REPORT of ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Held March 3, 1969

The business meeting was called to order at 7:50 by the Moderator, J. Arden Woodall. Moderator declared a quorum was present. Meeting was held at Paxton Center School.

Article 1. The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. for the election of Town Officers. The election officers were sworn in and the voting proceeded. The total votes cast were 551.

The following officers were elected:

Moderator stated that article 2 (Town Budget) be taken up page by page with amendments to be made from the floor, and that the amounts of money set forth in the printed report of the Finance Committee be appropriated, for the several purposes therein itemized, each numbered item being considered a separate appropriation, and that the same be expended only for such purpose.

Unanimous vote-Budget approved as amended.

Article 3. It was voted that the Town raise and appropriate a sum of Money (see Budget Item 834) with which to pay the proper charges of a surety company for acting as surety on bonds required of Town Officials and authorize the Selectmen to approve the same.

Unanimous vote.

Article 4. It was voted that the Town authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue for the financial years beginning January 1, 1969 and January 1, 1970 in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4 and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Unanimous vote.

Article 5. It was voted that the Town appoint the American Legion as a committee to have charge of the observance of Memorial Day.

Unanimous vote.

Article 6. It was voted that the Town appoint a committee to have charge of the July 4th observance.

Unanimous vote.

Article 7. It was voted that the Town appropriate the money received from the Dog Fund to the Richards Memorial Library.

Unanimous vote.

Article 8. It was voted that the Town transfer the money received from the State for Library use to the Library Account.

Unanimous vote.

Article 9. It was voted that the Town vote the money for street lights and the income from the sales of electricity to private consumers or for electricity supplied to municipal buildings or for municipal power and from sales of appliances and jobbing during the current fiscal year, be appropriated for the Municipal Light Plant, the whole to be expended by the Manager of the Municipal Light Plant under the direction and control of the Municipal Light Board for the expense of the plant, to include out of state travel of the employees where necessary, for the current fiscal year, as defined in Section 57. Chapter 164, of the General Laws. and if this income shall exceed the expense for said fiscal year, such excess shall be transferred to the construction fund of said plant and appropriated and used for such additions thereto as may be thereafter authorized by the Municipal Light Board.

Unanimous vote.

Article 10. It was voted that the Town provide vacation and sick leave pay to employees of the Highway and Water Departments.

Unanimous vote.

Article 11. It was voted that the Town transfer the sum of \$8,655.66 from the Highway Machine Rentals Fund

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to the Highway Equipment Maintenance Fund to be used to furnish supplies and maintain the Town's highway equipment.

Unanimous vote.

Article 12. It was voted to cooperate with the State to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300 to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highway Maintenance and that in addition, the sum of \$9,075 be borrowed or transferred from unappropriated, available funds in the Treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated funds in the Treasury.

Unanimous vote.

Article 13. It was voted that the Town cooperate with the State and County to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 to cover the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance and that in addition, the sum of \$3,600 be borrowed or transferred from unappropriated, available funds in the Treasury to meet the State's and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated, available funds in the Treasury.

Unanimous vote.

Article 14. It was voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 to cover the Town's share of the cost of construction on West Street under Chapter 90, and that in addition, the sum of \$12,000 be borrowed or transferred from unappropriated, available funds in the Treasury to cover the State's and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated, available funds in the Treasury.

Unanimous vote.

Transfer the amount requested for the Water Department budget from Surplus to the Water Department account.

Article 16. It was voted that the sum of \$28,000 be appropriated for the purpose of replacing the Town grader and to trade in the 1946 Austin Western grader, such sum to be provided as follows:

- \$10,342.35 by transfer from the School Construction Account in the custody of the Treasurer, and
- (b) \$10,000.00 by transfer from the Stabilization Fund, and
- (c) the balance to be raised by taxation.

Unanimous vote.

Article 17. It was voted that the Town accept Section 6H of Chapter 40 of the General Laws which provides that a town which accepts this section may make repairs on private ways which have been open to public use for 6 years or more without incurring liability on account of any damage caused by such repairs, and to raise and appropriate a sum of \$5,000 to be spent during 1969 for this purpose.

Unanimous vote.

Article 18. REPORT of the BOARD of SELECTMEN

The year 1969 was one of increased activity for your Select Board.

In one sense, it was what one might call a year of enforcement: The Building Inspector was instructed to strictly enforce the zoning bylaws in all respects, but with particular emphasis on the illegal storage of unregistered motor vehicles. Housing contractors doing business in Paxton were advised that the building bylaws were going to be strictly enforced and new procedures were established relative to building permit applications.

In another sense, it was a year of firsts: It was the first time in Paxton's history that all three members of the Select Board attended the state-wide meeting of the Massachusetts Selectmen's Association. It was also the fi,rst time that any improvements were made to private streets in Paxton by our Highway Department. This work was done under Sec. 6H of Chapter 40, which permits public improvement of private ways and for which the Town last year appropriated the sum of \$5,000.00. The improvements were made on the streets in West Tatnuck Heights and we hope that this is but the start of a continuing program.

It was also a year for improving the lines of communication between departments and we have met on different occasions with all of the other Boards in town in an effort to effect greater understanding of one anothers needs and problems.

All in all, your Select Board feels that 1969 was a year of achievements and we look forward to 1970 being equally fruitful.

REPORT of the **BOARD** of **HEALTH**

The Board has had several undertakings in the past year.

- 1. Our Public Health nurse has been transferred to Wachusett Agency as of November 1969. From this time on they will pay her salary and expenses for services rendered to patients and any surplus of funds will be used to reduce our apportionment to the agency. This amounts to a savings of about \$700.00 per year to the Town.
- 2. The Board has begun dye testing in different areas of Town to check malfunctioning systems.
- 3. The percolation test procedures have been changed to the State maximum code requiring more stringent tests in areas. This test takes considerably more time but gives a more accurate analysis of conditions.
- 4. The Board has also changed the procedure for building permits in regards to subsurface soil ex-

amination. All builders must present to the Board a plot plan before any tests will be done.

- 5. The new garbage contract for the year has been awarded to A. J. Letourneau at a price of \$36,000.00 per year. This amounts to a \$.10 increase per rubbish collection for each family at the time this report was written. There are about 1,165 dwellings in Town, an increase of approximately 175 homes since the first contract was awarded in 1968.
- 6. State Law requires the reporting of all communicable diseases to the Board of Health.

The Board meets on the 2nd Monday of the month. Please feel free to contact us for any assistance we may be able to offer.

The Planning Board re-organized for the year 1969 by naming Herbert F. Wentworth as chairman; Betty C. Peterson, Regional Representative; Robert F. Perry, Clerk and Gerald K. Lowe, Capital Outlay Committee.

The Board was seriously shaken by the sudden death of Herbert Wentworth who was one of the most respected "planners" in the Commonwealth and who performed invaluable service to the Town of Paxton during the many years he served in all phases of Town Government. The Paxton Planning Board will labor under a severe handicap without Herb's much needed and invaluable guidance. The greatest loss is that we all lost a good and close friend.

During 1969 the Planning Board approved two subdivisions which are presently under construction. We met with the Light Board in connection with its proposed garage and otherwise attempted to lend a hand to departments as needed. We prepared and printed a bound copy of the Zoning Bylaw, Sub-division Bylaw and Building Code.

Your Board met twice monthly on the above business and the continuation of the Master Plan Study which is now well into the second phase. The entire plan is scheduled to be completed in October of this year.

In anticipation of The Plan being completed, a twelve member Advisory Committee has been formed to evaluate and implement the recommendations of the Planning Consultant. This committee is made up of six members of the Town Government and six members chosen from the population at-large.

The Board wishes to thank all the people who have helped us in gathering information for the Master Plan and who have, in many ways, made our job easier and more enjoyable.

REPORT of the CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

During the year 1969 the Conservation Commission continued to press for further Open Space acquisition in two of the areas recommended by the Natural Resources Technical Team in their 1967 Report.

The Commission felt that an acquisition of a part of Asnebumskit Hill should be made, and after several meetings with the owner, a tentative agreement for acquisitions was reached and Articles inserted in the Town Warrant for consideration at the March Annual Town Meeting.

The limited use of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company land on Asnebumskit Hill for open space activities by Letter of Agreement continues in effect, and this year similar arrangements were made with the Yankee Network whose land adjoins that of A. T. & T.

A Work Day was held on May 3rd for the purpose of improving the appearance of the Hilltop Banking as a roadside beautification project. The entire area was cleaned of debris that somehow seems to collect in such places, and Pfitzer junipers were planted near the stairway. While little improvement was visible by year's end, the Commission will devote some of its efforts towards this project in 1970.

On May 10th a Fishing Derby at Illig Pond was sponsored by the Conservation Commission with Robert Paulson serving as Chairman. The purpose of this event was two-fold: first, to provide a day of enjoyment for the participants; and secondly, to develop more awareness of the conservation and recreational facilities available in Paxton. Winners in various categories were given prizes donated by Paxton, Holden, and Worcester businesses. The Commission wishes to acknowledge the generosity of these donors.

As the quality of our environment becomes of greater concern, the activities of a Conservation Commission should be expanded, and to that end, the members of the Commission have accepted duties in the following areas: Long Range Planning—Robert Paulson; Education—Susan Corcoran and Shannon Jacobs; Land Upkeep and Roadside Beautification —Ida Fraioli; Liaison with other Town Departments and Officials—Hilton Cunningham; and Land Acquisitions and Easements—Robert Fowler and Chester Johnson.

The Conservation Commission will sorely miss Mr. Herbert Wentworth who, in addition to being one of the founders of the Conservation Commission, and a member ex-officio, was a fountainhead of information and guidance for the Commission throughout the years of its existence.

A 500 foot 12 inch drain pipe was dug up, cleaned and relaid to a new grade between Forestdale Road and Grove Street.

Davidson Road, Walnut Street, Ledyard Road, Boynton Parkway and Pine Street were graded and gravel added where needed to make them passable through the winter and spring. Birch Street was excavated and graveled. Two catch basins were installed in trouble spots. More drainage is planned for 1970.

The library has been a busy place in 1969 — partly because our registered borrowers now number 1,546. Circulation has increased, also reference transactions. In the fall, the library hours were expanded to include "supper-

time hours," (continuous coverage from 1 P.M. to 9 P.M.), on Tuesday and Thursdays during our winter schedule. This addition has been appreciated and well used.

Donna Mathews, Specialist in Work with Children and Young Adults from the Bureau of Library Extension, helped us to be one of the libraries chosen to receive a cassette player and 50 cassettes (a \$275.00 value) from Title I, Special Projects Grants. The cassette library covers children's literature samplings from nursery rhymes to Shakespeare. It has been in almost constant use in various town programs, at school and in private homes.

In addition to the many helpful services of Central Regional, a series of workshops was given by Mrs. Janet Baker of the Worcester Public Library, concerning book selection. I attended all but one of these meetings.

The staff has taken a total of four library science courses at Worcester State College, including books for children, reference, and cataloguing and classification.

Gifts of recordings from several record companies and individuals now total 172. 534 records have circulated, with Christmas music proving most popular.

Golden Years Club graciously gave us a large American flag to display near the fireplace.

A junior high reading list has been developed through school and the books are kept in a collection. Three full encyclopedias, Britannica Jr., World Book, and Golden Encyclopedia, now may circulate.

MASTER PLOTS has been purchased for help with classic literature. The support of the trustees and the cooperation of the library staff continue to make my work a pleasure.

REPORT of the FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department answered eighty-four (84) calls for service in 1969 as follows:

44 Grass & Brush3 Motor Vehicle13 Building6 Mutual Aid18 Miscellaneous

This is an increase of fourteen (14) over last year or about 20%. Most people will recall 1969 for the fires at the Congregational Church and Anna Maria College, but I would like to call attention to the grass and brush fire calls.

The number of calls represents an increase of 57%over 1968 but does not show the true picture. Although the Department answered 44 calls of this nature there were sixty-five (65) fires extinguished. The largest portion of these calls were roadside fires and practically every section of town was hit during the year. Many times, grass and brush fires are caused by carelessness, especially those that occur during the dry parts of the spring and fall seasons and I urge everyone to use caution when using their outdoor rubbish burners during these periods. There were also many grass and brush fires where the cause was unknown. There is considerable concern because these types have continuously increased over the past few years, especialy at night. Some of these fires get very costly before they are extinguished although the actual property loss in dollars may not be as great as the loss in a building.

The number of calls concerning buildings was about the same as 1968 but the total dollar loss was more than any previous year. We received a definite shock on May 12 when an alarm of fire was reported in the First Congregational Church. Excellent work on the part of the Paxton Fire Department as well as the Rutland, Holden, Leicester.

West Boylston, and Spencer Departments kept the building from being destroyed and was a very good example of mutual aid as it is understood in the fire departments.

The Paxton Fire Department participated in mutual aid calls to other towns and was the recipient of the same on several occasions during the year and especially on two others beside the Church. One of these was a fire at the Channel 14 station on Asnebumskit Hill. The other was at Miriam Hall on the Anna Maria College campus. Here, again, at the college an excellent job was done in keeping the fire and resulting damage to a minimum.

In 1969 a different system of training was incorporated. This system consisting of dividing the firefighters into four groups and assigning one of each of the groups to a Deputy Chief. The Deputy then was assigned one of the four pieces of apparatus. Each group was then instructed on that particular piece of apparatus by the Deputy assisted by either a Captain or Lieutenant. At the end of a two month period the groups change and work on a different truck. For example, the group being instructed on Engine 1 moved to Engine 2 etc. This system seems to be working well and will be continued.

During 1969 more books have been added to the small library started in 1968. All these books deal in some way with the fire service from management to maintenance and are available to all members of the Department. Courses are also available at Quinsigamond Community College in Fire Science and Technology and this type of instruction is being taken advantage of.

There are a few things I would like to call attention to for future consideration as part of this report.

The first is that in a year or two you will be asked to consider replacing the present Engine No. 1. This may come sooner and will depend on how well this present truck lasts. This truck was purchased in 1946 and has been the most active piece in the department during this 23 year period. It has also been somewhat overloaded because of the amount of water carried for a truck this size. There is also a possibility that Engine No. 3 may need replacing before Engine No. 1 because it is estimated to be at least 26 years old. It has not had the usage that Engine No. 1 has had however.

The next thing is modernizing or updating the fire alarm system. A step has been taken in this direction with the purchase and installation of the radio home alerting system for the members. The Center School is tied into the present siren system and the Congregational Church will be before long. Consideration should be given to other public buildings so that all the buildings, schools, churches, etc. could be connected up to a central alarm system with some kind of an annunciator or signal panel showing the location of the alarm. Also newer and more modern methods of calling in and/or giving an alarm should be explored.

The possibility of setting up a paid answering service for all the town departments, Fire, Police, Highway, Electrical, Water, etc., should be considered. As the town grows there is an increasing amount of traffic in communications. The idea of the answering service, so called, would be to have all incoming calls and requests channeled into a central point, and then the necessary departments dispatched either by phone or radio, depending on the situation.

These last two items, fire alarm, and answering service, were part of the Fire Department report for 1968. I feel these are important items for future consideration and worth repeating in this report.

From the Manager's Desk:

Pursuit of low cost power was again the main goal of the Light Department for 1969. Several meetings were held

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with the Federal Regulatory Agencies and our supplier in an effort to obtain lower rates and more reliable service. A great deal of progress has been made in this direction, although no definite reduction has been received at this time.

The cooperation that the Paxton Light Department received from the Municipal Electric Association Mutual Aid Committee during the recent ice storms was excellent and we are extremely grateful, for without this aid the ice storm would have cost several thousand dollars more, and the outage time would have been considerabley longer. Crews from the North and the South shores worked for us, all of which was made possible through the Mutual Aid program. Our Department has aided other Municipals in the past, and this time we were on the receiving end. At this time I'd like to thank our own help, from the line crew to the girls in the office who put in many long hours without complaint, until all customers were back in service, also the Police, Fire and Highway crews deserve our gratitude. While on the subject of storms: let me give a few guidelines to the customer for future use:

- 1. Turn off your emergency oil burner switch, and other motor equipment until full power is restored.
- 2. Call the Light Department office—756-9508—and give your name, address, and nature of your trouble.
- 3. Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed as much as possible; the opening of doors shortens the time that the refrigerator or freezer will stay cold. Under normal conditions a freezer will hold 30 hours or more without spoilage.
- 4. If you use a home generator, be very careful that you do not connect it so as to cause a feedback on the Light Department lines.

I am listing some of the major projects completed in 1969:

- 1. Three new transformers were added to the substation increasing the station KVA capacity to 10,000.
- 2. Two new banks of regulators were added at the station allowing the Department the opportunity to regulate the voltage of each circuit separately.
- 3. The West Street road project, requiring considerable relocation of poles and reconductoring, was completed.
- 4. The underground feeder and the new street lighting at Anna Maria College was placed in service. Several of the new developments also required extensions of their underground lines and equipment.
- 5. A new $\frac{1}{2}$ ton pickup truck for meter reading and for the use of the foreman has been purchased, also a new wood chipping machine.
- 6. Groundwork for a new garage was undertaken, and the Light Commissioners are hopeful that the building can be started in 1970.

Projects to be undertaken in 1970:

- 1. Construction of a new garage.
- 2. The placement of spacer cable along Richards Avenue from Pleasant Street to the Worcester County Memorial Park, a distance of approximately 5,000 feet.
- 3. The placement of spacer cable along Maple Street from Richards Avenue to Grove Street.
- 4. Replacement of the Bucket truck chassis. The present one is a 1964 model and is showing body rust and wear and tear.

In regard to the construction of a new building, I would like to state that garage space, along with storage and office facilities, are desperately needed. This Department sincerely hopes that you will support this project at the March Town Meeting.

Once again it has been a pleasure to serve all our customers electrically, and again we urge you to feel free to call about your electric problems.

REPORT of the **RECREATION** COMMITTEE

During 1969, work on the new Utility Building continued with completion of the building expected early this year. Also expected to be completed is a picnic area next to the swimming pool grounds and landscaping.

There have been complaints on the iron color which gets into the swimming pool water as the summer season progresses. A sum of money is included in our budget this year to have our water supply analized to see if this problem can be solved.

Our summer program had to be cut back considerably in 1969 due to a change in accounting procedures imposed on us by State Auditors. In the past, we collected a fee from

those individuals participating in a special event such as a trip and used this fee to pay for the cost of the event. Although the State Auditors ruling still allowed us to collect the fee in 1969, we can not use this fee until 1970 after the townspeople vote to transfer this money from a special account into the Recreation Account. Careful use of the money available in 1969 by our Recreation Superintendent, Mr. Charles McManus allowed us to run a successful summer program.

The ski instruction program is being held at the Pine Ridge Ski Area in Barre again this winter and approximately twice the number of children have enrolled as last year. It is unfortunate that more adults did not take advantage of this program.

We regret that we must end this report on a sour note. Vandalism was practically non-existent in the Recreation Area until the past two years when it increased at a frightening rate. The wire reenforced windows in the new Utility Building were smashed in shortly after the summer season was over and the building was used as a clubhouse by Paxton youth. Bags of chemicals have been ripped open, equipment smashed and first aid kits dumped. The teenagers involved were caught in the act. They are Paxton youth, not outsiders. We ask all parents to discuss this situation with their children to see that this does not happen again.

REPORT of the BOARD of ASSESSORS

The first half of 1969 saw the completion of the revaluation study. Individual hearings were held by the mapping firm of Avis Airmap and the revaluation company of Whipple Magane Darcy between June 13 and 18. Present at those hearings was a representative of the State Bureau of Local Assessment. Less than 50 appointments had to be made to hear any grievances.

The Board followed very closely the progress of the revaluation study. Nevertheless, a number of problems arose, both in the areas of mapping and valuations, which had to be resolved directly by your assessors later in the year. The taxpayers of Paxton are to be commended for their fine cooperation.

Revaluation increased assessments by about four times to \$25,418,411.00. Land which had been valued before as low as 10 per cent of market value, increased proportionally more than building assessments.

The 1968 tax rate was \$92.00 per thousand valuation which would have corresponded to \$24.50 after revaluation. The increase of about 9 per cent to the 1969 tax rate of \$26.75 was due to the increased expenditures voted at the Town Meeting and the required adjustments of the State's "Cherry Sheet".

The "Cherry Sheet" was received approximately three months late, around June 20, 1969, which delayed the setting of the 1969 tax rate. Same was determined in July at \$26.75 per thousand valuation and thereafter submitted to the State for approval. Due to several delays, some tax bills were committed as late as October 1969.

The Board will continue to assess at fair-market value

or 100 per cent valuation as of January 1, 1969. Detailed records and up-to-date maps are being kept by the Board.

After all 1969 real-estate transfers have been posted, maps may be obtained at cost from the Board. Requests should be made in writing on or before April 1, 1970.

Because of the very detailed records that now are kept, the work load of your assessors has increased greatly. The official meeting of the Board is on the first Monday of each month, but your assessors are at the office practically every Monday, Tuesday and Thursday except during the summer months. Individual appointments can be made upon request.

REPORT of the SCHOOL COMMITTEE

We are pleased to submit our 1969 Annual Report to the voters of Paxton. 1969 was an eventful and challenging year for the Paxton School System. Your Committee's responsibilities for attendance at the various School Committee meetings noted in our report of 1968 remain basically the same.

In August our Superintendent of Schools, Irving H. Agard, resigned to accept a similar position in Shrewsbury. We were fortunate to have him with us and appreciate his capable and dedicated effort for the school system. Paxton in cooperation with the other four towns of School Union 64 and the Wachusett Regional School District, after extensive recruiting, selected Dr. Edward P. Yaglou as Mr. Agard's successor. Dr. Yaglou has an excellent educational background, successful experience and enthusiasm for the position. He has a bachelor's degree in architecture and a master's and doctor's degree in educational administration from Harvard. Prior to accepting this position he was principal of a High School in New Haven, Connecticut.

Each year the Paxton School Committee faces the budget dilemma. There is always a need to keep the budget within realistic proportion and cope with expanding pupil enrollments, competitive salaries, increasing costs of educational materials, and cost increases in utilities such as fuel and electricity. Our 1970 budget recommendations have increased approximately 10 percent over 1969. Looking at today's inflation and budget increases reported in neighboring towns, suggests that this increase is quite modest and realistic. In addition to meeting the inflationary costs, it is quite necessary that we not delay or put off needed repairs and maintenance, for delay will generally mean greater expense in the long run. Two members of the Committee actively participated in the preparing of the proposed K-12 Regional Agreement which is now finalized and has been submitted to the Wachusett Regional School District Committee for further action.

As of September of 1970 the responsibilities for transporting students in grades 9-12 are that of the Wachusett Regional School District Comittee and will result in 100 percent state reimbursement. This will not, however, result in any major changes in the present transportation arrangements.

It is the desire of the Paxton School Committee to keep the voters of Paxton as fully informed as possible on all aspects of our educational endeavors. We meet at the Paxton Center School on the third Monday of each month and welcome your attendance.

We express our appreciation for the dedicated efforts of the staff and the support of the community in making possible an exemplary educational offering for the youth of Paxton.

School Administration Annual Report

As Superintendents of Schools we respectfully submit our 1969 Annual Report to the Schoool Committee of Paxton.

Our report of 1968 explained in detail the organization of School Union 64 and the responsibilities of the Superintendents for the five towns. Therefore this year we include only the October 1, 1969 membership figures, Paxton's percentage and cost per pupil, and refer you to the previous page for this statistical information.

This past year we have been challenged with recruiting teachers, cooperative study and in-service training, providing sound maintenance and improvement programs, and routine supervision of the daily program.

Changes in our teaching staff in 1969 numbered ten, Of the ten new teachers employed, five had teaching experience. A rigorous recruiting program was carried on. We visited colleges and universities including University of Maine, Bates College, University of Vermont, University of New Hampshire, University of Massachusetts, Lowell State College, Framingham State College, Boston College, and Boston University. Following campus visits, prospective candidates were invited to visit the Paxton School System.

Curriculum study, revision, change and improvement is a constant requirement. To be effective, study revision and change must be a cooperative effort of the teaching staff and the Administration. With the encouragement and support of the School Committee our cooperative efforts this past year have been successful. Our curriculum study work this past year concentrated in the area of social studies, english and linguistics, mathematics, physical education and industrial arts. The studies were culminated with up-to-date printed curriculum guides ready for the teachers who helped plan them. In addition to curriculum study, revision, etc., we must also be involved in constant and continual in-service training. A number of our teachers completed a successful in-service training program in linguistics and social studies conducted at Anna Maria College.

In September 1969 speech therapy was introduced for the first time with a qualified speech therapist visiting the Paxton Schools $1\frac{1}{2}$ days per week. Under a federally funded program, sponsored by the Wachusett Regional School District, students are receiving help in the area of perceptual motor development.

For the first time students from Paxton attended the Title I summer program referred to as ROSE (Remedial Opportunity School Endeavor). This six-week summer session is held at the Dawson School in Holden. We look forward to continuing this successful program.

Approximately 500 library books were purchased with Title II Federal funds, and \$800.00 worth of science, geography and reading teaching aids. The non-graded primary program after one year of operation suggests success and continuation.

We were able to provide needed additional library space by converting an existing large classroom to a library and changing the library into a standard classroom. This was accomplished by our own maintenasce staff at a minimum of expense.

We can point to an exemplary maintenance and building improvement program and commend the head custodian and his staff for their untiring efforts.

The cafeteria program continues to be an efficient operation. It is interesting to note that this is the only cafeteria operation in School Union 64 that receives no subsidy from

the School Committee budget other than for purchase of major equipment items.

The increasing labor costs and skyrocketing food prices may require a cost of lunch increase in the future.

Our goals for 1970 include the following:

-curriculum study in the areas of science, health, conservation education and spelling;

- -continued in-service training programs for the staff and a new orientation program for beginning teachers;
- -continuation of the ROSE summer program;
- -providing additional instruction time in industrial arts, home economics, and girls' physical education;
- ---installation of fluorescent lighting in the 1963 addition providing more candle power at a lesser cost, surface and improvements to the bituminous play and parking areas.

We acknowledge and appreciate the dedicated efforts of the School Committee and staff and the teamwork which they have demonstrated.
