Report of Road Commissioners.

To the Citizens of Paxton:

At the last annual town meeting the sum of \$700,—seven hundred dollars was granted for the repair of Highways and Bridges. Three new bridges have taken the place of old ones which were found to be badly decayed, the balance of your appropriation has been spent in general repair, except ten dollars which was paid to James Boyd for the use of land in the early part of the season for convenience of teams that were obliged to pass that way while a certain portion of the State Road was being excavated. REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

To the Citizens of Paxton:

In our last report we called attention to the condition of the Centre schoolhouse which was greatly in need of repair. This seemed the more necessary as the schools in the outer districts were closed and all the pupils brought to the center and consolidated into two schools. In response to our call for an appropriation for special repairs, the town voted one hundred dollars for this purpose The Grammar room was furnished with a new ceiling and the whole building inside was made fresh and clean with paper, paint and new curtains. We hope during the coming year the outside of the building will receive a coat of paint.

The S. West schoolhouse is reported to need shingling, the wind having blown the shingles from the roof and left it in a leaking condition.

The schools opened with a good number of pupils and excellent work was being done when a serious cough developed which threatened to break up the schools.

After a time it was decided to call in a physician to examine several of the pupils and find if possible a cause for the distemper. The premises were examined and pronounced to be in good condition and the cough proved to be whooping cough.

About three weeks before the close of the Fall term one of the pupils was attacked with scarlet fever and it was decided to be the prudent thing to close the school for two weeks. This happened just before the Thanksgiving recess. Fortunately no other case developed in the school and the lost time was made up in December. Before the schools opened in the winter we had the whole building thoroughly fumigated and cleaned. We have tried by visiting other schools and by reading to keep our schools as nearly abreast of the times as possible.

The Primary Department has so many very young scholars that we have been obliged to furnish more or less of genuine Kindergarten appliances for their instruction and to keep them busy and it is interesting to see how soon the little people learn to hold and thread a needle and sew their perforated cards.

We have made a special effort to advance the pupils in reading and number work and have met with gratifying success. To do this we have introduced quite a good deal of supplementary reading and work.

We wish we could impress upon the parents the importance of having the young children especially, read a little during the long vacation, otherwise two or three weeks at the first of a term must be spent in learning again what has been forgotten during the weeks between the terms.

We have to acknowledge the receipt of a large Atlas map of Massachusetts and also a copy of the Manual of the General Court, both the gift of the State.

A table of statistics is given which will furnish information on points of interest concerning the schools, also a list of expenditures for the year.

We think an appropriation of eight hundred dollars for our schools not too much to ask for the year ensuing.

TOWN WARRANT.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

Worcester, ss,

To Either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton in the County of Worcester.

Greeting:—

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Paxton, qualified to vote in Elections and Town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall, in said Paxton, on Monday, the second day of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To hear the reports of Town Officers and Committees, and act thereon.
- Art. 3. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to vote Yes or No on the question of granting Liquor Licenses. The polls shall be open from 11 o'clock A. M. to 3 o'clock P. M.

- Art. 4. To see what sums of money the Town will grant for the support of the public schools and transportation of scholars; for the support of the Town's poor; for the repairs of the highways and bridges, and for contingent charges for the ensuing year, and act thereon.
- Art. 5. To see what disposition the Town will make of its Dog Fund.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money for the relief of indigent soldiers as provided by the Public Statutes.
- Art. 7. To see what action the Town will take in relation to repairing the roof of the Town Hall building, or act in any way thereon.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money for Memorial Day.
- Art. 9. To see what action the Town will take in relation to painting the buildings at the Howe Place, or act in any way thereon.
- Art. 10. To see what action the Town will take in relation to repairing the Liberty pole, or act in any way thereon.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to contract with the State Highway Commisson to construct an additional piece of State Road in this Town, and to sub-let the same or any portion thereof, as they, in their judgment, shall deem to be for the best interests of the Town, or do or act in any way therein.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will build a culvert at or near Connor's, or act in any way thereon.
 - Art. 13. To see what action the Town will take

in relation to enforcing Sect. 10, Chapt. 98, of the Public Statutes, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will authorize the lighting of the lamps around or near the Common, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will authorize the rental of the telephone for the use of all Town tax payers and grant a sum of money for the same, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will grant a sum of money for the payment of the Town debt

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote a discount on taxes paid before a given date, and fix a time when they shall be made payable, likewise to see if the Town will fix the compensation of the Tax Collector for the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the care and renting of the Town Hall the ensuing year, also the care of the Town Clock the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 20. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money by and with the approval of the Selectmen to meet current expenses or liabilities in anticipation of the taxes.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will accept the list of jurors as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will accept the provision of Chater 374, of the Acts of 1895, in choosing a Highway Surveyor, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to improve the Cemetery, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will purchase chairs for the Town Hall, and grant a sum of money for the same, or act in any way thereon.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will accept Sections 64, 65, 66 and 67, of Chapter 27 of the Public Statutes, relating to the Election of Selectmen and Assessors, one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years. Also to see if the Town will accept of the provisions of Sections 69, 70, 71, 72, and 73, of Chapter 27 of the Public Statutes, relating to the Election of Overseers of the Poor, one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, or act in any way thereon.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office, and one at Olmstead's blacksmith shop, in said Town, ten days at least before the time for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting as aforesaid.
