### TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

Warrant and Action Thereon at Annual Town Meeting, March 3rd, 1918

Article 1. To choose a moderator by ballot to preside at said meeting. Chose: E. L. Chute.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon. All reports accepted.

To bring in and deposit their ballots for Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables, and three members of the Board of Health, each for the term of one year, three Street Commissioners, one for three years, one for two years, and one for one year, one Assessor for three years, one member of the School Committee for three years, and two Trustees of the Public Library for three years. One member of the Electric Light Committee for three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for three years, and one member of Board of Water Commissioners for three years. All the above to be voted for on one ballot; also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question: "Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M. and may be closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

The total ballots cast, male 73.

The vote on the License question was as follows:

The officers elected will be found on the first two pages of this report.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be deemed necessary for the support of the Town's Poor, repairs of Highways and Bridges, for the support of the Public Schools and transportation of pupils, breaking out roads, for fire purposes, and for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

The Road Commissioner be instructed to spend the sum of \$500 of the \$1,500 appropriated for the East side for the purpose of making a rock road on the East side of the Common: beginning at the State road in front of Mr. Chaffin's house continuing north to meet the rock road, on the Rutland road, also, that portion of the road on the west side of the Common beginning at the State road and continuing north to meet the rock road near the Meeting House.

Article 5. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to purchase a new safe for the Assessors.

Voted to pass over.

Article 6. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to repair watering trough or act in any way thereon.

Voted: Selectmen investigate and report later.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to put the expense of street lighting in the tax levy and use the profits of the house lighting to extend the lighting system or to reduce the cost of house lighting.

Voted: Pass over.

Article 8. To see if the town will appropriate money for a Library Building Fund and choose a committee for that purpose.

Voted: That Mrs. H. Bidwell, Mrs. Ruth T. Derby, Mrs. Catherwood, and Miss Rena Robinson be a committee to investigate Library conditions with a view to better conditions.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to grant a sum of money for the rebuilding of the so-called "Rutland Road" under certain conditions.

Voted: Pass over.

Article 10. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day, and for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers, and choose a committee for Memorial Day.

Voted: Memorial Day, 35 00
Indigent and disabled soldiers, 240.00
To be taken from the Surplus.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the support of the library, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: \$50 and the Dog Fund.

Article 12. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay proper charge of a Surety Company for acting as

surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: \$20.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation to be paid the Collector for the ensuing year, or take any action in relation thereto.

Voted: 2 percent and postage.

Article 14. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1919, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate, three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) and to issue a note or notes payable within one year, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: That the Town Treasurer be and hereby is authorized, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenue of the present municipal year, beginning January 1, 1919, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year, and any debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said municipal year.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Voted: That list be accepted.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten dollars (\$10) and appropriate as much of it as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of Chapter 503, Acts of 1906, relating to the appointment of School Physicians.

Voted: To appropriate \$10 for said purpose.

Article 17. To see if the town will fix the compensation for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Voted: Man 35 cents, team 50 cents, per hour.

Article 18. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the town hall and also the care of the clock the ensuing year.

Voted: To leave in the hands of the Selectmen.

Article 19. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended in care and improvement of the Common, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: \$35.

Article 20. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended by the Tree Warden the ensuing year.

Voted: \$25.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the inspection of meat and slaughtering, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: \$150.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the transportation of high school pupils, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: \$650.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to keep the road leading from Paxton to Worcester open for automobiles during the winter, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: \$187.46 plus unexpended balance of \$312.54 left from last year.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of Moreland Cemetery, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: \$100.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Collector of Taxes to employ counsel when in his judgment it is necessary in the collection of taxes.

Voted: To so employ counsel.

Article 26. To see if the town will choose a Soldier's Memorial Committee and appropriate a sum of money.

Voted: \$100. Committee to be Fred E. Ladd, Dr. R. A. Race, Ruth T. Derby, Mrs. F. W. Flint, Mrs. H. C. Eames.

Article 27. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to purchase a steel road scraper loaned the town by H. S. Pike.

Voted: Not to exceed \$65 for said purpose.

Article 28. To see what action the town will take in regard to a better transportation and choose a committee.

Voted: To pass over article.

Article 29. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to reset grave stones and grading in the old cemetery or act in any way thereon.

Voted: To grant \$100 and leave matter in hands of Cemetery Committee.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to construct a covered drain in front of the house of Miss Ella B. Catherwood, or act in any way thereon.

Voted: \$100 from the General Fund for said purpose and be left to the road commissioner.

Article 31. To see what the town will do about furnishing a water supply for the town hall and vote a sum of money for the same or act in any way thereon.

Voted: Matter left to Selectmen.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) the income to be used for the perpetual care and maintenance of the cemetery lot of the late Simon H. Harrington, Jr.

Voted: To accept the fund.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to extend the light wires from the so-called Durgin's Corner to the Ojanne Farm and appropriate a sum of money for the same or act in any way thereon.

Voted: To appropriate the sum of \$1500 from the Electric Light Fund, and the town treasurer be authorized to borrow \$1500 for said purpose, giving a series of three notes of \$500 each, one note coming due and payable each succeeding year until all are paid.

Motion made and carried that the Selectmen be instructed to employ a State Auditor to audit the town's books.

Voted: To dissolve the meeting.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING HELD ON THE 26TH DAY OF APRIL, 1919

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Chose: E. L. Chute.

Article 2. To bring in and deposit their ballots for a Collector of Taxes to fill vacancy.

Elected: George H. Whitney.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectment to contract with the State Highway Commissioner an additional piece of highway on the "West Road" so called, and to determine in what manner the work shall be done or act in any way thereon.

Voted: That Selectmen contract as per article.

Article 4. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money to repair the road on the easterly side of the Common, from the intersection of the State Road to the foot of Maple Street and also around the Common to the intersection of the aforesaid State Road, or act in anyway thereon.

Voted: To begin at the State road in front of Mr. Chaffin's residence and continue on the easterly side of the Common to meet the rock road on the Rutland road at the intersection of Maple St., and continue around the west side of Common to meet again the State road, and to appropriate \$1000 for said purpose.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to extend the electric light line from Durgin's Corner so called, to the farm of Henry

Ojanne, and to appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1500) dollars for said purpose and to authorize the town treasurer to borrow the same and to issue therefor a series of notes, signed by him and countersigned and approved by a majority of the Selectmen in the presence of the town Clerk, with interest payable semi-annually; the first of said series of notes to become due and payable on the first day of January, 1920, and one to become due and payable on the first day of January of each year thereafter until all shall have been paid; and that the Assessors provide in their annual tax levy for the payment of one of the notes and interest on all outstanding notes each year.

A two-thirds vote necessary to carry.

A committee of G. A. Rossier, John Trum, and Wm. J. Koski was appointed to investigate the telephone and electric light condition on the Durgin and Ojanne roads and report at a later meeting.

Voted to dissolve the meeting.

Special Town Meeting Held on the 25th Day of September, 1919

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. Chose E. L. Chute.

Article 2. To hear a proposition from Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Richards in relation to the erection of a Public Library Building. Proposition as read by Mr. Richards:

TO THE VOTERS OF PAXTON:

On the fourth of this month at Allyn Hall, it was my pleasant privilege, on behalf of my wife and self, to present to an informal meeting of the people of Paxton an offer to build a suitable and well-arranged Public Library building upon land owned by me at the corner of Maple and School Streets.

The meeting was attended by about 125 people by whom our proposal was cordially received and unanimously approved. A committee was appointed by that meeting to report recommendations to your body, by whom I presume you will be fully advised in due course, of its conclusions.

It was furthermore desired that our proposal with its conditions should be formally presented to the voters of the town when opportunity offered.

Therefore, Mrs. Richards and I take pleasure in now presenting our offer as follows:

Provided certain conditions hereinafter named are accepted and undertaken by the town authorities, Mrs. Richards and I propose erecting upon the so-called Goddard lot at the corner of Maple and School Streets, a fireproof Public Library building for the use of the people of Paxton, attractive in design, well arranged for library, community and (more or less so) historical purposes, and to be known as the Richards Memorial Library.

The size and needed equipment of such a building erected at this time, must necessarily be somewhat restricted by the prevailing high costs of material and labor, but it is our belief that even these conditions will not be prohibitive to the carrying out of the plan.

The property thus proposed for the use of the people of Paxton and their visitors, will be held in trust for the time being by a body of trustees, a part of whom shall be voters, or non-voting property owners of the town, with the desire on the part of the donors that the entire property shall be deeded to trustees selected by the town in the not far distant future.

The affairs of the library will be wholly in the hands of the trustees.

The ground has already been surveyed for the purpose and preliminary plans and estimates are being prepared.

We are willing to expend for the building and its equipment whatever sum the circumstances may reasonably require and anticipate that such amount will not be less than \$18,000 and must not exceed \$25,000 exclusive of the land.

The foregoing is conditional upon the extension of the present State road (now bounding the southwest side of the Common)—along the other sides of the Common, and northward along School Street, as far as Streeter Lane; also up Maple Street to a point at least parallel with the southeast corner of the Goddard lot—such road to be the equal in quality to the present State road; also that a permanent sidewalk be built by the town, of brick, concrete or other equivalent, on the west and south sides of the proposed Library lot.

When the proposed building is completed and ready for use, the town should *furthermore* appropriate annually towards the maintenance of the Library the Dog Tax and also the sum of say \$300 to \$400. The present Town Library to be turned over to the Memorial Library Trustees.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Light Thousand (\$8,000) dollars for the purpose of building a macadam road from the present State road at the intersection of Main Street and the Barre Road to the corner of the Streeter road (so-called), also on Maple street as far as the Goddard lot extends and around the Common connecting again with the State road near the town hall, and to issue therefor a series of notes signed by the town treasurer and countersigned by a

majority of the Selectmen in the presence of the town Clerk, with interest payable semi-annually; the first of the series of notes to become due and payable on the first day of January, 1921, and one to become payable on the first day of January of each year thereafter until all shall have been paid; that the town appropriate the money thus borrowed for the purpose indicated and that the Assessors provide in their annual tax levy for the payment of one of the notes and interest on all outstanding notes each year.

Voted: To borrow and appropriate Eight Thousand (\$8000) Dollars for said purpose as per first part of article by unanimous vote. Also voted, that notes to pay for money borrowed be made for Two Thousand (\$2,000) Dollars each, first note to become due January 1, 1921, and one each succeeding year until paid, and that the Assessors provide for notes and interest on same each year as per second part of article.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to construct the said macadam road or act in any way thereon.

Voted: That Selectmen be instructed to construct the road.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of building a sidewalk in front of the proposed Library Building, said money to be taken from the surplus in the hands of the town Treasurer.

Voted: \$500 for said purpose and to be taken from the surplus.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty (\$250.) dollars to be used to improve the highways, said money to be taken from the surplus in the hands of the town Treasurer.

Voted: \$250 for said purpose and to be taken from the surplus.

Moved and carried that the town extend to Mr. and Mrs. Richards a rising vote of thanks.

Voted to dissolve the meeting.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

HOLDEN, MASS., Jan. 1, 1920.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE,

Town of Paxton:

I take pleasure in presenting for your consideration and that of the citizens of Paxton my second annual report as superintendent f schools.

School statistics and items of interest are appended and to these I invite your attention.

In the list of teachers for the year is found the name of Miss Monica O'Leary who taught in our Primary room for about two months. It was with deep sorrow and regret that I learned of her sickness and death. She was a splendid type of young woman, earnest and successful in her work, and she had endeared herself to all who I new her.

The short list of names in our Roll of Honor may be traced to the many absences due to the epideme of influenza. We have been fortunate so far this year in having very little sickness and we may hope for a better showing in the next report.

The enrollment at the time of writing shows a slight increase in the Crammar and Frimary rooms and practically no change in the Intermediate.

The total cost for support of the grades per pupil in average membership for the year was \$48.70 as compared with \$48.73 the corresponding average for the whole state. The valuation per pupil in average membership is \$7367 as compared with a corresponding valuation for the state of \$8294. This is an indication it seems to me that the Paxton schools are wisely and economically managed. Certainly the townspeople must appreciate the many hours of thoughtful planning and study given by the Committee to this most important department of town affairs.

We are very fortunate in retaining the services of Miss Barclay for another year. After some changes early in the fall we secured Miss Elizabeth A. Riley for the Intermediate and Miss Marion R. Hickey for the Primary Room. These teachers, with Miss Barclay in the Grammar room, are rendering excellent service. Their fine spirit and team work are to be commended. In order to retain them we shall need to approach the salary question with determination and resolve. The present success and future hope of our town lie in our children, and certainly teachers good enough for the children of other towns are worth keeping here. Our great problem just now in all school management is one of an adequate supply of teachers and adequate salaries. The Committee recognizes the situation and in order to "carry on" must have continued financial support to meet increasing demands. have been increased in many places from 20% to 40% yet we find schools closed and others consolidated because of the scarcity of teachers.

The new law (Chap. 63 of General Acts) provides state reimbursement in two ways—from the proceeds of the income tax and from a new form of distribution of the Mass. School Fund. It provides that the State Treasurer shall pay into the town treasury \$100 for each teacher who has received not less than \$650 the preceding year; \$150 for each one who has received not less than \$750; and \$200 for each who has received not less than \$850. This is increased by \$50 for each teacher if the valuation per pupil is less than \$4500.

Unfortunately it is necessary year after year to call attention to poor school attendance. In many cases the parents are directly at fault. I wish I might impress upon them the responsibility that lies in the home for securing better attendance. Our record for the year was 85% and might be charged to the epidemic until we look back and find it was but 86.6 in 1917.

We are buying as few books and supplies as consistent with good service, but next year it will be necessary to replace some books that are worn out. Supplies are more than double in cost and this fact together with the need for larger salaries will mean increased school appropriation. There are a few repairs that need to be made this next summer. I am glad to see some playground equipment in the school yard. Its constant use during warm weather testifies its value.

It is a pleasure to be back with you again after a year of absence, and I want to express my sincere appreciation of the loyal support received from the Committee, the teachers and the public.

## TOWN WARRANT

## COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

WORCESTER, SS.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton in the County of Worcester.

## GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Paxton, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet in Allen Hall in said Paxton on Monday, the first day of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To choose a moderator by ballot to

preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town Officers

and Committees and act thereon.

Article 3. To bring in and deposit their ballots for Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, two Constables, and three members of the Board of Health, each for the term of one year, two Street Commissioners, one for three years, one for two years, one Assessor for three years, one member of the School Committee for three years, and two Trustees of the Public Library for three years. One member of the Electric Light Committee for three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for three years, and one member of Board of Water Commissioners for three years. All

the above to be voted for on one ballot; also upon the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question: "Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" Also to choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. The polls will be opened at 11 o'clock A. M. and may be closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be deemed necessary for the support of the Town's Poor, repairs of Highways and Bridges, for the support of the Public Schools, and transportation of pupils, breaking out roads, for fire purposes, and for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to purchase a new safe for the Collector

of Taxes.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to put the expense of street lightning in the tax levy and use the profits of the house lighting to extend the lighting

system or to reduce the cost of house lighting.

Article 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to contract with the Massachusetts Highway Commission for the construction of a section of highway beginning at the southerly end of the Common, at the junction of the State Road, nonthward to the Streeter Road. Also on the westerly side of the Common, and on Maple Street as far as the Goddard land extends, and to determine in what manner the same shall be constructed.

Article 8. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for a sidewalk in front of the proposed Library

building.

Article 9. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to be expended under the direction of the Massachusetts Highway Commission and the Selectmen as provided under chapter 155, acts of 1918.

Article 10. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for a suitable water supply for the Town Hall.

Article 11. To see if the town will grant and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day, and for the relief of indigent and disabled soldiers, and choose a committee for Memorial Day.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the support of the library,

or act in any way thereon.

Article 13. To see if the town will grant a sum of money with which to pay proper charge of a Surety Company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same, or act in any way thereon.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation to be paid the Collector for the ensuing

year, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 15. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1920 to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate, four thousand dollars (\$4,000) and to issue a note or notes payable within one year, or act in any way thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared and posted by the Select-

men.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten dollars (\$10) and appropriate as much of it as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of Chapter 503, Acts of 1906, relating to the appointment of School Physicians.

Article 18. To see if the town will fix the compensa-

tion for labor on the highways the ensuing year.

Article 19. To see what action the town will take regarding the care and rental of the town hall and also the care of the clock the ensuing year.

Article 20. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the depreciation fund of the Electric

Light plant.

To see if the town will grant a sum of Article 21. money to be expended in care and improvement of the Common, or act in any way thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will grant a sum of money to be expended by the Tree Warden the ensuing

vear.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the inspection of meat and slaughtering, or act in any way thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the transportation of high

school pupils, or act in any way thereon.

To see if the town will vote to keep the Article 25. road leading from Paxton to Worcester open for automobiles during the winter, or act in any way thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of More-

land Cemetery, or act in any way thereon.

To see if the town will vote to authorize Article 27. the Collector of Taxes to employ counsel when in his judgment it is necessary in the collection of taxes.

Article 28. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to reset grave stones and grading in the old

cemetery or act in any way thereon.

Article 29. To see if the town will accept \$100 for perpetual care of cemetery lot of Leander T. Kirby.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road known as the old Anthony Road leading from the state road by the land of Edward Dunham and D. Waldo Graton to Bottomly pond.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to grade the schoolhouse yard and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to purchase a tractor for roadwork and appropriate a sum of money for same.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof, one at the Post Office and one at the Blacksmith Shop in said town of Paxton ten days at least before the time set for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid. Given under our hands this sixteenth dayof February, one thousand nine

hundred and twenty.
