I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from September 7, 1937, to July 7, 1938, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Paxton for the period from September 7, 1937, the date of the previous audit, to July 7, 1938, the following report being submitted thereon.

The books and accounts of the accounting officer were examined and checked, the reported receipts being compared with the financial records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with the treasurer's books. The payments, as recorded on the accounting officer's ledger, were checked to the treasury warrants authorizing disbursements and with the treasurer's cash book.

The accounting officer's ledger was analyzed, and after the necessary adjusting entries were given to the accounting officer to bring the ledger up to date, a trial balance was taken off proving the accounts, as adjusted, to be in balance. A balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on July 7, 1938.

The balance sheet indicates several overdrawn accounts, in which connection attention is called to the fact that to incur liabilities in excess of appropriations is contrary to Section 31, Chapter 44, General Laws.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the records in the several departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked to the selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The cash on hand on July 7, 1938, was verified by actual count and the bank balances were reconciled with state-

ments furnished by the banks of deposit, the reconciliation of the cash on the above date indicating that the sum of \$1,072.07 was due from the treasurer. Another reconciliation of the treasurer's cash was made on October 18, 1938, at which time the cash discrepancy was found to be \$1,105.72. The treasurer should promptly pay this amount into the town treasury.

The payments on account of debt and interest were checked with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the various trust funds in the custody of the treasurer were examined and listed. The income was proved and the withdrawals were checked with the treasurer's receipts.

The tax title deeds on hand were listed and the amounts transferred to the tax title account were verified, a further verification being made by a comparison of the deeds on hand with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked in detail. The taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination were audited and all subsequent tax commitments were analyzed and compared with the warrants given by the assessors for the collection of the taxes.

The collector's payments to the treasurer were checked to the treasurer's cash book, the abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved with the accounting officer's ledger accounts.

The outstanding accounts were verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the outstanding accounts, as listed, are correct.

The work of the collector has been performed in a painstaking and efficient manner.

The appropriations voted by the town were listed from the town clerk's records and checked to the accounting officer's ledger.

The assessors' computation of the tax rate for 1938 was examined and checked, and it was noted that two appropriations from available funds voted by the town were not considered in the determination of the tax rate.

In this connection attention is called to Section 23, Chapter 59, General Laws, which requires that the assessors raise all sums appropriated since the last preceding annual tax assessment, and which also provides that deductions on account of appropriations voted from available funds in the treasury may be made by the assessors only upon the written approval of the Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation. All appropriations voted by the town, whether they are to be raised by taxation or transferred from avilable funds in the treasury, should therefore be certified by the

town clerk to the assessors, as required by Section 15-A, Chapter 41, General Laws.

The books and accounts of the municipal water and light departments were examined and checked. The commitments were checked, the recorded collections were compared with the records of receipts by the treasurer, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled.

The surety bonds of the officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of licenses and permits issued by the selectmen were examined and the collections were checked to the receipts as shown on the treasurer's cash book.

The accounts of the sealer of weights and measures were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer being verified by a comparison with the treasurer's records.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the books and accounts of the bureau of old age assistance and of the public welfare department were examined and checked.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, together with tables showing the trust fund transactions.

For the cooperation extended by the several town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

Report of the Finance Committee

Paxton, Mass., January 23, 1939.

To the Voters of the Town of Paxton:

Your Finance Committee, after meeting with the Selectmen and various department heads, recommends the following proposal for this year's budget.

The Tax rate will go up approximately \$1.00 for every \$1000.00 added on the floor. Likewise the rate will go down approximately \$1.00 for every \$1,000.00 subtracted from this budget.

We wish to call the attention of the voters to the Interest and Notes due this year which amounts to \$5,657.50. This item represents largely the expenditures of previous years which we are now in the process of paying for. Approximately \$5.66 of our tax rate is in payment of these expenditures made during previous years. Until these obligations are paid, a substantially lower tax rate cannot be expected.

The department bought at a cost of \$311.67 the piece of land at the city line and plans to install an outdoor substation in 1939.

The ice storm in April cost \$407.89.

The change over on Pleasant St., West St., Maple St., and Richards Ave. because of the new telephone cable cost \$1,342.58.

The hurricane in September cost \$1,409.83.

The above costs are our net. Having received in addition \$1,989.07 the telephone's share of storm's expense and Pleasant St. changeover.

The department has installed seven new transformers. Eleven new range connections have been made.

It is to be noted that because of all our major troubles this year the department operated at 7.12% loss.

At this time your manager wishes to thank every one for their kind patience in the hurricane in regard to the restoring of service.

Report of the Planning Board

Paxton, Mass., Dec. 31, 1938.

During the year 1938 the outstanding item to report is the establishment in Paxton of the Experimental Radio Station of the Yankee Network. This enterprise bids fair to spread favorably the name of Paxton, and to draw a large number of visitors into the town. It also offers immediate and future material benefits.

At the first meeting, the Board organized with Rufus B. Dunbar, Chairman, and Edmund A. Reiser, Secretary. Action was immediately taken looking to the preparation of a plan of the Town, in accordance with the vote and appropriation of the 1938 Annual Meeting.

William I. Thompson, Civil Engineer, was employed and instructed to proceed with collection of office data and with the expectation that local help would be available and employed for certain of the field work. Welfare assistance did not become available and it became necessary to have the entire job done by William I. Thompson and his regular men.

The plan, a copy of which will be on display at the Annual Town Meeting, constitutes a basis upon which further data can be added from time to time. It should prove of great value to the assessors, and to all departments of town activity.

The Board was called upon to consider, and did approve a plan showing Trafton Road, a new street leading Easterly from Pleasant Street, South of Asnebumskit Road. The Board recommends that the Town By-Laws, as adopted at the last Annual Meeting and approved by the Attorney General, together with the other existing By-Laws be published as a part of the Town Reports with a separate run of extra copies thereof, or that they be so separately published so as to be available for distribution to interested persons. The present supply of zoning By-Laws is nearly exhausted.

No undertaking of general revision of By-Laws can be reasonably considered without technical assistance after an adequate appropriation has been provided.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

Holden, Mass., Dec. 31, 1938.

To the School Committee of Paxton:

The following report is the thirty-ninth in the series and the twenty-first by the writer, together with the usual statistics for reference, presented for your consideration.

We have had but one change in teachers this year, Miss Edith Klinglof having been elected to succeed Miss Thornton who resigned in June. The Music Supervisor is elected by the Joint Committee, and while we have had none this fall, the work has been carried on by the regular teachers with much credit. I should like to see part-time Supervisors or teachers for Music, Drawing, Practical Arts and Physical Education added to our staff in order that these important subjects may be given more emphasis.

Parents and teachers have cooperated with the School Nurse in the conduct of the various clinics and in carrying out the health program. The report of the Nurse is most encouraging. We now have a Maico audiometer for testing hearing and a Keystone Telebinocular for testing the eyes and for use in remedial reading. A dentist's chair that might be secured secondhand would add very materially to our equipment and would save transportation expense.

The teachers attended two Institutes conducted by the State Department of Education, one in March at Rutland

and one in October at West Boylston. They also attended the County Convention at Worcester and have carried out a successful teachers' Club program during the year, with 100% enrollment in both State and National Associations. They have attended summer school and taken various professional in-service courses. I believe we should establish a system of salary increments for such in-service study.

The winners of the annual poster contest are listed at the end of this report. Harold Clockedile and Stella Nanigian won the American Legion Essay awards and these were presented at graduation by Commander William Drown. We thank the members of the P. T. A. for their cooperation and those who have helped in carrying on the 4-H Club and Scouting activities, Mr. Clapp for his many acts of kindness, the ladies of the Legion Auxiliary for the reception to graduates, the teachers, and Mr. Maccabee for helping to make the year successful.

Reversing the usual order, the President of the N. E. A. in a recent discussion of the part of the schools in character and religious education, said "the school should learn to cooperate with the home, the community, and the church in building character." In his opinion the greatest opportunity for the development of a child's character lies in the proper attitude toward play, for here is the chance for free expression and building of good habits. "Teach the child to play fairly, squarely, honestly, with initiative, with fullness of life, with joy in success, with good sportsmanship in failure, and we have contributed a part to his nature that will help him to true success in the great game and busi-

ness of life." We have in Paxton a splendid opportunity to act on these suggestions and to learn to live with our children, to understand them better, to guide them into "the good life."

Our enrollment this year has increased a little, and our attendance of 96% is very creditable. There are eleven boys and four girls in the Trade Schools, and thirty-five attending high school. Most of our pupils do well in the Worcester schools but unfortunately there seem to be a few who do not appreciate the opportunity given them to get a high school education or to learn a trade. Certainly no boy or girl can expect to do good work unless regular in attendance and ready to attend strictly to business. Parents have a very definite responsibility here, to see that their children are in school every day unless prevented by sickness, and to see that they do the necessary studying at home.

The school plant is in good condition at the present time. We have completed the installation of the new seating in the class-rooms, made necessary repairs, put in a new sink and bubbler and done some painting. New textbooks have been supplied as needed, and the Rugg Social Science material furnished to supplement our geography and history in Grades III through VIII.

The Town is fortunate in having a Committee devoted to the best interests of the children and always ready to give of their time to a study of school problems and the function of the school in the community.

Report of the School Nurse

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The pre-school examination and vaccination clinic was conducted by Dr. Mayo, and six of the eight pre-school children attended. Decay and premature loss of teeth, diseased tonsils and adenoids, malnutrition and poor mental habits exercise serious effect on the body of the school child. Parents should try to have their children in the best possible physical condition before they enter school.

A survey was made in April to determine the number of children who might be susceptible to diphtheria and seventy were found, only twenty-two having been previously immunized. With the cooperation of the P. T. A. and the local Board of Health, Dr. Dudley of the State Department of Health immunized forty-nine children in May.

All pupils were weighed and measured four times during the year. A small steady gain is evidence of normal growth. Cleanliness, rest, fresh air and nourishing foods are discussed at this time. Two children attended the tonsil clinic in June at the Holden Hospital.

The annual physical examinations in September prove the worth of previous clinics and recommendations. The eradication of defects has raised the level of the children physically. Thirty-nine children were treated by Dr. Scott at the dental clinic.

Hygienic conditions at the school have at all times been very satisfactory. The children and all concerned show keen interest in keeping the building neat and clean.

Much credit should be given those who have made it possible to add to our equipment the most modern audiometer for ear testing and the new telebinocular for eye testing. With this new equipment handicaps of sight and hearing will more readily be discovered and many school-room problems eliminated.

Upon all home visits I found the parents cooperative, and the link between home and school is strong, both working for the interest of the child.

I take this opportunity to give full recognition and appreciation to the teachers, the parents and the children in keeping the health status of the Paxton school so remarkable, and to thank one and all who have helped to make my work so pleasant.

Report of the School Physician

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following is a brief report of my work as School Physician in the past year.

During the second half of the year the schools of the district were visited with the School Nurse for the purpose of sanitary inspection. Just before school closed in June vaccination clinics for pre-school children were held in the Rice, Chaffins and Jefferson schools of Holden and in the high school at Rutland. A similar clinic was held at Paxton and Oakham. Parents were, at this time, afforded the opportunity of having any child of preschool age vaccinated. The children who were to enter school in September were given a physical examination.

During September and October each pupil was given a physical examination at the respective schools.

There have been two epidemics of contagious diseases in the district during the past year. Last spring there were several cases of scarlet fever in Holden, and this fall and early winter there have been many cases of mumps both among school children and adults in Rutland. May I urge parents to report any known contagious disease and to call their physician when one is suspected.

Moderator 1 yr., Town Clerk 1 yr., Collector of Taxes 1 yr., Treasurer 1 yr., Auditor 1 yr., two Constables 1 yr., Tree Warden 1 yr., Selectman 3 yrs., one member Board Public Welfare 3 yrs., Assessor 3 yrs., one member School Committee 3 yrs., one member Municipal Light Board 3 yrs., Cemetery Commissioner 3 yrs., Water Commissioner 3 yrs., two Trustees Richards Memorial Library 3 yrs., one trustee of Richards Memorial Library 1 yr. to fill vacancy, and one member of Planning Board 5 yrs.

All of the above officers to be voted for upon one ballot.

Also to choose any other necessary town officers.

The polls will be open from 12 o'clock, Noon, until 8 P. M.

The business meeting to open at 7 o'clock P. M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon and act upon any recommendations contained in said reports, and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required in accordance with said reports or otherwise, or act in any way thereon.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (see budget) with which to pay the proper charge of a Surety Company for acting as surety on bonds required by town officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same.

Article 4. To see if the town will authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1939, and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the town will authorize the payment of a 1938 bill for \$24.00 to the Worcester County Sanatorium under the Board of Health, raise and appropriate this sum of money or act in any way thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23.25 to cover unpaid bills of the Constables, Dog Officer, and care of Common, or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the overdraft on Old Age Assistance for the year 1938 or act in any way thereon.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to pay the 1934 Taxes on the Howe Farm amounting to \$37.72 with interest;

also the 1936 Taxes amounting to \$156.75 with interest, charging same to rent of previous years, or act in any way thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to improve the buildings on the Illig property so called, or act in any way thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be used on Chapter 90 roads for maintenance, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State and County or both, for this purpose, or act in any way thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for construction on Rockland St. under Chapter 90, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for enlarging the Electric Light Plant to serve the new radio station, payment to be made by serial notes from their own revenue, or act in any way thereon.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for the purpose of protecting the town clock, said sum to be taken from Contingent, or act in any way thereon.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to use the income from the C. D. Boynton Fund for general purposes for the construction of sidewalks under direction of the Board of Selectmen or act in any way thereon.

Article 15. To see if the town will re-appropriate the

unexpended balance of \$17.85 on Memorial Day Fund to purchase Grave markers to replace missing or damaged on Veteran's graves and also to purchase new markers as needed, or act in any way thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to appoint the American Legion as a committee to have charge of the observance of Memorial day, or act in any way thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to elect two additional members to the School Committee, so as to constitute a School Committee of five members, or act in any way thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the extension of water on Richards Ave. or act in any way thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a town accountant as provided for in section 55 of Chapter 41 of the General Laws, for a term of three years, who may be a member of their board, raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Town Accountants department or act in any way thereon. (See Budget.)

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to abolish the office of auditor.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to give the Fire Department members compensation for their services or act in any way thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to have charge of the observance of the Fourth of July, or act in any way thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to pay the Moderator \$10.00 for his services at the Annual Town

Meeting and \$5.00 for any special meetings, charging same to Contingent, or act in any way thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to transfer the sum of \$658.50 from highway equipment fund to the highway equipment maintenance fund to be used to furnish supplies and maintain the town's highway equipment, or act in any way thereon.

Article 25. To see if town will vote to transfer the sum of \$892.12 from overlay surplus to the reserve fund or act in any way thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the Dog fund to the Richards Memorial Library, or act in any way thereon.

Article 27. To see what action the town wishes to take regarding a ban on fireworks.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to use up to 60% of the surplus funds in the hands of the Town Treasurer, available when the tax rate is ready to be set, as recommended by the Tax Commissioner for the purpose of reducing the tax rate for the current year, or act in any way thereon.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote that the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or municipal power during the current fiscal year be appropriated for the Municipal Light Plant, to be expended by the manager under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for said fiscal year, as defined in Section 57, Chapter 164 of the General Laws, including any new business.

Article 30. To see if the town will accept from Dell A. Hamilton et als., known as the Hamilton heirs, a deed of a strip of land thirty-three (33) feet in width for an extension of the town way now known as Highland Court and make a definite layout of a town way from Richards Ave. easterly over lands of Mary M. Daniher and others and over said strip of land and change the name of said town way to Highland Street, or act in any way thereon.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting two attested copies thereof, one of which shall be at the Post Office, seven days at least before the time set for holding said meeting as directed by a by-law of the town.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.
