# REPORTS OF THE ELECTED AND APPOINTED BOARDS OF THE TOWN OF PAXTON

# **BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

Last year was once again a busy and productive year for the Town of Paxton. The Board of Selectmen lost an old friend when Chairman John Lucey chose not to return to the Board at the end of his elected term. The voters then wisely elected Richard Bedard as his replacement. His understanding and fairness are an asset to this Board.

We are happy to report the end of the legal disputes resulting from the construction of a sub-division off Brigham Road. The final lawsuit was concluded when the Worcester Superior Court granted a summary judgement in favor of the Town.

This year the Police Department patrolmen voted to unionize. Negotiations have been taking place for several months with Mirick O'Connell, our legal counsel, working on behalf of the Town. We are dedicated to producing a contract that is fair to the Town and the Union. We expect to finalize the wording and enter into the contract sometime in early November 2000. In other police news, through a generous anonymous gift, the police were able to obtain a new fully equipped patrol motorcycle. Its use will relieve some of the wear and tear on the department's other vehicles, while using less gasoline than an automobile.

Several new employees have joined the team of workers needed to keep our town government functioning. Nancy Wilby accepted the position of Town Services Coordinator, replacing Charles Bolster. Nancy's background in business and her knowledge of the Town will serve the Town well. Richard Trifero accepted the position of Building Commissioner following the retirement of Raymond Kauppila. Changes in state law regarding building codes and regulations mandated that the Town protect itself by hiring a proven professional. Mr. Trifero's background gives us that protection. He has already demonstrated that he is both tough and fair in his efforts to protect the Town and its residents.

Beavers were in the news this year. Changes in state trapping laws have resulted in a blossoming beaver population in our Town. Water backed up by beaver dams caused serious drainage problems for several residents and caused septic systems to fail, resulting in public health concerns. Acting in conjunction with State Wildlife Officials, this Board took the necessary action to relieve the public health concerns. New changes to the trapping laws should help to negate some beaver problems in the future.

Several projects are ongoing at this time. The Grove Street reconstruction and resurfacing project is still awaiting final approval and funding by the Massachusetts Highway Department. We expect the project to begin in early 2001. The Public Safety Building Study Committee has been reviewing the need for more space by the Police, Fire and Communications departments. When we receive the final report with their recommendations, we expect that we will come before the Town to request funding for new facilities. An Ad-hoc committee is in the process of reviewing the Subdivision Rules and Regulations and the Zoning Bylaws. We eagerly await their report and hope that it will lead to the updating of the hodge-podge Bylaws now in effect. "Are You Okay", a program that allows the Town to monitor the well-being of those residents that request the service, is now in the implementation Finally, the proposed renovation and/or reconstruction of Wachusett Regional High School continues to be debated. The Board of Selectmen will continue to be proponents for the best possible educational opportunities for the children of Paxton.

A few of the projects completed this year included the installation of a new telephone system at the Town Hall. The new system was needed to handle the increased telephone traffic generated by our growing town. The exterior of the White Building was given a new coat of paint. The painting was completed at a minimum cost with the help of a painting crew from the Worcester County Jail. We increased the amount of the insurance coverage for death and disability for our oncall Fire Department members. The new limits will more fairly compensate them in the case of a disaster. The Grove Street playing fields were completed this year and are being utilized by many teams. We wish to once again thank all the people that worked so hard in seeing this project completed.

The Board of Selectmen sincerely thanks everyone for their understanding and support. We especially want to thank all the staff at the Town Hall and all the members of other Boards and Committees. Finally, we want to thank the people of Paxton for allowing us to serve you.

# **FINANCE COMMITTEE**

At the Annual Town Meeting in May, the voters passed a total budget of \$6,682,944 for Fiscal Year 2001. Although this represented an increase of \$534,587 over the prior year, most of the increase resulted from the estimated cost of borrowing for Paxton Center School and Water Pumping Station construction projects, an increase in the regional school budget assessment, town

insurance and waste disposal costs. Special articles totaling \$88,137 were also passed by the voters, one of which authorized the placement of \$50,000 in our Stabilization Fund, the first time we have been able to do this in several years.

Included in the total budget voted was a 3% wage increase for Town employees and special adjustments for selected employees. The Finance Committee continues to stress the importance of developing a more formalized process for evaluating Town positions and the performance of the people filling these positions. The need for all Town boards and committees to be involved in a process with established guidelines for position and performance evaluation is essential to the effective management of employee and financial resources.

Although we continue to be able to accommodate most justifiable budget requests and provide an appropriate level of Town services for our citizens, we must be ever mindful that our increased level of indebtedness and the need to recognize ongoing and future capital expenditures will continue to place an increasing strain on our revenue and taxing capacities.

For the past several years, we have used virtually all of our available resources to balance the Town budget. At some point, budget growth will seriously challenge our revenue streams, particularly with major capital projects such as a new high school and the need for upgrading our Town facilities and equipment. Although the Finance Committee remains committed to presenting a balanced and responsible financial plan to the citizens each year, we are ever mindful of our obligation to seriously evaluate and prioritize requested expenditures in order to live within our available resources and maintain a spending level that our citizens can afford.

# ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

During Fiscal Year 1999-2000, over 351 various types of calls pertaining to dogs and 126 various types of calls pertaining to other animals were handled.

All dogs and cats six months of age or older must be vaccinated against rabies. All dogs six months or older must be licensed by March 31st of each year.

The wild animal population has increased in recent years, especially foxes, coyotes, raccoons, and bears. Please do not feed these wild animals or leave dog or cat food outside during September and October. Take down bird feeders that attract bears.

The Animal Control Officer can be reached by calling the Dispatch Center at 791-6600. All calls will be returned as soon as possible.

In addition, I wish to take this opportunity to remind all residents that their dogs should be restrained at all times. If you walk your dog on a public way or someone else's property and your dog makes a mess, clean it up! Think of the other people who live there too!

# **BOARD OF ASSESSORS**

As of January 1, 1999, for fiscal year 2000, the total valuation of Paxton's taxable property was \$237,903,362, a net increase of \$3,661,091, 1.6%.

New construction, additions and alterations increased the valuation by \$4,528,844.

Real estate abatements approved by the Board of Assessors amounted to \$85,500.

Re-listing and other adjustments decreased the valuation an additional \$782,253.

The Board received 9 abatements requests, 3 were processed. Of the 6 denied one went to Appellate Tax Court. The Appellate Tax Court judged in favor of the Assessors for both the 1998 & 1999 cases.

The Assessors office is open 9am - 12pm, Monday through Thursday.

The BOARD OF HEALTH held 9 public hearings throughout the fiscal year on septic variances. Other issues that were handled by the Board members were: 1) Signing of Local Upgrades on septic systems; 2) signing of Accessory Use Renewals; 3) continued working on Watershed Bylaw; 4) vaccinated new firefighters/police officers for Hepatitis B; and 5) handled reportable disease matters.

RECYCLING: For the last nine years, Paxton residents have been recycling their trash. We have seen our tonnage of trash go down as the recycling tonnage has gone up. For the past three years, however, this cycle has changed with the trash tonnage rising and the recycling tonnage remaining constant. Residents who do not participate in the mandatory curbside recycling program cost us all added tax dollars. The Board welcomes any ideas or suggestions from the public for ways to increase participation in this most valuable program. PLEASE NOTE: Your Recycling Committee is always looking for volunteers!

TITLE V: The Board continues to work with Central Mass Regional Planning Commission to administer the Title V Loan Program for septic repairs. This money is being loaned to eligible residents at a 5% interest rate with a payback period of up to 20 years. Applications are available in the Town Hall.

# **CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

During the Fiscal Year 2000, the Conservation Commission met monthly and devoted most of its time to ensuring compliance of local projects with the Wetlands Protection Act. # FIRE DEPARTMENT

No event during the year could approach the import or impact of the tragedy in Worcester on December 3, 1999. Almost immediately after the initial request for mutual aid, it became apparent that this was no ordinary The activation of the Statewide Fire response. Mobilization Plan for our district sent a second Paxton unit to the apparatus staging area. As the magnitude of the tragedy unfolded, outpouring from all elements of our community added to those from throughout the world. I had the honor of receiving a substantial donation from the staff and students of the Center School and conveying it to the Fallen Fire Fighters Memorial Fund. Phone calls, cards, letters or people just stopping at our fire station expressed the grief for the victims and the gratitude for all the fire service. Paxton units responded again twice that week to requests for aid from Worcester, and members volunteered at the scene to assist in the search efforts.

December 9th was the Memorial Service. I said in my report later to the Selectmen that it was one of the most moving and memorable events of our lives. I had the honor of leading two dozen uniformed members of this department and joining with thirty thousand other firefighters and the President of the United States in a memorial tribute that had no equal.

My thanks go to all the individuals, companies and organizations who made our part in this possible. Special thanks go to the largest volunteer fire department in the Commonwealth, Swansea, who sent an engine and crew to our station throughout the day of the Memorial Service.

The department responded to one hundred and five emergency calls during the year. Two significant structure fires took place, both the result of wood burning heating devices. The requests for mutual aid continue to increase as the manpower limitation impacts all communities. Motor vehicle accident extrications increased as well.

Department training continues to stress the basic operations, however, we did sponsor a Massachusetts Fire Academy twelve-hour course on Incident Command. This is not only a standard operating procedure for all our emergency events, but now a requirement of the federal government for any

Hazardous Materials incident. Twenty members attended the four-night program. A local resident, Kenneth Carlson donated an ice rescue sled and winter training with it was held. Five members attended a Fire Academy twelve-hour course on ladders held in Rutland.

No new recruits entered the department this year and attrition has reduced the rolls to 34. Serious attention must be given to recruiting and retaining members so the increase demands upon all members of the department can be spread equitably.

The addition of a part-time clerk has greatly improved the administrative aspects of the Fire and First Responder operations. The severe space issues must be the next addressed. For the first time there is the possibility of federal assistance in the funding of major capital items. I feel it would be prudent to at least have plans on the shelf so application can be made for viable and demonstrated needs.

My thanks to the department members for their outstanding service, their families for sharing them with us, the community, its officials and departments for loyal support.

# FIRST RESPONDERS

The First Responders of the Paxton Fire Department responded to 174 medical emergencies during FY 2000. These requests for service ranged from lacerated fingers to cardiac arrests. This increase in activity over the years has led to a limited response at certain times of the day and night. We are looking at different ways to solve this problem.

The First Responders placed into service two new defibrillators that were purchased this year. One of which was donated to the Town by a concerned citizen.

Training for the year consisted of continuing education for medical emergencies, auto extrication, CPR and defibrillator refreshers.

# HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Commission has completed and submitted to the Massachusetts Historical Commission, its inventory documentation of homes in Town that were built during 1850-1920. These periodic inventory filings serve as crucial documentation tools used for purposes of future planning and as a necessary platform for argument should the Commonwealth wish to implement changes in road design or other landscape in Paxton. Subject to approval of this current inventory, the commission will begin work on the next inventory of homes in the upcoming year.

Another project completed during this fiscal year was the Paxton informational pamphlet written, designed and published by the Commission itself. With funding, in part, from an Arts Lottery grant, the members compiled historical points of interest, brief historic descriptions, and a location map. These brochures are circulated throughout Town and are also available via members.

The Commission hosted a successful open house and tour of the Common this past fall. Members led visitors from the Town Hall's basement, first and second floors, the Common, Center Cemetery and returned to the White Building to the Historical Commission resource room. A guest speaker from the Massachusetts Historical Commission was present for an open question and answer period as well.

Ongoing projects and future goals include artifact restoration as funds allow, efforts to save the White Building and its restoration and a community celebration for the White Building's 100<sup>th</sup> birthday party. Continuous efforts are made to generate new members and associate members as well.

The Commission welcomes and encourages the public to attend it's open meetings. General business meetings and open discussions are held the third Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. at the White Building.

# <u>REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL LIGHT COMMISSION</u> [For the year ending December 31, 1999]

The employees of PMLD strive everyday to serve the people who make Paxton a pleasant place to live and work. We hope that our customers feel that the delivery of superior service is a valued contribution to our community. We have joined with the 39 other municipal electric departments under the branded banner of "localight" to bring attention to the benefits of a municipally-owned electric utility.

During 1999, the Paxton Light Department contributed over \$6200 in direct labor and materials to projects for the Town of Paxton. We continue to provide billing services to the Water Department at a reasonable cost. The dual billing saves postage, forms expense, meter reading expense, and clerical processing time. Since the completion of installation of radio read meters for all water services was completed by the Water Department, customer service and billing questions have been dramatically decreased. The dual billing arrangement has benefited both the Light Department and the Water Department.

The department installed 17 new house services during 1999. In addition we continued to upgrade open secondary wire to improve system reliability. We also continued our tree trimming program to reduce outages caused by winter storms.

The department is addressing rate stabilization issues and has provided some reduction in the cost of electricity over the past year. Our power cost adjustment dropped by 1/2 cent per KWH during 1999. This reduced the average (700 kWHs/month) residential bill by \$3.50 per month. We will continue to look for opportunities in the competitive energy markets which will bring additional savings to our ratepayers.

The Light Commission meets each month on the second Tuesday at 4:00 p.m. at the department offices at 578 Pleasant Street. Guests are always welcome and customers with specific concerns can be accommodated in the meeting schedule. The Commission is dedicated to providing first rate customer service and top quality power supply at the lowest possible cost. If we can serve you better, please let us know how.

In an effort to save space and printing costs, the opinion, footnotes and supplemental report of our auditors have been omitted from the town report. The full report is available at the Light Department Office, which is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays.

# Independent Auditors' Report

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Paxton Municipal Light Department of Paxton, Massachusetts, as of and for the years ended December 31, 1999 and 1998 as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Department's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

Except as discussed in the following paragraphs, we conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As discussed in Note 10 to the financial statements, the Department records pension expense based on a formula determined by the Town of Paxton, whereas generally accepted accounting principles require the use of actuarial methods in determining annual pension expense and certain disclosures required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board relating to pensions have been omitted. The effect on the financial statements of not using actuarial methods has not been determined.

In our opinion, except for the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to determine the effects of not using actuarial methods in determining pension expense and the omission of certain pension plan disclosures required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board on the 1999 and 1998 financial statements. The financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Paxton Municipal Light Department as of December 31, 1999 and 1998, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

# PLANNING BOARD

The year ending June 30, 2000 has been very busy for the Planning Board and its Ad Hoc Committee. The latter was organized for the formulation of the new Paxton Zoning Bylaw which will be brought to a Public Hearing and subsequent Town meeting vote during FY2001. In addition to the members of the Planning Board. the Ad Hoc Committee consists representatives of various Town committees and officials as follows: Barbara Berka (Conservation), Peter Dawson (Town Counsel), Dory Huard (Assessors), John Lucey (Selectmen), Dave Parent (Board of Health), Mike Putnam (DPW), Kay Sears (Board of Appeals) and Rick Trifero (Building Commissioner). Professional guidance is provided by Bill Scanlan, Community Development Manager, Central Mass Regional Planning Commission. Planning Board members and the Ad Hoc Committee have met monthly since October '99.

Regular Planning Board business was usually scheduled for the second Monday of every month. In addition there have been four special meetings. The Board signed off on nine ANR applications (lots for which special approval is not required except for meeting sufficient size and frontage), extended time of completion of Paxton Ponds Subdivision to July 2001 and reviewed the preliminary plan of a 12-lot subdivision off the west end of Marshall Street. A number of our meetings dealt with poor drainage of a detention pond in the Forestdale Subdivision.

In August 1999, Steve Bik, Board Chairman resigned. We thank him for his many years of service and leadership. Dave Bennett was unanimously appointed by the Selectmen and Planning Board to fill his un-expired term.

The re-writing of the Paxton Zoning Bylaws introduces new or updated regulations on the following: Home Occupation/Business, Personal Service/Professional office, Adult Entertainment, Dog Kennels/Animal Control, Retirement Community, Flood Plain District, Communications Towers, Site Plan Approval, Upland Requirements, Rear Lots, Parking Restrictions, Bed & Breakfast Establishments and non-criminal

# POLICE DEPARTMENT

Fiscal Year 2000 was a very assiduous year for our police department. Calls for service continue to rise, which relates to increased service to our community. We have also noticed a dramatic increase in criminal related scams, which prey mostly on our senior citizens. Apprehending and convicting scam artists are difficult because of the fact that scam artists move throughout the country, never staying in one area for very long.

Public safety continues to be our priority. Increases in traffic flow, especially along Routes 122, 31 and 56, have been targeted for speeding violators and other motor vehicle offenses. Having our cruisers highly visible in these areas acts as a deterrent for speeders resulting in a decrease in speeding violations and motor vehicle accidents.

Our police department has also continued its efforts in community related projects. The Youth Activities Center has been a huge success. This past year we also offered VIN etching, part of the Watch Your Car Program, a federally funded program. As in the past, we continued with our D.A.R.E. program, bicycle safety program, Spree Day activities, and lectures on seat belt safety, alcohol and drug awareness, and scams. We have offered public safety programs to all age groups from infants to the senior citizens - of our community.

Fiscal Year 2001 promises to be as productive. Public safety will continue to be our main objective focusing on radar and neighborhood patrols. We have several activities to look forward to including R.A.D. (Rape, Aggression, Defense) self defense programs, the Youth Activities Center, and the D.A.R.E. Scare.

Not only will we continue to provide the most professional law enforcement, but we'll also continue to support the many organizations of our community.

# **DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS**

Our street re-surfacing schedule has fallen behind because of allocation reductions of Chapter 90 funds from the State. We were appropriated only 50% of our normal allocation. This will prohibit us from resurfacing streets that were on the schedule. We were able however, to resurface Suomi Street, and a portion of Brooks Road with Chapter 90 money.

Our yearly asphalt account enabled us to resurface Burtenmar Circle, Jefferson Drive, William Allen Drive, Briarcliff Lane, Franklin Street and Meadowbrook Drive.

The Grove Street Reconstruction project has been put on hold for a year, as were all State and Federally funded projects, due to cost over-runs at the "BIG DIG".

Beavers are the cause of a major problem that we face on a daily basis. A dam "let go" on Pond Street and washed out a section of the roadway. As a result, we had to install new drainage in that area. New drainage was also installed on parts of Brooks Road.

Mooreland Cemetery had fifteen burials during the year.

The water meter replacement project updating all meters to radio-read meters is at 100%. Leak detection and the new meters have brought our unaccounted water usage from 40% down to 6%. This drastic reduction will save money for the Town. I want to thank all water users for their co-operation in making a very difficult undertaking such a smooth transition. Trying to coordinate the schedules of the homeowner(s) and the Water Department is not an easy task. Thanks to George Johnson, Water Systems Specialist and department secretary, Carol Riches for doing an excellent job scheduling appointments. It only involved overtime for one Saturday morning!

Again, I would like to thank all residents for their continued understanding and support of our department.

### RECYCLING COMMITTEE

The Recycling Committee goals for FY2000 were met in the following manner:

- The Collection of trash and recyclables by BFI continued with few problems. The Board of Health signed a contract for FY2001 with Central Mass Disposal which began on July 1, 2000.

 The Recycling Committee purchased 300 recycling bins that are available to residents whose bins were broken or otherwise disappeared. The money was obtained from the Mass DEP MRIP program which was awarded to Paxton because the residents saw fit to increase their recycling efforts.

The Recycling Committee would like to thank Richard Hafey and the TELEGRAM & GAZETTE, the PAXTON LIONS CLUB and their PAXTONotes, and THE LANDMARK of Holden for helping to keep the residents of Paxton informed.

We would also like to thank the BARRE SAVINGS BANK for sponsoring Paxton's E-CALL recycling message (1-800-800-6881) and the Paxton Cable Committee for showing recycling videos every first Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. and informational bulletins when appropriate.

The Recycling Committee continues to work with the Board of Health to address the disposal needs of the residents of Paxton.

Despite a decline in yearly circulation to a total of 69,800, the library was busier than ever. More students coming for homework and group projects, more patrons coming for Internet searches and more patrons and groups using the library as a meeting place. We now have 3,215 registered patrons, and increase of 301 patrons. Our collection now numbers 31,494 materials; including books, videos, magazines, museum passes, books-on-tape, games CD's and CD-ROM's.

This year we expanded and upgraded our computer system. Our DOS based system was upgraded to a Windows based system that now runs on a dedicated NT server. With our single dial-up Internet connections now running through Proxy Server, each networked patron access computer is now available for catalog or Internet searches. Computers are also available for word processing, or CD-ROM based reference materials or games.

Funds from the Paxton Cultural Council provided passes to the Ecotarium, Worcester Art Museum, Discovery Museums, Higgins Armory, Boston Museum of Fine Arts, Tower Hill Botanical Gardens and Historic Deerfield. The Friends have purchased passes to the Boston Museum of Science and Davis Farmland and contributions from the donation jar have purchased passes to the Roger Williams Zoo, the Garden in the Woods and Fruitlands Museums. All of these passes are available to be checked out of the library and used for admission to these museums.

# **SEWER STUDY COMMITTEE**

# (Excerpts of report - Original on file at the Town Hall)

In May 1999 the Board of Selectmen appointed this Committee to examine the sewerage disposal needs of the Town and to make recommendations regarding the options available regarding sewerage disposal.

A survey of all Town residents and commercial facilities was conducted in 1999 using a mailing list of property owners provided to us by the Assessor's office.

Approximately 1,500 surveys were mailed out. Approximately 43% responded to our survey. Of the 43% who responded, 53% indicated that they would be in favor of sewers provided that no significant costs would be incurred by the homeowner. Of the 43% who responded, 36% did not want sewers and felt that septic systems were preferable, 9% were undecided and 2%

voted yes and no to the question of whether sewers should be installed in Paxton. The Committee felt that by negative inference, the 57% who did not respond to our survey did not feel strongly either way about the need or aversion to sewers.

Between April 26, 1999 and April 12, 2000, the Committee held nine meetings. Aside from the attendees who were present at our request, the only others that attended our meetings were Jerry Teran, Nipmuc Road and Jeff Mulford on behalf of Anna Maria College. An individual from the Massachusetts D.E.P. outlined the process for considering sewers for the Town of Paxton. A consultant from SEA Consultants, Inc. [an engineering firm engaged in engineering and oversight of sewer construction for municipalities in Mass] outlined the process which is involved in sewering a town as well as the various alternatives available. The Committee also met with the Board of Health for its input. Anna Maria College provided insight as to its And finally two residents from Indian Hill/Nipmuc Road area advised members of the problems with septic systems in that area.

As a result of the surveys and meetings, the Committee concluded that there are residents in Paxton who are having acute problems with their septic systems. We mapped out the areas in Town where the highest incidence of septic system problems are These areas were, in general, the occurring. neighborhoods coming into Town from Worcester on both sides of Route 122 and moving down into the Asnebumskit hill basin. In addition, some of the neighborhoods in the Glen Ellen Road and Orchard Drive area are experiencing septic system problems. There were also other less concentrated problem areas throughout the Town. Interestingly, the DEP views the installation of sewers as a last resort in dealing with sewerage disposal. There is a concern at the state level, that the rivers into which the treated sewerage must necessarily go, are not able to handle unlimited capacity.

The first step in deciding whether the Town is to move forward with sewers is to have an interim level study done by one of the engineering firms in order to examine existing soil records in Town, existing septic system Board of Health records and government maps. The report, which would cost up to \$10,000 would give us an idea of roughly how much it would cost to install sewers in the Town of Paxton. The voters would then have to vote to proceed further based upon the results of this study.

The next step in proceeding towards a sewer system is to have an engineering firm prepare what is know as a Comprehensive Waste Water Management Plan. This plan would cost between \$150,000 and \$200,000. It is possible to borrow the cost of having such a plan prepared from the Fund [State revolving fund available

to all municipalities to borrow funds on an interest-free basis]. This plan examines the various sewerage collection, treatment and disposal options in the Town. The plan would also examine whether homeowners, with assistance, are able to continue dealing with their own sewerage disposal on site. Once the plan is completed, an application for construction funding can be made.

It is possible that portions of the Town could be sewered rather than the entire Town. It is also possible that the areas in Town most affected could decide to form a sewer district. In this way, a majority vote of the entire Town would not be necessary in order to have the issue pass muster. Rather, the residents in the area proposed as the sewer district would be able to control their own destiny. There is a concern that by installing Town wide sewers as a solution to the septic system problems, commercial and residential growth would result in Town. By having sewers, many areas which were heretofore undevelopable would be opened up to development. There are residents who believe that this is a good thing and there are those who are adamantly opposed to it.

We learned of Anna Maria's septic system problems. Anna Maria was apparently in the process of adding some new buildings and renovating on campus when it learned that its existing septic systems were not sufficient to handle the anticipated flows. The DEP is working with Anna Maria to develop a solution to the sewerage disposal issue on its campus. It is our understanding that DEP has suggested that Anna Maria contact the Town of Paxton to see whether a sewer line can be constructed from the college to the Worcester line in order to send Anna Maria effluent to Upper Blackstone Sewerage Treatment Plant. It may be possible that Anna Maria can contribute a significant amount towards a limited sewer project if either the entire Town votes to approve sewers or a limited sewer district is formed including Anna Maria College.

These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We did not audit the financial statements of the Component Unit - Municipal Light Department

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Consistent with the practice of most municipalities in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the Town does not conform with generally accepted accounting principles as the cost of fixed assets is not capitalized.

In our opinion, based on our, and except for the effect of the matters described in the preceding paragraph, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Paxton as of June 30, 2000, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.
