## Report of An Audit

OF

## The Accounts of The Town of Paxton

FOR THE PERIOD FROM

January 1, 1930 to May 18, 1931

Made in Accordance with the Provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from January 1, 1930 to May 18, 1931, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions of the town, as recorded on the books of the several departments, were examined and checked for the period of the audit and compared with the records in the treasurer's office.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded on the cash book, were checked with the accounts of the several departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury.

The payments were checked to the appropriation accounts, with the selectmen's orders authorizing the disbursement of town funds, and with the original vouchers and pay-rolls on file.

The treasurer's cash book was footed and the cash balance on May 18, 1931, was verified by a reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks, and by a personal count of the cash in office.

The savings bank books representing the investments of the trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and the income was proved.

The appropriations voted by the town, as recorded by the town clerk, were compared with the apppropriation accounts.

The accounting officer's general ledger was written up for 1931, a trial balance was taken off, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of May 18, 1931.

The debt and interest payments were checked with the amounts falling due, and the outstanding debt accounts were listed and verified.

The books and accounts of the collector of taxes were checked. The commitments were examined and verified, and the receipts, as recorded on the cash books, were checked with the commitment books and with the payments to the treasurer. The abatements were compared with the assessors' record of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved. A further verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The books and accounts of the municipal light department were examined and checked. The ledger accounts kept by the department were analyzed, the records of charges were totaled, and the payments to the treasurer were checked to the treasurer's books. The outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled and the cash on hand was verified. A further verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the department, and from the replies received it appears that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The town clerk's records of dog and of fishing and hunting licenses issued were examined, and the payments to the county and the state, respectively, were proved, the cash on hand being verified.

The records of receipts from licenses issued by the selectmen, from rent of the town hall, and from the sealer of weights and measures were examined, and the reported payments to the treasurer were checked with the treasurer's books.

Great care should be exercised by the Welfare Board in billing to the State Department of Public Welfare, on or before October 1 each year, all charges due the town from the State up to and including June 30 of the current year. Failure to do this may result in a loss to the town of the reimbursement due from the State.

The surety bonds of the town clerk and of the town treasurer were examined and found to be in proper form. The bond of the tax collector was not on file.

For the co-operation received and the courtesy extended by the department officials during the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

### Report of Water Commissioners

At the time of the town meeting held February 2, 1931, the Board of Water Commissioners was considering the installation of a water system for the Town of Paxton by using the Streeter and Richard springs. Upon careful survey made by the Board of Water Commissioners and Mr. Fred O. Stevens (now with X. Henry Goodnough, Inc.) it was deemed inadvisable to depend upon the springs for our supply of water.

We then turned our attention to Asnebumskit Pond and the springs at the south end of the pond and the engineer feels that the supply from this source will be sufficient for many years.

In accordance with the authority given your board we endeavored to have the proper legislation passed so the Town of Paxton would be authorized to supply itself from the Asnebumskit Pond area. The City of Worcester has prior rights in the watershed of Asnebumskit which rights were acquired from the Metropolitan Water Board under authority granted by the Legislature in 1911 and for which Worcester paid a part of the original damages paid by the Metropolitan Water Board.

In 1895 prior to giving rights to the Metropolitan Water Board the legislature authorized the Town of Paxton to take water from Asnebumskit Pond, but this legislation was not accepted by the town as therein required and through its negligence Worcester acquired its rights in 1911.

In 1912 Paxton was given authority under chapter 361 to take water from Asnebumskit and this act was duly accepted by the Town. However the Town is liable to the City of Worcester for a proportionate share of damages paid to the

Metropolitan Board plus damages sustained by the City of Worcester. To acquire the rights to the waters of Asnebumskit pond at this time would impose a prohibitive financial burden so it seems advisable to negotiate with Worcester for the purchase of water at this source.

After extended efforts by your Board the legislature by Chapter 369 of the acts of 1931 authorized the Water Commissioners in behalf of the Town of Paxton to contract with the City of Worcester for purchase of water.

Our Engineer has made surveys and revised the estimates as presented at the last annual meeting and reports an estimated cost substantially the same as in that report.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Holden, Mass., Dec. 31, 1931.

To the School Committee of Paxton:

The report presented herewith for your consideration is the thirty-second in the series since the formation of the present Union and the fourteenth by the writer.

It is unfortunate to have frequent changes in teachers but there were fewer than usual this year. Mr. Merry resigned to accept a high school position in Connecticut and Miss Colbert was transferred to Holden. Mr. Stanley Cotton was elected as Principal and Miss Margaret O'Brien was elected for Grades II and III. There were no other changes and we feel that we now have a strong organization, with splendid cooperation and good work being accomplished.

Special attention is asked for the reports of the Music and the Drawing Supervisors, as well as for those of the School Nurse and the School Physician. The health program has been carried out with fine spirit, and the cooperation of teachers and parents with the work of the Nurse has been very gratifying. The use of an Audiometer in making hearing tests was new this year. It was made possible through the Worcester League for the Hard of Hearing and the testing was done by Miss Anna C. Shattuck. Follow-up work is done by the League at a special Clinic held in Worcester. Dr. Gordon Berry is President of this League and the Audiometer was loaned to them by Dr. Rowe of the Evans Memorial in Boston. These hearing tests should be made yearly for defects caused by the so-called children's diseases often become serious if not dis-

covered and treated in their early stages.

The enrollment for the fall term was 132, an increase of 12 over the year before. The separation of Grades I and II has been accomplished without difficulty. The extra time given to Grade I will mean thorough preparation for all of the child's later school work. It is the most important year in the elementary school, and next in importance is the year just before entrance to high school. I hope we may be able to separate Grades VII and VIII, for we need to give more drill on fundamentals as well as an enriched program in preparation for high school. Along with certain advantages in attending a city high school, go certain disadvantages. Our pupils need much more intensive and extensive training to meet the situation in a large city high school. We are not meeting that situation at present. We have 35 pupils in high school now and their success is pretty largely the measure of the kind of preparation we have given them.

We prepared posters again for the annual contest conducted by the American Humane Society. Gold medals were awarded to Jack Morse, Eugenia Robinson and Elizabeth Morse. Silver medals to George Reed and Marjorie St. Martin. Honorable Mention to Martha McGovern, Helen Pouttu and Elizabeth Putnam.

The Prize Speaking Contest has become an annual event, and Mr. and Mrs. Dunbar again presented prizes. First prizes of \$5.00 were awarded to Robert Hughes and to Eula Maccabee. Second prizes of \$2.50 were awarded to Wesley Aykroyd and to Doris Carlson.

Child Health Day was observed with appropriate exercises in May. This observance is nation-wide and serves to emphasize the importance of our first objective, Health.

The radio today is making a splendid contribution to the daily program of the school, reaching as it does, the most remote rural school community. We have two projects now before us, one being to secure a radio for the school, and the

other to equip one of our rooms for assemblies. The American School of the Air offers an excellent educational program every-school day at 2.30, under the auspices of the U. S. Department of Education and many of America's best known educators. With a radio we may avail ourselves of these programs as well as the music appreciation programs conducted by Walter Damrosch.

Monday—American History Dramatizations.
Tuesday—Story Telling and Music.
Wednesday—Literature Dramatizations.
Thursday—Music Appreciation.
Friday—Vocational Information and Current Events.

The splendid support of the School Committee and the cooperation of parents and teachers make for the success of our school. Results may be measured in terms of increasing interest in our health program, in our equipment, Pre-School Round-up, hot lunches, organized play and games, playground equipment, various clinics, lessened retardation and our well-cared-for school building. An aroused consciousness of the importance of these contributions to the welfare of the child means an aroused and progressive community.

The cost of maintenance is about the same as for last year. The only increase is in the amount needed for high school transportation and tuition and this is reimbursed by the State.

The music schedule and aims are practically the same this year as they were last. Singing plays the most important part, and of course in order to read music well, a certain amount of theory must be studied. This is done as the songs require it.

In the Primary Grades the rhythmic band is used to develop rhythmic feeling and to give the children the experience of playing together. The violin class which gave the older children this same experience plus a knowledge of the violin, was discontinued this year.

The new text books in music which are used in the sixth Grade add greatly to the enjoyment of music in that class. I hope that we may have Music Hour Book V in the seventh and eighth Grades.

# Report of the Drawing Supervisor

To the Superintendent:

In the work of the past year projects have been planned which have been a progressive development of the previous year. More stress has been placed on the expression of individual ideas both in composition and design. Design has been an especially interesting field of creative development. Considering the increasing demand for decorative design in the business world, it seems to offer a practical outlet for the child who has artistic ability.

We have made an effort to apply our designs, color study and representation to some constructive projects such as boxes, book covers, greeting cards, Christmas wrapping papers, linoleum block printed cards. Attractive blackboard designs have been made and used to decorate the school rooms.

We aim throughout to make the pupils independent workers, that they may originate and produce posters and other projects with confidence and success. Much credit should be given the pupils of the upper grades who have independently worked out very successful posters for school activities.

The new Course of Study in Art issued by the State Department of Education is very helpful. It has been necessary to make but few changes in our course to have it coincide with the new outlines.

## Report of the School Nurse

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Dr. Thayer has completed the physical examinations for the year beginning in September. The children have been weighed and measured four times since last January.

As last year it is possible for the children and teachers as well to have a hot lunch at noon. Something warm for the children to have with their noonday meal is very helpful especially when they come a long distance to school, and have to make an early start as is necessary in many cases.

Dr. Fredricka Moore and Miss Mary Billmeyer made a Health Survey of the school in April. At that time there were a number of helpful suggestions made which are being carried out.

A hearing test was given the children by Miss Grace Shattuck by the audiometer in April. This test was under the direction of the Worcester League for the Hard of Hearing.

The following is the report of the tests:

Serious loss of hearing in left ear	1
Moderate loss of hearing in left ear	2
Slight loss of hearing in right ear	2
Slight loss of hearing in both ears	2

A pre-school clinic was held in June. At that time Dr. Thayer examined eight children all of whom entered school this fall. Credit is due the Womans' Club who helped to make it a success.

It is with pleasure that I can say two children were sent to the Health Camp at Sterling. They returned to their homes improved for having spent a month there. I think the children join with me in saying it was not only a pleasant vacation, but that they were benefited in many ways. While at camp they not only learned how to improve their own health, but also the spirit of true sportmanship and consideration of others.

## **Town Warrant**

#### THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Worcester ss.:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Paxton,

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town, who are qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs, to meet in "ALLEN HALL," on MONDAY, the FIRST day of February, A. D. 1932, at 5:45 o'clock A. M., then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Article 1. To bring in to the Election Officers their votes for the following officers to be elected on the official ballot.

Moderator, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Treasurer, Auditor, Two Constables and Tree Warden each for the term of one year. One Selectman, one member Board of Public Welfare, one Assessor, one member School Committee, one member Municipal Light Board, one cemetery Commissioner, one Water Commissioner each for the term of three years; one Water Commissioner for one year to fill vacancy; one member Planning Board and two members Board Library Trustees for the Richards' Memorial Library each for the term of three years.

All the above officers to be voted for upon one ballot. Also to elect any other necessary town officers. The polls will be opened at 5:45 o'clock A. M. and may be closed at 3 o'clock P. M.

The business meeting will begin at 10 o'clock A. M.

- Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon.
- Article 3. To hear the report of the Finance Committee and to vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the various departments and expenses of the town for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to pay the proper charge of a Surety Company for acting as surety on official bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same or act in any way thereon.
- Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year beginning January 1, 1932, and to issue a note or notes of the town therefor, payable within one year or act in any way thereon.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town officers, by and with the approval of the Selectmen, to employ counsel when deemed necessary, in the performance of their duties, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of completing the permanent road on Richards Avenue, providing that the State

and County each appropriate \$4,000.00 for the said purpose, or act in any way thereon.

- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to be used on Chapter 90 roads, providing that the State and County each furnish \$1,200 for the said purpose, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to extend Highland Court, as a town way, from the end of the present town way to the residence of Miss Mary A. Bottomly, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to establish a Road Machinery Account, to which shall be credited all receipts received for the use or rental of road machinery, the fund to be used for road machinery purposes as voted by the town, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of \$1,000.00 from the overlay surplus to the Reserve Fund, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to purchase certain

weights for the Sealer of Weights and Measures, as recommended by State Sealer of Weights and Measures, or act in any way thereon.

- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and appoint a committee to have charge of the same, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of the Fourth

of July and appoint a committee to have charge of same, or act in any way thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover overdrafts as follows: \$16.67 Trade School 1930; \$44.38 school department 1931; \$376.10 Welfare department 1931; \$408.99 Old Age Assistance 1931, or act in any way thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following By-law: That the town create a Finance Committee to consist of the chairman of the Selectmen, the chairman of the School Committee and the Treasurer together with six property owners who are not town officials, the said six members to be appointed by the Moderator, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year. And each succeeding year the town shall elect, on the official ballot, two property owners who are not town officials, for a term of three years. In case a vacancy shall occur, by death or otherwise, the remaining members of the committee may fill such vacancy until the next annual election.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following By-law: The financial accounts of all the departments of the town shall be audited annually by the Director of Accounts in the Department of Corporations and Taxation, pursuant to the provisions of Section 35 of Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote that this meeting be governed by a manuel of parliamentary rules or act in any way thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee consisting of five, seven or nine property owners to draft a set of Zoning laws in addition to

those now existing, call a hearing relative thereto, or act in any way thereon.

- Article 21. To see if the town will vote to draft a set of By-laws and that all town business be conducted in accordance therewith or act in any way thereon.
- Article 22. To see if the town will vote to extend the Electric light line to the residence of Benjamin F. Barclay, raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 23. To see if the town will vote to increase the salaries of the Board of Public Welfare to \$80.00 per year, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 24. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the present zoning laws or act in any way thereon.
- Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 with which to build a section of permanent road on Suomi Street, beginning at the end of the present stone filled road and continuing in a southerly direction, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 26. To see if the town will vote that the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or municipal power during the current fiscal year up to \$500.00 be appropriated for the municipal lighting plant, to be expended by the manager of municipal lighting plant under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for said fiscal year, as defined in Section 57 of Chapter 164 of the General Laws.
- Article 27. To see if the town will hear the recommendations of the Water Commissioners acting under and by virtue

of the vote at the Annual Town Meeting of 1931, or act in any way relative thereto.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 369 of the Acts of 1931 entitled "An Act authorizing the City of Worcester and the Town of Paxton to enter into Contracts for the Purchase and Sale of Water for Municipal Water Supply Purposes" and act in any way relative thereto.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to purchase a water supply system with standpipe under the provisions of Chapter 361 of the Acts of 1912 and the provisions of the General Laws of 1921 and acts in amendment thereof or addition thereto; and vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for such purpose and to issue bonds or notes of the town therefor, the proceeds of such bonds or notes to be used for the construction of the said system and the purchase or acquisition of the property and rights necessary in conjunction therewith including rights from the City of Worcester or take any action relative thereto.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting two attested copies thereof, seven days at least, before the time set for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
