## Report of the Committee Named at the Annual Town Meeting, February 1, 1926, for the Purpose of Selecting a Name for All the Public Ways in This Town

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**PLEASANT STREET.** Formerly known as Main Street, or Worcester Road and Barre Road, from Worcester city line to Rutland town line following new State Road.

**CAMP STREET.** Formerly known as "Nystrom Road" from Pleasant Street, near residence of Ludvig Carlson, northerly and easterly, to the Holden town line.

**CRYSTAL STREET.** As formerly known, from Pleasant Street, near residence of M. J. Foy southerly to Leicester Town Line.

**ASNEBUMSKIT STREET.** Formerly known as "Henry Road" from Pleasant Street, at foot of Arnold Hill, easterly to land of Alfred Henry.

**RESERVOIR DRIVE.** Formerly known as Leicester Road, from Pleasant Street, at foot of Arnold Hill, southerly to Leicester town line.

**GROVE STREET.** As formerly known, from Pleasant Street, at Johnson's Corner northerly to Pine Hill Reservoir.

**RUTLAND AVENUE.** Formerly known as School Street, from Pleasant Street, at south end of Common north-erly to the Rutland town line.

**MAPLE STREET.** As formerly known, from Rutland Avenue at north end of Common easterly to Grove Street.

**HOLDEN ROAD.** As formerly known, from Grove Street, near residence of Samuel Van Wyck easterly to Holden town line.

**STREETER ROAD.** As formerly known, from Rutland Avenue, easterly to Grove Street.

**SUNSET LANE.** As formerly known, from Grove Street, westerly to residence of Arthur A. Brigham, known as "SUNSET FARM."

**POND STREET.** Formerly known as Joe McHenry Road, from Grove Street, easterly to Holden town line.

**HIGHLAND COURT.** Formerly known as Water Street, from Rutland Avenue. Opposite Common easterly.

**BROOKS ROAD.** As formerly known, from Rutland Avenue to Pleasant Street.

**DAVIS ROAD.** Formerly known as Davis Hill Road and Christian Hill Road, from Pleasant Street, near residence of H. W. Estabrook, over Christian Hill across Pleasant Street, over Davis Hill to Mill Street.

**BRIGHAM ROAD.** Formerly known as Brigham Hill Road, from Pleasant Street. Opposite residence of J. W. Bishop, over Brigham Hill to Mill Street.



**TURKEY HILL ROAD.** From Pleasant Street to Turkey Hill Inn.

**WEST STREET.** As formerly known, from Pleasant Street at Hay Scales to Spencer town line near the Woodbury Farm.

**SUOMI STREET.** From West Street southerly to Marshall Street.

**SOUTH STREET.** From West Street at Flint Corner southerly to Marshall Street.

**MILL STREET.** Formerly known as Saw Mill Road, from West Street, northwesterly by Eames' Pond through mill yard to West Street.

**MARSHALL STREET.** Formerly known as New Brain-tree Road, from Leicester Line near residence of Brandt Brothers westerly to Spencer line near residence of J. H. Gotha.

Depreciation for 1927 is 3% of cost of plant or \$678 04

The Electric Light Department has added eight new consumers to the plant in 1926, making a total of 169 consumers on the system.

The cost of the Barclay extension was \$3,742.58. The balance of \$742.58 above the note issued was paid out of the Light operation account.

The cost of the Sexton extension was \$592.09. The balance of \$42.09 above the appropriation by the town was paid out of the light operation account.

The cost of the extension to Turkey Hill Inn was \$281.24. The department received \$105.00 from the Telephone Co. for one-half of the poles and setting; leaving the balance of \$176.24, which was also paid out of the Light account.

The cost of the rebuilding the line on Pleasant Street, because of the new State Highway, cost \$2306. The sum of \$306 was billed to the Telephone Company for one-half the cost of re-setting the original poles; the new poles erected were furnished the department, at no expense to us by the Telephone Co., and we in turn set the poles, at no expense to them, which was about even for us both.

The too common practice of going to the hospital and sending the bill to the Overseers of the Poor is unwarrantable and should be discontinued.

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### REMARKS

This year the town received aid from the state and county under Chapter 90 for the improvement of the North Spencer and the Rutland Roads. The North Spencer Road was gravelled, rolled and oiled the entire length but will have to receive additional allotment to repair the damage done to this road by the trucks hauling gravel on to the new State Road, which have rutted and spoiled the surface.

On the Rutland Road, 1500 feet of improved work was built by contract. This work comprised laying a stone fill 18 feet wide and 8 inches deep over 4 inches gravel sub-base. The stone fill was rolled and covered with 4 inches of new gravel. It is hoped that the town will raise money under Chapter 90 to continue the permanent work on this road beginning at the Rutland line and extending toward town, this work to be done by contract.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Holden, Mass., Jan. 1, 1927.

To the School Committee of Paxton:

My ninth report of the condition of our schools and the twenty-seventh in the series since the formation of the present union, is presented herewith for your consideration. The usual statistics are given at the end of the report. Our average membership has increased somewhat over last year and the average attendance is improved. The record of 95% in attendance is the best we have had, and reflects a real interest on the part of all who are connected with the schools. The census shows an increase of ten children between the ages of five and sixteen and the average membership has changed in proportion.

With the opening of the fall term we had two new teachers. Mr. Robert L. Dodge of Gorham Normal School succeeded Mr. Bowes as the Principal. Miss Ruth Maynard of Willimantic Normal School in Grades III and IV took the place of Mrs. Gould who returned to Grades V and VI in place of Mrs. Smith who left in June. These teachers have carried on the work with earnestness and devotion and we shall be fortunate if we can keep the present staff without further changes. Miss Annie P. Stevenson was appointed to Succeed Mrs. Settle as teacher of Music. Miss Mills and Mrs. Cunningham returned for their second year. I am presenting in full the reports of the Nurse and the special teachers and am glad to testify to the excellent work that is being done by them.

Reference has been made in other reports to the need for more class rooms and the possibility of an addition to the present building. While at present we need but one extra room, the Primary grades being too large for one teacher, any building program should look into the future and anticipate further growth. An assembly hall should be included in an addition, and provision made for manual training and sewing, inside toilets, a water supply and more indoor play space.

We are especially fortunate in the provision that has been made for playgrounds and an athletic field. Very few schools of this size have anything to compare with our splendid ballground. It is an asset that may be used to improve the health of the pupils, to build a fine school spirit and to train in discipline and self control. We have no greater responsibility today than to maintain a high moral standard and to teach respect for authority. These are fundamental in character building. It should be remembered however that without the cooperation of the home and the church, the school cannot succeed in its most important task. In the class room and on the playground the aim of our teaching should be to prepare for the right sort of family and community relationships and to develop moral and intellectual leadership.

A teachers' Institute was held in Holden in October under the direction of the State Department of Education. The teachers of our union and from several surrounding towns attended.

Special interest in Spelling was aroused by a Spelling Bee held in Worcester under the direction of the Telegram-Gazette. A preliminary contest was held in Rutland with representatives from all our schools.



We need a piano, a phonograph and more supplementary reading. The interior should be redecorated and the grading completed. Mr. Johnson takes a genuine interest in keeping the building clean and this service is appreciated. The committee deserve the hearty thanks of all for their fine service in behalf of our boys and girls.

I appreciate the loyal support that I have received during the past year and am very grateful for the many kindnesses shown me during my illness. Real progress has been made during the year and we look forward to further growth and higher accomplishment.

## Report of the Supervisor of Music

Holden, Mass., Jan. 1, 1927

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I respectfully submit my first report as Supervisor of Music in the town of Paxton.

During the four months that I have visited the schools of Paxton, I have endeavoured to adapt the course in Music to the needs of the pupils, but the program of the Progressive Music Series has been followed as closely as possible. In the First Grade all songs are taught by note, and special attention is given the less musical children in voluntary control of the voice.

In the Second Grade, rote songs are continued and specific work in Ear Training given.

In Grades V and VI, separate instruction is given, and all problems in tone, time and theory are learned before they are introduced in a new song.

In Grades VII and VIII, Book Four is obviously beyond the technical ability of the girls and boys, due to the lack of a complete musical course through their earlier grades. I would recommend a special book of exercises for drill in Sight Singing to enable them to more readily understand the work required at this period.

Our greatest need in the upper grades is a new piano, without which any true rendition of a part-song is almost impossible.

Throughout the schools we are stressing the fundamental principles of music and are striving to improve the tone quality by pure enunciation of the vowels and the use of the "head voice".

The phonograph is used in the lower grades to teach the children how to listen to music. In the upper grades we are studying Nationalism in Music. The national airs and folk-songs of America have been rendered and the history of the compositions and composers given. Other phases of American music will follow and later the music of their countries studied in like manner.

I wish to thank all who are in any way associated with my work in the schools, for their great help and cooperation.

## Report of the Supervisor of Drawing

The work in drawing in the Paxton schools from January to June, 1926 was as follows: practice in lettering and drawing of animal pictures, later combined in the making of animal poster. Some of these were entered in the M. S. P. C. A. poster contest held in Boston in April. Early American artists and their works were studied next, and the notes and pictures bound in book form. With drawings from nature the year's work was finished.

The fall term work began with nature and figure drawing and illustrations from imagination. Then followed elementary study of color. Next, construction problems were given before Christmas. The outline for the remainder of the year includes the following subjects:—drawing from imagination, art appreciation, poster making, a further study of color and nature drawing.

The school year has been a very pleasant one. The teachers and pupils have done the work very faithfully and successfully.

## Report of the School Nurse

Holden, Mass., Jan. 1, 1927

To the Superintendent of Schools:

This report covers the period from January 1, 1926 to January 1, 1927.

**MEDICAL INSPECTION:** We were very fortunate in securing Dr. Arthur N. Kimberly, Childrens' Specialist, for our School Physician, as he has given our children a very efficient examination of the Throat, Heart, Lungs, Mouth and Posture. This Physical Examination is given to ascertain as nearly as possible the exact condition of the children, to point out defects to parents, that they may correct them, thus safeguarding their children from serious trouble later.

Teaching from a medical standpoint, the old saying, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure", seems to be a step towards the idea of a thorough physical examination which everyone should have every year. We are starting with the children, hoping that they will continue all through their lives, to have a Doctor for a friend, and have him check them over year after year. This would lead to a correction of errors in diet, exercise, and living conditions that may prolong an active and vigorous life much longer than we are accustomed to.

Our aim for the children is Good Health. The definition of good health is "To live most and to serve best," (J. F. Williams).



**WEIGHING AND MEASURING:** The children have been weighed four times during the year . This is done to show how the children are gaining, and to check up on the child's growth. All children should gain a little, although some will gain more than others. We try to impress the normal weight children to keep their weight up to what it should be. The children 6% to 9% below weight are urged to help themselves to gain their weight. In the case of children who are 10% and more underweight, I am trying to get in touch with the parents, to cooperate with them in trying to find the cause, and to see what can be done to help them gain their normal weight.

**LUNCHES:** Most of the schools are serving a lunch at recess of crackers and milk. We especially urge the underweight children to take this extra milk, as milk is the best known food to bring children up to normal weight, and to promote a normal growth. Milk is not a fat producer but is a muscle, flesh and bone builder. The parents have cooperated with us, and have urged their children to take this extra milk during the day, either buying it at school or bringing it from home.

A hot lunch at noon is so beneficial to growing children that we hope to have some means of providing it for more children in the future.

**TEACHING HEALTH HABITS:** It has been my pleasure to assist the teachers in teaching health habits in regard to food, cleanliness, fresh air, rest, sleep and play. If these good habits are started in childhood and become real habits, they will last a lifetime as do their other habits. Let us strive to start our little folks on the right road to permanent good health.

**CLINICS:** In June there was held in Rutland a clinic for administering the Schick Test, and the immunizing

doses of Toxin Antitoxin for Diphtheria prevention. 100% of all children Schicked showed that they were susceptible. Nearly all children that were Schicked took the immunizing doses and are safe for twelve years at least. We are planning to hold another Clinic in the Spring and hope to have the children of the four towns immunized against Diphtheria.

The Parent-Teachers Association of Rutland is working hard to have a Dental Clinic in the near future. We hope to carry out the suggestion from the State Dept. of Public Health, Hygiene Division, to care for the 6 year, 9 year and 12 year molars and to preserve these teeth from future decay if possible; then fill all the present cavities of the children in the school. We hope this clinic will help the parents who do not have the time to have this work done in Worcester.

**COMMUNICABLE DISEASES:** We cannot control any epidemic in the school without the Parents' cooperation. Children who are known to have been exposed to any contagious disease should be kept at home during the incubation period for the safety of the other children in the school. This is one way in which to show our "Community Spirit".

**VACCINATION:** There are a few children who have not been vaccinated. These children should be vaccinated or have a certificate from their family Physician saying that they are not in a fit physical condition. This certificate must be presented to the school teacher every year at least, according to the Mass. law.

**SANATORIUM:** Four children have been entered at the Westfield State Sanatorium, suffering from Hilum Tuberculosis, to stay for a period of six months, more or less.

## Report of the School Physician

Worcester, Mass., Jan. 1, 1927

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In commenting on the physical examination of the children may I say that on the whole they seem in very good condition. A great many remedial defects exist. The most frequently occurring being defects in the early (deciduous) teeth. Among the older children there is a much greater tendency to keep the teeth defects corrected.

I should say that the response to notices on defects sent in previous years has been very good. The better the financial status of the parents and the more enlightened they are the more quickly these notices are responded to.

A school room is very much like a home. In the hands of one teacher it may be very cheerful and orderly and pleasant while in the hands of another it may be very bleak and forbidding. With only one or two exceptions, I think that the teachers have made very much indeed out of the possibilities of their school rooms. Several of the rooms are exceptionally well managed and cared for.

The actual equipment for heating, ventilation etc. in the various buildings, you are doubtless familiar with. In some of the schools this is very much better than in others. Centralization has always meant a great improvement in equipment.

## Warrant

### THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Worcester ss:

To either of the Constables of the town of Paxton,  
Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town who are qualified to vote in elections and town affairs to meet in "Allen Hall" on Monday, the 7th day of February A. D. 1927, at 5.45 o'clock A. M., then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To bring in to the Election Officers their ballots for the following officers to be elected on the official ballott:

Moderator, Town Clerk, Three Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, Two Constables and Tree Warden each for the term of one year; One Selectman, One Assessor, One member of the School Committee, One member of the Municipal Light Board, One Cemetery Commissioner, One Water Commissioner and One member of the Planning Board, each for the term of three years.

All the above officers to be voted for upon one ballot.

The Polls will be opened at 5.45 o'clock A. M., and may be closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

The business meeting will begin at 10 o'clock A. M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and pass any vote or votes relative thereto.

Article 3. To hear the report of the Finance Committee and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the following purposes:

Assessors, Contingent Expenses, Elections, Howe Place, Insurance, Legal Certification of Notes, Printing, Auditor, Selectmen, Tax Collector, Town Hall, Record Building and Town Clock, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Water Supply, Constables, Court Charges, Fire Department, Moth Extermination, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Tree Warden, Health Department, Inspector of Animals, Inspection of Meat, Bridges, Highways Chap. 90, Highways Chap. 81, Drainage, Snow Removal, Street Lights, Support of Poor, State Aid, Soldiers' Relief, Richard's Memorial Library, Trade School, Public and High Schools, Care of Common, Agricultural Extension Work, Flagpole, Fourth of July, Memorial Day, Mooreland Cemetery, Interest on Notes and Reserve Fund.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day and appoint a committee to have charge of the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to pay a proper charge of a Surety Company for acting as surety on officials bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year beginning Jan. 1, 1927, and to issue a note or notes of the town therefor payable within one year or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the selectmen.

Article 8. To see what action, if any, the town will take regarding the care and rental of the Town Hall and also the care of the Town Clock for the ensuing year.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen hundred (\$1500.00) dollars to construct a piece of permanent road on Pudding Corner Road, starting at West Street.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote that any Selectman of the Town of Paxton can hold no other office, either elective or appointive, while serving a term as selectman in said town of Paxton.

Article 11. To determine whether the Commonwealth of Massachusetts paid for the gasoline used in the state machines and drills, or whether the Town of Paxton paid for said gasoline or any gasoline to John F. TRUM, the former Road Commissioner of said Paxton, during 1923, or during the incumbency of the Town Treasurership by Miss Mary M. Daniher of said Paxton.

Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer of the Town of Paxton to pay three hundred and ninety-four dollars and sixty five cents (\$394.65) for the Hill work, so-called, the excavation and filling in connection with the Nannigan Road, which the said Town of Paxton had agreed by its agreement and vote of January 18, 1926 to do, which said sum of three hundred and ninety-four dollars and sixty-five cents (\$394.65) is due for work done to two city of Worcester workmen, several workmen of Paxton, two Paxton farmers and John F. Trum, the former Road Commissioner of the Town of Paxton, and which said work was ordered by the state engineer of Public



Works Division of Highways, acting under the authority of a written contract between the selectmen of Paxton and the Nanigian Brothers of said town, and also the sum of eleven (\$11.00) dollars to Fred E. Ladd for coal and cartage, making a total of four hundred and five dollars and sixty-five cents (\$405.65.)

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Committee to investigate the advisability of establishing a town forest, or act any way thereon.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to reappropriate the unexpended balance of 1926 on the Street Naming account and also the unexpended balance of 1926 on the Direct-U-Light account for the use of the street naming committee to be used at their discretion and that the same committee be authorized to act for the ensuing year.

Article 15. To see if the town will reappropriate the unexpended balance of the funds appropriated last year for the use of the Water Commissioners during the ensuing year, or act in any way thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will provide that no further extension of the electric light plant shall be made except upon suitable guarantee of an adequate return for a reasonable period of years and after hearing before and written report by the Municipal Light Board.

Article 16. To see if the town will take appropriate action to establish a definite and permanent method of street numbering so that the owner of any house in Paxton may determine a street number thereon, or act in any way thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will adopt rules for the general guidance of the Board of Survey or act in any way thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to fix the number of voters necessary for a quorum at Town Meetings, or act in any way thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to suspend Article I of the By-Laws until July 1, 1927, in order to allow Fred A. Skiff the opportunity to saw logs on land belonging to "Graystone Lodge," or act in any way thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town officers, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to employ counsel when deemed necessary in the performance of their duties.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended under Section 26, Chapter 81 of the General Laws, or act in any way thereon.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to construct sidewalks on Rutland Avenue and Pleasant Street and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or act in any way thereon.

Article 24. To see if the Town will pass a vote substantially as follows: That no appropriation in excess of \$300.00 shall be made outside of the Annual Town Meeting except in cases of extreme emergency involving the health or safety of people, or act in any way thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease the "Howe Farm" for a term of years, or act in any way thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to extend the Electric Light line from Pleasant Street to the "Howe Farm" or act in any way thereon.

Article 27. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to build one-half of the line fence between the Howe Place and land owned by G. A. Rossier and other abutters, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or act in any way thereon.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be paid to the Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, in accordance with the provisions of, and for the purpose of, Chapter 128, General Laws, or for the support of demonstration work in agriculture, Home Economics, or Boys' or Girls' Club Work, under the direction of the agent or instructors, or the trustees, cooperating with the local Town Director, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to choose a director in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 128, General Laws, or pass any vote or votes in relation thereto.

Article 30. To see if the town will make certain provisions with reference to the Howe Farm, or act in any way thereon.

Article 31. To see if the town will take any action relative to celebrating July 4th, 1927, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor and appoint a committee to have charge of the same, or act in any way thereon.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) dollars from the estate of

the late Ellen F. Clark, the income only, to be used for the perpetual care of the William H. Clark burial lot in Paxton Cemetery.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) dollars from Mrs. Mary F. Eames, the income only, to be used for the perpetual care of the Henry C. Eames burial lot in Paxton Cemetery.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) dollars from Mrs. Jennie Harrington, the income only to be used for the perpetual care of the George H. Harrington burial lot in Paxton Cemetery.
