Another financial year has closed, and we trust that in the main it is entirely satisfactory. The last of the town's notes has been paid, and, for the first time in the last ten years, the town is absolutely out of debt. It is a subject of congratulation to every citizen and especially the tax payers. This condition of affairs ought to enhance and does enhance the value of every acre of land in town. All men seeking homes are careful to look into this subject, and the question of taxation is among the very first of enquiries by them. We ought this year to get the rate down to ten mills in place of thirteen and a fraction, as it was last year. While it is of course impossible to foresee what expenses the town may have to bear in the future, yet, assuming that nothing extraordinary will occur, we feel safe in recommending the reduction of one hundred dollars in the customary grant of the town for repairs of the highways, and the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars less for the contingent fund, the ensuing year. The large balance in favor of the town would allow even a further reduction for the purposes named, but it may not be wise to prune too severely at once, though the true financial policy of a town does uot, like an individual, lie in the direction of keeping a large sum in the treasury, but to so guage its taxation as to meet as nearly as may be its year!y expenses, leaving each year to care for itself, or rather provide by taxation only for the advancing years as they come to us.

The total amount paid out on account of State Aid, this year, was \$232 50. Of this amount, the State pays back the sum of \$162 00, leaving the net cost to the town the past year only \$70 50.

Finally, as the law directs, we report as follows, concerning the Guide-boards. They are all up and in good condition at the present time, and are located as iollows:

One near the Nugent house, one near the house of C. S. Flint, one near D. L. Ware's house, one near house of T. Wendall, one near house of F. T. Merriam, one near S. W. school-house, one on N. E. school-house, one near barn of P. Daw, one near house of H. L. Fiske, one on barn of T. S. Penniman, and one at the junction of the Leicester and Worcester highways.

This has been in many respects a year full of perplexity to the Overseers. The soil of the farm is naturally dry, and the drought of the past two seasons has greatly affected the crops, especially that of hay, the amount cut this year being at least five tons less than last year, thus reducing the invoice below what it otherwise would have been, about \$100, which is charged to the expenses of the farm.

The town granted the sum of \$800 from this, there had to be paid above the available resources the unpaid bills of last year to the amount of \$268 88, leaving \$531 12 to meet the expenses of the current year, and from this we were obliged to take \$56 41 to make the necessary sanitary improvements requested by the Inspector of State Charities, (putting in an house drain and changing the out-building,) and this sum does not include the warden's labor, leaving \$474 71. Take from this \$40 19, that it cost to support the poor out of the almshouse and the expenses of contested settlements, and there is left \$434.52, from this must be paid the Warden's salary of \$275.00 and there is left \$159.52 for the support of the poor at the almshouse and Overseers' services, which no doubt with an ordinary season and fair crops would be enough outside of the Warden's salary, and probably a town grant of \$500, would be enough for the coming year unless the town desire to make some improvements on the place.

Early in the season the Overseers became satisfied that the werden was not a suitable person for the place, and after a thorough investigation he was discharged, but we were very fortunate in being able to secure the services of Mr. Henry Buemond and wife to take charge of the farm, who have given us entire satisfaction, having increased the comforts of the inmates and at the same time greatly reduced the expenses, and we are glad to say that we have been able to secure their services for the coming year. Much of the bedding had become worn and poor and the board decided to furnish new, which was done; all the bedsteads were changed but one, among the rest was one new iron bedsead, and nearly all new bedding, at a cost of about \$75.00 which of course is a permanent improvement, but had to be added to the expenses of the farm this year; this with the new underclothing furnished the inmates places them in good and comfortable condition.

Several important cases of contested settlements have come up the past year, all of which have been settled to the advantage of this town with one possible exception, and in this case the settlement have been denied and the evidence so far goes to show that this town is not the place of their legal settlement. These settlement cases are of the most vital interest to the town, a single mistake or omission may cost the town, hundreds of dollars in the future.

Balance in Treasury, \$6.31, of which \$5.00 will be due the Librarian, April 1st. The Librarian's salary, until the past year, had been uniformly \$25.00 per year. At the annual meeting of the Trustees in April last, the Librarian, in consideration of the small appropriation, voluntarily relinquished \$5.00 of her salary to be used for the purchase of books. This, with the amount received for old books, constituted nearly eighty per cent of the amount expended for new books. To show the decrease in the yearly receipts of the Library, we present herewith a statement of the amount of dog fund, for each year of the Library's existence.

IN THE NAME OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Paxton qualified to vote in election and town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Paxton, on Monday the third day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following Articles, namely :—

ARTICLE 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2nd. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3rd. To hear the report of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

ARTICLE 4th. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5th. To see what sums of money the town will grant for the support of the Public Schools, and for the support of the Town's Poor; for the repairs of Highways, Townways and Bridges, and for the Contingent Fund, the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 6th. To see what disposition the town will make of its "Dog Fund."

ARTICLE 7th. To see if the town will grant a sum of money for the support of the Public Library in addition to the "Dog Fund."

ARTICLE 8th. To see what action the town will take in regard to the observance of "Memorial Day." ARTICLE 9th. To see if the town will authorize the School Committee to close the schools in West and North-east Districts, and pay for the transportation of school children, or act any way thereon.

ARTICLE 10th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers, as provided in Chapter 30 of the Public Statutes, or act any way thereon.

ARTICLE 11th. To see what compensation the town will allow its Firemen the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 12th. To see if the town will fix the amount of compensation for labor on the Highways, the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 13th. To see if the town will authorize the purchase of a Road Machine for the repair of the Highways, also to see if the town will establish a watering trough or tub near the house of Frank Keep, or act in any way thereon.
