accept as printed.

Artilce 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for vacation pay and sick leave for Highway and Water Dept. employees.

Article 12. Voted to tranhsfer the sum of \$2,287.05 from Highway Equipment Fund to Highway Equipment Maintainence Fund.

Article 13. Voted under Article 2.

Article 14. Voted under Article 2.

Article 15. Voted under Article 2.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for Water extension on Pleasant St., towards Barre.

Article 17. Voted under Article 2.

Article 18. Voted to install one new hydrant on each of the following streets:

Orchard Drive Pinewood Road Elizabeth Lane Pockwood Road

and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 for this purpose.

Article 19. Voted to raise and appropriatete the sum of \$150.00 to increase the salaries of the Board of Water Commissioners and that the Finance Committee be appointed to review Town salaries and report their recommendations at the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article 20. Voted that the sum of \$101.96 be raised and appropriated to cover an overdraft in the Fire Department.

Article 21. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the purchase of a 2-way radio unit to be installed on Engine I of the Fire Department.

Article 22. Voted to use the sum of \$133.50 already on deposit with the Federal Civil Defense Agency to purchase a light generator under matching funds.

Article 23. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00

Article 23. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for civil Defense purposes.

Article 24. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 25. Voted to turn over the operation and control of that portion of the premises, conveyed to the Town by Ernest R. Illig, by his deed dated April 1, 1937, recorded with the Worcester District Registry of Deeds, Book 2691, page 251, not enclosed on a plot plan dated March 5, 1956 bearing the signatures of J. Mackenzie Johnston, Alden H. Jacobson, Donald C. Alexander, Herbert F. Wentworth, M. Lawrence Price, and attached to the motion voter under Article 32 of this meeting, to the jurisdiction of the Recreation Commission.

Article 26. Voted that the Collector of Taxes shall collect all accounts due the Town under the title of Town Collector.

Article 27. Voted to taise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to pay the Town Collector as additional salary.

Article 28. Voted under Article 2.

Article 29. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 30. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 and transfer the sum of \$2,500.00 from the Dr. Andrew Jackson Howe Fund to the Town Hall Account, the total to be used to purchase and install a new heating unit and ducts in the Town Hall.

Article 31. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the surplus chairs in the Town Hall.

Article 32. Voted to situate a new elementary school on certain parcels of land as set forth in the motion under Article 32.

The Planning Board was notified in early Spring, by the Mass. Dept. of Commerce that our request for 'Planning' funds under Title 7 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1954 has been approved.— This amount to be matched by our Board. The Board then retained Dr. Raymond Murphy of the Clark School of Geology to do a 'land use' study of the Town. This was finished by Fall. We received 10 work map of the Town and a 30 page report which will help and guide the board in its future planning for the Town. A complete copy of this report is on file in the Mass. Dept. of Commerce for companies who might be interested in locating in this Town. This year the board will match the remainder of the monies and retain consultants to devolope a "Capital Finance Program."

In October of this year the Harvard University Graduate School of Design requested that students be allowed to study the Town as one of an overall study of the 9 towns and one city in the Worcester area; this report to be made in January 1957—to be held at Clark University with Selectmen and Planning Boards of these towns being invited.

The Board will have a Spring 1957 meeting at which all voters wll be invited to hear the report of the 'Land Use' study. The Harvard student who did the 'Study' will also be present.

Voters, we are always open for suggestions from you and it is our duty to study and report on your suggestions.

The Planning Board has received a number of plans for additional developments in the Town and have approved Two, with a total of 60 lots. We have 3 plans before us which, if approved, will add 105 more homesifes.

## **REPORT** of the BOARD OF SELECTMEN

In the early part of the year the new heating system was installed in the Town Hall. The alterations to the Selectmen's office were completed and the selectmen's office as well as a portion of the lower hall were painted. Miscellaneous repairs were made elsewhere in the Town Hall including new wndow shades. It is our opinion that the Town Hall building is now in good condition.

The selectmen are sponsoring on the ballot for the annual meeting for 1957 a question for the townspeople to answer as to whether or not they would like to accept the provsions of Chapter 32B of the general laws. This chapter provides that the Town shall pay one-half of the cost of Group Life Insurance, Hospitalization, Sickness and Accident coverages for employees of the Town of Paxton and their dependents.

Assuming that those Town employees now covered under a Blue Cross Group Plan all continue to be covered with the addition of Life Insurance the total annual premium we estimate to be about \$2,400. Of this amount \$1,200 or 50 percent would be the Town's share.

It is the feeling of this Board that this Town should join with many other towns in this area and in the State in taking advantage of this Chapter to provide these benefits to its employees. The exact cost will be determined after the Town Meeting if the Town approves the acceptance of this Chapter. Then the Board will receive bids from varous insurers and will, after awarding the contract to an insurer or insurers, certify to the Board of Assessors the exact amount to be included in the Tax levy for 1957 to cover the Town's share of the premium.

As of January 1, 1957 the Selectmen have initiated a policy of charging \$5.00 for all building permits for new construction.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS To The School Committee and The Citizens of Paxton:

This is the fifty-seventh annual Superintendent's report in the series and my ninth.

The major event of the year was the vote for the addition to the center school. At the beggining of the next school year, September 1957-1958 we will be able to offer a more effectual cirriculum with enough teachers for improved instruction. The report of the Building Committee will, no doubt, go into the physical details of this new building. Ralph D. Huggett the present principal will be a supervising principal. A course in Industrial Arts and Household Arts will be given to the pupils in the seventh and eighth grades. A full lunch program will be established.

Miss Ruth S. Innes, Music Supervisor returned to teach this year and an assistant in instrumental music, Miss Constance E. Brown was hired. Mrs. Helen P. Olmstead was also added to the Union Personnel as Supervisor of the health program.

Due to the increased enrollment it became necessary to make a temporary classroom for grade eight in the basement. It was estimated a year ago that the enrollment for September 1956 would be 260 but it increased to 275.

In September 1957 we will need two teachers for grades I, II, III, IV and possibly grade V. The expected enrollment will be over three hundred.

Several members of the Parent Teacher Association appeared before the School Committee and suggested a fire escape be added to the present building. It has been estimated that \$2,000 will be needed to cover this installation.

The Superintendent's office is now located at 1204 Main Street, with its modern equipment and lighting facilities has been occupied for one year. The increased space for working and storage has made it much easier to carry on the work that is necessary for a smooth running organization. At present the two Union Secretaries, the Wachusett Regional Secretary and the Health Supervisor occupy the man office and the Superintendent uses the smaller room as his private office.

Union No. 25 has been growing for the past few years. The school population numbers 2,764. The combined budgets for all the schools including the Wachusett Regional High School will be over \$1,000,000 00 for 1957.

A few months ago I was appointed a member of a State Commission by Ex Governor Christian A. Herter to study State Aid for Schools. Many towns are beginning to find that another tax other than real estate is needed for education. I trust that information I may receive from the Commisson will be of benifit to Union No. 25.

## STANDARDIZED TESTS

In the spring we gave the Calfornia Achievement Tests to Grades III, V VI and VII. This test included Reading, Arithmetic, English and Spelling.

Grade Norm for Grade III — 3.6 Grade Norm for Grade V — 5.6 Grade Norm for Grade VI — 6.6

Grade Norm for Grade VII - 7.6

Grade III was one year and three months above the norm.

Grade V was one month above the norm.

Grade VI was two months above the norm.

Grade VII was nine months above the norm.

Results show Paxton pupls are above grade for this test.

In December the Mental Maturity Tests were given to Grades II, V, VI, and VIII. i

These tests show that Paxton pupils have the ability to do better than average school work. In fact they are now doing this as shown by the Achievement Tests.

The percentage of Honor Students we have at the Wachusett Regional High School from Paxton speaks well for the parents, teachers and students.

Mr. Huggett, Principal, has reported the following:

There is one change and two additions in the faculty of the Paxton Center School. Mrs. Hazel M. Grey retired and Mrs. Shirley B. Davidson has replaced her as teacher in grade one, and Mrs. Aileen E. Wilmouth was appointed as an extra teacher for a split grade two and three.

The School has inaugurated a school savings bank program effective December 7, 1956. On the first bank day, 162 pupils made deposits.

During the school year running from September 1955 to June 1956 Paxton was rembursed \$579.81 by the United States Department of Agriculture as a member of the National School Lunch Program. Milk sales during this period totalled 19,763 halt-pint bottles, an increase of 2,932 over the previous school year

## WACHUSETT REGIONAL HIGT SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT FOR 1956

To Superintendent William H. Buker and the Members of the Wachusett Regional School District Committee.

ENROLLMENT AND STAFF

In its third year of operation the school finds itself with 959 students as of January 3, 1957. Two of these students are taking postgraduate work. Six more teachers were added to the staff in September, 1956, making 59 on the faculty. The addition of Edmund Kelsey to the Guidance staff has helped some to relieve the excessive load in that area, as he has worked primarily with Seniors, but at least one more person is needed in Guidance. Charles Bartlett, the Guidance Director, has made many valuable contacts with business and industry as well as laying the foundation for a sound testing program. The loss of Charles Johnson as Assistant Principal was severe, but Charles LaPrade, having been moved from the Science Dept. to the Assistant Principalship, has taken hold of the work admirably. The granting of a second instructor in Driver Education by the Committee has made it possible to handle 107 students in the first semester, as compared with 104 for the entire previous year. It is hoped that by continuing the program in this way, we may get to the point where we can offer Driver Education to the majority of students as they become 16.

Although the opening of West Boylston High School in the fall of 1957 will bring about a heavy loss in income from tuitions, yet the additional space thereby made available will be needed by students of the Regional Distrct. If the growth of the pupil population of the District does not increase unexpectedly, there should be about 985 students in 1957-58. From 1957 on, however, enrollments in the schools of the towns of the Distrct indicate a steady, strong increase in enrollment in the high school. This situation makes it mandatory that some plan providing for the education of secondary school students be developed and put into action without delay or else the school will be faced first with curtailment of offerings and then with double sessions. Such a plan should take into account the educational needs of the students as well as the cost to the taxpayers of the Regional District.

**EVALUATIVE CRITERIA** 

The New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, of which this school is a member, sponsors a program of self-evatuation followed by evaluation by a visiting committee. The staff is currently starting one its self-evaluation, and the visiting committee will come some time in 1958. The purpose of the program is the improvement of secondary education resulting from a very careful study of eight Major Areas (Pupil Population and School Community, Educational Needs of Youth, Program of studies Pupi Activity Program, Library Sedvices, Guidance Services, School Plant, and School Staff and Administration) as well as specific study of 14 Subject Matter Areas. The carrying out of this program will entail a tremendous amount of extra work on the part of all staff members, but from my own experience I know that the whole precedure will be exceedingly valuable-to the students, to the faculty, and to the communities served by this school.

## MISS ADA L. CARLSON

The sudden passing of Miss Ada L. Carlson, our Librarian, on January 3, 1957, brought deep grief to our hearts. Beloved and respected by students and faculty alike, she had given her whole life to teaching young people how to use books, as well as encouraging them to learn to love and enjoy them. The Wachusett Regional High School was extremly fortunate to have had her help not only in the orignal establishment of the Library, but also as its Librarian since 1955.

In conclusion, I should like to express my sincere appreciation of the help that has come so willingly from all with whom I have worked during the past year.

During the year the Committee held 13 regular meetings and 5 special meetings.

Your Committee has been faced with many problems and decisions this year that will affect your schools for sometime to come. It is our heartfelt wish that our decisions will result in better education and better schools. One of the biggest problems os the creation of conditions which will be attractive to the teaching staff. It is our hope that by setting and attractive and fair pay scale and by recognizing the value of the work being done by the teachers we can help to create a professional atmosphere conducive to their remaining with us for a long period of time. To this end the Committee spent sometime at the 14 of its 18 meetings as well as much time on the part of some members in sub-committee meetings on salaries and working conditions. The changes approved are shown in the Superintendent's Report.

School finances were of course high in importance on our agenda. Expenses were approved at all regular meetings, and some phase of budget matters was discussed at twelve of our meetings.

Certain phases of the educational program were reviewed by Committee and Administration with policy decisions which resulted in:

(1) Expanded driver education,

(2) A basis for teaching of physically handicapped children at home,

(3) An expanded guidance program.

Custodians' salaries and working conditions were reviewed and improvements made.

A change was made in the District by-laws which allows a non-committee member to hold the treasurer's job if the Committee deems it advisable and so votes.

The adult education program was continued and has proved worthwhile by the large response from the towns. The details of its operation (subject to committee approval) have been in the hands of a very competent adult education advisory committee.

The committee expressed its approval of the school cafeteria lunch program. It noted that over 93,000 meals were served at a cost of approximately \$44,000. More than 60% of the pupils eat here. About half the cost of the meals is borne by the state, the rest being paid by the pupils.

The purchase of a few items of new equipment was approved by the Committee. This was necessitated by the increase enrollment and was for the cafeteria and industrial arts areas.

The Committee joined the Area 4 District of the Massachusetts Association of School Committees in order that its members be informed of statewide committee activities.

The Committee appreciates the cooperation of the school administration, staff, pupils and parents in making ours a better high school.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (see budget) with which to pay the proper charges of a Surety Company for acting as surety on bonds required of Town Officials and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow moneyfrom time to time in antripation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1957, and to issue a note or notes of the Town therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes of the Town as may be given for a period of less than oneyear in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, of the General Laws.

To see if the Town will vote that the money voted for street lights and the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or for municipal power, and from sales of appliances and jobbing during the current fiscal year, be appropriated for the Municipal Light Plant the whole to be expended by the manager of the Municipal Light Plant under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for the current fiscal year, as defined in Section 57, Chapter 164, of the General Laws and Chapter 235 of the Acts of 1937, and that if this income shall exceed the expense for said fiscal year, such excess shall be transferred to the construction fund of said Plant and appropriated and used for such additions thereto as may be thereafter authorized by the Municipal Light Board.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to provide vacation and sick leave pay to employees of the Highway and Water Department as follows:

'After having worked for the Town one full year, one week vacation with pay and one week sick leave with pay, after having worked for the Town two full years, two weeks vacation with pay and one week sick leave with pay. After having worked for the Town one full year, the Superntendent to receive two weeks vacation with pay, and one week sick leave, and after two years, three weeks vacation with pay, and one week sick leave with pay, sick leave may accrue up to two weeks. only," or act in any way thereon.

To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with the the State to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,900.00 to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highway Maintainence and OK that in addition the sum of \$7,975.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored upon their receipt, to unappropriated funds in the Treasury or act in any way thereon.
