We think all will agree that the Dump is well cared for, and for the benefit of newcomers the dumping hours are: Saturday from 9 - 5, and on Sunday morning from 9 - 12 m.

The garbage collections have increased considerably this past year. The Swine Breeders, who collect your garbage, render you a service that is very important from the standpoint of public health. Because of certain animal health problems, we must, as of January 1, 1954, cook all garbage fed to swine. It is very expensive, uneconomical, and difficult to cook table-waste that is wrapped in paper or littered with trash. We are asking for your help and support in this important matter.

After doing an excellent job as a member of the Board since 1950, Doctor Cunningham did not run for reelection due to business reasons. We regret losing him very much, but we were very fortunate when Vernon Prentice agreed to become a member.

Our Board meets regularly on the first Thursday of each month, and we hope that the townspeople will feel free to call on us at any time for assistance. The co-operation of the Town officials and residents throughout the past year has been appreciated

Report of the SWIMMING POOL CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE

The swimming pool was officially opened for the use of residents of the Town on July 4, 1953 and remained open until Labor Day. The continuous flow of water into and out of the pool during the entire summer, in spite of unusually dry weather bore out the original studies of the Committee.

The attendance at the pool reached a maximum of nearly 150 on one of the hottest days and was quite good during the entire season. The Committee feels very gratified that the people of the Town were far-sighted enough to support this project financially to the extent of approximately \$7,500.00 and with hundreds of hours of volunteer labor. As a consequence we now have a pool which might easily have cost \$50,000.00 by the usual methods of construction. What is more important, Paxton has made one important step in establishing an organized recreational program.

The work of grading and clearing of the adjacent areas was carried as far as possible in the Fall, but the final grading and seeding, together with additional clearing and burning of brush must be completed in the Spring. The pool must be cleaned and re-filled before the next swimming season and there are a number of minor projects to be concluded before final maintenance of the area is officially turned over to the Parks and Recreation Commission which is to be elected at this Town meeting. Money to complete this work has been carried over from the appropriation of last year and an Article has been entered in the Warrant asking that the same Committee be allowed to complete the construction phases of the project.

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It is felt that many of the people of the Town who have not had the opportunity to contribute directly toward the volunteer efforts which went into the construcion of he pool, would have a keener sense of enjoyment in this new recreational area if they could have a part in the beautification of the surroundings. Toward this end, it is planned to have some work parties in the Spring, and invitations will be sent out in the hopes of getting a willing turnout.

During the year the Committee held 22 regular and 3 special meetings. In addition, special trips were made by various members to visit schools of men being considered for the position of Princpial of the Wachusett High School.

The major efforts of your committee were spent in making decisions on problems arising in regard to construction details and in making studies and selection of the many items of equipment necessary for operation of the school. \$77,000 worth of equipment has been ordered, including such items as laboratory equipment, tables, desks, chairs, auditorium and gymnasium seating.

The Committee completed the details of financing the new school by selling the balance of \$1,000,000 of bonds, the details of which are recorded in the report of the Treasurer.

The selection of a Principal involved interviewing 13 men and inspection of schools under the direction of the leading candidates before a final appointment was made. We were fortunate to be able to sign a contract with Gordon M. Thomas of Bennington, Vermont, who has an enviable record of accomplishments to his credit. He started work on the Wachusett High School Project September 1, 1953, and a report of his activities is included in this report.

Superintendents Buker and Fogg and Principal Thomas were most helpful to the Committee in assisting with details on such items as:

- 1. Salary schedules for teaching staff.
- 2. Operating rules and regulations for school administration.
- 3. Selection of equipment.
- 4. Establishment of a curriculum for the school.
- 5. Setting up an operating budget for 1954.
- 6. Appointment of members to the teaching staff. (Details included in Principal's report).

The Committee arrived at a decision in regard to acceptance of West Boylston High School pupils. It was agreed to accept approximately 150 students on a uniform basis for the school year 1954-1955, 1955-1956, 1956-1957.

Construction of the building is of major interest to all, and the status is best covered in the report of the Committee's Clerk of the Works, Colonel George Schumacher.

Construction Progess, 1953

During the year 1953 conditions, generally, were favorable for building construction. The material and equipment market was easy, transportation was uninterrupted, availability of labor near normal, and weather conditions better than average. Though the tornado of June 9, 1953, missed the school site completely, it caused temporary inconvenience in the delivery of material and the furnishing of services. One labor strike, that of the carpenters union from February 24th to May 18th, caused delay to phases of the work which required carpenters. However, construction progress during 1953 continued slowly and is approximately seven months behind schedule at the present time. The contract called for completion by November 13, 1953.

The exterior walls and the roof of the building have been substantially completed. Interior masonry partitions are in place in the Academic Section. Those in the Shops Section, in the boys' and girls' locker room area, in the Band area, Gymnasium area, and Auditorium, all in Units "C" and "D" are still under construction.

Interior finish at the close of the year had not progressed beyond the Academic Section of the building — Units "A" and "B." In these units over half of the plaster and acoustic tile work has been finished, all windows are in, and some trim and prime coating of paint have been applied. The tack and chalk boards are three-fourths complete. No doors have been hung and no finished floors have been laid. No cabinet work has been installed.

In Units "C" and "D", which include the Cafeteria, Kitchen, Auditorium, and Gymnasium, the general construction work is still in the "roughing in" stage. The Boiler Room is functioning but is not complete.

The work of the mechanical trades, i.e. Plumbing, Heating, and Electrical is progressing at approximately the same rate as the General Contract.

Some of the plumbing fixtures have been hung and are operating in units "A" and "B" where all of the plumbing roughing is substantially complete. Throughout Units "C" and "D" the roughing in of plumbing is still incomplete.

The Heating System, while still incomplete, has been operating since November in order to provide satisfactory working conditions for the Contractor. None of the permanent heating or ventilating units have been completed. The ventilating system, which is part of and operates in conjunction with the heating system, is not complete in any unit, and is not operating. Until such time as both the heating and ventilating systems are complete, the automatic regulating system will not be in operation. The heat now being delivered must therefore, be manually controlled with a consequent loss in efficiency and high fuel consumption.

The status of the electrical work is at approximately the same level as plumbing and heating. The permanent light and power lines, together with the transformers, conduits, switchboards, etc., have been substantially completed. Light and power wiring have been installed in Unit "A" and in parts of Units "B," "C," and "D". Permanent electric fixtures are being installed in the second floor rooms of Unit "A". None of the clock or signal systems have been completed, and the emergency generator set has not been received.

GRADING and MUNICIPAL WORK

The Grading and Paving work, under the Walter Reed Corporation Contract, progressed satisfactorily during the summer months. The rough grading was finished and the two entrance roads and parking lot were completed and paved The pond was dredged and the shore line trimmed in accordance with the plans.

The landscape contractor, the Eastern Tree & Landscape Co., of Dedham, Mass., graded and seeded the Athletic Field, the embankment along the south and west sides of the building, and the northerly slope from the Parking Lot to Highway 122A. They also planted trees and shrubbery

in the Interior Court, and areas adjacent to the Parking Lot. Much of the top soil and seed on slopes was washed away by heavy rains and will have to be re-worked in the spring. The Eastern Tree Co. had to suspend work for the season on December 9, 1953.

Water Line

The six-inch fire hydant line around the building has been completed with the exception of some back filling and the supplying of the hydrant wrenches.

Sewer Lines

The sanitary sewer lines from the building to the sewer main on Highway 122A have been installed and are functioning. They, like the water line, will not be completed until the back fill is finished.

Electric Lines

The electric service lines from Highway 122A to the terminal pole south of the building and installed by the Town of Holden, are complete and functioning.

Telephone Service

None has been provided to date. The Telephone Engineer made a survey of requirements in December 1953.

CONCLUSION

The Building Project proper, i.e., the J. W. Bishop contract was estimated to be 73% complete on December 31, 1953. This would make the average monthly progress for the past 20 months of operation of 3.65%. The highest progress so far estimated in any one month was 5%. Operations at present are proceeding with somewhat increased activity in an effort to complete the project early in the summer of 1954.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Rarely does one have the opportunity to participate in establishing a new type school. The Wachusett Regional High School is the first one of its kind in Massachusetts. The towns represented in this school are Holden, Paxton, Princeton, Rutland and Sterling.

During the year, my major activities, in conjunction with the Committee, have been:

Assistance to the Committee concerning State legislation applicable to regional schools.

Assistance in preparing rules and regulations pertaining to the management of the school.

Assistance in perparing specifications for equipment.

Assistance in financial matters, such as payrolls and the preparation of the 1954 budget.

Interviews for principal and recommendation for same.

Interviews with teachers, sixteen of whom the Committee has, to date, elected. These interviews were held in conjunction with the Assistant Superintendent and Principal.

Attendance at several regional school conferences held by interested groups in other towns.

Visits to more than twenty high schools in other states

During 1954, my duties will include ordering books and supplies, preparing payrolls and bills, interviewing and recommending the remaining personnel and assisting the Committee in whatever other assignments it may desire. The Principal will have supervision of the school personnel as stated in the Regulations of the Committee.

It has been a pleasure to have been associated with the Committee, Asst. Supt. Lawrence A. Fogg and Principal Gordon M. Thomas who has excellent qualifications for organizing the school.

May this first Regional High School in Massachusetts serve our youth efficiently and be a successful pattern for a broad, democratic education.

- 3. Setting up the daily program.
- 4. Seeing to it that textbooks and equipment are available for the operation of the school.
- 5. Seeing to it that school organization is ready for the opening in September 1954.

Report of the WACHUSET REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT COMMITTEE

REPORT OF THE TREASURER

FOR 1953

In the year 1953 the matter of completing the financing for the new Wachusett Regional School was one of outstanding importance to your committee. Late in 1952 interest rates on bond issues began to rise very noticeably and it was decided to hasten as much as possible the sale of the balance of \$1,000,000 of Wachusett Regional School District bonds, before prevailing rates became unreasonably high.

Accordingly, \$1,000,000 in coupon bonds, dated February 15, 1953 and maturing \$50,000 annually over a period of twenty years, were sold to the highest bidders, The First Boston Corporation and Hornblower and Weeks at \$100.349 for a 2.60% coupon rate. The indicated premium made the net rate approximately 2.57%. While the coupon rate of 2.60% seemed to the committee rather high at that time, we were assured that it was quite in line with the current market and it was therefore accepted. Later events proved that hastening the offer of these bonds was wise in that interest rates continued to rise during the next few months. It is therefore felt by the committee that the overall financing of the school was entirely satisfactory.

In order that the complete picture may be seen at a glance the three stages of financing are here tabulated.

The first issue of \$100,000 was sold to W. E. Hutton & Co., while the two later issues were purchased by The First Boston Corporation and Hornblower and Weeks.

From these figures it will be noted that the weighted average of the coupon rates is 2.18% and the net interest rate is 2.15%, well within the 2.25% top rate as presented to the towns of the district when final approval of the school was voted.

The fact that some of our 1953 bond service requirements became payable prior to the receipt of sufficient funds from the member towns made necessary our first borrowing in anticipation of current revenues. This was in the form of a note dated May 22, 1953 in the amount of 338,000 sold to the Mechanics National Bank of Worcester at a discount of 1.21%. The note became payable November 18 and was paid when due.

During the latter part of 1952 the District committee believed there was a possibility of making use of the academic portion of the new building in September of 1953 and an operating budget for four months of 1953 was assessed upon the towns of the district. When a further survey proved this impossible the major portion of this part of the budget was withdrawn before the budgets of the member towns were voted. It is now the definite plan to open the new school in September of 1954 and the new budget therefore includes. in addition to the necessary bond service requirements, full operating expenses for four months of the year, together with partial custodial expense and other items incident to the opening of a new building for a longer period. In accordance with this plan your committee voted on November 23, 1953 to appropriate a 1954 budget totaling \$325.258.50 as follows:

Of these amounts, item No. 1 thru No. 5 totaling \$141,621 constitute expenses of operation. Anticipated receipts for tuition will approximate \$19,000, leaving a balance of \$122,621 to be assessed for these items in proportion to the high school enrollment of the member towns as of October 1, 1953 as follows:

Item No. 6, covering debt and interest charges, is assessed according to precentages layed down in the District agreement. The appropriation includes \$130,000 for bond maturities and \$53,637.50 for interest. As an offset to this total of \$183,637,50, however, there are certain credits including \$81,815 fom 1954 state reimbursement, a balance of \$41,815 from the 1953 state reimbursement, \$20,139 earned in the investment of our funds in Treasury Bills and the premium of \$3,490 on our February sale of \$1,000,000 in bonds. These credits total \$147,259, leaving a balance of \$36,378.50 to be raised by assessment as follows:

This year on December 23, we reached a peak demand of 600 Kilowatt at 5:45 P.M. and with a total Kilowatt hour consumption of 202,800 Kilowatt hours for the month of December, an all time high.

Report of the PLANNING BOARD

January 27, 1954

At the Town meeting last year, one thousand dollars was appropriated to hire an engineer to draw up plans for a combination town building and garage and to recommend sites for this building. It was the opinion of the board that the Illig property was the location for a combination building and that the site on Water Department land on Holden Road was the best location for just a garage.

The board then retained Mr. Frederick H. Gagnon as architect to draw up a sketch for a combination garage and town building. This sketch was submitted at a special Town meeting in June 1953, at which time the town voted to build a garage on the Water Department land, instead of a combination town building and garage. The architect, Mr. Gagnon, has assured us that at any future date the town wishes to retain him to finish the plans for this building or to make plans for a new building, he would credit us with the five-hundred dollars we have paid him.

During the past year the Planning Board has approved two Sub-divisions with a total of thirty-three house lots.

We are still working on an over-all map of the town.

Report of the SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The School Committee submits the following pages of reports covering the many activities of the School Department. Increasing school enrollment will bring about many new problems during the next few years and it is hoped that each voter with study these reports in order to be familiar with these problems.

The Wachusett Regional High School will open this Fall and Paxton pupils will, for the first time in history participate in a High School which truly "belongs to them." Those pupils at present enrolled in Worcester High Schools will be allowed to continue if they wish. Those who would like to transfer to the Wachusett school may do so and it is hoped that some will make this choice. In the future, all pupils graduating from Center School in Paxton will be expected to enter Wachusett school unless they choose to go to a Trade or private school. The Town will continue to provide tuition and transportation to Trade schools as provided by law.

The enrollment in Center school has now reached a total of 193 pupils as compared to 159 a year ago, and in contrast to 82 in 1944. Indications are that this growth will continue for some time with a predicted enrollment of close to 300 by 1960. We are now operating with eight teachers in eight rooms and have no additional classrooms in which to expand. One grade already has near the maximum number of pupils for efficient operation. We now have no assembly room, the recreational facilities are inadequate, and the total enrollment is such that a lunch program could be handled with economy.

The time has now come when the Town should undertake the task of making the necessary studies and plans required to meet these expanding needs at the proper time. We have been very fortunate in having more than enough classrooms since the size of the school was doubled in 1929. However, many of the classrooms will be overcrowded within three years. The School Committee has already held two meetings with the School Building Assistance Commission, a State Commission, and they have begun to help us in working out our future needs. This Commission is in a position to render a very considerable amount of help at no cost to the Town. However, it is vitally important that a number of the people of the Town assist in the working out of the solutions to the many problems involved. An Article has been placed in the Warrant asking for the appointment of a School Building Committee.

One of the problems which continually faces the School Committee is that of providing safe and adequate transportation. It is the intention of the Committee to continue to increase the transportation facilities to meet growing population and increasing traffic hazards.

The Committee wishes to express its appreciation to all of those who are helping out in these changing and difficult times.

Report of the SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of Paxton:

The following is the fifty-fourth annual Superintendent's report in the series and my sixth.

In presenting this report I shall endeavor to mention the most important educational events of the year and recommend the future needs of the school.

In September we increased our teaching staff to eight, thus providing a teacher for each grade. This will give the pupils ,a far better type of instruction. The staff is an experienced group, having an average of sixteen years experience. Experienced teachers are an asset to any school system. It is hoped that we may retain the present staff for some time.

The average salary of the Paxton teachers is \$2,862.00. Residing near a large city and several communities it behooves Paxton to raise this amount in the coming year.

In October the California Achievement Tests were given to Grades IV, VI and VIII. The results were very satisfactory in English.

The teachers make use of these standardized tests by giving additional instruction to those who are below the norms in their subjects. These tests are given to thousands of pupils in the country, thereby establishing a fairly good sampling of what is taking place in similar schools.

The increased enrollment and an anticipated increase for several years means that additional school facilities will be needed in the very near future. Also we shall be giving our pupils further educational advantages. We do not have any room for industrial arts, home economics, physical education, a school lunch program or a kindergarten room. It seems to me that a committee, in conjunction with the school officials should be appointed at the coming town meeting to study and recommend to the town the future physical needs of the school.

Beginning September 1954, the amount Paxton is now paying for tuition will become a part of the Wachusett Regional High School budget.

Pupil enrollmnet at the Center School continues to increase and is currently 18% above registration for last year. Also, attendance has improved slightly over the previous year.

In October, standardized achievement tests were administered in grades 4, 6 and 8. The scores revealed that Grade 4 is .5 above grade level; Grade 6 is .3 above grade level and Grade 8 is .5 of a year above the norms for grade level. These results indicate that the school is serving its pupils favorably. However, adjustments must be made in Reading Comprehension and certain Arithmetic Fundamentals in order to meet the needs of the children better.

The School continues to offer a weekly defense savings stamp day and many youngsters are participating in this thrift experience. Savings that many parents could realize are those that result from the school being a member of the National School Lunch Program. During the period December 1, 1952 to November 30, 1953, 11,553 half pints of milk were sold. The United States Department of Agriculture provided a reimbursement of \$231.06 which permitted the sale of milk at a rate of 4 cents per bottle or about 16 cents a quart.

The addition of the new room and the hiring of one teacher per grade has enabled the teachers to better meet the problems associated with the instruction of pupils.

The parents and School Committee, have been very willing and interested in contributing to the constant improvement of the Center School. This spirit of friendly cooperativeness has been appreciated by the entire school staff.

Dr. Leroy E. Mayo, the school physician reports that the annual physical examinations have been completed and immunization clinics were conducted using Diphtheria and Tetanus Toxoid provided by the State. This coming spring further clinics are being planned.

Mrs. Brenda T. Sullivan, the school nurse, reports that sixty-three pupils were innoculated against diphtheria. A pre-school clinic was held with the parents present. The annual vision tests were given and many defects have been corrected.

The nurse reports that all contagious diseases must be reported to the Board of Health. Certificates must be secured from the family physician or Board of Health before pupils who have had a contagious disease can return to school. Parents are urged to keep children home, who have beginning colds or early signs of illness.

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health has established a regulation whereby the child shall be examined by a physician six months before entering school or during the first year after entrance and at intervals of three or four years. The nurse has weighed and measured two hundred and forty, given first aid to thirty-one, made twenty-eight field visits, one hundred twenty vision tests, ninety-four physical examinations, excluded eight and assisted four who are physically handicapped.

The music supervisor, Miss Ruth Innes, reports that rote and reading music has been provided. Favorite songs from the classics, romantic and contemporary composers have been taught. The Glee Club and Orchestra will be ready to perform at the Graduation Program.

Gregory F. Bowes, Supervisor of Art, reports that the policy of self expression and experimentation have been encouraged. In the upper grades such varied activities as murals, stained glass windows and three dimensional paper sculpture projects have been carried on, as well as consideration of figures in action, seasonal projects, color theory and practice in using water colors, poster paints and crayons.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all for assistance received in conducting the school for the past year. May 1954 be a greater educational year for the children and young people of Paxton.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and the committees and act thereon, and to act upon recommendations contained in said reports and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required in accordance with said reports or otherwise, or act in any way thereon.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (see budget) with which to pay the proper charges of a Surety Company for acting as surety on bonds required of Town Officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1954, and to issue a note or notes of the Town therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes of the Town as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, of the General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to appoint the American Legion as a committee to have charge of the observance of Memorial Day, or act in any way thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to give the members of the Fire Department compensation for their services, or act in any way thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the money received from the Dog Fund to the Richards Memorial Library, or act in any way thereon. Article 8. To see if the town will vote to transfer \$300.00 from the "Illig Fund" to the "Illig Property Maintenance Fund," the same to be used to pay taxes and make necessary repairs, or act in any way thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as presented by the Selectmen, or act in any way thereon.

Article 11. To see that there be included in the tax levy for electricity, a sum to be used for street lights and that this sum and the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or for municipal power, and from sales of appliances and jobbing during the current fiscal year, be appropriated for Municipal Light Plants, the whole to be expended by the manager of the Municipal Light Plant under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for the current fiscal year, as defined in Section 57. Chapter 164, of the General Laws and Chapter 235 of the Acts of 1937, and that if this sum and this income shall exceed the expense for said fiscal year, such excess shall be transferred to the construction fund of said Plant and appropriated and used for such additions thereto as may thereafter be authorized by the Municipal Light Board.

Aticle 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to provide vacation and sick leave pay to employees of the Highway and Water Departments as follows: "After having worked for the town one full year, one week vacation with pay and one week sick leave with pay; after having worked for the town two full years, two weeks vacation with pay and one week sick leave with pay. After having worked for the town for one full year, the Superintendent to receive two weeks vacation with pay, and one week sick leave, and after two years, three weeks vacation with pay and one week sick leave; sick leave may be accrued up to two weeks only."

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to cover the town's share of the cost of construction on West St., under Chapter 90 and that in addition the sum of \$9,000.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the Treasury to cover the State and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the Treasury, or act in any way thereon. Article 17. To see if the town will vote to transfer from surplus, an amount equal to the receipts of the Water Dept. for 1953 to the account of the Water Dept., or act in way thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purpose of increasing the Salaries of the Selectmen or act in any way thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of increasing the salaries of the Fire Dept. Engineers, or act in any way thereon.

Article 20. Thence S. 8 18' 40" W. by land of the said Town of Paxton three hundred eighty-eight and six hundredths (388.06) feet to a stake on the northerly line of Holden Road; Thence by a curve to the right with a radius of seven hundred seventy (770) feet by said northerly line of Holden Road one hundred thirty - five and seventy hundredths (135.70) feet to the place of beginning.

Containing 2.28 acres, more or less."

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to rescind the amount of \$5,000.00 from the loan authorized by a vote passed under Article 4 of the Special Town Meeting of June 12, 1953, or act in any way thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of surveying the Town property at Davis and Pleasant Sts., or act in any way thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the accumulated income, including the income for 1954, on the C. D. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to obtain exact figures on the possible sale of the Electric Light Plant to the Worcester County Electric Co., in order to determine if such sale would be to the benefit of the town, or act in any way thereon.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to extend the water main on Grove street 475 feet on the northerly end said extension completing the Grove St. by-pass and cost approximately \$2,200.00. The remaining \$2,300.00 to be used to extend water main 500 feet along the Barre Road, or act in any way thereon. Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of installing water main on Indian Hill Road, or act in any way thereon.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Water Commissioners and the Selectmen to sign, seal and deliver, an agreement with the City of Worcester, to limit and set the rate of damages to be paid as a result of any water diverted by the Town of Paxton from Asnebumskit Brook, or act in any way thereon.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for water diversion account, or act in any way thereon.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the purpose of surfacing the streets, that have been made public by the Town, with tar, or act in any way thereon.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the School Committee to jointly appoint a "School Planning and Building Committee" for the purpose of making studies and recommendations relative to expansion of facilities at the Center School, or act in any way thereon.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be used by the "School Building and Planning Committee" in carrying out the necessary work in connection with studies of the facilities of the Center School, or act in any way thereon.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the present "Swimming Pool Construction Committee" to continue the work involved in the completion of the pool and surrounding areas as outlined in the report of the Committee, or act in any way thereon.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Swimming Pool Activities for 1954, or act in any way thereon. Article 37. To see if the town will vote to amend Section IV, paragraph 8, of the town By-Laws, by adding the following to be known as sub-section 6:

"Home occupations carried on in the residence of the occupant and not in an accessory building, provided that not more than one-half the floor area of such residence shall be devoted to such uses."

or act in any way thereon.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to accept the laying out of Meadowbrook Drive, from its present terminus 300 ft. to Briarcliff Lane, by the Selectmen under date of February 11, 1954, as delineated on a Plan, designated; Mountain View, Section B, dated November 25, 1953, drawn by P. R. Grout, R.P.E., or act in any way thereon.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1.00 to purchase a deed or acquire by right of eminent domain an easement for public way purposes in Meadowbrook Drive, or act in any way thereon.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase or acquire by right of eminent domain from Franklin G. Fleming, Jr., an easement for public way purposes in Meadowbrook Drive being a way 50 feet wide extending southerly from its present terminus 300 feet to Briarcliff Lane as shown on a plan of land designated; Mountain View, Section B, dated November 25, 1953, drawn by P. R. Grout, R.P.E., or act in any way thereon.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the laying out of Briarcliff Lane by the Selectmen as shown on a plan designated; Mountain View, Section B, or act in any way thereon

Article 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1.00 for the purpose of acquiring by purchase or taking by right of eminent domain an easement for public way purposes in Briarcliff Lane, or act in any way thereon.

Article 43. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to acquire by purchase or by right of eminent domain an easement from Franklin G. Fleming, Jr., for public way purposes in Briarcliff Lane, being a way 50 feet wide extending easterly from Pleasant St. and shown on a plan designated; Mountain View, Section B, dated Nov. 25, 1953, drawn by P. R. Grout, P.R.E., or act in any way thereon.

Article 44. To see if the town will vote to accept the laying out of Crestwood Road, Pinewood Road, and Oakwood Road by the Selectmen under date of February 11, 1954, as shown on a plan designated; Asknebumskit Hill Homesites, dated Sept. 21, 1953, drawn by Francis B. Thompson, C.E., or act in any way thereon.

Article 45. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3.00 for the purpose of acquiring by purchase or taking by right of eminent domain easements for public way purposes in Crestwood Road, Pinewood Road, and Oakwood Road, or act in any way thereon.

Article 46. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to acquire by purchase or by right of eminent domain easements from Clarkson-Giffin Realty Corp. for public way purposes in Crestwood Road being a way 50 feet wide extending 950 feet southeasterly from Asknebumskit Road; Pinewood Road being a way 50 feet wide and extending 200 feet between Ridgewood Road and Crestwood Road: Oakwood Road being a way 50 feet wide extending 200 feet between Ridgewood Road and Crestwood Road; as shown on a plan designated; Asknebumskit Hill Homesites, dated Sept. 21, 1953, drawn by Francis B. Thompson, C.E., or act in any way thereon.
