# REPORT OF VOTING AT ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 7, 1955

ARTICLE 1. Election of Officers.

ARTICLE 2. Acceptance of reports of Town Officers and acceptance of the budget as presented by the Finance Committee with changes made from the floor.

The following action was taken under this Article.

Voted to increase the salaries of the Board of Registrars to \$35.00 per year per member. Article 20.

Voted to increase the salaries of the Board of Health to \$50.00 per year per member. Article 19.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,900.00 to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Maintainence. Article 14.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 to meet the town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 highway maintenance. Article 15.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to meet the town's share of the cost of construction on Rockland Street. Article 16.

Voted to transfer the sum of \$2,355.10 from Highway Equipment Fund to Highway Equipment Maintainence Fund. Article 13.

Voted to reduce the amount to be appropriated under Snow Removal to 5,500.00.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for vacation pay for employees of the Highway and Water Department. Article 12.

Voted to install street lights on Spring Drive at Mower Street, Pleasant Street at Briarcliff Lane, and Marshall Street; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,645.65 to cover the operating expenses of street lights. Article 10.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to increase the salaries of the School Committee. Article 21.

Voted to continue the present "School Planning and Building Committee" and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for their purpose. Article 23.

Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,800.00 for insurance and bonds for Town Officers.

## REPORT of the RECREATION BOARD

This Committee, now in its second year, reports the following:

The general spring clean-up day was organized with volunteer help. It was very successful.

Mr. Philip Ryan was again life guard for the 1955 season.

The ten Red Cross swimming lessons, with two instructors provided, was better than ever with a total attendance of 110, 47 of these received Red Cross certificates in their various groups. The Town should also know that the Red Cross gave a life preserver to be used at the pool.

There was a weekly test of the water, this made possible through our agreement with Dr. Alexander Witkow, Director of Public Health in Worcester. The dam at Illig Pond which washed out in 1954 was replaced during the summer months. During the August floods there was considerable damage which will have to be taken care of and sand replaced.

Once again during the year there was a discouraging note. This time in the form of malicious destruction. Spot-lights were broken and glass thrown in the pool and quantities of it in the sand. Burning of the shed was attempted and tools and first aid equipment scattered about.

The following equipment has been purchased for the coming season:

Also during the year we met with the Planning Board and it was agreed to have a representative from the National Recreation Association come to Paxton to aid us in plans for the future. This is something that will take time and thought and money but over a ten year period it is hoped that many recreation plans can be carried out.

During the year the Committee held 22 regular meetings and three special meetings.

The growth of the School, as a unit, was noted during the year.

The curriculum, and extra curricular activities, were expanded to offer more varied opportunities as noted in the Principal's report. The Athletic teams have begun to make a name for themselves; helping to build the unity and spirit of the School.

The School plant has been completed and the construction accounts paid. The building was accepted, and final reimbursement figures submitted to the State. The cornorstone was also officially laid, with records being placed therein.

Original development work on the athletic field was completed with the installation of drainage tile, the building of a baseball diamond, the erection of a baseball backstop and fence, and the installation of both portable and permanent bleachers.

Other Committee action included work on revision to the teachers' salary schedule, policy on the duties of various groups working at the Shcool (i.e. teachers, custodians, and cafeteria staff), policy with regard to awards being given at the School, and policy with regard to the use of the School for the Adult Education classes.

The usual functions of budget formulation and approval of expenses, and new teachers, was carried out.

With an increased budget for 1956 the tuition rate was increased from \$380.00 to \$390.00 effective January 1, 1956.

Due to the problem of increased enrollment over and above the number originally anticipated, the Committee decided to start work on planning future building end expansion. As our towns grow and develop, their schools must keep pace. By the time additional space can be planned, approved and built facilities for an anticipated 50% greater enrollment will be needed.

The school was accepted as a member of the New England. Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools which is a group dedicated to the up-grading of school systems. It is independent of public funds.

The Committee appreciates the cooperation of the School Adminstrators, staff, pupils and parents in making ours a better High School.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the members of the Wachusett Regional School District:

I will present this report in a very brief form. The major activities were:

- 1. Served as an Educational Advisor on the General and Sub-Committees.
- 2. Prepared, in the Superintendent's Office, all the requisitions, bills, payrolls, and balance sheets, and state reports.
  - 3. Interviewed and recommended all beginning personnel.
  - 4. Carried on research for the Committee.
- Assisted the Adult, Agricultural and Household Advisory Committees.

The Adult Evening School has been offered to over 240 persons. It has been under the direction of Mr. David Eaton and an Advisory Committee appointed for that purpose. Mrs. Avis Bourne, a member of the Committee, has been active in formulating the activities of the School.

- 6. The layout of the Corner Stone was one of the major events of the year. Mr. George Lyman, Chairman of the Committee, gave the address for the event. The Superintendent assisted the Committee in preparing the contents which were placed in the sealed box.
  - 7. Supervised the advertising of all bids.
- 8. Had conferences with visiting groups pertaining to the Regional School, and made several addresses on educational subjects.

- 9. Arranged a program, in September, for the teachers of the High School, and the teachers of Union No. 26. Mr. George Lyman, Chairman of the Committee, and Mr. M. Lawrence Price were lay speakers.
- 10. Conferences with the Principal, Gordon M. Thomas, Area Chairman were numerous.

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

There is a staff of fifty instructors, Principal, Gordon M. Thomas, Assistant Principal, Charles Johnson, a Guidance Director, a nurse, a librarian, two secretaries in the Principal's office, one in the Guidance office, and by January 1st, 1956, there will be a full-time secretary in the Superintendent's office. There are also seven custodians and nine cafeteria workers.

Several members of the staff have attended conferences outside the area. These provesional meetings tend to raise the academic standards of the School.

The salary schedule has been changed. The schedule now ranges from \$3,250 — \$4,900 for a Bachelor's degree, and from \$3,450 — \$5,100 for a Master's degree. The Committee will, in three years, place all teachers on the schedule based on training and experience.

Several groups, closely related to education, have met in the School. Such groups aid the Committee, endirectly, in many ways.

An addition to the present building will be needed not later than 1958. The enrollment in September, 1958 will be about 1,100. The Committee has asigned \$3,000 for a study of this problem.

The teacher shortage is handycapping the School. It is very difficult to get Science and Language instructors. This situation is likely to continue for several years.

The social gatherings for the teachers and administrators have been very beneficial for all concerned.

#### MAJOR ACTIVITIES FOR 1956

- 1. Repairs and replacements.
- 2. A study of increased School facilities.
- 3. A study of salary schedules.
- 4. Printing Adminstrative Regulations
- 5. Visiting to other Schools.
- 6. Preparing of agenda for Committee meetings.
- 7. Conferences with Principals, Custodians, and Teachers.

The activities for 1955 could not have been accomplished without the co-operation of the Committee, its Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer, and Mrs. Lios Drawbridge, a most efficient Secretary in the Superintendent's office. It is this type of organization that makes a school system run smoothly.

## WACHUSETT REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To Superintendent William H. Buker and the members of the Wachusett Regional School District Committee:

My third annual report is herewith submitted.

#### ENROLLMENT

In only its second year of operation, the school finds itself at almost its rated capacity of 900 wih 888 students enrolled as of December 23, 1955, distributed as follows:

Of these, 89 are taking Vocational Homemaking and Agriculture. Even without any incoming freshmen from West Boylston in 1956, preliminary enrollment figures indicate that there will be about 1,000 pupils in the fall of 1956, or about an 11% overload. Ten teachers were added to the staff for 1955-56, and additional teachers will be needed for 1956-57.

#### Curriculum

Any school whose curriculum remains exactly the same for very long relatively loses ground, because the world around it

constantly changes, and the school must adapt itself to those changes in certain ways. New courses that have been added this year are as follows: Modern History (including Asia and South America), Science 12 (for general students — it includes Photography, Astronomy, and Greenhouse), General Math II (for seniors), Practical Geometry (for sophomores), Spanish II, Bookkeeping II, Home Management (for juniors), and semester courses in Speech and Drama.

In Industrial Arts, as students become more skilled, a greater variety of courses is offered. Currently, these courses are being offered: Grade 9, study of use of wood and sheet metal as materials, and the making of them into projects with hand tools; Grade 10, use and operation of woodworking machinery, (both on an individual and a production line basis) plus power machanics; Grade 11, pattern making, foundry, machine shop, welding, heat treatment, working primarily with steel; Grade 12, structures (full or scale models) plus special work in an area of the student's choice. This fall, the boys in Industrial Arts under the supervision of Mr. Norman Rayner and Mr. Peter Houmere, built two ticket booths for use on the Athletic Field.

Because the Driver Education program is to teach people to drive, future enrollment in this course will be limited to students who have not yet received their licenses.

#### Activities

The growth of that part of the curriculm dealing with the socalled "activities" has also been steady. In addition to interscholastic athletics, a program of intra-mural competitive sport has been established whereby students can compete under desirable game conditions against other of approximately equal development and ability. The Boys' and Girls' Intra-Mural Clubs, each numbering over a hundred, sponsor these activities under the direction of the Physical Education Instructors. The "Pep Squad" is the heart of the cheering section at inter-scholastic games. In the Music area, under the direction of Mr. Barre, the school band now numbers 43, with a "junior band" of about 30. Two choruses, one for grade 9 and one for grades 10, 11, and 12 number about 100 each. Among the newly-formed clubs is the Science Club under the direction of Mr. Francis Carbone and Mr. Norman Mills. It is divided into two groups — one for Chemistry, and one for Biology. This organization will again sponsor a Science Exhibit in the spring. The addition of a Future Teachers Club under the direction of Mrs. Frances Creamer, is aimed at encouraging those who have the interest and ability to enter teaching. Perhaps the most important organization to get started this year is the Student Council. Last Spring after months of study and discussion, a temporary committee of students presented proposals for a Student Council Constitution to the whole school. This fall the Student Council Members were elected and the Council has already begun to take an active part in the life of the school. One thing they have done is to set up a monitor system to facilitate traffic flow between periods. The Student Council also determines the allocation of school parties and dances to various organizations, as well as taking charge of the luncheon period, recreation programs. Thirty members of the Vocational Agriculture classes belong to the Future Farmers of America, the Wachusett Chapter of which received ots charter from the State F.F.A. in the spring of 1955. Regular meetings are held throughout the year, as well as the many special events sponsored by the group. Other new activities this year are the Library Club under the direction of Miss Ada Carlson, and the Latin Club under the direction of Mr. Ernest Frechette.

Athletic Field

During the year much work has been done on the athletic field. Permanent bleachers seating 800 have been added on the western slope, and temporary bleachers for about 500—600 are available for occasional use. The baseball infield has been completed with home plate located in the northeast corner, and a baseball backstop and fence have been built from the northeast corner to the ramp leading from the gymnasium. Drainage lines were laid all around the field and several lateral drains were also installed.

## Late Study Hall

The institution of a supervised room for study has not only made a suitable place in the building available to all students until 5 o'clock, but also has made it possible for students to use time that might otherwise be wasted. Arrangements were completed through the cooperation of the Faculty and the Teachers Association.

#### Class of 1955

The first graduating class from Massachusetts' first regional high school numbered 138. The best information available on these students as of December, 1955, is as follows:

We have had a busy and successful year despite the expensive ice storm trouble of March 21, 22, 23, which cost the Department \$1,984.11.

The Department installed two 25 Kilowatt Transformers near the home of Thomas Harney, Jr. 470 Pleasant Street giving the system beyond this point a 5% permanent boost in voltage thereby giving us improvement in the use of our substation regulations at our city line substation and improve the voltage conditions in general over the town.

We have installed 56 new meters this year expanding our primary and secondary systems in the amount as follows:—

Poles, Fixtures and Overhead Conductors	5,139 22
Consumers Meters	987 14
New Transformers	1,273 19
Street Light Equipment	615 41

We have added one pole on Centeral Avenue, one pole on Birch Street, two poles on Briarcliff Road, four poles on Elizabeth Road, and five poles on Orchard Drive.

On December 20th, we reached a peak of 794.4 Kilowatt demand on our system at 5:45 P.M. or about 12% above last year without WWOR TV Station load of 33 Kilowatt. Our Kilowatt hour consumption for December was 247,200 Kilowatt about 5% increase without the TV Station load.

The Fire Department answered 37 calls for service the same number as in 1954. Again these were not all for fires. They are as follows:

On the night of March 22, members of the Department remained on duty all night at the Fire Station because of the power failure caused by a severe ice storm. During this ice storm the Department answered a call to Mr. Bolton's house on Streeter Road.

On March 27, the Fire Department portable lighting system was set up for temporary lighting at the Town Hall for a banquet in case of a power failure.

On March 10, Herbert Wentworth, a member of the Fire Department discovered a situation and corrected same that could have caused a serious fire at the Paxton Inn.

After the flood last August, members of the Department totaled approximately 200 hours pumping out cellars.

The Department purchased a new portable forest fire pump.

Engine No. 1 was painted and the pump overhauled.

New fire alarm boxes have been installed and both sirens connected to these boxes so that they operate the sirens simultaneously.

One of the new 2-way mobile radio sets was installed in Engine No. 2 and has proven very satisfactory.

Six more men obtained badges by completing the instruction courses given during the summer months.

#### REPORTS of the PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board has now been a member of the Town Government for thirty-three years. In that time the Town facilities have increased tremendously. The changes consist of hard roads, electric lights completely covering the town and now a new school is under way. Future planning is extremely important and this is the duty of the Town Planning Board.

We must realize that this Town has grown 100% in less than ten years and the time has now arrived when a Capital Outlay Program must be made to insure our future financial stability.

The Board met on the average of two meetings a month and sometimes more. Few people realize that all deeds to be recorded must be passed by the Planning Board and all changes and proposals for developments must be studied by the Board. To all the new citizens of our Town it must be realized that as a small Town we were self sufficient for eight-hundred people, but now we are at that point where we are too small to be big and too big to be small, so we must plan and build for the future to make this a good Town to live in for all of us.

The Planning Board is considering the following projects for the coming year:

- 1. Business zoning established
- 2. Street numbering
- 3. Capitol Outlay Program
- 4. Consideration of recreational facilities
- 5. Continued organization of maps to get and up-to-date complete layout.

We have approved fourteen building lots on Orchard Drive and five lots on Briarcliff Lane.

#### REPORTS of the SUPERINTENDENT of SCHOOL

To the School Committee and Citizens of Paxton:

This is the fifty-sixth annual superintendent's report in the

series, and my eighth.

Chester O. Gay resigned as Principal and teacher of Grade 8 to accept a position elsewhere in the State. Ralph D. Huggett was elected as Principal and teacher of Grade 7. Mr. William D. Mullaney, Jr. was elected to teach Grade 8. There were no other changes in the staff of regular teachers. Miss Ruth S. Innes, Supervisor of Music, was granted a leave of absence to broaden her experiences by taking advantage of an opportunity to teach

music in France. Arnold M. Repucci was elected to take over the music during Miss Innes' absence. Mrs. Dorothea S. Roth resigned from the position of Art Supervisor and Lawrence J. Lesser was elected.

Mr. Huggett, Principal, has reported the following:

"The Center School is continuing its thrift program for pupils. A school magazine, basketball, and baseball are included in the extra-curricular activities. Basketball is restricted to games with the Rutland Center School and intramural contests. Baseball includes a program with teams drawn from Grades 3, 4, and 5 to a Junior League and Grades 6, 7, and 8 to form a Senior League. A similar program is being planned for the girls.

The School Lunch Program has been reimbursed \$406.36 this past year. Milk sales were 16,831 half-pint bottles, and increase of 2,650 bottles over 1954.

The Parent-Teacher Association has continued its interest as evidenced by the attendance at the meetings and the carefully-planned programs. We look forward to a continuation of the relatonship in 1956."

Mrs. Brenda T. Sullivan, School Nurse, reports the following:

"Dr. Washburn completed the annual fall examinations in Grades 1, 4, and 7. Three diptheria and tetanus clinics were held and clinic for poliomyelitis was cancelled."

The total school enrollment was 240 pupils, an increase over 1954 of approximately 12%. The estimated enrollment for September 1956 is 260.

There are 184 pupils transported daily to the Center School and 62 are transported to secondary schools. The transportation route has been extended in the southern part of town. Pupils in Grades 1 and 2 are dismissed and taken home before the sessions close for the other grades.

The Committee voted to add a remedial teacher to the staff. Mrs. Lorraine Ream has been appointed and will begin her work in January 1956. A remedial teacher works with children who need extra help in their school subjects.

The teachers of Union No. 26 recommended, and the administration approved, a new report card designed to show the parent the accomplishment and also the effort put forth by the pupil.

"Workshop" meetings were held this past year. Teachers in the same grades met for a full day with other teachers in the Union and discussed the curriculum. These meetings have been very successful.

The Union Committee voted to secure new offices for the Superintendent. In January, 1956, the office will be located at 1204 Main Street, Holden.

A building committee has been appointed and an architect engaged for the new school recently voted. This will relieve the congestion in the present school, especially in the lower grades.

I enjoy the privilege of serving as a delegate to the White House Conference. I hope to utilize the ideas and psychology of thinking in the guidance of the schools in this area.

In looking back seven years, one who has been a part of the system cannot fail to note the physical changes which have taken place in the equipment, textbooks and supplies, and in the standards which have been attained. This progress would not be possible without the support and the cooperation of the people of Paxton. Your school committee members have been very alert in recognizing and promoting school needs.

The privilege of working with the people of Paxton has added another plesant year to my career in the field of education.

To any of the Constables of the Town of Paxton:

#### GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, who are qualified to vote in Town Affairs, to meet in "Allen Hall" on Monday the 5th day of March, 1956, at 12:00 noon, then and there to act upon the following article:

ARTICLE 1. To bring to the Election Officiers their votes for Town Officers to be voted for upon the official ballot as follows:

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls will be open from 12:00 noon until 8:00 P.M.

The Business Meeting will be called to order at 7:30 P.M.

The voters will be called to act upon the following articles at the Business Meeting:

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the items of the Budget as presented by the Finance Committee and to act upon said items and raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required under said items and to hear any other necessary reports of Town Officers, or act in any way thereon.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (see budget) with which to pay the proper

charges of a Surety Company for acting as surety on bonds required of Town Officers and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same.

- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1956, and to issue a note or notes of the Town therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes of the Town as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, of the General Laws.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to appoint the American Legion as a committee to have charge of the observance of Memorial Day, or act in any way thereon.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to give the members of the Fire Department compensation for their services, or act in any way thereon.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the money areceived from the Dog Fund to the Richards Memorial Library, or act in any way thereon.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$300.00 from the "Illiig Fund" to the "Illig Property Maintence Fund," the same to be used to pay taxes and make necessary repairs, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as presented by the Selectmen, or act in any way thereon.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote that the money voted for street lights and the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or for municipal power, and from sales of appliances and jobbing during the current fiscal year, be appropriated for the Municipal Light Plant, the whole to be expended by the manager of the Municipal Light Plant under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for the current fiscal year, as defined in Section 57, Chapter 164, of the General Laws and Chapter 235 of the Acts of 1937, and that if this income shall exceed the expense for said fiscal year, such excess shall be transferred to the construction fund of said Plant and appropriated and used for such additions thereto as may be thereafter authorized by the Municipal Light Board.
- ARTILCE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to provide vacation and sick leave pay to employees of the Highway and Water Departments as follows:

"Aftr having worked for the Town one full year, one week vacation with pay and one week sick leave with pay, after having worked for the Town two full years, two weeks vacation with pay

and one week sick leave with pay. After having worked for the Town one full year, the Superintendent to receive two weeks vacation with pay, and one week sick leave, and after two years, three weeks vacation with pay, and one week sick leave with pay, sick leave may accure up to two weeks only."

or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$2,287.05 from Highway Equipment Fund to the Highway Equipment Maintainence Fund to be used to furnish supplies and maintain the town's highway equipment or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with the State to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,900.00 to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highway Maintainence and that in addition the sum of \$7,975.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored upon their receipt, to unappropriated funds in the Treasury.

ARTIC E 14. To see i fthe Town will vote to cooperate with the State and County to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 to cover the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintainence and that in addition the sum of \$3,200.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State and County share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to cover the Town's share of the cost of construction of West Street, under Chapter 90 and that in addition the sum of \$12,000.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to cover the State and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to extend the water main on Plesant Street towards Barre, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the amount requested for the Water Department Budget from surplus to the Water Department Account, or act in any way thereon.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to install 4 new hydrants, one on each of the following streets:

Orchard Drive Pinewood Road Elizabeth Lane Rockland Road

at a cost of \$275.00 per hydrant and raise and appropriate \$1,100.00 for the above purpose, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of increasing the salaries of the Board of Water Commissioners, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 20 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$101.96 to cover an overdraft in the Fire Department, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing and installing a mobile 2-way radio unit in the Fire Department Engine No. 1 the same to be purchased under Federal Civil Defense matching Funds, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing a generator to be used for Civil Defense purposes, the same to be purchased Federal Civil Defense Matching Funds or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Civil Defense purposes, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote that persons elected as the Recreation Commissioner shall constitute a Board of Park Commissioners, or act in any thereon.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to turn over the operation and control of the Illig Property to the jurisdiction of the Recreation Commission, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote that the Collector of Taxes shall collect under the title of Town Collector all accounts due the Town, or act in any way thereon.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to pay the Town Collector for the extra work of collecting all Town Accounts, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the purpose of increasing the salary of the Veteran's Agent, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chapter 670 of the General Laws. An act relatove to increasing the amounts of pensions, retirement allowances and annuities payable to certain former public employees, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 30. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 and transfer the sum of \$2,500.00 from the Dr. Andrew Jackson Howe Fund to the Town Hall Account, the total of these two amounts to be used to purchase and install a new oil burning heater and new hot and cold air ducts in the Town Hall, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of surplus chairs in the Town Hall, or act in any way thereon.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the town will vote to situate a new elementary school in part on, and to use for school purposes, the land conveyed to the town by Edgar J. Matthews by his deed dated June 9, 1921, recorded with Worcester District Registry of Deeds, Book 2315, Page 189, by Ernest R. Illig by his deed dated October 13, 1926, recorded with said Registry, Book 2419, Page 269, and by Ernest R. Illig by his deed dated April 1, 1937, recorded with said Registry, Book 2691, Page 251, or act thereon.
