March 4, 1957

- Article 4. Voted to authorize the Treasurer to borrow money from time to time with the approval of the Selectmen in anticipation of the revenue in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, of the General Laws.
- Article 5. Voted the American Legion Post to have charge of Memorial Day observance.
- Article 6. Voted under Article 2. (Compensation for members of the Fire Dept.).

- Article 7. Voted to appropriate the money from the Dog Fund to the Richards Memorial Library.
- Article 8. Voted to accept the list of Jurors as presented by the Selectmen.
- Article 9. Voted to accept as printed. (Electric Light Dept.).
- Article 10. Voted under Article 2. (Appropriate \$700.00 for vacation and sick leave pay.)
- Article 11. Voted to transfer \$2,381.87 from Highway Equipment Fund to Highway Equipment Maintenance Fund.
- Article 12 Voted under Article 2. (Appropriate \$2,900.00 and transfer \$7,875.00 for Chapter 81 Highway Maintenance.)
- Article 13. Voted under Article 2. (Appropriate \$1,600.00 and transfer \$3,200.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance.)
- Article 14. Voted under Article 2. (Appropriate \$3,000.00 and transfer \$12,000.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Construction.)

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

This Committee organized in March 1957 with Mr. Louis Childs as Chairman and a new member from the School Committee, Mr. Harry Clark.

The first proposal to be passed on was a hard-topped area 140' x 60' and divided into basketball and volleyball courts. It had constant use.

For the first time Paxton had a Little League. The ballfield was constructed by the joint efforts of the Recreation Committee and the Little League organization. This first year there was no participation with other towns. Every game was well attended and it gave the boys from ages eight to twelve a chance to play according to national rules and regulations.

Mr. Philip Ryan, lifeguard, had additional duties this year. He supervised organized recreation for children from 10:00 A. M. to noon, two days a week for one month. This was well attended and it is hoped the program can be extended for next year. Again the Paxton Boys' Club generously paid for the swimming lessons. Fifty-two children passed in the various courses and as most Townspeople realize, this is one of the most beneficial benefits provided, and to have it paid for by a Town organization is not only a financial help to this Committee but a splendid community project.

Weekly water tests were made by the Health Department, City of Worcester. These were posted on the bulletin board and in spite of the severe dryness they remained "good" throughout the summer.

Three times during the year the shed on the property was broken into, several items were stolen, windows and locks broken. The Chief of Police has a record from the investigating officer.

The Committee has plans for the coming year to provide recreation and enjoyment for more people.

This was one of the worst forest fire seasons in the history of Massachusetts and the cooperation of the townspeople in preventing any serious fires was greatly appreciated.

We have had one of the largest plant expansion for some time caused by the additions to our Center School, Anna Maria College, First Congregational Church, enlargement of pumping station and many new homes.

This has necessitated installing 280 Kilowatt of transformer capacity, 49 watthour meters and expanding our primary and secondary wires by some 32,317 feet and costing as follows:

There have been installed 3 new street lights, 1 on Asnebumskit Road and Crestwood Road and 2 on Crestwood Road as per vote of last Town Meeting.

The street lighting system is slowly being changed from series to multiple which when completed will not make a general blackout. When trouble develops in this type of control it will only be in a comparatively small area.

There have been installed new poles on Glen Ellen

Road, Center Avenue and Ledyard Road.

Our load peak came Thursday, December 26, at 5:30 P. M. with a demand of 900 Kilowatt or about 8.6% increase over 1956. Our Kilowatt hours used for 1957 increased to 3,000.000 Kilowatts or 13.07% over 1956.

To the Citizens of Paxton:

This is the fifty-eighth report in the series and is submitted by the School Committee and Superintendent of Schools and includes items taken from reports of the Principal and Supervisors of the Paxton School.

After twelve years of faithful and efficient service, Mr. M. Lawrence Price did not seek re-election to the School Committee. Mr. Price has contributed greatly to the Town through his service on the School Committee.

An important event of this year was the completion of the new addition. Appropriate dedicatory exercises in which town officials and committees participated were held on Sunday, June 2, 1957.

Overcrowding and split grades have been eliminated and there is now a more ideal classroom situation. There are double grades—one through five—with not more than twenty-four pupils in each grade room, which allows the teacher more time for individual instruction.

A school lunch program has been initiated with Mrs. Dorothy Cooper as manager. Approximately 225 pupils, 78% of the school enrollment, buy hot lunches daily.

The all-purpose room is used daily for school activities and is also providing location for local evening functions. The Girl and Boy Scout Organizations meet Tuesdays and Wednesdays, respectively, and the high school boys make use of the facilities for basketball on Fridays.

Due to increased enrollment and the addition of classrooms, the regular staff has been increased to fifteen teachers plus two instructors—one in Household and one in Industrial Arts. These two courses have been added to the curriculum this year for pupils in grades seven and eight. These instructors are employed on a part-time basis in conjunction with a similar program in Rutland, serving Paxton two days per week and Rutland three days per week.

Mr. Hugh B. Wylie was elected as custodian as increased school area demanded a second custodian.

Standardized tests in achievement were given in grades three through eight, covering reading, arithmetic, English and spelling. The following gives the standing of Paxton pupils as compared with the average norm for each grade:

The increment for the first three years is \$200, thereafter at the rate of \$150 until maximum is reached.

MUSIC-Miss Ruth S. Innes reports:

The time given vocal and instrumental music has been increased with appreciable results. Mr. Richard H. Bowden provides weekly instruction in string, woodwind and brass classes, Grades four through eight. Approximately twenty-one pupils are in this program. The Glee Club of forty members from Grades seven and eight meets weekly and performs publicly and at school assemblies.

ART-Mr. George N. Morris reports:

During the past year and a half, an attempt has been made to lay a foundation for an approach to the teaching of art which coincides with the best art education today. In order to help the teachers in this respect, a handbook has been written and provided for each teacher, which analyzes the general aims of art education and describes some of the many possible art techniques. An art materials workshop course has been offered. An effort is being made to increase parent understanding of public school art by offering to conduct art programs for the Parent-Teacher Associations. An exhibition of children's art was held in the Library in Holden. Annual exhibitions in the schools are being planned for the coming year. Progress in art has been more than satisfactory from a supervisor's standpoint.

HEALTH—Mrs. Helen P. Olmstead reports briefly on the activities of the school health program:

Of 100 children examined in Grades one, four and seven, fifteen were found to have physical defects of which eleven are being treated. Vision tests were given to 216 pupils—seventeen were found to need treatment—eleven are now receiving treatment.

A dental hygiene program was carried out for the purpose of finding and correcting dental defects and educating the children to practice correct dental hygiene procedures. There were fifty-eight children with defects and thirty-six have received dental treatment. This program was carried out through the cooperation of the State Department of Public Health. The required reports on physically handicapped children have been properly compiled and submitted. A survey was made to acquire information to have on file for each pupil as to whom to contact in the

event of an emergency in case the parent could not be reached. The usual areas of health in the schools have been served.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Wachusett Regional School District:

During the year a considerable amount of the Superintendent's time has been devoted to the study of the future building needs of the District.

A joint conference was held with the Holden Junior

High School Building Committee.

L. W. Briggs Associates, architect, submitted prelim-

inary plans for a proposed addition to the High School. Several meetings were held with town officials, from each of the five towns, to study these plans.

An official survey of the building needs of the District was made by Dr. John E. Marshall, a former Director of the Massachusetts School Building Assistance Commission. The results of this survey were presented to the District Committee and to several of the town officials from each of the five towns, and a summary of it released in the local newspapers.

There have been several changes in personnel during the year. On March 11th W. Goulding Warren resigned as Treasurer of the District having served very efficiently in this capacity since its organization in 1950. Mr. William F. Lionett was appointed to succeed him.

On April 22nd Gordon M. Thomas resigned as Principal of the High School to accept a principalship in Wilton, Connecticut. This meant considerable work on the part of the Committee and the Superintendent to select a new man.

On August 1st Neal T. Skillings, Principal of the Senior High School in Skowhegan, Maine assumed his duties as the second Principal of the High School.

Eleven vacancies occurred on the teaching staff for which the Superintendent recommended replacements, and one additional teacher was hired.

The operating budget for 1958 has been set up to take care of the increased enrollment which is anticipated in September. It is expected that the enrollment then will be between 1,050 and 1,070. This means that additional equipment will be necessary and possibly two additional teachers.

A look into the future indicates that it will be necessary to provide more classroom space to take care of the increased enrollment. This should be available not later than September of 1960 or double sessions will be inevitable.

In closing, may I express my sincere appreciation for the support given me by the Committee, the Faculty, the Custodians and the Clerical Staff.

May 1958 be a year of educational advancement.

WACHUSETT REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1957

To Superintendent William H. Buker and the members of the Wachusett Regional School District Committee

ENROLLMENT

In its fourth year of operation, Wachusett Regional High School has an enrollment, as of January 10, 1958, of 997 students, comprising 183 Seniors, 228 Juniors, 273 Sophomores, and 313 Freshmen. Since the rated capacity of this building is 900 pupils, it is obvious that we are badly crowded. In fact, the cafeteria and auditorium are each used-all day as classrooms. Present indications are that we shall be even more crowded next year and that the enrollment will continue to increase for several years to come. It is imperative that some means to relieve this undesirable situation be devised as soon as possible so that this school can continue to provide superior secondary education for the boys and girls of this district.

STAFF

The size of the faculty has remained the same this year as it was last year, namely 59. However, many changes in personnel took place both before school opened in September and since school has been in operation. Those who have left include Gordon Thomas, the former principal, Miss Patricia Anair, Gordon Cooper, Edward Eisnor, Robert Flagg, Mrs. Lois Hall, Peter Harrity, Philip Hugo, Carroll Jones, Gerard Rousseau, Mrs. Charlotte Williams, Mrs. Jean Williams, and Mrs. Hope Bracebridge, the school nurse. Replacements for the above are as follows: Neal Skillings, Principal, Luther Allison, Lawrence Barrington, Mrs. Anne Bernier, Robert Bombard,

Mrs. Alice Carr, Harry Lengas, Miss Frances Russell, Miss Rosa Simpson, James Torpey, Frederick Warren, George Yonker and Mrs. Pauline Rose, as school nurse.

Recently Mrs. Helen Still and Nathan Beardsley have resigned and have been replaced by William Wilbur and James Fleming. It is to be hoped that there will be no more changes amongst the faculty for some time to come. Such a rapid turn-over does not increase the efficiency of school operations.

Trade School for Girls (Practical Nursing)

Of the 466 graduates, 127 are attending four-year colleges, 33 junior colleges, 33 special schools and 30 nursing schools. Approximately 49% of the graduates continued their education after high school.

USE OF SCHOOL PROPERTY

The building continues to be widely used by both school and outside organizations. Adult Education classes of various types are in session three nights a week. The gymnasium is in almost constant demand either for dances or for intra-mural and inter-scholastic sports. The auditorium is frequently used, both by school groups such as the musical and dramatic organizations, and by non-school aggregations, for many varied purposes.

ACTIVITIES

In no school does all learning take place solely within the classrooms. To broaden and to enrich the students' program here, many group meetings take place both during "activity period" and after the regular school day is over. These thirty or more varied activities cover a wide field and range from strictly scholastic clubs such as the Latin Club, Chemistry Club, and others, through specialized groups like the Future Teachers' Club, the Yearbook Staff, the Dramatic and Musical groups, to the various intra-mural and inter-scholastic athletic teams. The Student Council is an important and powerful organization of outstanding students elected by their classmates. This group aids in forming school policies, scheduling social events, operating the school store, and the like. All in all, practically any student who so desires can become a member of some worth-while extra-curricular activity.

LIBRARY

The library has continued to grow in size and quality. At present there are 3,295 volumes including:

The year 1957 saw the continued growth and development of the Wachusett Regional High School.

During the year the Committee held twenty-one regular meetings as well as two special meetings and numerous sub-committee meetings.

Your Committee has continued working with the school's administration on its problems of finance, salaries, teacher supply, classroom needs, building needs and changes in administrative personnel.

In keeping with our policy of maintaining conditions attractive to the teaching staff we have continued to raise pay scales. This has been at a rate as consistent as possible with that of other towns in the area, but has been tempered by our ability as taxpayers to meet increasing tax requirements. This item which accounts for 70 to 75% of our operating budget has increased as follows:

1956—\$260,770.00 1957—\$295,020.00 1958—\$327,600.00

These items reflect not only salary increases but enrollment growth which requires an addition of 1 to 3 teachers per year.

This question of enrollment growth has occupied your Committee as they continued the study of plans for an addition. They have held meetings with local town officials, and have received the report of an educational consultant, Dr. John E. Marshall, to help them in their decisions. Work on this project will continue.

The Committee accepted as a gift from the first three graduating classes those very striking stainless steel letters now mounted on the outside of the building and identifying the school.

Changes in administration were made with the resignation (accepted with regret) of our principal Mr. Gordon Thomas, and the election of our new principal, Mr. Neal Skillings. Also, being cognizant of Supt. Buker's reaching retirement age in April of 1959, we have started discussions of our whole administrative set-up and have instructed a sub-committee to study the possibility of a more unified administrative set-up for our schools, grades 1 through 12. This, of course, will be undertaken in close cooperation with those other groups now involved with the administration of our schools.

The adult education advisory committee, under Mrs. Bourne's leadership, has continued a very worthwhile adult

education program.

The school lunch program has continued to expand and in 1957 served 117,029 meals at a cost of approximately \$45,000.00. Participation in the program rose from 61% to 67% of the pupils.

The Committee reviewed the educational program several times, but made no major changes except to allow seniors with good scholastic standings to take under certain conditions evening courses in the adult education program.

Policy on smoking was reviewed and a "no smoking" policy continued.

The Committee wishes to express its appreciation for the cooperation of the school administration, staff, pupils and parents in making ours a better school.

II. Sources of Income

This budget represents an increase of \$41,065.00 over the 1957 budget. In view of the trend in all costs, this increase of 7.2% is very conservative. However, the total amount assessed the participating towns is up by \$68,533.92 because of a reduction in credits, centered largely in tuition. This is the first year since the opening of our school that West Boylston has not had a large number of tuition students.

Article 1. To bring to the Election Officers their votes for the following Town Officers to be voted for upon the official ballot:

The polls will be open from 12:00 noon until 8:00 p. m.

The Business Meeting will be called to order at the Center School Auditorium at 7:30 p. m.

The voters will be called to act upon the following articles at the Business Meeting.

Article 2. To see what sums of money the town will raise by taxation and appropriate to defray the necessary and usual expenses of the several departments of the town for the fiscal year 1958 and especially for any and all of the following to wit:

Moderator, Selectmen, Town Accountant, Treasurer, Town Collector, Assessors, Legal, Town Clerk, Elections, Registrars Town Hall, Planning Board, Board of Appeals, Finance Committee, Police Department, School Traffic, Dog Officers, Fire Engineers, Fire Department, Building Inspector, Sealer, Tree Warden, Moth, Dutch Elm Disease, Health, Inspector of Animals, Inspector of Meat, Collection of Garbage, Highways, Public Welfare, Veterans Services, Schools, Library, Common, Town Clock, Insurance and Bonds, Printing, Memorial Day, Swimming Pool, Water Department, Cemeteries, Interest on Notes, Certification of Notes.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (see budget) with which to pay the proper charges of a Surety Company for acting as surety on bonds required of Town Officials and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1958, and to issue a note or notes of the Town therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes of the Town as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, of the General Laws.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to appoint the American Legion as a committee to have charge of the observance of Memorial Day, or act in any way thereon.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to give the members of the Fire Department compensation for their

services, or act in any way thereon.
Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the money received from the Dog Fund to the Richards Memorial Library, or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as presented by the Selectmen, or act in any way thereon.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote that the money voted for street lights and the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or for municipal power, and from sales of appliances and jobbing during the current fiscal year, be appropriated for the Municipal Light Plant the whole to be expended by the manager of the Municipal Light Plant under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant for the current fiscal year, as defined in Section 5, Chapter 164. of the General Laws and Chapter 235 of the Acts of 1937, and that if this income shall exceed the expense for said fiscal year, such excess shall be transferred to the construction fund of said Plant and appropriated and used for such additions thereto as may be thereafter authorized by the Municipal Light Board.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to provide vacation and sick leave pay to employees of the Highway and Water Department as follows:

'After having worked for the Town one full year, one week vacation with pay and one week sick leave with pay; after having worked for the Town two full years, two weeks vacation with pay and one week sick leave with pay. After having worked for the Town one full year, the Superintendent to receive two weeks vacation with pay, and one week sick leave, and after two years, three weeks vacation with pay, and one week sick leave with pay; sick

leave may accrue up to two weeks only.' or act in any way thereon.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$2,787.19 from Highway Equipment Fund to the Highway Equipment Maintenance Fund to be used to furnish supplies and maintain the Town's highway equipment or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with the State to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,100 to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highway Maintenance and that in addition the sum of \$8,525 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored upon their receipt, to unappropriated funds in the Treasury or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with the State and County to raise and appropriate the sum of \$\$1,600 to cover the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance and that in addition the sum of \$3,200 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State and County share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000 to cover the Town's share of the cost of construction on West Street, under Chapter 90 and that in addition the sum of \$28,000 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to cover the State and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury or to act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the amount requested for Water Department Budget from surplus to the Water Department Account, or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$400 from the Illig Fund to the Illig Property Maintenance Fund the same to be used to pay taxes and make necessary repairs, or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 to extend the water main on West Street, or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 to extend the water main on Streeter Road from Richards Avenue toward Grove Street, or act in any way thereon.

Disapproved by Finance Committee.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the purpose of making alterations to the Town Hall to provide additional office space, or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be used by the Board of Fire Engineers for the purpose of purchasing new hose, or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$966.52 to cover overdraft in the 1957 School Department Accounts, or act in any way thereon.

Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the purpose of increasing the salaries of the Board of Assessors.

No action by Finance Committee.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of increasing the salary of the Town Treasurer.

No action by Finance Committee.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to have all appointments receiving \$100 or over in the performance of their duties be elective, unless appointments are required by the General Laws of the State of Massachusetts, or act in any way thereon.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money in order to have the real estate and taxable personal property of the Town of Paxton revaluated, or act in any way thereon.

Disapproved by Finance Committee.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds, the sum of \$7,000 for the purpose of purchasing a 1958 dump truck for the Highway Department, or act in any way thereon.

Disapproved by Finance Committee.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the purpose of increasing the salary of the Town Building Inspector, or act in any way thereon.

No action by Finance Committee.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of erecting a street light on Hill Street to be located at the discretion of the Electric Light Board, or act in any way thereon.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended by the Board of Water Commissioners for surveys by engineers with respect to the development and preservation of the town's

water supply, and for legal studies as to rights in Asnebumsket Pond, or act in any way thereon.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to install 6 new hydrants as follows:

2 on Paxton Gardens Development

2 on Clarksons' Development

1 on Asnebumskit Street

1 on Glen Ellen Road

at a cost of \$300.00 per hydrant and raise and appropriate \$180.00 for the above purpose, or act in any way thereon.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to extend the water main on Grove Street northerly towards Streeter Road, or act in any way thereon.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to obtain exact figures on the possible sale of the Electric Light Plant to the Worcester County Electric Company in order to determine if such sale would be to the benefit of the Town or act in any way thereon.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the laying out of Briarcliff Lane by the Selectmen on date of 1958 as shown on a plan designated plan of lots in Paxton, Mass. Mountain View Sec. C drawn by P. R. Grout R. P. E. Dated Oct. 13, 1955, or act in any way thereon.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of acquiring by purchase an easement for public way purpose in Briarcliff Lane, or act in any way thereon.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase from Franklin G. Fleming Jr. Et All an easement for public way purposes in Briarcliff Lane being a way 50 ft. wide extending north easterly from Meadowbrook Drive a distance of approximately 675 ft. as shown on plan designated "Definite Plan Mountain View" sec. C drawn by P. R. Grout dated Oct. 13, 1955, or act in any way thereon.
