Peirce's, one near Fisk's, one near Daw's, one on N. E. school house, one near Haggett place, one at Frank W. Peirce's, one near Flint's, one near Frink's, one near Wendell's, one near old Smith place, two near S. W. school house, one near Whiting place, and two near the Goddard place. Two new boards have been put up in place of old or missing ones.

Last year the debt at close of the financial year was \$1,914.15. This year we are greatly gratified to once more make record that the town is not only out of debt, but has a balance of \$219.46 in its favor, and our earnest wish is that the coming year shall be equally as prosperous. The tax rate has been also greatly lowered, from 15.40 to about 11 the past year.

The writer has for the past ten years faithfully endeavored to serve the town, and while fully appreciating the honor of continuous re-elections, with an increasing majority year by year, yet the time will come when other hands must take up

the work, and perhaps it is better done now than later on, and hence he asks to be relieved of further duty in this direction at this time.

In presenting this report we are very glad to be able to make so good a showing. It will be seen that the cost per week is quite low, by reason of the good fortune of the town in receiving some funds as indicated, but which cannot be expected as a rule in the future. But yet, had no resources come to our hands other than that received by town orders, the expense is reasonably satisfactory, considering this is the first year of the Union Alms-house experiment. It was proposed by the Board of Managers at their last meeting, February 1, 1891, to give a statement of expenses, as nearly as possible, for the period of ten months, viz: from 1st of April, 1890, to February 1, 1891, thinking the citizens of each town will be interested to get the same, even though the statement did not fully cover the whole year. If the Association had began on March 1st, of last year, or if our Annual Town Meeting did not come till April, then of course, we would have presented an account for the full year. Our successors, however, will likely furnish a statement at close of the Association year. By careful management and less trading at the farm, we believe the cost can be considerably reduced below the figures given by the Association.

We have, since the settlement, turned into the town treasury the sum of \$130.64, the amount shown in above statement as in our hands at date of settlement. The amount due from the State will go directly into the town treasury when received.

The undersigned, one and all, desire to be excused from further service, indeed it was with great reluctance that we consented to serve at all.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

To the Citizens of Paxton :

In compliance with a Statute of this Commonwealth, the School Committee beg leave to submit their annual report of the condition of the public schools under their supervision.

The year just closed has been a very quiet one. Nothing worthy of note has transpired to disturb the tranquillity of the schools. Although we have not noticed so great a degree of improvement as could have been desired, yet we think that some progress has been made in the general work of instruction. The teachers have been faithful in the discharge of their duties ; and the pupils have, generally, applied themselves with considerable diligence to their studies. No change was made during the past year in the corps of teachers, except in one instance.

Owing to some misapprehension in regard to the number of children of school age in the southwest district, a school was opened in that district and maintained during the spring term, with only five pupils—a number too small to awaken much interest or enthusiasm, either on the part of the teacher or pupils. We have been obliged, sometimes, to employ teachers with little or no experience, because we could not offer sufficient inducements to secure those of a higher grade. It is safe to say that such a course is not always attended with the best results.

In view of the small number of children of school age in the southwest district, the Committee deemed it advisable to discontinue the school in that district for the fall term ; and they accordingly made arrangements to transport the children to the centre school.

On the first day of May, 1890, there were in this town, sixty-three children between the ages of five and fifteen years. Now if they could all be brought together at the centre school, it would seem that the Grammar school building would afford ample accom-

modations for them. There may be, however, in the minds of some parents, an objection to this plan.

In the district already alluded to, the families are widely separated. The children, in some instances, would have to walk a mile or more to some central point, thence to be conveyed by carriage to the centre school, a distance, perhaps, of two miles. This subject is specially presented to you for your consideration.

Repairs, as a general thing, are always in order. The past year in this respect, is no exception to the rule. The southeast school-house was sadly out of order. The roof leaked badly and had to be shingled on one side. In the school-room a portion of the floor was re-laid, and the entire walls newly papered. The southwest school-house, also, came in for its share of repairs. Window shades were provided for the grammar, primary and southeast schools.

In order to secure a more even temperature in the Grammar school room, and with due regard for the health and comfort of the scholars, the Committee decided to take out the old stove, which was nearly worthless, and substitute therefor a coal-burner. The change is a good one. It is to be hoped now that the pupils will be less subject to sudden and severe colds than they have been hitherto.

It is said that "order is heaven's first law, and that cleanliness is next to it." The school-room should always present a neat and attractive appearance. In some of our visits we have noticed a lack of order in and about the school building. We often judge of the character of a school by the attention paid to little things.

One of the chief hindrances to the progress of a school, is irregularity in attendance. Some parents, we fear, do not realize how much trouble this evil causes a teacher, or how much injury it inflicts on the whole school. A pupil who is irregular in his attendance, falls behind his class and is soon discouraged. He seldom has energy or ambition enough to make up lost time; and so goes through the term, perhaps, in a sort of hap-hazard way, and knows about as much when he gets through as he did when he commenced. Parents and others who have the best interest of the schools at heart, should endeavor to do all they can to help remedy this evil.

Your Committee are of the opinion, that an appropriation of nine hundred (900) dollars should be made for school purposes the current year.
